

Exhibit depicts legendary 6666 ranch

Meinzer's work on display at Fort Worth Cattle Raisers Museum

To the casual eye, the area around Guthrie - - halfway between Wichita Falls and Lubbock -- - isn't a grand country. It is rock and cedar-speckled. It has a barren look, though it hides thousands of cattle behind its brushy

It is ranch country, home to places like the famed Four Sixes, the Pitchfork and the Tongue River ranches.

Photographer Wyman Meinzer knows the region well. He was born on a ranch at nearby Benjamin and has made his living capturing life on these plains and in other rural folds of Texas.

That's why, on one particular day last winter, he noticed the afternoon sky. He knew the sun

would quickly drop below the horizon and cast a red reflection on the turgid clouds. The clouds, he recognized, would scatter the dying light on the pastured horses

He captured the moment on film, and the photograph is now on display at the Cattle Raisers Museum in Fort Worth.

It is a dramatic photo, matted and encased in a large Gothic

Meinzer's work is part of an exhibit titled The 6666 Today. There are 10 photographs in the collection, which will be on display at the museum until January

The photographs are for sale -- priced from \$350 to \$1,500 - with a portion of the proceeds going toward the museum's \$20 million capital campaign.

The Cattle Raisers Museum is raising money for a new home near the National Cowgirls Museum and Hall of Fame adjacent to the Will Rogers Memorial Com-


All the photos were shot on the Four Sixes. "I've been working on them since December," said Meinzer, who was recently in Fort Worth for several book signings.

His newest books are The Great Lonely Places of the Texas Plains, with text by Walt McDonald, the 2001 Texas Poet Laureate; and Texas Hill Country with John

Meinzer was proclaimed Texas State Photographer in 1997 by the Texas Legislature and then-Gov.

He was quick to select a favorite among his new photo exhibit. It was the snapshot of the red

sky and the Four Sixes horses taken on that late afternoon. "That picture continues to just

floor me when I look at it," he said. "It was hard to imagine it turned out the way it did, the shooting conditions were so tough."

The lighting in the western sky was at a really low level, he said. It was a rich light that reflected on the horse, but it was dim. He had to balance the need for light with the need to stop action on the grazing horses. It was a difficult task.

"When I looked at the negatives, lo and behold there it was," he said. "It was a delightful surprise."

Meinzer said he continues to shoot on the Sixes. He goes out when there is a branding or weaning or any event that holds photographic promise. "I might not shoot for two or three weeks," he said, "then something comes up and I'm there for several days at a

There is an ebb and flow to life at the Four Sixes, he said. It is the kind of big ranch that has "a life of its own, a personality that is set apart from the smaller outfits.

"It is a progressive ranch but one that still reaches back to hold on to its history.'

Meinzer said his photography shows the natural working order at the ranch. There is nothing set up. He never stages a shot, and he never asks to cowboys to do something over again for the camera.

"I never intervene in the action," he said. "This exhibit shows the natural heart and soul of the

Don't believe the rumors.... KCHS will be playing 11 man football next year, NOT 6 man

In the past two weeks, several other newspaper stories or sports columns have said Knox City will be playing 6 man football next year. According to Superintendent Louis Baty, that is not true and he has no idea how that information was obtained.

While Paducah and Crowell have decided they will be playing 6 man ball next year, Knox City will continue to play 11 man football. Predicted enrollment figures put Knox City in the 6 man range, but the school still has the option to play 11 man as long as there are enough players coming out for football.

The 2004 district alignment will be decided by the UIL within the next two months. With Crowell and Paducah dropping down, the Greyhounds will probably end up traveling further for away games. Rumors have several current 2A schools dropping down to 1A, but there has been no confirmation yet on what schools the Knox City Greyhounds will face during the 2004 football season.

As soon as more information becomes available from the UIL, we will get the news to our readers as soon as we can.


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

Great American Smokeout is Thursday

Want to quit smoking? Now's your chance!

AUSTIN-TX, -- On November 20, the American Cancer Society, the nation's leading voluntary health agency, will host the 27th Great American Smokeout and help millions of smokers kick the habit, and help youth understand the importance of never starting to smoke.

The Great American Smokeout() promotion is the American Cancer Society's annual, nationally recognized day when we ask smokers to put down their cigarettes, cigars, spit tobacco, or any tobacco product because they all have the potential to cause cancer. Because we know that approximately 32 million smokers (out of 46 million current smokers) want to quit smoking completely, we will continue to offer support and education to the public. The promise of an addiction-free life has encouraged many smokers to join in and prove to themselves that they can live a day without cigarettes, and that they can therefore live the rest of their lives without them. Approximately 10,900 Texans will be diagnosed with lung cancer in 2003 and of those, 9,900 will die. Nationwide, 171,900 will be diagnosed and 157,200 will die. The American Cancer Society is sending a message this year

with a poster stating "It's Never Too Late to Quit," proclaiming that quitting smoking significantly reduces your risk of cancer, not only of the lung, but also mouth, nasal cavities, pharynx, larynx, esophagus, stomach, pancreas, and other organs. Smokers who are ready to kick the habit can find help through the American Cancer Society's Quitline by calling toll-free, 1-877-YES-QUIT. The Quitline, funded by the Texas Department of Health using Tobacco Settlement funds, offers free telephone counseling services, advice and cessation materials to smokers, age 13 and older. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's "Cigarette Smoking Among Adults - United States, 2001" report shows a slow but continued decline in adult smoking rates from 25 percent in 1993 to 22.8 percent in 2001. Current or former smokers may enroll in a National Lung Screening Trial (NLST), a cancer screening trial funded by the National Cancer Institute that will take place at 30 study sites throughout the United States, including The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. The trial, slated to last eight years, will examine the risks and benefits of spiral CT scans compared to chest X-rays.




Mrs. Faver died November 4, 2003, in Fort Worth.
