
Johnson families, watermelon production honored by Texas House Resolution





Knox City - O'Brien CISD announces dress code for 1997-1998 school year

DRESS AND GROOMING

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with District guidelines.

Dress and grooming practices that create safety hazards or disruption and therefore are prohibited include the following:

1. Pictures, emblems or writing on clothing or elsewhere that are lewd, offensive, vulgar or obscene, that advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs or any substance prohibited under school policy or that suggests devil worship/occult activities, either explicitly or by innuendo. This would include skeletons, skulls or demonic representations that are commonly used by many types of musical

bands.2. Shirts that expose the midriff when the student's arms are

riff when the student's arms are raised. Tank-tops and jerseys may be worn over t-shirts, if otherwise appropriate.

3. Trousers worn down around the hips. (sagging trousers are expressly forbidden)

4. Skirts and dresses not extending to at least the fingertips when arms and fingers are extended to the sides.

5. Shorts or skorts, except during PE.

6. Clothing that is considered revealing, excessively tight, clothing with slits, splits, tears or holes, or deemed inappropriate by the building principal.

7. Hats, caps, head-dress, etc., shall not be worn in school buildings or at any indoor school-sponsored functions. Caps worn to outdoor functions must be worn with the bill forward.

8. Ornaments in, on, or around

the ears or nose of male students or nose ornaments on female students.

9. Facial hair.

10. Male students hair that extends past the bottom of the collar on a normal dress shirt or the middle of the ear or impairs vision.

Male student's hair must be neatly groomed. The length and bulk of the hair will be such that it does not present a ragged, unkempt or extreme appearance. The hair should present a tapered appearance when combed and not fall past the middle of the ear or eyebrow or past the collar on a normal dress shirt.

Male students will not wear "tails" or ponytails of any form. There will be no designs shaved in the hair or multiple lengths of hair above the ears.

"Chili bowl", "chopped" or "cropped" cuts do not conform to the above policy.

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Police Department Report

The Knox City Police Department had another very busy month during June 1997, receiving a total of 500 calls and tasks which required attention. This total included 20 actual criminal offenses, of which 16 were cleared or otherwise handled. Five charges were filed in regard to the above offenses, with two of the offenses involving juveniles as offender.

Offenses reported include: burglary of a building 1, burglary of a habitation 3, fail to comply with requirements on striking unattended vehicle 1, minor in possession 1, assault 2, criminal mischief 2, kidnapping 1, forgery 2, theft 5, littering 1, harassment 1, traffic charges filed 8, warnings issued 16, and accidents 3.

Other items reported to the Knox City Police Department during June are classified as incidents. These incidents were not able to be considered as a criminal offense, however, they must be handled in a responsible and proper manner.

Incidents reported include: prowler 2, missing person 1, runaway 1, child possession dispute 1, child custody dispute 1, argument 1.

According to a newsletter published by the folk at Central Dispatch (911), the Knox City Police Department received a total of 45 emergency calls during the month of May, 1997. This information was made available to late to be entered in the May report, however, this department greatly appreciates the said information being made available to us.

On June 3, Officer Harry E. Steen attended a Fred Prior Seminar in Abilene. The seminar was a course dealing with business and report writing, which will be very helpful in properly creating the numerous reports that come through this office on a monthly basis.

Also on June 3, Officer Steen was issued a renewal Emergency Medical Technician certificate from the Texas Department of Health. The knowledge required to obtain a EMT certificate can be very valuable when responding to an accident or any other situation that may require immediate medical attention.

On June 11-13, Officer Harry E. Steen attended a Police Emergency Driving school that was held in Vernon. The course was put on by the Texas A&M University. At times, a police officer puts in long hours of driving, so any education that can make a driver safer and more aware of other drivers can be of great benefit.

On June 20, I attended a Fred Prior Seminar in Abilene which dealt with suggestions on how to handle Multiple Projects/Problems. It is rare that this department can totally concentrate on only one offense/problem at a time. Usually, there are several problems that need to be handled or considered at any one given time.

On June 26, I travelled to Aspermont to attend the Resource Conservation and Development (RC & D) meeting. At the meeting, this department, along with several other various agencies, received a FREE surplus computer. The computer was made available through the efforts of Dan Henson, who heads the Four Winds RC & D district, with the office being located in Knox City. Dan is also a Knox City resident and strives to do whatever necessary to better the community. I personally do thank Dan for his efforts to make the equipment available.

Help for needy Medicare beneficiaries

Medicare beneficiaries with limited income but who are not poor enough to qualify for Medicaid should be aware of the help available from two Medicare programs: the "Qualified Medicare Beneficiary Program" for beneficiaries below the poverty level, and the "Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary Program" for beneficiaries slightly above the poverty level. The programs are designed to make Medicare coverage available to people who have problems paying the Medicare premiums and out-of-pocket medical expenses. Interested persons should apply at their State Social Services Agency.

Vernon Regional Junior College offers college courses over the internet

College credit courses will be taught over the Internet by Vernon Regional Junior College (Vernon campus) beginning in the fall 1997 semester. Course offerings include COSC 1301 Introduction to Computers, CAGR 1402 Computer Aided Design - ACAD-2D, CAGR 1415 Graphics programs, MCOT 1104 Introduction to Internet, and MCOT 1105 Intermediate Internet (Web Page Development).

In order to enroll in a course, students must have access to a computer (machine requirements are stated in course information) with modem, an e-mail account, and an internet provider. They also must have a browser (Netscape 3.0 or higher or equivalent) on their computer. Books and software required for the courses may be purchased at the VRJC Bookstore located on the Vernon campus.

Anyone who is eligible to enroll for a course at VRJC may enroll in computer courses taught over the internet.

Part time students whose declared goal is personal enrichment or job related training may accumulate up to nine semester hours of non-TASP on-line computer courses before college assessment in reading, writing, and math is required.

Computer courses taught over the internet are designed to meet the busy schedules of students who don't have time to come to the Vernon campus on a regular basis. Courses do require campus attendance for orientation and testing.

The course objectives and curriculum for computer courses on the Internet are the same as for classes taught on the Vernon campus. It is simply the method of delivery which is different. Class notes, assignments, and discussions are via computers for the classes.

Dear Editor:

As State Representative for State House District 70, I would like to urge all voters to get out and vote during the upcoming August 7 Constitutional Amendment election.

On August 9, voters will have the final decision on House Joint Resolution 4, passed by the Legislature during the last session. If passed, the measure would:

1) increase the current homestead exemption of \$5,000 to

\$15,000 providing each homestead the amount of tax relief accrued from the additional \$10,000 exemption;

2) the measure would provide a teacher pay raise of 6% over the current state base during the next biennium;

3) allow those persons over sixty-five (65), or their surviving spouse to transfer the constitutional limitation on school district tax increases or the "tax freeze" to a different residence, if the person moves and subsequently establishes a different place or residence. In addition, the amendment would provide a one time reduction in the amount of the tax freeze to take into account the tax reduction provided by the \$10,000 increase in the homestead exemption.

Regardless of how you chose to vote on the issue, remember, the choice is yours. I hope to see you at the polls on August 9.







Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to: (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.

(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device. (3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.




