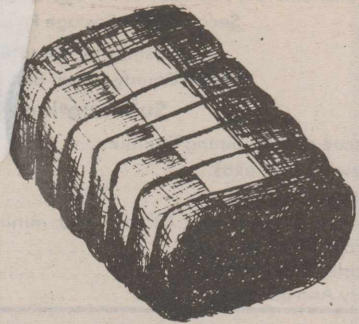

Capture Given EPA Exemption

The Environmental Protection Agency has granted a specific exemption under the provisions of section 18 of the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act, as amended, to the Texas Department of Agriculture for the use of bifenthrin (Capture) on field corn to control mites.

Carl L. King, executive director of the Texas Corn Producers Board, met with Douglas Campt, director of the Office of Pesticide Programs at the Environmental Protection Agency in Washington, D. C. on June 17 to explain the importance of this pesticide.

King stated, "This exemption has come just in time to battle the mite situation. Thanks to the efforts of TDA in Austin and the EPA in Washington, farmers will be able to control the outbreak of mites caused by the recent high temperatures and windy conditions."

The specific exemption is subject to the following conditions and restrictions:

1. The Texas Department of

Agriculture is responsible for ensuring that all provisions of this specific exemption are met. TDA also is responsible for providing information in accordance with 40 CFR 166.32. This information must be submitted to EPA headquarters through the EPA Regional Office.

2. The product Capture 2EC, EPA Reg. No. 279-3069, manufactured by FMC Corporation, may be applied. All applicable directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA-registered product label must be followed.

3. A maximum of two applications may be made, at the rate of 0.08-0.1 lb. a.i. per acre, by air in a minimum of two gallons diluent per acre, or by chemigation equipment.

4. Bifenthrin will be applied by, or under the direct supervision of, certified commercial or private pesticide applicators. Mixer/loaders must wear, at least, long sleeves, long

Each camper will receive personal instruction and attention. There will be drills to improve offensive and defensive fundamentals, three-on-three tournament play, and daily competition.

A special feature of the Silverton Basketball Camp is the Friday evening clinic session and games. All parents and friends of campers are invited to attend and see the drills and activities demonstrated by the campers, who will be divided according to age and ability to play in team competition.

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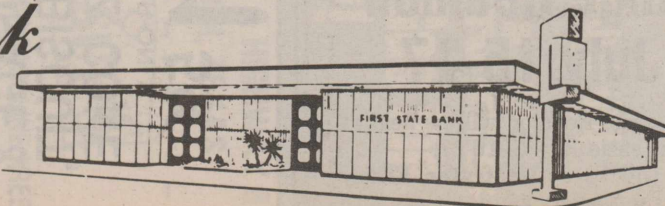
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Kay Lynn Edwards In Miss Texas Pageant

pants and gloves. Mechanical flaggers only may be used. All applicable directions, restrictions and precautions for chemigation on the EPA-registered product label must be followed.

5. Emergency use of bifenthrin may be initiated in those corn fields that meet the economic threshold criteria for treatment, Management in Corn." Prior to authorizing applications of bifenthrin in a particular county, the Department of Agriculture or official designees must confirm the presence of the above emergency situation in the county.

6. Growers with Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) chemigation capabilities in place and functional at the time of need may not use bifenthrin under this exemption.

7. A thirty-day pre-harvest interval and crop rotation restriction will be observed. Treated fields will not be

grazed prior to harvest. Straw derived from wheat planted in corn fields treated with bifenthrin may not be used for animal feed.

8. A maximum of 450,000 acres of pop- and field corn may be treated.

9. A buffer zone of 500 feet will be maintained between treated fields and streams, ponds, lakes, rivers, springs, swamps, bogs, marshes, or irrigation canals containing water year around. Applications may not be made under this exemption when wind speeds are 10 mph or greater.

10. The use of bifenthrin is prohibited in areas that may result in exposure of endangered species. Prior to authorizing use in a particular county, the Texas Department of Agriculture will notify the appropriate Endangered Species Specialist, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

11. Combination residues of bifenthrin and its 4'-hydroxy metabolite resulting from applications made in accordance with the above are not expected to exceed 0.05 ppm in/on field or popcorn grain; 2.0 ppm in /on field or popcorn forage; and 4.0 ppm in/on field

Commercial Vehicle Drivers Reminded to Comply With Law

In the nearly 33 months that Texas-based commercial motor vehicle drivers have had to study for and take the tests necessary to receive a commercial driver license (CDL), some 412,000 persons required to have the license have done so.

"We're concerned, though, that some drivers in our state who are required to have a CDL don't yet realize that they are now considered commercial drivers," Inspector John Hall, who administers the Texas Department of Public Safety's Commercial Driver License program, said.

"The law requires some drivers who previously did not meet the criteria of a commercial driver to get a CDL," Hall

or popcorn fodder; as concerns the commodities of cattle, goats, horses and sheep, combined residues are not likely to exceed 0.02 ppm in milk, 0.2 ppm in milk fat, 0.1 ppm in meat or meat by-products, and 0.6 ppm in meat fat; secondary residues are not expected as a result of this use in meat of hogs, poultry tissues, or eggs. This Agency has determined that these levels are adequate to protect the public health. The Food and Drug Administration, DHHS, and the Food Services Inspection Service, USDA, have been notified of this action. Analytical methodology is available from the Chemistry Branch, HED, (H-7509C), EPA, 401 M Street SW, Washington, D. C. 20460.

12. The EPA shall immediately be informed of any adverse effects or misuse resulting from application of bifenthrin made in connection with this specific exemption.

13. This specific exemption expires September 15, 1993.

14. A final report summarizing the results of this program must be submitted by March 15, 1994.

15. Any future correspondence in regard to this exemption should refer to file symbol 93-TX-22.

said. "For instance, a person who drives a vehicle designed to carry 16 or more people (including the driver) now is considered to be a commercial driver, and that could include drivers of vehicles used by churches and day care facilities," he said.

The Texas Department of Public Safety began issuing commercial driver licenses in September of 1990 and the law mandating that drivers of certain classes of vehicles obtain a commercial driver license went into effect April 1, 1992. The Texas law was implemented to conform to the federal Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Act of 1986 that, among other things, makes it illegal for an operator of a commercial motor vehicle (truck or bus) to have more than one license. In addition, it defines who is categorized as a commercial driver.

The law also makes a CDL mandatory to drive a vehicle that weighs more than 26,000 pounds or carries certain hazardous materials. There are exemptions for farm, military, emergency and personal-use recreation vehicles.

"The law also helps prevent abuses by interstate and intrastate commercial drivers, who in many instances had multiple licenses and could spread traffic offenses over different states to circumvent license suspension or revocation," Hall said.

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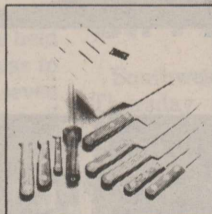

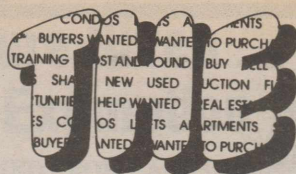

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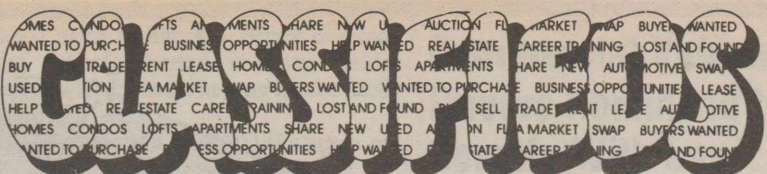
