Eaton pleads guilty, is sentenced on June 23

Jerry Carl Eaton, 40, of Knox City plead guilty last Monday, June 23, 1997, in the Knox County District Court to two separate indictments, one charging him with cattle rustling and the second for the sale of drugs, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

Pursuant to a plea bargain agreement with the State which was approved by District Judge David Hajek, Eaton was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary on the cattle theft charge and ten years in the penitentiary on the drug sale charge. The sentences are to run concurrently.

Eaton is presently serving a six-year sentence in the Federal penitentiary for possession with intent to sell methamphetamine.

In the Knox City drug case, Eaton was indicted for selling methamphetamine to an undercover Drug Task Force officer in Knox City on June 6, 1995.

He had also been indicted by a Knox County Grand Jury for theft of 22 head of cattle from Dolan

Brinson. Eaton was charged in that indictment along with Payton Ellis Tankersley and Kevin Wayne White, all three alleged to be acting together in a criminal combination to accomplish the

White previously plead guilty pursuant to a plea bargain agreement and received a seven-year probated sentence but with the stipulation he had to make restitution to Dolan Brinson for the stolen cattle. In addition, he, and Eaton, as a part of the plea bargain agreement, agreed to appear and testify for the State at the jury trial of Tankersley.

Tankersley was tried before a Knox County jury on April 8, 1997 after pleading not guilty to the cattle theft indictment. The jury found him guilty on April 11, 1997 and assessed a five-year sentence in the penitentiary plus a \$10,000.00 fine.

Tankersley is presently in the process in appealing that convic-

On A Wizer Note....

Moisture, cool weather & bugs......

Most cotton is planted and looking good. Wheat harvest has been slow at time and very fast at others. Yield from 3 to 40 bushels/ acre have been reported on dryland wheat while irrigated fields have been yielding around 45-50 bushels/acre.

There have been many individuals asking about all of the moisture that is inside the straw this year. This sticky, syrup-like substance has caused problems for many combine operations.

Originally, I figured this was due to freeze damage on the stalk. After visiting with some wheat specialists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Vernon, I have realized that it is not our April freeze to blame.

This spring has been relatively cool and humid. This weather pattern has not allowed the stalk to dry as fast as the heads and grain_ Because of this, the wheat plant is green while the grain and head is mature.

Some producers have also reported a swarm of lacewings in their fields. There are no absolute answers for this. The best guess is an abundance of aphids/green bugs feeding on fresh vegetative growth within these wheat fields are attracting these natural enemies. Normally, by now, the green bugs are leaving wheat fields because of the lack of green vegetative growth. However, with the cool, wet climate that has been cast upon us, the wheat fields are producing some green growth, thus keeping high numbers of greenbugs.

Another big concern this spring is the Boll Weevil Eradication. I have heard several rumors as to when they will start spraying. The rumors have ranged from late June to late August.

I will try to help keep everyone aware of what is happening with the eradication. The boll weevil numbers are very high this spring. On June 6, I had an average of 234 weevils per trap. On June 8, 1996 the average number was 9. If the eradication does not begin spraying this month it will be vital that farmers do their own spraying if they want to make a crop. 





Yes, an insecticide is a chemical that kills or controls an insect pest. The reason it is an important part in viral disease control is because viral diseases are transferred from one plant to another by in-

sects with biting, chewing or socking mouth part. This is very similar to Malaria being transferred by mosquitoes. Most cotton farmers can tell you how thrips are a very big nuisance to a young cotton field. Thrips thrive very well in wheat. When the wheat begins to dry, the thrips look for a new host. This happens to be the same time that cotton is being planted.

Recently, some gardens have been showing signs of thrip damage and viral diseases. Thrips may be a big from now until the cotton begins to grow. That is because of all the wheat fields that have been mowed for hay or are no longer April freeze. These two instances have caused a massive movement of thrips.

So how can a person tell if they have a viral disease or a fungal disease? Fungal diseases will usually cause circular color patterns. Viral diseases will have a mosaic color pattern. Occasionally a viral disease may have some spots. However, this is from the feeding activity of the insects.

Another big problem that I have noticed here in Knox County is nutrient deficiency. Many of our lawns show a yellowing from iron or zinc deficiency. This can be compensated by adding a fertilizer with 2 or 3% iron and zinc. However, those fertilizers often have phosphorous and potassium in them. This may or may not be

Most Texas soils require nitrogen. However, one application a year is not good enough. Nitrogen needs to be applied a little bit at a time throughout the growing season. On the other hand, only about half the soils in Texas needs more phosphorous and only a few places require additional potassium. That is why soil sampling is so important. A soil sample kit may be obtained through any county Extension office.
