



AG's office gives computers to non-profit groups in West Texas

More than 120 computers valued at nearly \$100,000 have been distributed to non-profit organizations in West Texas by the state attorney general's office.

The program seeks to help rural communities in West Texas, according to Dan Henson of Knox City, executive director of the Four Winds Resource, Conservation & Development Area Inc.

"It's great they were able to give these to rural Texas," Henson

Four Winds will use six of the computers to set up a lab to teach computer classes, he said.

"It's pretty exciting," Henson said. "We are going to try to make it mobile."

Henson described the equipment as upgraded computers built in 1995.

In the Four Winds area, seven computers went to Knox County, another seven went to Stonewall County, while four to Haskell County and one to Baylor County.

Henson recognized the efforts of State Representative David Counts, D-Knox City; Knox County Judge David Perdue of

Knox City and Attorney General Dan Morales.

In Knox County, computer recipients were the Knox County 4-H, the Knox County Historical Commission, the Knox County Judge, the City of Munday, the

Munday Housing Authority, the Knox County Constable, and the Knox City Headstart Program of Rolling Plains Management, Inc.

In June, Four Winds received 15 computers from the state comptroller's office, Henson said.

State of emergency declared in county

Dry weather causes "extreme potential for large and destructive wildfires"

Knox County Judge David N. Perdue declared on Monday morning that a state of emergency exists in Knox County due to recent dry weather and the extreme potential for large and destructive

Judge Perdue also issued an emergency order, effective immediately, which prohibits any open burning in the unincorporated areas of Knox County except the burning of combustible material in approved enclosures, such as trash barrels and charcoal grills which are designed to contain all flames and embers.

Due to dry conditions and the lack of significant rainfall, all persons are advised that any open no present forecast for improving burning is extremely likely to weather and/or moisture condi-

posing risks to lives and property. Local fire department officials, the National Weather Service, and the personnel from the Texas Forestry Service advise that there is

The order signed by Judge Perdue provides that repeated or flagrant violations of the order shall constitute a misdemeanor, and that any peace officer of the State of Texas may enforce the order in the venue of Knox County.

This order goes into effect immediately, and will be in effect for the next ten days, and then will stay in effect until significant moisture occurs.

Knox County Hospital to host Health Fair

Representatives from each agency will be on hand to assist visitors or answer questions about their department. Cholesterol and glucose testing, EKGs, rehab testing, height and weight checks, blood pressure and pulse checks will all be available at NO

CHARGE for the participant. Those wishing to take advantage of the free tests are reminded not to eat before coming to the hospital for testing.

Many of the vendors will have giveaways for the visitors and punch and cookies will be served to all attending the fair.

Everyone is encouraged to come to the hospital on Saturday, October 11 to take advantage of the services offered by the various health and safety agencies.

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Knox County FSA official announces CRP sign-up

John Rector, County Executive Dirctor, Knox County Farm Service Agency (FSA), has announced a public meeting to inform local producers and landowners about the Conservation Reserve Program's (CRP) 16th sign-up, which will be held October 14 to November 14, 1997.

The public meeting will be held at the Knights of Columbus Hall, Rhineland, at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, October 21, and will cover benefits offered and producer requirements under the 16th signup. All those interested in participating in the CRP are encouraged to attend. The meeting will be a joint effort between FSA and the Natural Resource and Conservation Service (NRCS).

"If you've got any questions, or if you haven't participated in the CRP before, this is your chance to find out what you need to know to bid for a contract," Rector said. "We'll cover all the bases, answer all your questions, so that you can make an informed decision on what best suits your operation."

The new, environmentally-focused CRP provides immediate benefits to producers, ranchers and taxpayers through reduced soil erosion, improved water quality and expanded wildlife habitat. Under this voluntary program, landowners enter into contracts with USDA to place erodible and other environmentally-sensitive

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cropland in conservation practices for 10-15 years. In exchange, landowners receive annual rental payments for the land and cost-share assistance for establishing those practices. "Here at FSA, we're all work-

ing hard to tell producers about this important opportunity. We want to sign up every qualifying applicant," Rector said. "I want to encourage all landowners to consider enrolling their eligible highly erodible and other environmentally-sensitive land in the new CRP," Rector said. "The sign-up begins October 14, and once things get going you'll be glad you got your questions answered when things were quiet."


All land that is enrolled in the program must compete for acceptance based on an environmental benefits index that ensures fair and equal consideration for all types of land. Producers will be notified by the middle of December as to which acres have been accepted into the CRP.

Interested producers and landowners should contact the Knox County FSA or NRCS office at 1101 East Main, Knox City, for additional information, phone 940-658-3537 for FSA or 940-658-3526 for NRCS.

FSA asks participants to call for an appointment prior to coming to the office to avoid the possibility of having to wait in line.

Sheep & goat validation set for October 22

The 1997-98 sheep and goat validation for the Knox County Junior Livestock Show and all major shows in Texas will be held on Wednesday, October 22, at the Brazos Valley Young Farmers Building in Munday beginning at 4:30 p.m. All market goats and market sheep must be brought to this validation.

The goats will be ear tagged and the tag number and exhibitor's name will be recorded. The market lambs will also be ear tagged. However, they will also have a tattoo placed in their ear and will have a nose print taken for the records.

Cost for validation will be three dollars for the sheep and the goats will not be charged a fee. The ear tags to be used on the goats have been donated. The ear tags to be used on the sheep were specifically designed for a state wide sheep validation. The cost of these tags, plus the cost of the tattoo ink and nose printing supplies were used to determine the three dollar charge.





KCHS boasts 99.94% passing rate for 1st Six weeks

As I begin in writing this article, let me take a second to apologize for just now starting to write to you. Although the High School is off to a good start this year, it seems like every

minute of my day has been accounted for, and then some!

For those of you that have not already heard, Knox City High School was awarded a Recognized status for the 1996-97 school year. This is a great accomplishment for our kids and the teaching staff The Academic Excellence Indicator System is the method by which the state rates the quality of schools. Areas that the state looks at in determining a school's rating are attendance, TAAS performance of all students and each subgroup that makes up the school population, dropout rates and performance on ACT, SAT and TASP tests for our older students. We are working very hard to maintain the gains that we made last year and would like very much to improve our status to Exemplary, which is the highest rating a school can receive. That goal is within our reach and with your help and encouragement as parents, interested community members and taxpayers our kids and teachers can do it.

It's not unusual for us, as adults, parents, etc., to congratulate our children for a great tackle, an overpowering spike in volleyball or great leg on the mile relay, but sometimes we forget the importance of a good report card, a ten point improvement on an English test or passing all parts of the TAAS test the first time it's taken. The Sophomore class takes the TAAS for the first time in high school each year and their test performance weighs very heavily in the AEIS rating system. If you see one of the kids or their teachers, congratulate them for their accomplishments last Spring and encourage this year's group strive to help us gain that Exemplary rating.

I'm also proud to let you know that we had 99.94% passing rate in all classes this 1st 6-weeks reporting period. We have very few kids failing and will work very hard to ensure that our kids are given the opportunity to be successful. I firmly believe that any measure of success breeds more success and the pursuit of excellence.

Congratulations to the football team for breaking in to the win column. They stumped their toe last week, but they'll come back and get after it this week! The Volleyball team is in pretty good shape and have an important game at Benjamin Tuesday night.

As always, we welcome you input at school. Feel free to call or come by and visit with us if you have concerns or just want to talk about school.

No one will be denied immunizations due to the inability to pay. For more information, call the



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
