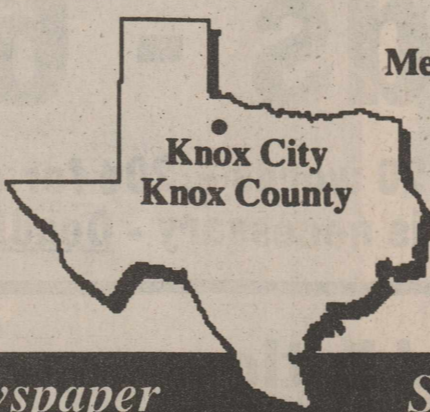

Mr. Phipps, 60, died Thursday, February 1, in the Knox County Hospital.

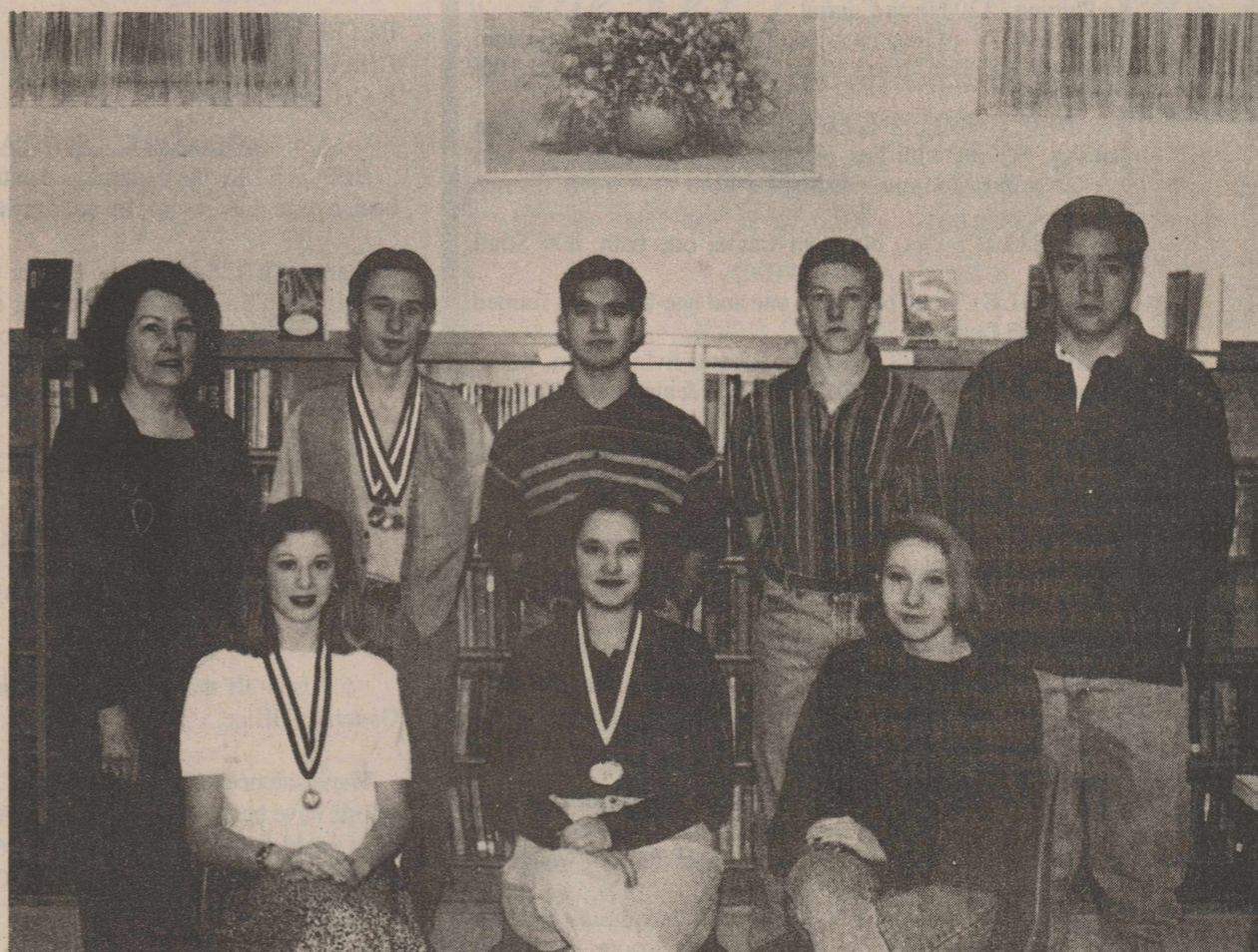
Born April 13, 1935, in Goree, he was preceded in death by his parents, Lee J. Phipps and Eula Williams Phipps and by his grandparents, who raised Leonard, Claude and Ila Williams.

He graduated from Carney High School in O'Brien in 1953. He had lived in Knox County for 58 years and retired from Oxy Company (Cities Service) after 22 years of service and then served as a Knox County Commissioner for Precinct #1 for three years.

He married Wanda Grant on October 16, 1959, in Knox City. He was a member of the Knox City Volunteer Fire Department and the Foursquare Church.

CHECK YOUR W-2 FORMS FOR CORRECT NUMBER & NAME

Be sure your Social Security number and name are correctly shown on the W-2 form (statement of earnings) your employer is required to have given you by the end of January, Social Security District Manager Greg White urged.

"Compare the number and name shown on the W-2 with the information on your Social Security card. Report any discrepancies to your employer and local Social Security office right away. The name and number on your W-2 must match your Social Security record so that your earnings will be credited to the correct Social Security record," White said. "Call Social Security's toll-free number 1-800-772-1213 if you detect a problem on your W-2."

Retirement, survivors, and disability benefits are based on an individual's earnings record. Uncredited earnings could adversely affect your future eligibility for benefits, as well as your benefit amount.

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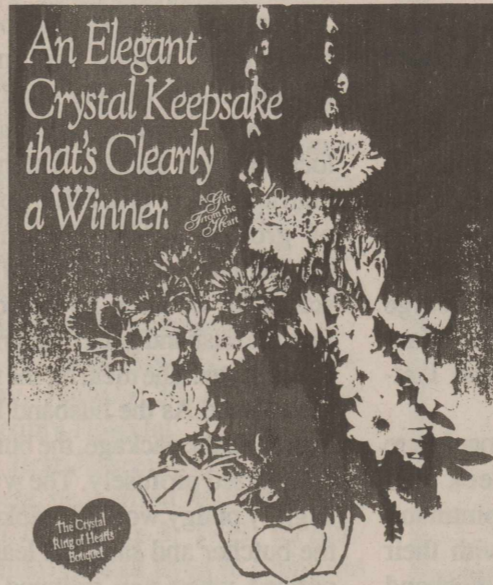
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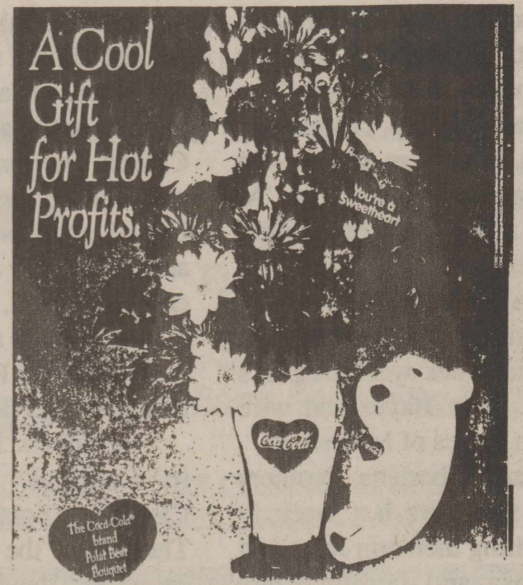
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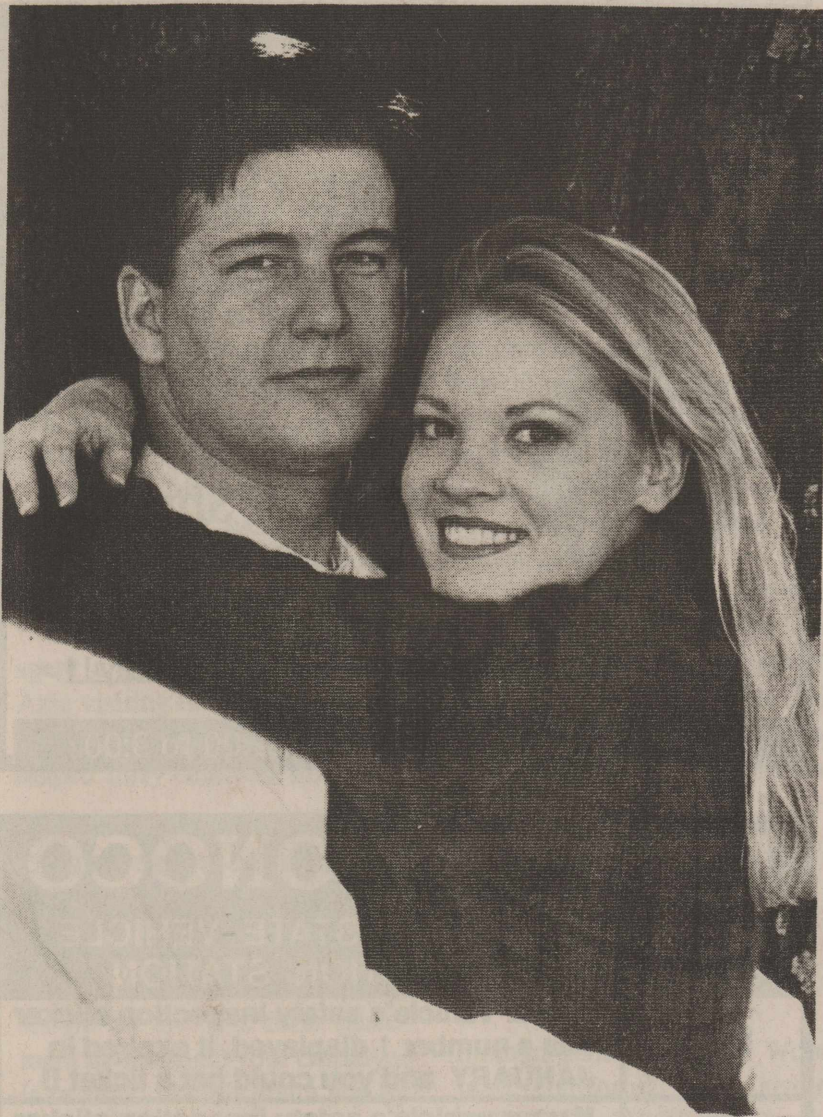
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Knox City Police Department Has Busy Month In December

One Case Of Prostitution Reported In City

The Knox City Police department released its monthly report for activities in December, 1995, and Police Chief Dean Homstad reported a very busy month that included one charge of prostitution here in Knox City. Receiving a total of 308 calls, officers responded to 6 actual criminal offenses, of which all 6 were cleared or otherwise handled. A total of 3 charges were filed in regard to these 6 criminal offenses.

Offenses reported included 1 theft, 1 criminal mischief, 1 domestic related assault, 1 disorderly conduct, 1 charge of prostitution, and 1 driving while intoxicated.

Traffic offenses for December included 6 charges filed, 22 warnings issued and officers investigated 1 accident.

Reserve officers for the Knox City Police Department contributed a total of 31.5 hours of duty and classroom time to the city and residents during December.

Other items reported to the Police Department are classified as incidents. These incidents either did not occur in the city or

were not considered to be criminal offenses for some other reason. Incidents reported include 1 domestic related kidnapping, 2 thefts, 1 case of lost/found property, 1 disorderly conduct, 1 case of harassment, and 1 contempt of court charge. Although the above incidents were either not reported as or considered to be criminal offenses, they still had to be investigated to determine if they were to be reported to another agency, or if a record needed to be made for future reference.

During the month of December, all incidents were settled to the satisfaction of the Knox City Police Department and Police Chief Dean Homstad.

Mr. Patterson, 83, died Tuesday, January 30, in the Knox County Hospital.

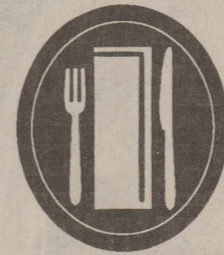

Most of all, I would like to show my appreciation to all the Lady Bulldog teams.

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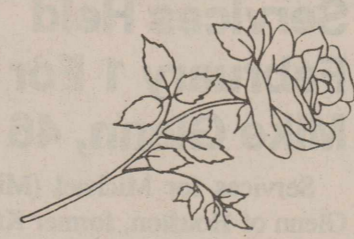

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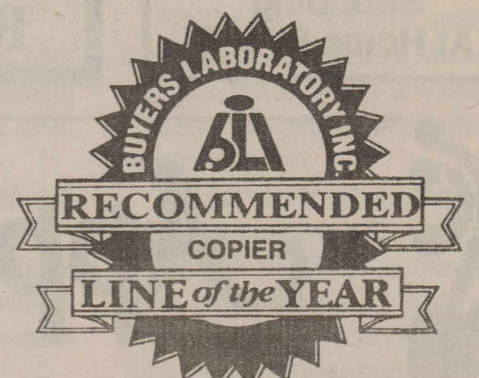
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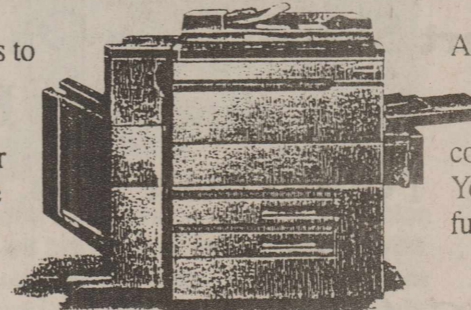
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Hertel Rites Are Held Tuesday In Seymour

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.
