

# Post-SeasonHonorsPile High For Owl Gridsters

Post-season honors are being heaped on members of the Silverton Owls football squad, with their coach, Clyde Parham, being chosen as Coach of the Year by the two largest area newspapers.

Last week, Coach Parham received accolades as Coach of the Year as chosen by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal for its All-South Plains team. This week, the coach "narrowly edged out first-year Lazbuddie Coach Mark Scisson" as Coach of the Year on the Amarillo Globe-News Super Team.

No selections from among Silverton's players were added to the All-South Plains Team, but Casey Frizzell and Lance Holt received places on the Super Team

And what a super team it is!
At quarterback is Lazbuddie's Brett

Thomas, who completed 196-of-305 passes for 3,001 yards and 59 touchdowns with eight interceptions.

The Super Team receivers also are from Lazbuddie, ends Leland Brockman and Matt Cozbey. Brockman caught 56 passes for 947 yards and 22 touchdowns. Cozbey caught 53 passes for 840 yards and 25 touchdowns.

At running backs are Follett's Gregory Frazier and Silverton's Lance Holt.

Frazier, who missed two games with an injury, rushed 167 times for 1,277 yards and 17 touchdowns. He caught 11 passes for 239 yards and six touchdowns. He completed 11-of-26 passes for 176 yards and four touchdowns. He returned a punt and a kickoff for touchdowns.

Holt rushed 257 times for 1,883

yards and 39 touchdowns. He also

caught 16 passes for 203 yards.
Groom's Matt Fields, an all-district selection the last three seasons, is the center. The 6-0, 225-pound senior was the main blocker on running plays that accounted for 2,000 yards rushing. He caught four passes for 165 yards and one touchdown.

The defense is built around a strong linebacking corps that features Bradley Price, who keyed a Valley defense that allowed an area-leading 163.3 yards per game

Price made 132 tackles, including 20 for losses. He also recovered six fumbles and returned an interception for a touchdown.

The other two linebackers are Silverton's Casey Frizzell and Groom's Paul McLaughlin.

Frizzell made 157 tackles, including 78 solos. He intercepted three passes and recovered two fumbles.

McLaughlin made 54 solo and 24 assisted tackles, figures that would have been much higher if five of Groom's 11 games had not ended by the 45-point rule. McLaughlin also could spell one of the running backs as he rushed for 1,845 yards and 29 touchdowns on 285 carries.

The linemen are Follett's Scottie Schilling and Valley's Josh Scoggins.

Schilling made 73 solo and 29 assisted tackles, six quarterback sacks and four fumble recoveries. He returned an interception 41 yards for a touchdown.

Scoggins, the biggest player on the team at 6-6 and 225 pounds, made 89 solo and 17 assisted tackles. He made 36 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for losses totaling 132 yards. Scoggins,





# Irrigation To Be Focus of Seminar

Texas Panhandle growers must continually seek methods to improve irrigation management and efficiency. For more than two decades, producers have looked to the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference as the place to get practical information on irrigation use and the newest technology steming directly from research innovation in the field

At this time each year, producers have the opportunity to see the latest in new and improved products and equipment as demonstrated by major industry suppliers.

The January 7 conference starts at 8:30 a.m. with registration, refreshments and exhibits at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Boulevard West. Moderators for the program are Extension Agents Dennis Newton of Deaf Smith County, who will lead the morning session, and Robert Harris of Moore County, who will conduct the afternoon program.

At 9:30 a.m., conference chairman Leon New, Extension Irrigation Specialist of Amarillo, will review factors involving irrigation efficiency. Growers will have a chance to hear Karl Johnson, who farms near Morse, describe how he manages his irrigation operation.

Answers to questions on selecting the right product, determining correct amount and time of fertilizer applications will be provided by Michael Hickey, Extension Soil Chemist of Lubbock. Steve Amosson, Extension Economist-Management, Amarillo, will describe various methods of paying for center pivot systems. Larry Soward, Special Counsel to Texas' Agriculture Commissioner, from Austin, will review current conflicts of water rights statewide and describe situations of apportionment for domestic, industrial and agricultural use.

The afternoon session on chemigation begins at 1:25 p.m. Moderator Robert Harris will outline requirements for obtaining two continuing education units which will be offered during the conference to private and licensed commercial and non-commercial applicators who complete the training.

"This annual conference offers a unique forum for discussing issues of interest and concern to producers, scientists and suppliers involved in irrigated agricultural production systems," said Leon New, conference chairman.

Jim Hayes, an agricultural chemical supplier from Clarendon, will talk about commonly-approved chemicals, their use and safe handling. C. E. Williams, Panhandle Groundwater District Manager from White Deer, will

Valley's Jason Smith is the safety. Smith made 12 interceptions and 77 tackles. He returned eight of his interceptions for touchdowns.

The two kicking specialists are from Follett: place-kicker Aaron Trenfield and punter Tyler Terrell. Trenfield converted 43-of-57 PAT kicks, and he also made his only field-goal attempt (28 yards) of the season. Terrell punted 23 times for a 35-yard average.

The Sophomore of the Year is Lazbuddie's two-way standout Jon Colby Miller, 5-10 and 155 pounds. He averaged 17 tackles at linebacker, totaled 1,000 yards rushing and receiving, and scored 22 touchdowns.

The Coach of the Year honor goes to Clyde Parham. His team returned one starter on offense (Frizzell) and three starters on defense. The Owls were picked to finish as low as fourth in their district by many preseason publications. But Silverton was 8-2 in the regular season, having lost only at Follett in non-district and to second-ranked Lazbuddie in district play. Silverton advanced to the second round of the playoffs where the Owls lost to fifth-ranked Chillicothe.

The Offensive Player of the Year is Christian Looney of McLean, who produced mind-boggling statistics after the Tigers changed from a "tight" formation to a "spread" formation following their season opener.

## 1993 TEC Tax Rates Announced

"Texas employers can breathe a sigh of relief because their tax rates are not going to escalate significantly," TEC Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said as the Texas Employment Commission released tax rates for 1993.

"This has been a trying year. The state's economic woes have caused thousands of businesses to downsize and the result has been massive layoffs throughout Texas. Employment prospects have been so bleak that unemployment benefits have been extended on an emergency basis numerous times. These factors have greatly concerned Texas employers about their 1993 TEX tax rates," Nabers said.

The maximum rate that could apply to any Texas employer in 1993 will be 6.35 percent according to Nabers. That is up only slightly from last year's maximum rate of 6.30 percent. The lowest rate any business will experience in 1993 will be .35 percent, up from .30 percent in 1992. The new rates become effective January 1, 1993.

Employers should begin receiving their individual tax rate notices the second week of February. Payment will be due for the first quarter of 1993 in April

"Employers in Texas pay taxes for every employee's first \$9,000 in wages. Depending on an employer's tax rate, that amount could vary from a low of \$31.50 per person to a high of \$571.50 per person," Nabers said. There are more than 333,000 tax-paying employers in Texas.

The Texas Employment Commission administers the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act and provides services to both employers and employees statewide.
