

# State sales tax rebate for Feb.'97 to Knox City drops by 20.33% Overall Yearly total also drops 9.99%

(Austin, April, 1997) State Comptroller John Sharp delivered \$142.5 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,085 Texas cities and 117 counties, including a check of \$9,270.38 to Knox City. The rebate to Knox City reflects a, decrease of 20.33% from a rebate check of \$11,636.88 for the same period in 1996. Knox City collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax, with a full 1.000% of the tax directed towards EDC funding.

Texas cities received \$130 million, 2.9 percent lower than payments of \$133.9 million at this same time one year ago. Counties received a total of 12.4 million in rebates, 2.9 percent below the \$12.8 million in allocations for the same period in 1996.

April, 1997 payments include taxes collected by monthly filers on February, 1997 sales and reported to the Comptroller in March of 1997.

For other Knox County cities, Benjamin received \$94.23, a 59.93% decrease from \$235.21 for the same period a year ago. Goree received \$109.55, down 56.66% from a payment of \$252.82 last year at the same time. Munday received \$3,462.86, down 28.93% from a payment of \$4,872.91 in 1996 at the same time. Munday collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax, with Benjamin and Goree collecting a 1.000% sales tax.

In Haskell County, Haskell received \$18,496.82, down 8.29% from a payment of \$20,170.57 in 1996. Haskell collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax. O'Brien received \$29.83 this period, up 2077.37% from a payment of \$1.37 a year ago. Rochester received \$319.00, down 38.85% form a payment of \$521.73 during the same period last year.

In Jones County, Stamford received a payment of \$29,288.26, down 12.99% from a payment of \$33,663.64 in 1996. Anson received \$7,234.64, down 29.23% from a payment of \$10,223.60 last year. Hamlin received a check of \$10,061.02, down 11.879% from \$11,416.35 in 1996. Stamford, Anson and Hamlin all collect a 2% rate of sales tax.

In Baylor County, the city of

Seymour received a payment of \$8,037.36, down 15.90% from a payment of \$9,557.88 in 1996. Seymour collects a 1.000 rate of sales tax.

In Foard County, Crowell received a payment of \$2,183.83, down 35.97% from a payment of \$3,410.66 in 1996. Crowell collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax.

In Dickens County, Dickens received \$1,510.54, down 11.36% from a payment of \$1,704.32 in 1996. Spur received a payment of \$2,359.58, up 119.91% from a 1996 payment of \$1,072.97. Dickens collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax, while Spur collects a 1% rate.

In Cottle County, Paducah received a payment of \$2,209.52 down 26.01% from a payment of \$2,986.42 in 1996. Paducah collects a 1% rate of sales tax.

Sales tax figures are furnished to THE KNOX COUNTY NEWS as a public service by the State Comptroller's office to be used as an economic indicator of the state of the economy in Texas. The full report is available for inspection at the NEWS office.



### Fungicide okayed for control of ergot in Texas grain sorghum

The Texas Department of Agriculture, acting on a request from the Texas Grain Sorghum Association, has issued a crisis exemption for use of propiconazole on grain sorghum to control ergot. The product, Tilt fungicide, can effectively control the new disease and can now be used in all sorghum-producing counties in Texas.

The disease, sorghum ergot or Claviceps africana, is a fungal infection of sorghum. The disease, which has been prevalent in Africa and Asia for decades, finally made its way to Texas this year. The U.S. sorghum industry has been closely tracking the disease since its spread to the Western Hemisphere two years ago. Scientists have documented its northward movement and predicted the movement of this disease into Texas.

"When the disease was found in South Texas, the Texas Grain Sorghum Association and the National Grain Sorghum Producers were ready to go with a request for an exemption so that Tilt could be used to control the disease," said Travis Taylor, executive director of the association. "We asked the Texas Department of Agriculture to issue the exemption and they worked very quickly to get it through.

"We really appreciate the way TDA handled our request, because now the product can be used immediately to treat infected commercial seed production in the Rio Grande Valley and South Texas," he said. "Being able to


treat sorghum produced for hybrid seed so quickly ensures a safe, clean supply of seed for next year."

"We know that every other major sorghum-producing country in the world has the disease and that Asia and Africa have had the disease for a long time," Taylor said. "Because of the experience of other countries, we are confident that it will not be a significant problem for farmers in Texas."

Taylor said that the risk of getting ergot in sorghum produced for grain-which accounts for almost all sorghum produced in Texas—is extremely low. That's because these sorghums are self fertilizing and are not likely to be affected by ergot. When fertilization occurs in a rapid fashion, as it does in commercial hybrids, it prevents infection, even when disease spores are present. He pointed out that sterile forage sorghums are highly susceptible to the disease, but only when they are allowed to head. However, producers must be sure that they manage their forage correctly to lower the risk of infection.

TDA has also submitted a request to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for a specific exemption for the product. This will allow the crisis exemption to remain in effect until EPA makes a decision on the specific exemption application.

"Some restrictions apply to the use of this product and we encourage producers to carefully follow the rules provided by TDA," Taylor said.




She was preceded in death by her husband, Charles L. Baker on November 17, 1989; and her brother, Sterman Hudspeth in 1989.




