CAPTAIN OLIVER F. WERST WRITES FROM CALIFORNIA

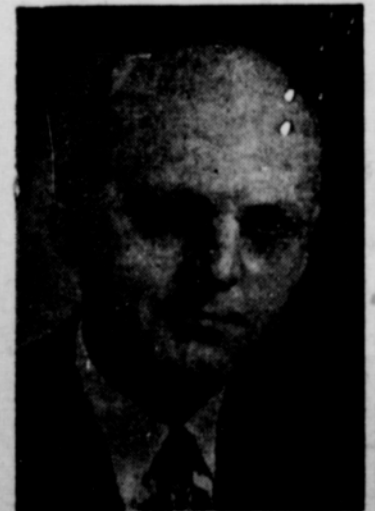

Price Clinic in Baird To Aid Merchants

A "Price Clinic" to assist all Baird and Callahan County businessmen with OPS price problems will be conducted in the County Courthouse on Friday, July 13, beginning at 9:00 a. m. Announcing the price clinic came from Fort Worth District OPS. A price specialist, representing that office will be in the city for the clinic.

Ellis H. Boyd, district OPS director, pointed out that even on a county to county basis, price regulations constitute a big job. OPS statistics show that almost six million dollars in retail sales were recorded for Callahan County last year. A business survey conducted by the OPS revealed more than 58 business establishments in Baird alone.

"A good percentage of these firms come under OPS regulations," said District Director Boyd. Everything from manufacturing to the service of a baby sitter or practical nurse is covered, he said.

Merchants, regardless of their type of business are invited to take their OPS problems to the clinic.

Baird Minister Accepts Wyoming Church

Leslie Rickerson, who has served as minister of the Baird Church of Christ for the past 19 months, will leave on August 1st, for Thermopolis, Wyoming, where he has accepted the appointment as minister of the church at that place. The family is making preparations to move to their new field of work. Mrs. Rickerson and their two children, George, 4 years, and Betty Jane, 7 months, will accompany Brother Rickerson on the trip.

A graduate of Abilene Christian College, of Abilene, Texas, class of 1951, Rickerson holds a BS degree. He has been engaged in preaching for the past four years. He is 37 years of age.

Born in Dallas and reared in Texas, this will be Brother Rickerson's first endeavor beyond the Texas state line. He is an able preacher of the gospel and has rare ability to teach people of all classes. There are only three congregations of the Church of Christ in the state of Wyoming, and he believes he will be doing a good work by helping to spread the gospel in that part of the nation.

His resignation as minister of the local church came as somewhat of a surprise to Baird people and to the church members. Brother Rickerson's work here has been so satisfactory that the church was not expecting to change preachers for some time. While members of the church regret to lose Brother Rickerson and his fine family, they admire him for his desire to "go into all the world and preach the gospel." The Rickersons will be missed by all the Baird people, and the good wishes of their friends go with them.

J. T. Lawrence Elected Mayor In Special Write-In Election

In a write-in election held last Saturday, J. T. Lawrence, local druggist, was elected mayor of Baird. Mr. Lawrence will fill the unexpired term of B. H. Freeland who resigned the post at the advice of his physician. Mayor Freeland was serving his second term in the office.

There were 136 votes cast with Mr. Lawrence receiving 96 of them. Fifteen votes favored Rupert Jackson, the name of W. L. Ray was written on 9 of the ballots. J. E. Bullock received 6 votes. Glen Rockey's name was written on two ballots, Randall Jackson received two votes. The following received one vote each: S. L. McElroy, Harold Ray, A. A. Manion, L. B. Lewis, Marvin Hunter and Leslie Bryant.

The election was strictly a write-in affair, with no names printed on the ballots.

Mayor Freeland has served the city well during the short time he was in office. His chief accomplishment was the completion of the new city lake and filter plant, which solved Baird's age-old water problem.

Lawrence has been in business here since he purchased his drug store from the late C. B. Holmes, in 1933. He served as a member of the city council from

1937 to 1947, which has given him a splendid background for a good mayor. Although he has not announced his policies or set

out a goal, his tenure in office promises to mark many accomplishments for the good of Baird people in the way of civic improvements. With the steps that have been taken in the past to help the town grow, Mr. Lawrence will probably serve as mayor while the fruits of many years of endeavor are being harvested.

Of chief importance to the city government at the present time is the finance problem. All growing West Texas cities are facing the same problems that Baird is experiencing. With depression values of property on the tax rolls and inflation prices for materials and general operation costs mounting, there is a real puzzle to solve if Baird keeps up its trend for development. Being a successful business man himself, and having full knowledge of the city's finances, Mr. Lawrence will come through with flying colors. He has the backing of the citizenship and the assistance of a cooperative council as he enters upon the duties of his office.

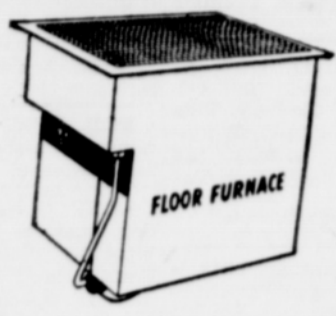

"EASY DOES IT"

CABBAGE, lettuce, cauliflower and greens which may have insects in them should be placed in cold, salted water so the insects can be drawn out. Wash the vegetables thoroughly after this treatment, before cooking, to float out any dirt.

Fried oysters are delicious and puffy if you add some baking powder to the flour in which they are rolled before frying. A bit of celery salt added to the flour, also, gives them a delicious flavor.

When you boil ham or roast beef, add a few whole cloves to the meat before cooking to give it a delicious, very delightful flavor.

If you have trouble with fish while frying, getting it burned, sprinkle a bit of salt on the bottom of the frying pan before placing the fish in it. This also helps to give it a nice even brown.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
Crusty Scrapple
(Serves 6)

1 pound bulk pork sausage
1 14 1/2-ounce can evaporated milk
1 1/2 cups water
1/2 cup yellow cornmeal
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 cup crushed corn flakes

Brown sausage and drain well. Combine milk and water; measure out 2 cups. Add to sausage, reserving remaining 3/4 cup for dipping scrapple. Heat sausage mixture to boiling and slowly stir in cornmeal and seasonings. Cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour into a 5 x 9-inch loaf pan and chill until firm. Unmold and slice into 1/2-inch slices. Dip slices in corn flakes, then in milk, then again in corn flakes. Brown in hot fat on both sides. Serve with maple-flavored syrup.

When a recipe calls for creaming butter, and you don't have time to let it soften for easier creaming, break it into small pieces by cutting, then work it with a wooden potato smasher. Always cream butter before adding sugar to shorten the time required for working.

Muffins will be much lighter if you grease the pans and place them in a hot oven for a few minutes before spooning in the muffin batter.

THIS WEEK IN Washington

NOT within the memory of the oldest observer here has the Congress been so in arrears in its legislative program.

So engrossed has the congress been in these various extra-curricular investigations, outstanding of which was the ouster hearings on the General MacArthur case, which drew the attendance of many senators that regular committee work could not proceed and the congress has sought to even by-pass its own rules and to legislate by short cuts in these same appropriation bills through the technique of hastily added "riders."

Riders often slip by. Several riders now in appropriations bills would prohibit replacement of federal employees, a slash by the house in public housing to 5,000, although there is a public law which permits 135,000 public housing units.

said to be headed in this country by the Bank of China in New York and operated by brothers-in-law of Chiang Kai-Shek, whose front is said to be one Alfred Kohlberg, New York importer, who reportedly supplied Senator McCarthy with funds for his campaign against the state department.

Latest "low" achieved by Senator McCarthy, according to most people here, was his vicious attack on General George C. Marshall, Secretary of Defense, and termed by President Truman as the "greatest living American."

General Wedemeyer, who, by the way, has asked for retirement and had the grace to doff his uniform, appearing in "civvies" before the Senate Committee, generally backed the policies of General MacArthur in the far east.

When Henry Ford was a young man on his father's farm he "foiled" with machinery. At last, he got a big idea. He would invent a wonderful steam engine for trains which would make all other steam engines look silly.

WHEN a friend of ours took her six-year-old son to his first big league game last week she called his attention to the vast number of people in the stadium—more than he had ever seen in his life.

"Yes," replied her son with an odd mixture of resignation and smugness, "and I suppose they'll all be talking about how long my eyelashes are."

It took our friend a moment to catch her breath and when she gasped an astonished "Why?", the boy replied calmly, "Well, every one always does."

Mother took stock after that and began to remember that, indeed, visitors in her home had quite regularly re-echoed, "Where did you get those long eyelashes?"

The art of making conversation with children seems a lost one where most adults are concerned. Their remarks too often take on a stilted repetitious quality: "My, how tall you've grown," or "How much you look like your mother," or unthinking comment on a physical characteristic like this little boy's eyelashes.

Even when this kind of talk takes a complimentary turn, it tends to make a child self-conscious. But worse than this, some normally well-mannered people are guilty of cruel can-

der where their juniors are concerned. "It's too bad her hair is so straight," or "What a pity he has to wear those disfiguring braces on his teeth," they say, just as if they thought all small fry were conveniently deaf or completely insensitive.

A wise mother can do much to discourage this kind of personal comment and will certainly do her best to counter the hurt and embarrassment caused by a thoughtlessly frank remark. But unfortunately, there are a good many mothers who themselves make a practice of discussing their own youngsters while they are well within earshot.

"I don't know what to do about Mary, she is so awkward," says one such careless mother, apparently with no realization that Mary's self-confidence shrivels under the public criticism.

Actually to avoid this kind of mistake, it is only necessary to remember one's manners. What adult would be guilty of embarrassing another by such unvarnished, unsolicited home-truths. And why should we take the attitude that children's sensibilities are any less acute or that they suffer less than their elders from having their frailties brought to attention? Childhood would come nearer to being the ideally happy time the poets picture it if all of us took care to treat young people—tots and teenagers—with the same courtesy we observe in our association with grownups.

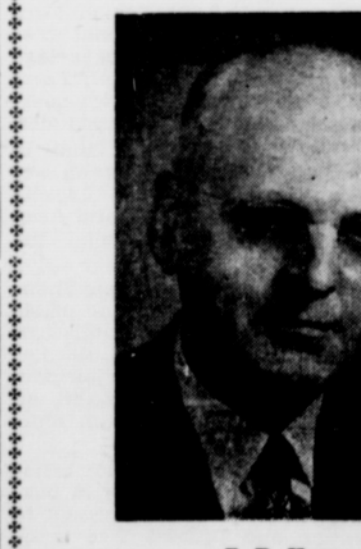

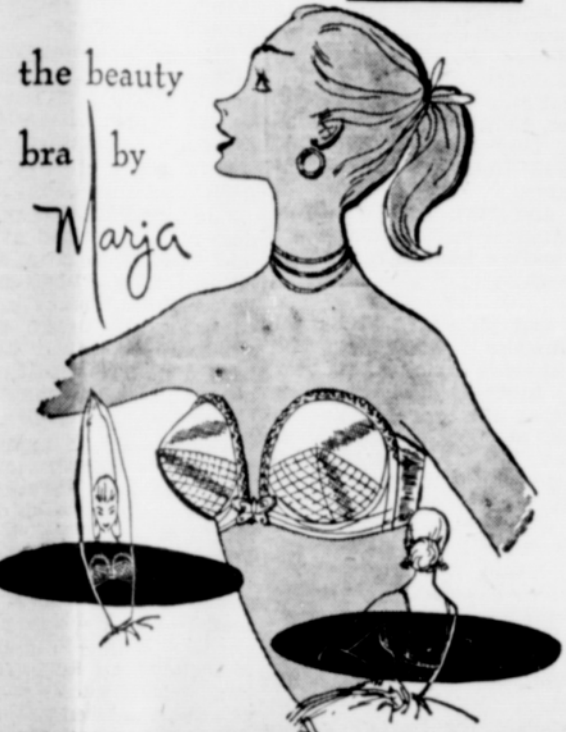

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Cooperators of the Lower Clear Fork, Central Colorado and Middle Clear Fork Soil Conservation Districts, that are being assisted by the Soil Conservation Service personnel of the Baird Work Unit, report the following accomplishments for the first half of the 1951 calendar year. Practices applied on the land show that 1943 acres have been contour farmed, for the first time; 50 acres have been planted to cover crops; 107 acres of proper stubble management; 15 acres of grass seeded; 26 ponds constructed; 704 miles of field terraces and 4 miles of diversion terraces built.

Accomplishments to date show that plans, based on sound land use and sound conservation farming, have been made on 352 farms and ranches, comprising 165,005 acres in these districts.

Initial Copy Publication Laws Book Presented Price Daniel



TEXAS' ATTORNEY GENERAL PRICE DANIEL took time out on Father's Day to receive the first copy of his new book, "Texas Publication Laws", as a gift from his family. Gathered around the Attorney General are Mrs. Daniel and the four children—John, Price Jr., Houston, and Jeanie. In spite of a big job and a big family, Daniel found time to edit the law book on newspapers and public notices as a public service for the Texas Press Association.

Price Daniel Receives First Copy Texas Press Publication Laws Book

Texas' Attorney General Price Daniel has a big job and a big family.

In spite of that, during the past two years he has found time to compile and edit the first complete book on Texas Publication Laws, a work long needed by Texas newspapers, public officials and newspaper lawyers.

The first copy of the new book, published by the Texas Press Association, was presented to Price Daniel by his four children on Father's Day.

In addition to his distinguished career as a country lawyer and then as the aggressive attorney general of his native state, Price Daniel is co-publisher of his hometown newspaper, the Liberty Vindicator. His newspaper partnership with Jake Smyth and John Manthey also includes the Anahuac Progress at Anahuac, Texas.

Daniel is the son of a weekly newspaper editor. It was in the high schools of Fort Worth at the age of 15 years that Daniel first published his own newspaper, the Fort Worth High School Student. He also worked as a cub reporter for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and then for the Waco News Tri-

bune while attending Baylor University. At Baylor, Daniel edited the Daily Lariat and the college annual.

"I paid my way through law school by working in the newspaper business," Daniel has often said. He is an active member of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity, as well as his many legal associations.

From the standpoint of a lawyer and a newspaper man, Daniel was well equipped to write the book which contains all newspaper and public notice law in the state. The Texas Press Association is making it available to newspapermen, lawyers, public officials, and others at actual cost of publication. "It is a public service project made possible by the work of our attorney general," Brad Smith of Weslaco, president of the Texas Press Association said.

The only thing which rates higher attention than the law and the newspaper with Price Daniel is his attractive and devoted family. His wife, the former Jean Houston, a widow of Houston, is a great-granddaughter of General Sam Houston. The four children are Price Jr., 10, Jeanie, 9, Hous-

ton, 5, and John, 4. They now live in Austin in a rambling house on three lots covered with oak trees—the nearest thing they could get to the open spaces of their permanent home in Liberty.

In his first five years as Texas' Attorney General, Daniel has gained distinction for his fight against federal seizure of the tidelands from the Texas public school fund. He insists that Texas will win in Congress if Texans keep on fighting and refusing to compromise or surrender. He has been outspoken in his belief that federal officials are violating the Texas Annexation Agreement in attempting to take these lands.

Daniel has been equally persistent against other federal encroachments upon the powers and property of the states and of individual citizens. Also, he has been leading the state's fight against organized crime, vowing that Texas will soon lead the nation in its clean-up of syndicated gambling and warning outside hoodlums and racketeers to stay away from Texas.

Daniel is a veteran of World War II, having retired from the office of Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives to enter the service as a private. After three years, the last few months of which were spent in General Douglas MacArthur's occupation of Japan, he was discharged as a captain.

That he is a hard worker in his job as "the people's lawyer" is evidenced by a record of 4832 lawsuits and 2498 official opinions disposed of by his administration since January 1, 1947.

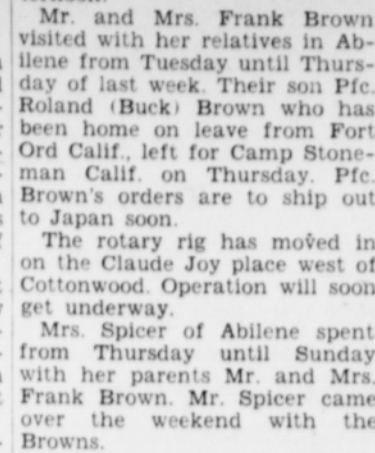

"DISAPPOINTING RESPONSE" BY DOVE HUNTERS

AUSTIN — A "disappointing response" to the sportmen's poll on the 1951 mourning dove season was reported by the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

He said "less than 100" letters or postal cards had been received one week after the poll was announced. The greatest response, he explained, has been from the Houston area. Most of the writers want a later season.

In announcing the poll last week, the Executive Secretary said the Commission wanted to obtain sportsmen's opinion as a basis for making recommendations to the Federal Fish & Wildlife Service, which sets the season since doves are migratory.

The Commission plans to prepare its recommendations at its next regular meeting in Austin, July 6.

The Executive Secretary said there has been some sentiment to have the mourning dove season in the south zone coincide with the bobwhite quail season which usually is later than the dove shoot.

Streamlined Postal Money Order System Put Into Operation July 2 at Post Offices

Patrons of more than 42,000 Post Offices found the new and more convenient money order available Monday morning, July 2. Postmaster General Jesse M. Donaldson announced today.

Principal changes in the new money order system will make it possible to have a money order cashed at any of the nation's post offices or it may be collected through any bank in the same manner as the depositing or cashing of a check.

The new money order appears in the form of a punched card instead of the customary paper slip and purchasers will fill out the same form and pay the same fees as has been required in the past.

The regulation that money orders must be cashed at specific post offices has been eliminated. Under the old system, it will be recalled, a money order had to be cashed in the office to which it was issued. If it was cashed at a post office in another city, an additional fee was charged.

The new system makes available to the Post Office Department the most advanced electronic business machines. One machine, the IBM Type 808 Proof Machine, has been especially developed for the new money order purposes and it combines all the advantages of the modern proof machine in widespread use by banks and large department stores throughout the country. Another of the principal machines to be used with the new system is the Electronic Statistical Machine, workhorse of the 1950 Census tabulation.

The Postmaster General described the inauguration of the new money order system as the largest single accounting change ever made in postal history and said, that the development comes after exhaustive study by the Post Office Department, the General Accounting Office, the Treasury Department and the Federal Reserve Board.

The Department urges users to remember that the new money orders must not be folded, stapled or mutilated in any way since they are to be issued on punch cards and processed by machinery.

Last year more than 300,000 money orders, totaling upward to five billion dollars were issued and paid by the Post Office Department.

The new money order system will be under the management and supervision of Assistant Postmaster General Asborne A. Pearson, who directs the Department's Bureau of Finance.

All new money orders will clear Federal Reserve Banks in the same manner as Treasury checks or other cash items. The Federal Reserve banks will then turn over the paid money orders to the proper regional Post Offices.

The new money order system is in keeping with the program to modernize and improve the operation of the postal service, as well as to effect economy and the better to serve the general public.
