

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

So engrossed has the congress been in these various extra-curricular investigations, outstanding of which was the ouster hearings on the General Mac-Arthur case, which drew the attendance of many senators that regular committee work could not proceed and the congress has sought to even by-pass its own rules and to legislate by short cuts in these same appropriation bills through the technique of hastily added "riders." In at least thirty instances, these "riders" have been added to appropriation and other basic legislation. A strict congressional rule is that where riders mean a change in substantive law they are out of order. Both senate and house appropriations committees have overridden basic laws passed by the whole congress simply by attaching a legislative rider to an appropriations bill, contrary to all rules, for the appropriations committees are charged only with providing funds for government agencies to pay their bills.

Riders often slip by. Several riders now in appropriations bills would prohibit replacement of federal employees; a slash by the ouse in public housing to 5,000, although there is a pubilc law which permits 135,000 public housing units. SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Cooperators of the Lower Clear Fork, Central Colorado and Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation Districts, that are being assisted by the Soil Conservation Service personnel of the Baird Work Unit, report the following accomplishments for the first half of the 1951 calendar year. Practices applied on the land show that 1943 acres have been contour farmed, for the first time; 50 acres have been planted to cover crops; 107 acres of proper stubble management; 15 acres of grass seeded; 26 ponds constructed; 70.4 miles of field terraces and 4 miles of diverson terraces built.

Accomplishments to date show that plans, based on sound land and sound conservation farming, have been made on 352 farms and ranches, comprising

165,005 acres in these districts. Farmers and ranchers who are members of the Board of Supervisors from this area are M. 

ABOVE THE *HULLABALOO*

By LYTLE HULL

EVEN the Socialist Government of England is beginning to realize that the inclusion of Spain in the western defense setup is a matter of importance to their own protection. Their opposition is based mostly upon the fear of widening the breach already existing in the Labor Party and thus giving the Conservatives a better chance of reelection. This breach was caused primarily over the British Government's defense alliance with the United States and its adoption of the Rearament Plan. It's another case of placing Party before country-and that habit isn't confined to the British alone.

The British Government, as everyone knows, is purely socialistic-a condition which, according to most students, is just one step removed from Communism. But even this left-wing setup has a left wing. How far left can one go and not be a Communist?

In France there seem to be two obstacles in the way of admitting Spain to the Atlantic Pact. Primarily the French feel that if the Pyrenees are fortified, the United States will consider that the line of defense rather than the Elbe or the Rhine; and that we will plan to "liberate" France rather than to defend it. Also in France is the matter of the strong Communist Party which doesn't wish to put any obsta-cles in the way of Russian onquest of their country. Fine fellows!

But both France and Britain are at long last beginning to appreciate the strategic value of the air and sea bases of Spain; of her command of the mouth of the Mediterranean; and of the fact that she has two million trained soldiers ready and willing to fight the Russians—if they have the arms with which to fight. There have recently come suggestions from abroad that the United States alone might make defense treaties with Spain which would accomplish the purposes contemplated without embarrassing the Governments of the other members of the Atlantic coalition. The Spanish themselves would prefer this, as their feeling toward us is far more friendly than toward any European nation.

The new system makes available to the Post Office Department the most advanced electronic business machines. One machine, the IBM Type 808 Proof Machine, has been especially developed for the new money order purposes and it combines all the advantages of the modern proof machine in widespread use by banks and large department stores throughout the country. Another of the principal machines to be used with the new system is the Elec-tronic Statistical Machine, workhorse of the 1950 Census tabula-

The Postmaster General described the inauguration of the new money order system as the largest single accounting change ever made in postal history and said, that the development comes after exhaustive study by the Post Office Department, the General Accounting Office, the Treasury Department and the Federal Reserve Board.

The Department urges users to remember that the new money orders must not be folded, stapled or mutilated in any way since they are to be issued on punch

Last year more than 300,000 money orders, totaling upward to five billion dollars were issued and paid by the Post Office Department

The new money order system will be under the management and supervision of Assistant Postmaster General Asborne A. Pearson, who directs the Department's Bureau of Finance.

All new money orders will clear Federal Reserve Banks in the same manner as Treasury checks or other cash items. The Federal Reserve banks will then turn over the paid money orders to the proper regional Post Of-

The new money order system is in keeping with the program to modernize and improve the operation of the postal service, as well as to effect economy and the better to serve the general
