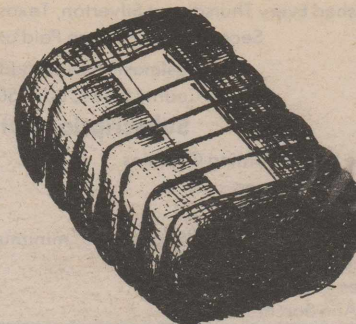

Silverton Hosting Conference to Launch Hoot-Out Tourney New Crop Year Soon

Silverton's varsity Owls and Owlettes will be hosting the annual Hoot-Out Tournament this weekend. Teams entered in both divisions are from Motley County, Lakeview, Smyer, Kress, McLean, Trinity Christian, Alamo Catholic and Silverton.

First-round games for the Owls and Owlettes will be with Alamo Catholic, at 6:30 and 8:00 p.m. Thursday (today). Winners of these games will play the winners of the McLean-Trinity Christian games at 6:30 and 8:00 p.m. Friday. Winners of these games advance to the championship round, at 6:30 and 7:00 p.m. Saturday.

Motley County will be paired with Lakeview in the opening round, and these teams are to play at 9:30 and 11:00 a.m. Thursday. The other opening-round game is between Smyer and Kress at 12:30 and 2:00 p.m. Thursday.

Lists of the workers for the tournament may be found elsewhere in this issue of the newspaper. If you

cannot work when you are scheduled, please try to find someone to take your place. All workers are asked to be a little early for the beginning of their shifts.

Camp Meeting To Be Planned On January 13

There will be a planning session for the Caprock Cowboy Camp Meeting beginning at 8:15 p.m. Wednesday, January 13, at the United Methodist Church in Quitaque.

Everyone interested in working with the Camp Meeting is invited to attend.

The latest information to help area cotton farmers plan their 1993 crop will be presented January 25-26 during the Caprock Cotton Conference. The two-day program, featuring national leaders in the cotton industry, will be at the Crosby County Pioneer Museum and Civic Center, 101 West Main Street in Crosbyton.

This conference is especially designed for growers of the South Plains, Rolling Plains and West Texas. It is being sponsored by the ag committees of Briscoe, Crosby, Floyd, Dickens, Motley and Garza counties.

The program has been approved for seven continuing education units for licensed private chemical applicators who attend.

The first day's technical sessions will open with information on growing cotton with limited water. It will be presented by Dr. Dan Krieg, professor of agronomy at Texas Tech University in Lubbock. Dr. Harlan Thorvilson, professor of entomology at Tech, will discuss insect management.

Mark Brown, Extension Pest Management Agent for Crosby and Floyd counties, will cover weed control. Roger Haldenby, Plains Cotton Growers coordinator of the boll weevil diapause program, Lubbock, will report on that long-successful effort. The proposed boll weevil eradication program for Texas will be discussed by Dr. Ray Frisbie of College Station, coordinator of integrated pest management with the Extension Service.

The second day will open with an update on work of the Extension Service by Dr. Chester Fehlis, associate director of that agency. Characteristics of the cotton plant's physiology which can benefit the farmer will be detailed by Dr. Kater Hake, National Cotton Council, Memphis. In February, Hake will join the Extension Service as cotton agronomist at Lubbock.

Management and economics of conservation tillage will be discussed by Dr. Wayne Keeling, assistant professor of systems agronomy with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock.

Growing cotton to meet textile demands will be covered by Dr. John Gannaway, Experiment Station cotton breeder and professor at Lubbock. Mark Lange, director of economic services with the National Cotton Council, Memphis, will explain the outlook and local effects of world cotton supplies and trade agreements.

Cotton of the future will be discussed by Dr. Norma Trolinder, plant physiologist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture - Agriculture Research Service at Lubbock.

Each day's program will begin at 9:00 a.m. The registration fee is \$20.00 for both days, or \$10.00 for one day, until

January 15. After January 15, the fee is \$40.00 for both days or \$20.00 for one day. Fee includes lunch, refreshments and admission to the technical sessions and exhibits. Advance registration may be made at the Briscoe County Extension Office.

The event will be held at the project center barn behind the Valley High School football field.

Prescribed Burn Workshop Slated

Prescribed burning can be an effective tool in controlling unwanted brush and weed species in rangeland. January, February and March are the typical months in which a prescribed burn may be planned and carried out under the right conditions.

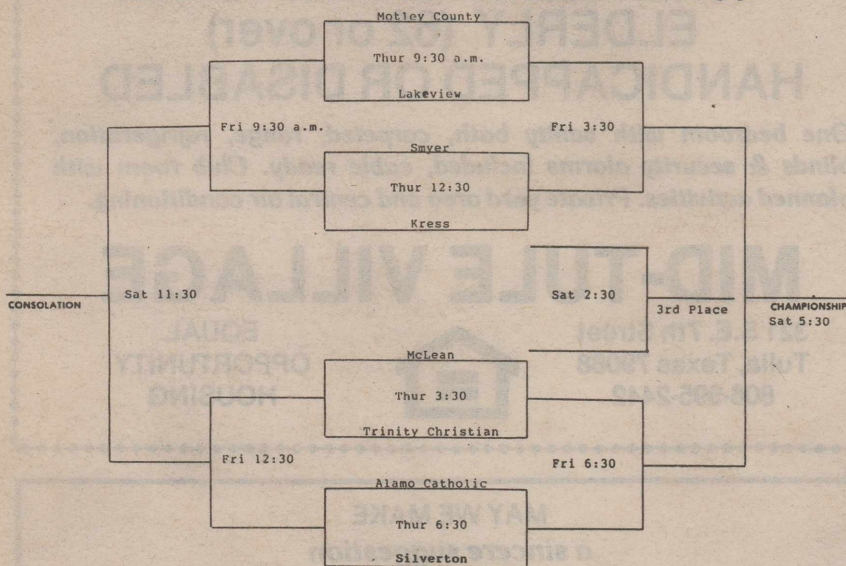
There is a lot more to burning as a brush control method than just going out and lighting matches and throwing them out the window as you drive along. It takes some planning and having the right equipment to carry out a successful burn.

The Briscoe County Extension office will be sponsoring a workshop for area ranchers and landowners on prescribed burning. The workshop will be held Monday, January 11, from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Some of the topics covered in the workshop will be planning the burn, equipment, and demonstrating the equipment, and how to carry out a burn.

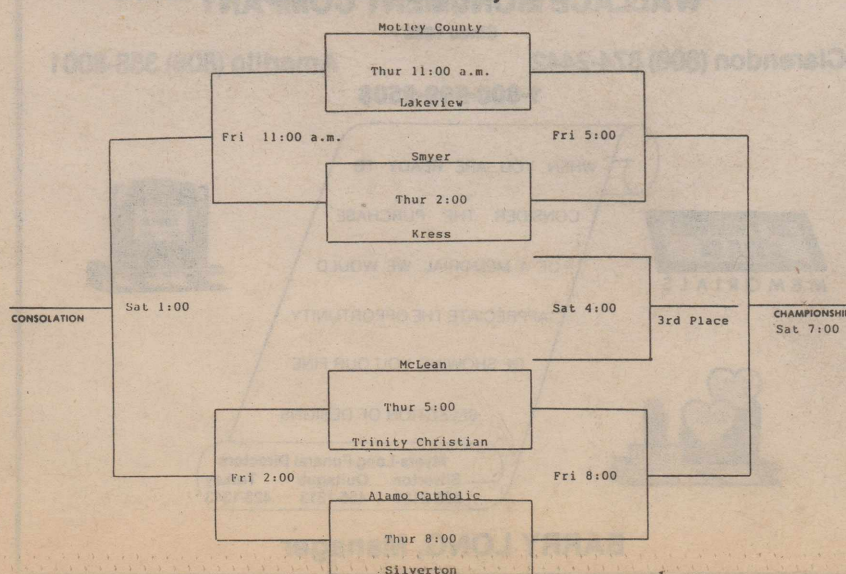
If you have an area with fireguards in place, call the Extension office at 823-2131. This could be a possible demonstration site in the future.

Funeral services for Minnie Miriam Jowell, 86, were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Saturday at Trinity United Methodist Church in Plainview, with the Rev. John Rech, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery with arrangements directed by Lemons

Funeral Home.

Mrs. Jowell died at 8:00 a.m. Thursday, December 31, at Methodist Hospital in Plainview.

She was born November 5, 1906 in Holland, Texas, and moved with her parents, the late Thomas Jasper and Minnie Bell Crass, to Briscoe County in 1908. They moved into a home fourteen miles southwest of Silverton.

Mrs. Jowell started to school at Lakeview and also attended the Rock Creek School and Silverton High School. She was graduated with the Class of 1925. She attended Texas Tech and West Texas State, receiving a teaching certificate, and taught in the Holt and Francis schools. She gave private piano and guitar lessons.

She married John Edward (Jack) Jowell on October 1, 1931, and they farmed in the area for two years before moving to Arkansas. They returned to farm in Briscoe County in 1935 and remained here until Mr. Jowell's death in March 1962. She moved to Plainview in November 1973 and had resided there since that time.

She was a member of Trinity United Methodist Church, Friendship Sunday School Class and the Rebekah Lodge.

She was preceded in death by two brothers, Theron Crass and Edwin Crass.

Survivors include two sons, Bill Jowell of Huntsville and John Jowell, jr. of Dumas; a brother, Clinton Crass of Palestine; five grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

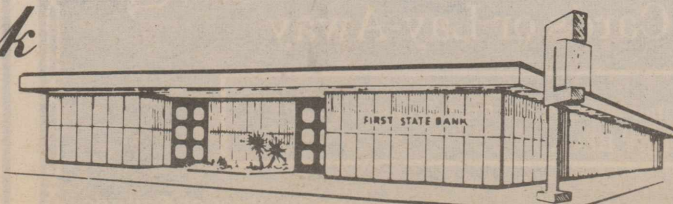

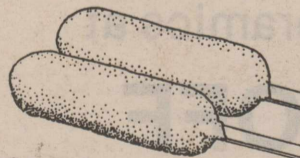

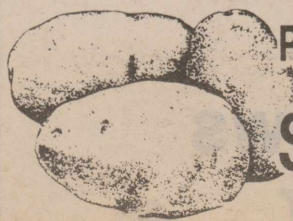
