



EDITORIAL

A WORTHWHILE COMMUNITY PROJECT

For some time now the Baird people have been working and thinking along lines of "doing things ourselves." One of the most worthy projects we can think of, that would definitely be a step forward for our town, is the construction of a new and modern city hall and fire sta-

At first thought, this might sound like a pretty big mouthful, but when we take the second look at the picture, it might not be so hard to do.

We hear about other towns in Texas turning out to build a city park in a day. One town not so far from Baird built their own hospital by all its citizens turning out with hammers and saws and erecting the structure in a very short time. All of these projects have carried a whale of a lot of civic pride along with them and the citizens have taken more interest in their accomplishments than they would have under almost any other plan.

Now take Baird's case. We own the corner lot, a most desirable location for a city hall and fire station, just north of Wylie Funeral Home. The present city hall could be sold for probably enough to buy the materials for the new structure. Then with donated labor under the supervision of one good carpenter, the job could be done in no time at all. Even if we voted a small bond issue, and got the building erected, we would be far ahead of where we

The present city hall is inadequate and obsolete. When the city council meets, it can't do justice to the business at hand for lack of space in the office. The vault is over crowded, too. The fire station is too small. The assembly room up stairs is much too small and inaccessible. It is not even a suitable place to hold elections, but they are held there—up stairs—almost every election day. Now and then elections are held at the American Legion building where voters do not have to climb a flight of stairs. We could go on and on about the bad features of the present city building, but we believe the citizens can add the rest of them up for themselves.

Just now the city and the fire department are figuring on building an addition to the city hall-fire station to house the new fire truck. Whatever is built there will be too costly in face of the fact that we need a new building. Why not start in now and build a city hall and fire station that we can be proud to own-something that would reflect the civic pride of the town?



IT WAS NEARLY 20 years ago that Charles E. Prideaux, Morristown, N.L., was told by his physician that he had contracted pulmonary tuberculosis. Worried? He most certainly was. His knowledge of the disease made him feel that his days were numbered and that the number was not high.

He went to Saranac Lake, N.Y., and was placed under the care of the late Dr. Lawrason Brown, one of the world's authorities on this disease, who told him that he must completely relax and not worry. Not worry? Well, Dr. Brown didn't have pulmonary tuberculosis!

During the next few months his progress was very slow. But it was progress! That was something. One day he was handed a book written by Dr. Brown on how to recover from tuberculosis. This little volume did more for him than all the preaching in the world could have done, for he



Well, worry had certainly not helped him; he made up his mind to try the opposite of worry.

For the next nine months he lay in bed with a bag containing 15 pounds of buckshot in his right lung. And he didn't allow himself to dwell on anything unpleasant. At the end of this period, he showed remarkable improvement.

Two years later he was back at work, and since that time he has not had an illness beyond the common cold. But what is of equal importance, he has carried a cheerful mental attitude into his work-a-day life. He has a job of great responsibility and hard work, but although it is such that he must carry some of the responsibility home with him at night, he doesn't worry about it, but looks upon his task pleasantly, and when he is finished puts it out of mind and goes to bed.

A HIGHWAY SAFETY "MUST"

In the half century that the automobile has been on the scene, the average span of life in America has increased about 21 years. For this we can largely thank medical and surgical advances, not the reckless drivers of automobiles. Indeed, the average span of life today would be even higher if such drivers had not killed 1,000,000 persons since the turn of the century-300,000 of them in the decade between 1941 and 1950.

Last year more than 300,000 years of life were wiped out in traffic accidents that claimed over 6,500 victims between the ages of 15 and 25 alone. These are the years in which educations are finished, careers started, marriages made and families founded. Parents had watched over these young lives until eyes, once filled with pride and hope, became glazed with stunned unbecame glazed with stuffied the belief when word came of the tragic end. "Why did it have to happen?" they sobbed. Why indeed? An average of between 44 and 52 years of pro-

mising and potentially fruitful life were destroyed in each instance. Relatively few of these 6,500 young victims were pedes-trians, probably because they had been trained in grade school in the ways of pedestrian safety. Nearly all were killed while driving or riding in accident-bound automobiles. The accidents were largely due to the inexpert, careless driving habits of youth.

Driver education, which trains young men and women to be safe drivers before they take the wheel of the family car, is offered today by only 38 percent of the nation's high schools. These courses are taken every year by about 600,000 high school students, or 44 percent of those eligible to enroll. Through such courses a determined effort is being made to improve the tragic accident record of drivers between the ages of 16 and 25, March 27, with Mrs. John Berry which is nearly twice as bad as it should be in relation to the
