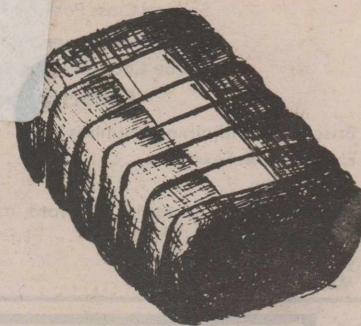
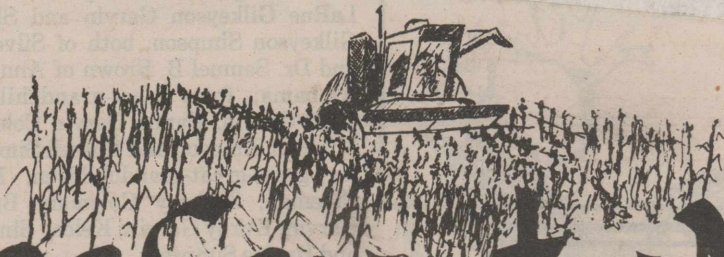

Krista Kirkland to be Speaker For Banquet

Krista Kirkland, a senior member of the Texas Tech University Lady Raiders, the NCAA Champions, will be the guest speaker for the Athletic Banquet which will honor Silverton High School athletes on Saturday, May 8, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

Miss Kirkland was an All-Southwest Conference selection and received All-Tournament honors at the Red Raider Classic, Miami Church's Classic, SWC Post-Season Classic, NCAA West Region, NCAA Final Four, and was named to the CoSIDA District 6 All-Academic Team.

Miss Kirkland started the final 96 games of her career and is one of only 11 Lady Raiders to have played in more than 100 career games. Only three Lady Raiders have started more games, and only Carolyn Thompson started more consecutive games than Miss Kirkland. Another highlight in her basketball career was when Miss Kirkland became the Lady Raiders' All-Time leader in assists. A three-time All-SWC selection, Miss Kirkland has played more than 1000 minutes in each of the last three seasons, giving her a total of 3,756 minutes played in her career—an average of just under 30 minutes a game.

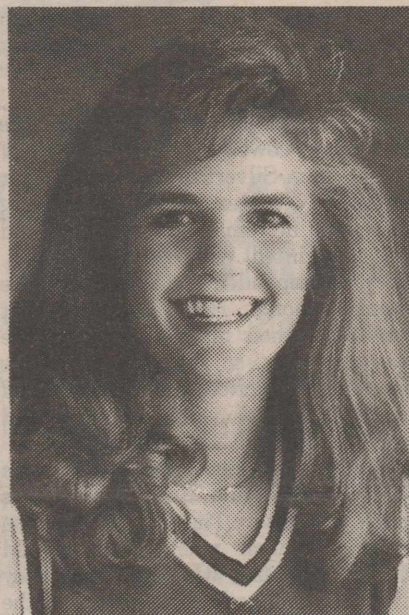
At Texas Tech, Miss Kirkland, who is majoring in exercise and sports science with a minor in math, carries a 3.477 grade point average. She is the daughter of Jim and Phyllis Kirkland who now reside in Corpus Christi. She was graduated as the salutatorian from Spearman High in 1989, but played her freshman and sophomore years at Sudan where her father coached after leaving Silverton. She was in elementary school when the family

moved from here. Sudan won the state title in 1987 and was area finalist the other year, and at Spearman her teams went 28-3 and 26-6, reaching the area finals both years. She was winner of cross country all-state three times, with her team winning the state title her senior year. She was a regional track qualifier all four years (state runner-up in 1600 meters as a senior) and a regional qualifier in golf one year.

The Austin American selected as the play of the year one made by Miss Kirkland in the first Tech-Texas meeting, when she stole a pass, dribbled the length of the court, made a 360-degree turn and connected on a reverse layup with her left hand.

Everyone is invited to be present at the athletic banquet. The meat will be furnished, and each family attending is asked to bring a dessert and vegetable or salad dish.

The high school athletes will receive their awards at the banquet.

Propositions Are Defeated Across State of Texas

All three of the proposed constitutional amendments submitted on last Saturday's special election ballot were defeated by the people of Texas.

In Briscoe County, No. 1 failed 138-301; No. 2 carried 222-210, and No. 3 failed 138-292.

A runoff between Kay Bailey Hutchison and Bob Krueger will be necessary to determine which one will fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Senator Lloyd Bentsen when he was appointed to President Bill Clinton's cabinet.

On the local scene, John Bowman polled 114 votes to be elected to succeed Wayne Nance as Silverton's mayor. Nance chose not to run for re-election.

Five candidates were on the ballot for the two places on the City Council, to fill the vacancies created by the resignations of John Bowman and James Griffin.

Lane Garvin, with 105 votes, and W. D. Rowell, with 78, were chosen to serve as Councilmen.

Rick Minyard received 64 votes, James Edwards polled 41 and Vance Childress captured 34 votes.

The two incumbent school trustees, Dewey Estes and Tom Burson, were candidates for re-election and were joined on the ballot by newcomer Penny Carpenter. Mrs. Carpenter led the voting with 207 votes, while Estes was re-elected with 156 votes. Burson was narrowly defeated after receiving 142 votes for trustee in the Silverton ISD.

A number of write-in votes were cast for school trustee and mayor.

CHARLSIE ARNOLD

Mrs. Arnold died on Wednesday, April 28, at Lockney Care Center following a lengthy illness.

Charlsie Juanita Myers was born July 24, 1992 in Swisher County on what is now known as the Adams Ranch. Her father was Charlie Myers and he sold the ranch and the family moved to Tulia when Charlsie was six years old. In a short while, they moved to Hereford. After the death of her mother in 1902, they moved to Elida, New Mexico.

She met Jim Bomar in 1906 when he and other cowboys drove a herd of horses from Silverton to a ranch near Portales, New Mexico. She was visiting there, and he remained a few days and got acquainted with the young girl. They corresponded for a year after he returned home. Her father wouldn't consent to their marriage because she was so young, so she got one of his checks and practiced his signature and in 1907 they eloped in a buggy and were married in Elida, New Mexico.

They made their home in Silverton and their first child, Ruby Thelma, was born in 1908. They lived on the Matador Ranch when their second child, Zollie Mae, was born. Later they lived at the Turtle Hole camp of the ranch, and in 1917 they returned to Silverton to make their home.

Jim Bomar died February 22, 1948, at the age of 62. He and Charlsie and their family all were members of the First Baptist Church in Silverton.

Mrs. Bomar and Doug Arnold were married March 10, 1955 in Clovis, New Mexico. They continued to make their home in Silverton. He was a deacon and teacher of Sunday School in the First Baptist Church, and the couple continued their work in the church in which both had been members for many years.

Doug Arnold died February 16, 1975. Mrs. Bomar Arnold was a homemaker and a nurse, and had owned and operated a shop that she called The House of Gifts. She was a member of the Silverton Senior Citizens and was a long-time Sunday School teacher. She was active in keeping her yard and beautiful flower garden until

she suffered a broken hip several years ago.

Her two daughters, Ruby Gilkeyson and Zollie Brown, preceded her in death.

Surviving are three grandchildren, LaRue Gilkeyson Garvin and Sharon Gilkeyson Simpson, both of Silverton, and Dr. Samuel B. Brown of Anniston, Alabama; four great-grandchildren, Lane Garvin, Danna Garvin Coleman, Mitchell Simpson and Russell Simpson; six great-great-grandchildren, Kayla Coleman, Zackary Coleman, Brooke Garvin, Kurby Garvin, Kelcey Simpson and Haylee Simpson.

Pallbearers were Blanton Garrison, Fred Garrison, Duane Reynolds, Roy Mack Walker, Berton Hughes and Wayne Nance. Honorary pallbearers were deacons of the First Baptist Church in Silverton.

The family suggested that memorials might be made to the Charlsie Arnold Memorial Fund at First Baptist Church.

L. B. LOUDERMILK

Retired Navy Commander L. B. Loudermilk, 73, of 16 Sherwood Road, Middletown, Rhode Island, died Monday, April 12, 1993, at Newport Hospital. He was the husband of Dorothy L. Kroeger Loudermilk of Middletown.

Born in Anadarko, Oklahoma, December 10, 1919, he was the son of the late Claude T. and Lottie Inez Garner Loudermilk.

Mr. Loudermilk had lived in Middletown since 1957, and had lived on Aquidneck Island since 1949. He was a Navy veteran, and served for 27 years before retiring in 1965. He served in World War II and Korea.

He enlisted in the Navy in 1938, was commissioned in 1944, and retired as a commander. He served in Newport from 1949 until his retirement in 1965, except for a two-year tour of JUSMAC, Thailand, from 1960 to 1961. He attended the Naval War College in 1957, and was the commanding officer of the USS Mills BER-383 from 1958 to 1959. He was also a member of the Middletown Fraternal Order of Police.

Besides his wife, he leaves a son, John E. Loudermilk of Naples, Florida; a daughter, Gail L. Kirk of Marstons Mills, Massachusetts; and three sisters, Dorothy Hunt of Jacksonville, Florida, Mildred McDaniel of Silverton, Texas, and Anna Mae Smith of Quitaque, Texas.

A memorial service was conducted Friday, April 16, 1993, at 1:30 p.m. in the Chapel of Hope, Naval Education and Training Center, Newport. Burial was private. 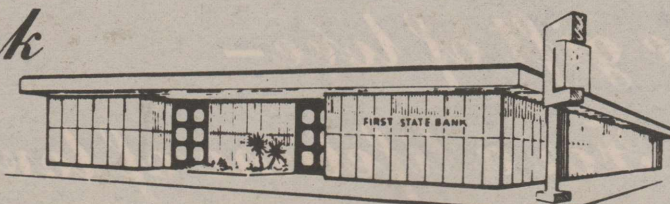
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4-H'ers Compete In Rifle Contest
