

However, if the Hounds were not successful in their Tuesday night game, classes will be held as usual on Friday, Baty said.



Guilty Pleas Entered In February 20 District Court

William Watson, 47, of Knox City was sentenced in the Knox County District Court to five years confinement in the penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of sexual assault, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

The plea was entered on Tues-

day, February 20, 1996 before District Judge David Hajek. The investigation leading up to the charges was conducted by Knox City Police Chief Dean Homstad. In other court action, Alan Lee Benedict, 36, of Lubbock and Carl David Engbrock, 43, of Benjamin,

both plead guilty to indictments charging them with felony DWI. 
Barrick Found Guilty

Ricky Lee Barrick, 46, was found guilty of sexual assault on a 35-year old retarded woman ater more than two hours of deliberation by a Knox County jury last Friday. At 9:35 p.m. Friday, jurors began punishment deliberations and after more than an hour, handed down the maximum pen-

alty of 20 years in prison.

Barrick was convicted of raping the woman at her home in Benjamin on Sept. 14. He was driving her home after a day of work at a Seymour, Texas, vocational program where she worked and he was a trainer.



It's Still Not Too Late For Your Free Soil Tests, Says Aquifier Project

There is still time left to get your soil tested free in Haskell and Knox counties.

The Seymour Aquifer Project will continue free soil testing sthrough the month of March. The free soil testing program is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

The soil sample should be taken from a uniform area of the field and represent from 10 to 40 acres. Take 10 to 15 samples from the field and mix in a clean plastic bucket, take out about one pint for a composite sample. Be sure to fill out an information sheet to send in along with the sample. The information sheet asks about the type of crop to be grown and the yield goal of the crop.


