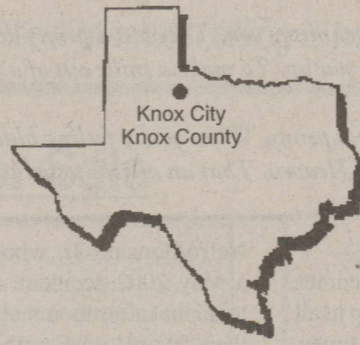

'Hounds gearing up for for playoff berth, battle with Munday is Friday

Spells brothers lead Greyhounds to 28-14 victory over Rotan's Yellowhammers

Junior Riley Spells and Sophomore Quentin Spells made their parents and the rest of Knox City proud last Friday night as both brothers picked up touchdowns against Rotan. Along with a trip across the goal line each, Riley picked up 148 yards on 18 carries while little brother Quentin picked up 116 yards on 14 carries. Other Greyhounds picking up touchdowns were Sophomore Andy Shaver and Senior Carlos Ruiz.

Knox City picked up a total of 353 yards on 49 carries, and another 41 yards through the air. Compared to Rotan's 244 yards on the ground and 8 through the air, it was easy to see that Knox City had the dominant offense last Friday night, despite the game being played in Yellowhammer territory. Knox City picked up 14 first downs while the Greyhound defense held Rotan to only 11 first downs for the game. The game at Rotan was

a valuable district win for the Greyhounds, advancing their district record to 3-1. Knox City has one regular scheduled district game left, they will host the Munday Moguls here on Friday night, game time is 7:30 p.m.

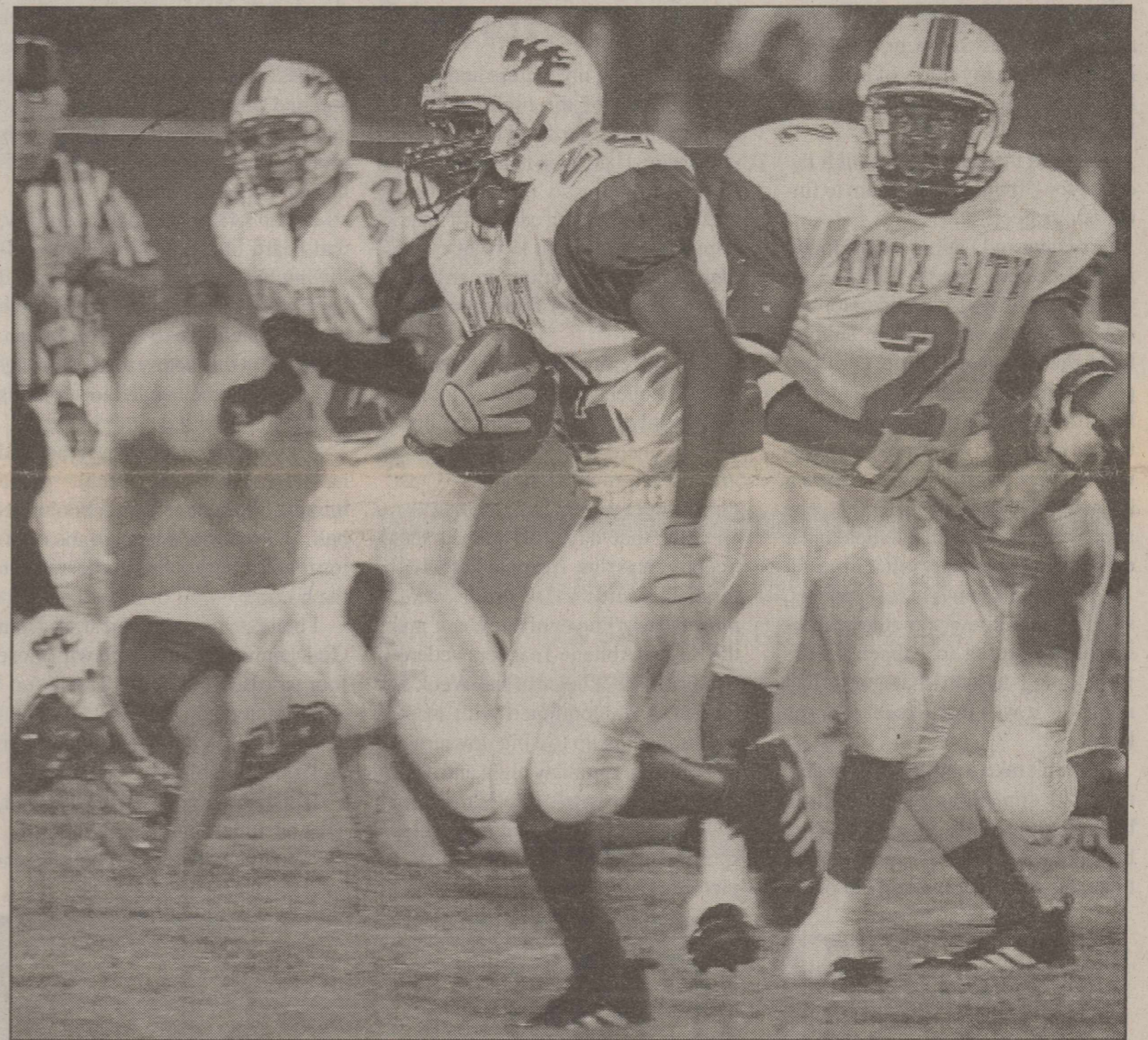
Hounds battle Friday for a playoff spot as runner-up

Greyhound Stadium in Knox City will be filled to over capacity this Friday night when our Greyhounds host the Munday Moguls in a game plays a key part in the puzzle over which team in District 9A will advance to the playoffs as the District Runner Up. With the Paducah Dragons having a 4-0 lead in the district, they will advance to the playoffs as the District Champions. They will play the Hamlin Pied Pipers this Friday night. Hamlin is currently tied for second place with Knox City. Munday is at third place. In order for Knox City to advance to the playoffs, our 'Hounds have to win against Munday and Paducah will have to defeat Hamlin. Should Hamlin defeat Paducah, they will advance as the District Runner-Ups.

Regardless of District playoff implications, the game on Friday night between Knox City and Munday will be for Knox County 'bragging rights' and is always guaranteed to be thrilling. Parking and seating will be full, so plan on getting to the Stadium early!

Veterans Day Memorial program is Tuesday, November 11 in Benjamin

Citizens from throughout Knox County and the surrounding area will gather at the Knox County Veterans Memorial in Benjamin next Tuesday morning, November 11, to honor Veterans of American Armed Forces.

The annual program is sponsored by the Knox County Historical Commission, and is sched-

uled to begin at 11:00 a.m.

Marva Gentry, a Gold Star Mother, former Knox City resident and mother of David Gentry of Knox City will place the memorial wreath honoring veterans. Corporal David Gentry was killed in action on September 29, 1967 in Vietnam.

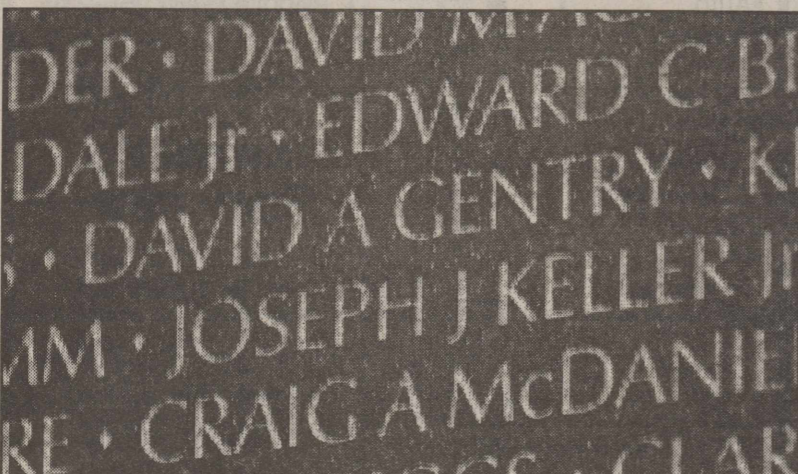
Three school children of Knox

County will represent their schools as they are the featured speakers, reading interviews they conducted with veterans.

Charles Baker of Munday will be the master of ceremonies. There will be a presentation of the colors, and a pledge of allegiance led by Benjamin third and fourth graders. Music will be provided by the Knox City High School Greyhound Pride Band, under the direction of Mr. Mark Tucker.

Those attending should plan on bringing their own lawn chairs to be comfortable throughout the program.

Following the program at the memorial, there will be a lunch at the Benjamin Ex-Students Center consisting of hamburger, beans and cobbler. Tickets for the meal will be available for sale. Proceeds from the meal, the sale of Joe Barton books, memorial postcards and Veterans Day videos will be used to help pay the expenses of supporting the Knox County Veterans Memorial in Benjamin, located at the intersection of US 82 and State Hwy 6.

'Oh, how I love this story . . .'

"That's what my Grandpa told me . . . Oh, how I loved that story."

Tuesday, November 4, marked the sixth anniversary of the death of my father and Scooter's granddad, Buddy Angle.

I recall this time every year, in remembrance of someone I never knew life without.

Last year though, was different.

Many of you know about 'this story' and had asked me last year to write of the events that occurred. Seems as though time completely got away - until now.

So for those who asked, reminisce with me, if you will.

I remember the day with a smile on my face.

It was the day of the 'big' game with Hamlin. All of us 'Hound' parents and supporters had been busy all week long literally painting the town in anticipation of our first district game.

After working every night all week long, painting the bleachers, checkerboarding the endzones, hanging miles and miles of streamers, and planning other spirit filled activities, we all had really been busy and Friday morning was no exception.

We still had lots and lots to do.

I went by the post office and gathered our KC News mail. I took it on to the office and plopped it down on my desk when something caught my eye. There was a newsletter from the North Texas Rehabilitation Center in Wichita Falls. Printed next to our address label was the poem, 'A Penny'. I stopped from my flurry of activities long enough to read it in its entirety - I'm awfully glad I did.

I smiled that morning as I left the office for Greyhound Stadium to finish our projects.

As Dave and I, along with Hound mom LaDonna Smith, finished up our details on the visitors side, I looked down at my feet and there shining like a diamond was the most brilliant penny I've ever seen. It was then that I told them of the poem I had read just that morning - so I knew that this was no ordinary penny. With LaDonna knowing Daddy like she did, she smiled at me and with the look in her eye, she knew exactly what I meant.

I put the penny in my pocket, smiling, and knew something wonderful was going to happen - - we were going to win that game that night - - it was just a feeling in my heart.

It didn't take long for the 'penny' news to spread among our little booster group and soon people were beginning to bring me their copper treasures that they too had the privi-

lege of finding.

It was uncanny - pennies, pennies and more pennies - showing up in all the right places at all the right times. Those pennies that I collected were put in a Tide bottle to shake at the games.

As the district season continued and throughout the playoffs, Scooter would come in at night from his day, reach in his pocket, pull a penny out and say 'Mom - look what I found today.'

The week of the Munday game rolled around and once again, parents and supporters were busy planning just what to do to make it a perfect week.

We had been extremely busy and on Tuesday morning it dawned on me that there had been no pennies in sight.

I was called to the school that morning to take a picture, so I hurriedly grabbed the camera and took off so I could get back and finish up our paper.

After taking my picture and starting back out of the high school, I stepped off the steps and there it was - the penny I had been hoping to find! I was thrilled - so thrilled, that I picked it up and with camera in hand, jumped up and down in front of the high school, screaming to myself, "Yes! This is what I've been looking for!"

I happily hurried to my vehicle and as I opened the door, I looked down and there was another one! Two in one day, I knew something great was going to happen - I just didn't know what!

Later that day, we learned that Scooter was the recipient of two football awards - *The Abilene Reporter News* 'Player of the Week' and the KTXS/Abilene Teachers Federal Credit Union 'Player of the Week'.

The week continued with many events leading up to a big downtown pep rally on Thursday night and a big Friday afternoon pep rally in the gym.

That afternoon, Pat Gonzales spoke at the pep rally and shared a picture of her son, former Greyhound

Nefro Gonzales Jr., who was killed in a May 2002 accident. She told the team that afternoon that he would be their "Angel on Fourth Down" that night.

This held so very true, as the Greyhounds converted all of their fourth downs into first downs that evening leading to the district championship title.

On Monday preceding the Munday game, Greyhound Logan Morrow, lost his grandfather, Sheep Morrow, to an apparent heart attack. This day, November 4, was the same day that my dad and Scooter's granddad had died - five years earlier. The Morrow family shared that the elder Mr. Morrow had already bought a red shirt to wear into the Greyhound playoff season.

When the Greyhounds rolled into Munday and got off the bus, they went into the locker room. Scooter said as he placed his helmet on a shelf, to his amazement were three pennies staring him in the face. He put these three pennies under his thigh pad and played with them there the entire game - signifying one for his granddad, one for Logan's grandfather and one for Nefro Jr.

Logan's father, Poncho Morrow, had heard of the 'Penny' plight following his father's death. He found his first one at the high school when he had gone there to see son Logan. He brought this penny to me smiling. I told Poncho he needed to keep this penny and hold it dear to his heart.

Scooter knew that his granddad had never had the opportunity to see him play a down of high school football. We've always been of the opinion that Daddy has had the best seat in the house!

I believe in angels and signs from God. Pennies are inscribed with those four words, 'In God We Trust'. So remember . . .

"Don't pass by that penny, when you're feeling blue.
It may be a penny from Heaven,
That an angel's tossed to you."
"That's what my Grandpa told me - Oh, how I love this story."

Benjamin Mustangs end season a game early

A forfeit from the Rochester Steers would cut short the season for the Mustangs.

With a season plagued by injuries, Coach Copeland would rely on his three seniors to provide superior leadership and a strong work ethic for the Mustangs. That proved productive with Sr. Enrique Acevedo racking up 1,922 yards of offense resulting in 27 TD's.

On the other side of the ball Enrique would lead the team and the area in all classifications of schools including six-man to 5A in tackles with 160, 1 interception and 1 fumble recovery. Sharing in that leadership was Sr. Tyler Collins. Collins would add 647 yards receiving resulting in 10 TD's and on defense would have 89 tackles. Collins also was responsible for leading the team in interceptions with 5 and 3 fumble recoveries. Starting fullback senior Anthony Lamb pocketed 132 yards rushing and 42 yards receiving with 6 TD's. Lamb also pitched in with 34 tackles and added a fumble recovery to his list of stats.

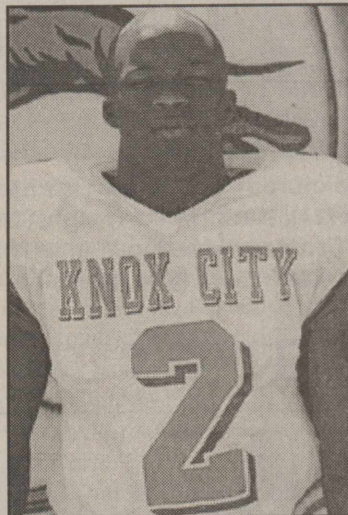

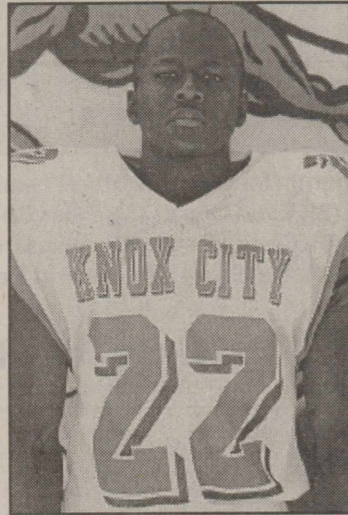

Kursten Reynolds inducted into TTU's nursing honor society

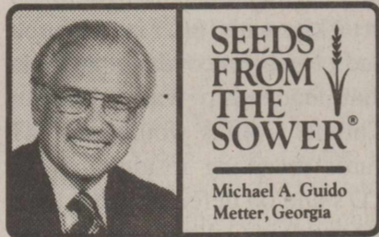

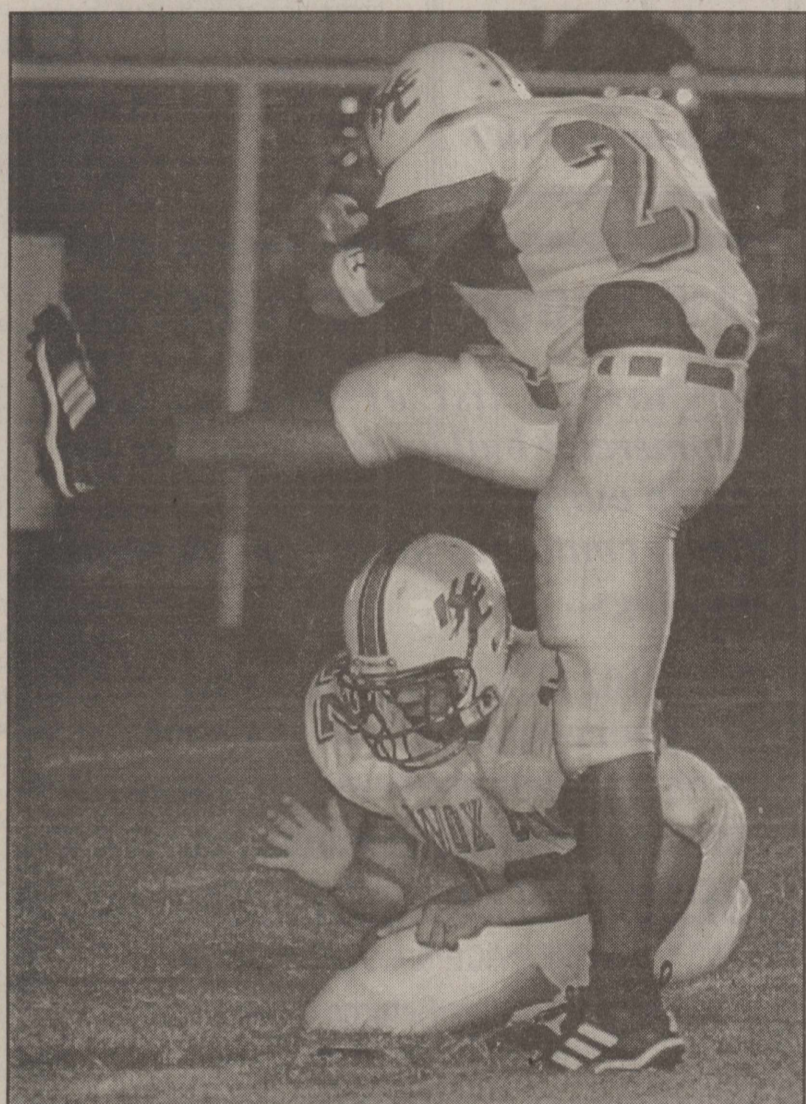

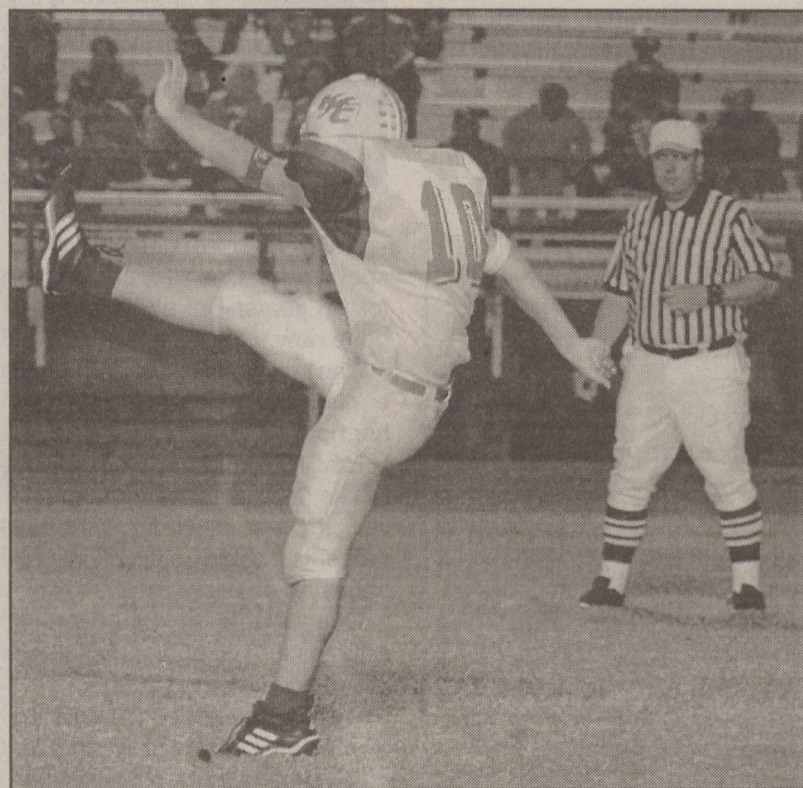
