

New City Councilmen Sworn In at Monday Night's Meeting

The Children Need your help!

I was visiting with Dewey Estes a few days ago about the financial condition of the Silverton swimming pool, and he told me that the pool is just about "broke".

There has had to be considerable repair work done at the pool, and more is needed on the roof and fence at this time. There is no money with which to accomplish this.

There have been problems with the pool lights, heating system and pool tiles in recent years, and some money was borrowed to accomplish the needed repairs.

Years ago, when the pool was built, numerous families bought memberships in the pool club and supported the building project whether or not they had children who would be swimming there. For many years the dues were kept "cheap" because the pool was quite new and no major repairs were needed. They just collected enough dues to pay the current year's expenses. Thus, the pool was able to keep no money in reserve for the future.

A one-year diving board fee of \$25.00 has been added to each member's dues this year only and this brings the total dues for 1993 to \$150.00. This was the only way the directors could find the money with which to replace the broken diving board. The guest and party fees at the pool have been increased in order to try to make a little more money.

Now, some of the young families with children who love going to the pool almost daily say they aren't going to be able to pay their dues this year due to the financial crunch. This compounds the pool's problems.

If there was anyone who doesn't have a pool membership who would be willing to donate a few dollars to the pool's upkeep, it would be greatly appreciated both by the pool directors and the community's children. Small Grains to Be Certified by Monday, May 17

May 17 is the final date to certify your acreage of small grains (wheat, oats, barley or rye). This applies to any acres seeded to a small grain, regardless of use, including small grains intended for harvest, small grains as cover crops on ACR or CU, small grain covers to be hayed or grazed, or small grains left standing. Please call for an appointment.

May 17 also is the final date to request measurement service for small grains. If you are unsure of your acreage, you are encouraged to request measurement service. This service is offered for a nominal fee; check with the ASCS office.

If you have wheat or other small grains on ACR or CU that will be left standing after May 15, you must file a request to leave the small grain standing and pay a \$10.00 fee. This crop may not be hayed, grazed, or mechanically harvested in any way.

REDUCED ACR PROVISION

Producers whose projected 1993 program payments exceed the \$50,000 limit may request a reduction in required ACR acreage. Any crop except a program crop, peanuts, or vegetables may be grown on reduced ACR.

Courthouse, the road to the cemetery and city streets are to be seal coated. Briscoe County Commissioners will be picking up the tab for the work around the courthouse and the cemetery road repair, and the city will be paying for the balance. This is a distribution of approximately 16% for the county and 84% for the city. The cost to Briscoe County will be \$10,955.04 and the cost to the City of Silverton is to be \$57,513.96. Engineering costs make up the difference between the bid and the bottom-line figures.

The bid was a little lower than had been expected by the Councilmen, and the work will require a few less dollars than originally had been estimated. The

Woody Grimland Grimland Still Missing After Three Years

Woody Grimland, brother of Florene Ratliff of Lockney and Edna McKay of Plainview, is still missing after he disappeared three years ago on a trip to visit relatives in this area. Mr. Grimland left his home in Needles, California, with his dachshund named Gretchen, and stopped in Flagstaff, Arizona to visit his son, Ron and his son's family. He departed Flagstaff on May 9, 1990, in his dark-green Dodge Ram pickup-camper. He was last seen buying gas on that day at a truck stop in Cline's Corner, New Mexico, about 50 miles east of Albuquerque on Interstate 40. He had stopped in Plainview to visit his sister and her husband, the Cecil McKays, before his stop in Lockney to visit Florene Ratliff. He lived in Silverton in the 1940s and operated the Grimland Blacksmith Shop. His relatives who presently live in Silverton include nephews, Bill Durham, Terry and Alan Grimland, and a niece, Connie Henderson. Grimland—who would be 75 now—was carrying \$800 in cash and an income-tax refund check worth about \$300. Like him, his dog and truck, the check has never turned up. Family members believe it is possible

that when Grimland stopped for gas that he gave somebody a ride. "He had been known to pick up hitch-hikers for company on the road," said a family member. Three employees of the Cline's Corner truck stop said they remembered him, which wouldn't have been hard to do because his hands are bent into a hook shape from arthritis. He also has an artificial knee and wears dentures. Mr. Grimland was born in East Texas and grew up in Silverton. He lived in Amarillo and Los Alamos, New Mexico before moving to California. He was a retired welder and construction worker whose wife died about a year before his disappearance. After visiting with Mrs. Ratliff in Lockney, Mr. Grimland also was scheduled to visit with a third sister, Maidee Partain of Hico, and a brother, Bob Grimland of Yuma, Arizona. He also has a daughter, Genella Clark of Reno, Nevada.



NSII also gives the VMS provider the ability to activate and deactivate an intermittent dial tone on a patron's line in multiple offices. The VMS provider will be able to perform these functions in multiple offices through a connection to a single Message Node office. The Message Node will be a predesignated central office and will interconnect with all central offices within the Message Node Service Area. Upon approval of this application, NSII will be available to customers where facilities are available. Available facilities are not currently deployed statewide. The proposed effective date of this service is June 20, 1993.

SWBT estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$2.4 million. VMS providers and Telephone Answering Services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.


