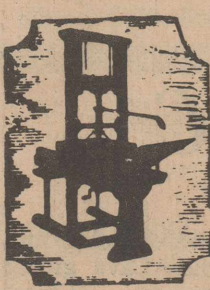

Hale And Parker Forced To Runoff, Hargrove Wins Race

Fisher County Democrats re-nominated two members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court and in most instances went with state-wide front runners in their primary election Saturday.

In addition to re-nominating Jimmy Wright and Billy Henderson, voters re-named Marshal Bennett to another term as Fisher County Judge.

In the race to name a Commissioner for Precinct #4-Jimmy Wright captured 307 votes; E.M. (Bud) Guelker had 194 and Gary Graham had 102 votes.

Marshal Bennett, in his race for re-election as Fisher County Judge,

captured approximately 58% of the vote. He had 1245 votes, Wayne Porter had 471 votes and Wynelle Terry had 413 votes.

Rotan Fire Department Auction Set

The auction sponsored by the Rotan Volunteer Fire Department has been set for 10:00 a.m. May 22nd. Several donations have been received, but more are needed. Among some of the items are: quilts, grill, cook top, refrigeration units, binoculars, and a calculator. A complete list will be available by press time the week of the auction.

In the Fisher County race for District Clerk, Betty Hargrove won the nomination by capturing 1059 votes to 1043 for incumbent Eula Mae Hull.

The only runoff race in Fisher County will pit Ilene Hale against Willardene Parker. Hale received 863 votes to 646 for Parker. The other can-

didate, Kathy Smith, received 637 votes.

Geneva Chandler won re-election over Tammy Herron by taking 778 votes to 343 for Herron.

The runoff for state races and the local race for Fisher County Treasurer will take place on June 5th.

A Spring Turkey Hunting Season in Fisher County--While probably not too many local folk are interested in Turkey Hunting, the occurrence is very unusual. For the first time ever it was legal to take wild turkey for one week. The season closed this past weekend. Local hunters didn't seem too interested, then too, Fisher County wild turkeys are on private property and many landowners do not want them shot.

No kills were reported last week, but during the fall hunting season numerous hunters bagged, big, long-bearded toms.

Fisher County was never 'turkey country', but was splendid deer hunting country about the turn of the century, especially the 'shinnery' east of Roby and Rotan. My Grandad Ed Hooper, the third Sheriff of Fisher County, told me as a small lad of he and other Roby men always getting their deer in some farmer's pea patch (was legal to hunt with light at night). But they had to go to Paint Creek (presently Lake Stamford) for their Thanksgiving and Christmas turkeys. He said before the turn of the century the 'draws' on Double Mountain River, Rough Creek, Longhorn Valley and Croton Breaks had many Cottonwood trees which are good protection for the turkeys.

The fact that wild turkey are fairly abundant in Fisher County at present time is mainly due to a most efficient game department. Until the 1920's our game department was controlled by politicians, now it is practically free of this, and is one of the best in the nation.

I was always told "If you learn something new you live another day." Well, I have added another day, and after reading this, you may too. The poultry industry loses millions of dollars each year because of broken eggs. After some study researchers at the University of Illinois found that when they let hens drink carbonated water they lay eggs with thicker shells. Eggshells are made of calcium and carbon compounds. Hens don't always have enough calcium in their blood, one reason being that in hot weather hens keep cool by panting. Rapid breathing pushes carbon dioxide levels down. This causes blood proteins to be negative. The calcium with its positive charge binds to the negative blood protein. This results in thin, chalky, fragile shells. When carbonated drinking water is provided to hens the carbon dioxide is replenished and the calcium supply increases in the blood. Fizzy water for hens means harder egg shells for us.

meeting and gave the treasurer's report. Refreshments of sandwiches, cookies, potato chips, cake and punch

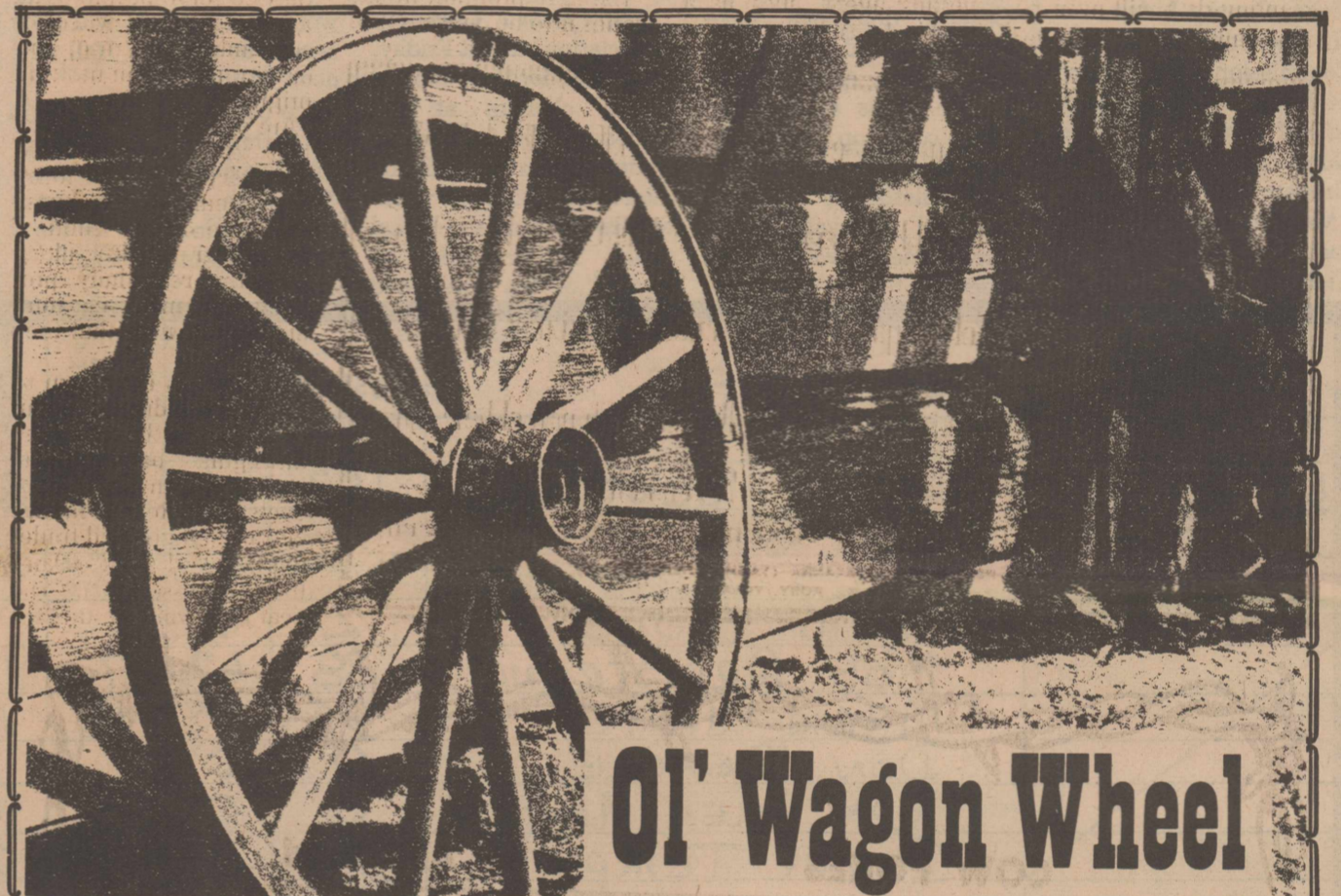
were served to ten members, the 4-H members and their leaders. Mrs. Preston will be the Club's next hostess with

The old wagon wheel in the picture, leaning against the side wall of the old log shop, is fast becoming a relic of a departed era.

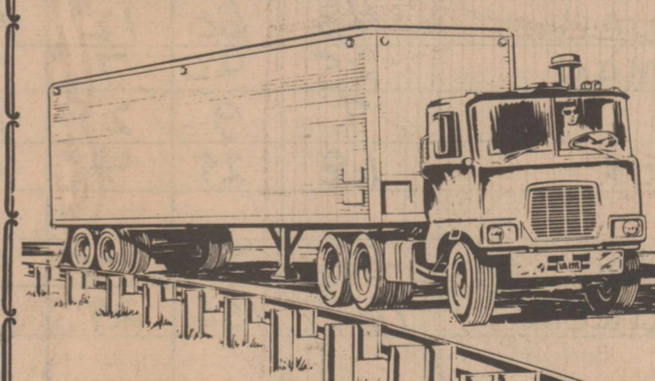
Time was when the blacksmith and wheelwright did a thriving business and the rumble of carts and wagons was a familiar sound in every community. Some of these

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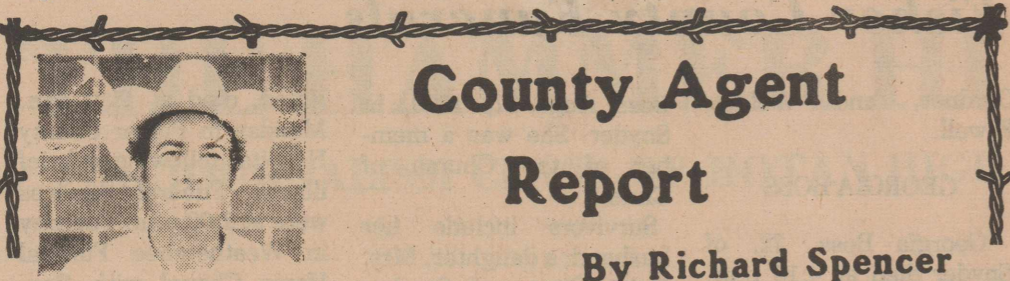

County Agent Report

Several farmers over the county are draining salt seeps with underground pipe. This should make the land more productive and allow the farmer more access to the seep ground. Bill Pfluger is installing a Savary grazing system on his ranch near Sylvester. Pfluger raises cattle and sheep on the ranch along with having a large wheat acreage.

A big percentage of wheat acreage is being grazed out since a lot of producers consider it too far gone for a rain to help. However, there is still wheat in the county that will cut in the 12-15 bushel range.

In a recent report from Jeff Slosser of the Rolling Plains Experiment Station at Vernon, he states that there was a 1.5 percent survival rate of boll weevils in Kent County. This is the highest percentage in 2 years and means that the uniform planting date will even be more important than ever

this year. The planting date has been set for May 24 this year.

Roses can be enjoyable for many homeowners but special care is required to keep foliage diseases under control. Blackspot and powdery mildew are the two most prevalent foliage diseases affecting roses. Powdery mildew can be found on new growth while blackspot normally begins development on lower leaves. Blackspot infections cause the leaves to turn yellow and shed.

For both blackspot and powdery mildew diseases, benomyl, triforine and phalton will help control the infections. Captan, maneb and chlorothalonil will help control blackspot only.

For best results, most fungicides should be applied every seven days. Adding 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon per gallon of mixture of a wetting agent, such as a liquid household deter-

gent, to the fungicide will give better cover on the foliage.

It is best to start applications in early spring to help protect new growth before foliage diseases are able to develop. However, you can work to control the problems in plants that are showing considerable infection and summer stress.

Pecan owners should spray their trees at this time to encourage new growth and prevent rosette.

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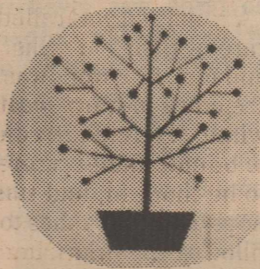

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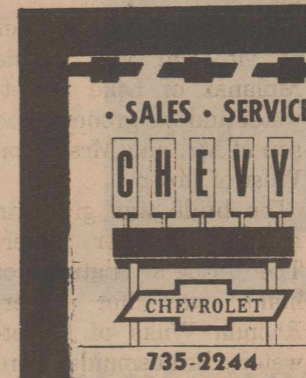

Favorite Recipes From Fisher County Folks

By Carol Weatherly

More and more, women are depending on the convenience of Microwave Ovens in these busy days, so I thought it might be nice to feature some favorites.

From Janece Pease comes the following recipe for Swiss Steak. She is the wife of Editor Kim Pease and the mother of four children.

Swiss Steak

Note: Four factors help tenderize this less tender cut. Pounding and cooking in tomato sauce break down fibers. A lower power level allows meat to simmer slowly. Standing time is the most important; meat will not be tender without it.

2 lbs. beef round or chuck, cut in serving size pieces
 ¼ to ½ cup flour
 1 envelope onion soup mix
 1 can (8-oz.) tomato sauce
 2 tsp. parsley flakes
 ¼ cup water

Serves 4

Pound meat with edge of saucer or meat mallet to tenderize and flatten it to ¼ to ½-in. thickness. Coat meat with flour by shaking in a paper bag or dredging on a sheet of waxed paper. Place meat in 2-qt. baking dish. Sprinkle with soup mix. Combine remaining ingredients in a 2-cup measure. Pour over meat. Cover with vented plastic wrap. Microwave at 50% power (Medium) 25 minutes. Re-arrange meat. Re-cover. Microwave 25 to 35 minutes longer. Meat should be fork tender. Let stand, tightly covered, 10 minutes to tenderize further.

Our second recipe was sent to us by Stephanie Dickson, wife of Rotan School Superintendent Jerry Dickson. They have one daughter, Jody, who will be 2 years old in July.

Golden Onion Quiche

Pastry:

1 cup unsifted all-purpose flour
 ½ t. salt
 3 T. Shortening
 3 T. cold butter

In small mixing bowl stir together flour and salt. With pastry blender, cut in shortening until it has the appearance of cornmeal. Cut in butter until particles are the size of peas.

2½ T. cold water
 Sprinkle mixture with cold water. Blend lightly with fingers until dough holds together and can be formed into ball. Roll out to fit 9-inch quiche dish.

1 egg yolk 1 t. Worcestershire sauce
 Brush pastry with mixture of egg yolk and Worcestershire sauce. Microwave at High 4-6 minutes, rotating dish ½ turn after 2½ minutes.

1 cup shredded Mozzarella cheese
 Sprinkle cheese over bottom of pie shell.
 3 eggs ½ cup whipping cream 3 drops Tabasco
 With fork beat together eggs, cream and hot sauce. Pour over cheese in pie shell.

1 can (3-oz.) French Fried Onions
 1 T. dried or frozen chives

With sharp knife, cut through onions in can to chop medium fine. Pour over top and lightly press down. Sprinkle chives over top. Microwave at Medium 12-14 minutes, rotating pie ½ turn after 6 minutes. Let stand about 5 minutes to firm slightly before serving. Yields-6 servings.

Hint: Scald milk easily in a glass measuring cup for yeast breads or custards.

Hint: Refrigerate fresh perked coffee. Re-heat a cup at a time on high for 1½ to 2 minutes.

Hint: You can use your glass measuring cup to melt chocolate. Two ounces unsweetened chocolate melts in 1½ to 2 minutes.

Leisure Lodge Organization Changes Local Name To Rotan Nursing Center

Crestview Lodge, owned by Convelescenters of America, opened April 1, 1968. Homer Baird, presently associated with Weathersbee Funeral Home, was the first Administrator. The first Director of Nurses was Mrs. Wynelle McCormick Bryant, formerly of Roby. There was no state requirement for an Activities Director or Food Service Supervisor. These were added in 1972. Nina Eeds, morning cook, was head cook and as such wrote out the menu daily, supervised and trained staff, and controlled Dietary Purchasing.

The Home opened with five patients. The first patient admitted was Mrs. J.H. Thompson, mother of H. Thompson. Among the first five patients admitted were Nancy White, Dalton Huckaby, Mr. Emmett Cave, Mrs. Ella Kemp, followed closely by Felix Garcia. Felix Garcia and Nancy White lived here for 14 years, prior to their recent deaths.

Early and first employees were: Minnie Baird, Laundry; Abbie Tankersley, Cook and later Nurses Aide; Ann Allen, Nurses Aide; Faye Martin, LVN; Laura Meyers, Nurses Aide; Kathrine Bruce, Nurses Aide; Christine Gruben, Nurses Aide; Oscar Tankersley, first Janitor - Maintenance Man. Early Nurses and subsequent Directors were: Rena Caldwell, presently employed at Fisher County Hospital, and Estelle Acker, retired. Wanda Murphree succeeded Homer Baird when he joined another home a year after the home was established. Butch Cochran was the first Area Supervisor and is presently employed by The Beverly Corporation Central Division as Regional Supervisor for Maintenance. Alta Hinson, Director of Nurses at Fisher County Hospital, was also one of the first Area Supervisors.

Crestview Lodge was purchased the early part of 1972 by Leisure Lodge, Inc. In June, 1978, Leisure Lodge, Inc. was purchased by the Beverly Co-operation. The Home's name is presently Rotan Nursing Center.

The first Activities Director was June Hicks in 1973, Laura Lee Myers; in 1974, Ima Berry joined the staff January 13, 1975, as Activities Director and is employed in that capacity presently.

Other very early employees were Joyce Marie Van Loan as cook; Juanita Reyez as cook, and Mickey

Martinez, cook. The last two are still employed, Joyce, a Food Service Supervisor, and Mickey as Head Cook.

Nina Eeds daughter, Laura Myers, has worked here nearly continually in one capacity or another since the Home was established. Nina's granddaughter, Sharla Marks, currently works in the Dietary Department as a Cook's Helper-a 3rd generation following the trail blazing tradition established by Nina Eeds.

Nina still laughs about setting up the kitchen and equipment-some of it still in use in the kitchens. The states she and Buck Cochran and Homer Baird used a wheelbarrow to move items stored in a house across the street into the kitchen. She made out all menus subject to a final okay by the Department of Health Dietician.

The name of Leisure Lodge, Rotan, was changed to Rotan Nursing Center March 17, 1982. We are currently owned by Beverly Corp., having been purchased (Leisure Lodges, Inc.) by them six years ago (Fall of 1976).

We presently have an Activities Program going with crafts, games, ring-alongs, parties, exercise class, gardening (a rose garden was recently established by the Residents), a rain gauge and temperature gauge were recently added, Reality Orientation-shopping trips. 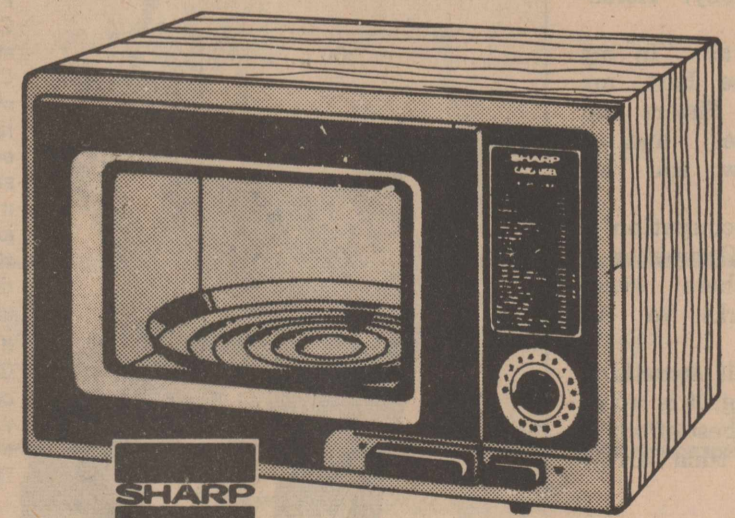

Fisher County Nursing Home Residents

As recently as 1950, Texas and most other states had no regulations governing nursing homes. Most of the early facilities which bore the name were simply of a boarding house nature that became a small nursing home as their guests aged and required

more "nursing" attention. The unfortunate ailing elderly of those times who were unable to pay even the meager rates for private "keep" became charity cases who were dependent upon the county, which moved them to "farms" which for the

most part was dreaded by all.

From those sorry circumstances came scary tales, myths, and many false legends about "nursing" homes which still persist in some folks' minds even to this day.

Although the quality of nursing home facilities and the people who staff them have long since attained the rank of professionalism, the image of both which prevails in the minds of many is still clouded by disturbing doubts and preconceived ideas.

From zero standards less than 30 years ago to over 2000 standards today! We certainly have come a long way, and to comprehend the changes in the long term care industry calls for some honest and factual information.

Here are the facts about

nursing homes in the state of Texas today.

State licensing of nursing homes in Texas was first required in 1953 and licensing of Administrators was mandated by law effective July 1, 1970. The Board of Licensure, appointed by the Governor requires: Basic 200 clock hours of study and lectures, two written examinations, one oral examination, minimum 26 week internship with direct supervision orientation and planning under a certified preceptor, 40 hours biennial study to keep license valid and if the Administrator does not have a minimum of 12 hours of college per year until the degree requirement is completed. Effective July 1, 1984, 90 hours of academic credit will be required and the 200 hour course. Effective July 1,

1986, a Bachelor's Degree will be required and the 200 hour course.

Facilities as well as Administrative Personnel must meet demanding standards for licensure. As the licensing agency, the State Health Department makes regular inspections at least one of which each year must be unannounced. The Department of Human Resources (formerly Welfare) dispenses payments. Facilities are, of course, subject to all local building codes and inspections conducted by local fire, safety, and sanitation authorities.

In 1959 the Fisher County Nursing Home was built in Rotan. In 1961 the Home for the Aged was built in Roby. The name was later changed to Golden Haven

Home. Fisher County has a total of three nursing home facilities. There are approximately 1,029 licensed nursing homes in Texas with a total of 104,460 beds.

Golden Haven Nursing Home Plans Nursing Home Week Celebration

The average age of nursing home patients is now 80 years and 70% are women. These individuals average three or more chronic conditions. 19% of the people in nursing homes have never married. 6% have no surviving next of kin. Up to 64% of them are on some form of public assistance. One-third of these individuals

leave within one year after entering a nursing home, but 2/3 of them stay from 1 to 5 years or longer, reinforcing the fact that patients go to nursing homes to LIVE, not to die. People served by nursing homes are not a cross-section of the general population. They have very special needs. Nursing Homes today are

staffed and operated to meet those needs. These facilities are the major elements in Medicaid health care programs funded jointly by the State and Federal government. Service to patients under Medicaid in Texas embraces the total care concept. That care includes, under a fixed

uniform rate set by the State Department of Human Resources, all such care, regular, special or supplemental diets, non-legend drugs, medical accessories, equipment and supplies necessary to meet the current health needs of the patient. No charges are permitted by the nursing home to the patient, to his family, or any other service, over and above the fixed rate (except for oxygen if prescribed in writing by the physician.) These homes are reimbursed at a rate of \$27.61 per day or \$1.25 per hour. "Round-the-Clock" care delivered by Nursing Homes--Long Term Care--differs drastically in cost from Hospital Care. According to Texas Blue Cross/Blue Shield figures for 1981 Hospital national averages are running \$600.00-\$900.00 per day. Because a major portion of Nursing Home payments are from public funds, their operation is more closely monitored than any other segment of the entire health delivery system.

Among all states, operating under the Medicaid Title XIX program, Texas alone was classified #1.

Larry Gatlin and Gatlin Brothers, in their roles as Celebrity Hosts for Nursing Home Week have urged people everywhere to "Share Your Love--Visit a Nursing Home." So as the staffs of Golden Haven and Fisher County put our tired aching feet up at the end of a long day and wonder why we do what we are doing--I guess it's really very simple--we care.

County Entomologist Gives Tips On Pecan Tree Care

Budbreak has occurred on most pecan trees and it is time for the first foliar application of zinc. There are two types of zinc which can be used in Texas, zinc sulfate or NZN. Both are very effective. Take care when using zinc sulfate because it can burn the leaves and kill many kinds of plants. Only apply zinc sulfate to the leaves of your pecan trees. NZN is a highly soluble liquid and is less toxic to other vegetation. The high Ph of our soil makes it so that the zinc in the soil is not soluble in water and so is unavailable to the tree. This is why applications of zinc to the soil are of no significant value to pecan trees in Texas.

Zinc is an important element utilized by the pecan foliage to manufacture a growth hormone called indole-acetic-acid. Without zinc and the formation of this growth hormone, pecan growth is greatly reduced. The leaves will be small and the shoots will be short and in clusters forming what is commonly called "zinc rosette".

Zinc alone is not the answer to perfect pecans. It is, however, a very important cultural requirement. With good zinc management, other cultural practices such as fertilization and irrigation will be more effective.

Cutworms have been reported doing damage in gardens again this year. Seeding plants are especially vulnerable to cutworms since the main stem is tender and can be severed easily.

Cutworms are the larvae of a group of moths which have a wingspan of 1 to 2 inches and normally exhibit a grayish-brown to black body and wing color. The cutworm larvae usually appear as dingy, grayish-black, smooth "worms" that curl into a ball or tight "C-shape" when disturbed.

There are four distinct groups of cutworms based on habitat and feeding behavior. One or more examples for each category are discussed in the following paragraphs.

Subterranean cutworms—Members of this group such as the pale western

cutworm—*Agrotis orthogonia* (Morr.) feed almost entirely below the soil's surface on roots and underground stems.

Tunnel Dwellers—Several cutworm species such as the black cutworm, *Agrotis ipsilon* (Hufnagel) form and live in tunnels. This particular cutworm cuts a tender plant at the soil surface, pulls it into the tunnel and devours the plant.

Surface feeders—The army cutworm, *Euxoa auxiliaris* (Grote) is a serious pest of ornamental plants. The worms are active during the night when they cut off small plants at or near the soil surface and feed on the plant. They either hide in the soil or under mulch or surface trash such as boards during the day. They are very tolerant to the cold temperatures and are often present as damaging larvae in early spring.

Climbing cutworms—Several species of climbing cutworms feed on the foliage, stems, leaves and fruits of many plants. The variegated cutworm, *Peridroma saucia* (Hubn.) like other cutworms feeds

primarily at night and hides during the day. However, some feeding may occur on cool, cloudy days.

Cultural control techniques are important in reducing cutworm. A few control methods are listed below.

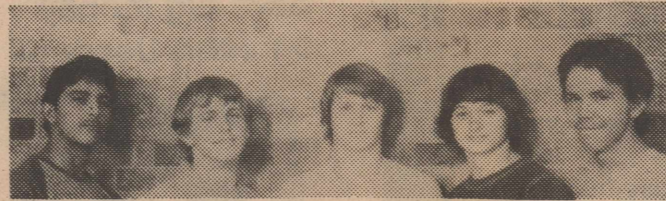
—Keep gardens plowed and weed-free when not planted with desired crops since cutworm moths are attracted to grassy areas to deposit eggs.

—Place small boards in the garden so that cutworms which congregate under them during the day can be easily collected and destroyed.

—Climbing cutworms can be controlled to a degree by encircling stems or trunks of trees and vines with a specially prepared, very thick and sticky substance.

—Mechanical barriers such as tin cans with both ends removed, cardboard collars, plastic or paper milk jugs or any barrier placed around transplants, offers some protection.

—Treat soils infested with cutworms before any seed or transplants are placed in the garden.

A Sweetwater operator has posted first production figures for two new oil producers in Fisher County's Claytonville Field.

The two new wells are the No. 1 and No. 2 Fomby et al, located 10 miles southwest of Roby. The No. 1 showed potential for 15 barrels of crude and 150,000 CF casinghead gas per day, pumping open choke. The No. 2 indicated its ability to pump 18 barrels of oil daily, also making 150,000 CF gas.

J.A. Wilburn of Sweetwater is the operator. Wilburn took the wells to 5,300 and 5,290-ft. total depths respectively. Production intervals will range from 5,236 to 5,276 feet in the Canyon Sand.

Drillsites were in a 120-acre lease, H&TCRR Survey.

The same operator has filed for permits to drill three shallower oil wells 12 miles southwest of Roby. They are designated as the No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 Wilburn "C". Locations are in a 160-acre unit in Fisher County's H&TCRR Survey. All three wells will carry permit for maximum depth of 850 feet.

Enserch Exploration of Dallas has staked location for a Stonewall County wildcat for oil nine miles north-northwest of Aspermont. The explorer well will be known as the No. 1 Annie Oldham "32". It will be located in a 654-acre lease block in the H&TCRR Survey. Projected total depth is 3,100 feet.

Wilburn Posts Claytonville Production Figures

A new oil well has been brought on line in Stonewall County's Flowers Field, five miles southeast of Aspermont. It is the No. 218 Flowers, a venture of Getty Oil Co.

The well becomes the 154th active producer in the lease. It showed ability

to flow 32 barrels of oil daily on a 1-in. choke with flowing tubing pressure on 100 PSI.

Getty took the probe to 4,350-ft. total depth. It will produce from a perforated interval in the Canyon Sand, 4,018 to 4,259 feet

into the wellbore.

Drillsite was in a 5,876 acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey.

A Nolan County oil wildcat has been completed by Callon Oil Co. of Natchez, Miss., seven miles southeast of Sweetwater. Designated as the No. 1 Pace, it demonstrated ability to pump 8.5 barrels of oil per day, along with a small volume of gas and salt water.

Location is in a 640-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

Callon drilled to 6,288-ft. total depth and perforated a production interval 5,908 to 5,918 feet into the hole.

Bentley and Loving of Wichita Falls have successfully completed a new oiler in Jones County's Huddleston Field 3.5 miles north of the town of Noodle.

The well will be known as the No. 1 J.A. Griffith. It demonstrated capacity for 25 barrels of oil per day, pumping on a 2-in. choke. It bottomed at 4,825 feet

and will produce from Strawn Sand perforations 4,770 to 4,777 feet into the hole.

Lamesa-based Union Exploration Inc. has filed initial production figures on the No. 3 Druesedow "B" 2.5 miles southeast of Old Lory.

Tested on a 14/64 choke, the well showed ability to produce 147 barrels of oil and 95,000 CF casinghead gas per day. The flowing tubing pressure stood at 120 PSI.

With bottomhole at 6,250 feet, the well will produce from two sets of perforations in the Bend Conglomerate Formation,

5,975 to 6,000-feet. It is in Nolan County's Corsica Field, BBB&CRR Survey, in a 40-acre drilling unit.

Pumping 40 barrels of oil per day, along with 350 barrels of salt water, the No. 1 Wilson has been brought on line in Nolan County's J&J Field, three miles southeast of Sweetwater. R.L. Adkins Corp., Sweetwater, is the operator.

Bottomed at 6,389 feet, the well will produce from an interval of perforations in the Caddo Limestone, 6,236 to 6,248 feet into the hole. Drillsite was in a 160-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

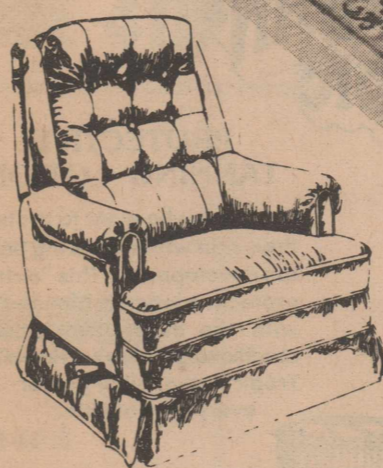

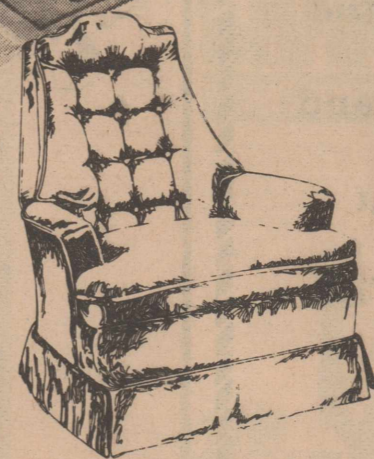

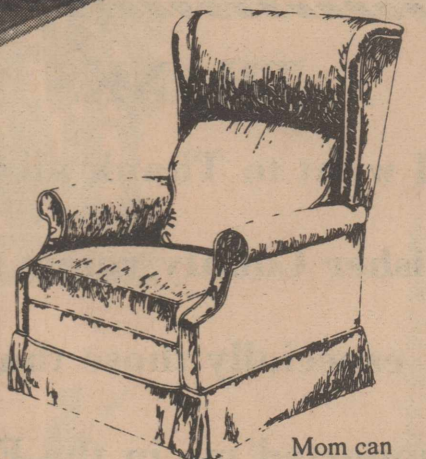
