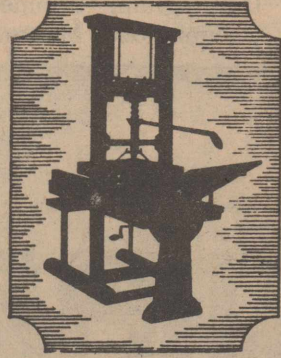

### Commissioners Approve \$4,800 Job To Panel Eleven County Offices

Fisher County Commissioners have authorized approximately \$4,800.00 in repair work to the Fisher County Court House, according to Judge Marshal Bennett. Commissioners originally asked for bids on paneling offices with 9 ft oak paneling. M & C Lumber

of Rotan was the only bidder. That bid was rejected by commissioners because they felt the cost was excessive. That bid was in the amount of \$12,500.00. In the bid it was mentioned that alternative measures could be taken to decrease the cost of remodeling.

After investigating the alternative measure, commissioners authorized installing 8 ft. paneling with a 1 ft cap in eleven Fisher County offices. The offices to be remodeled included: Home Demonstration agent; Assistant County Agent; District Clerk's Office;

County Attorney's office; Judge's Secretary's office; Justice of the Peace office;

#### Treasurer Pays Off Note On Court House

In September of 1972 the members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court awarded a \$339,900 construction contract to C. B. Oates Construction Company of Abilene for the construction of a new Fisher County Court House. Last Tuesday, March 1, 1983, Ilene Hale, Fisher County Treasurer, made the final payment on that note.

The original amount of the note was \$357,000. Bonds for the original note show an issue date of September 1972.

The final note payment, made last Tuesday, was in the amount of \$37,925.00 to the Citizen's State Bank of Roby, Texas.

Our organization in cooperation with Commissioners Court cleared and fenced several early-day abandoned community cemeteries in the county that were in bad condition, several years ago, but some of these again need attention. This also is not a major project but we consider it very important. Surely we can pay respect to a number of our pioneers by caring for their last resting place.

We do not plan to do earth-shattering projects but do plan to gather and record all available history and preserve the same for posterity.

This is a county-wide organization with all communities being represented.

The Roby boys basketball team needed a "last second-miracle two point shot in overtime last Monday night to pull out a win over a tough McGargle squad at Haskell in the bi-district contest and didn't get it.

In the overtime period Robby King scored 2 points while Terry Coker had 3 points. The McGargle five scored 6 points and advances to the next level of competition in Stephenville.

Roby soundly trounced Rule in Abilene on Thursday, February 24th. They emptied the bench, giving all uniformed players the opportunity to play, and still walked away with a comfortable 80-58 win.

## TSTI Offering Typing Classes

For high school students who can't work typing into their schedules, TSTI has a great opportunity. The Technical Office Training Department is offering Typing I-A at night, beginning March 3.

Class meets on Monday and Thursday evenings from 6:00-9:00. Typing I-A is the basic typing course, designed to familiarize students with the keyboard and touch typing. Registration for this 12-week course is March 1, and tuition is only \$22.00. The textbook is not included. To enroll in this course, high school students must have a letter of consent from a parent or guardian and from the high school principal or other recognized school official. Students must be at least 16 years old and must present a current high school transcript and complete the necessary admission forms.

### TAX DEFINITIONS

A great deal of confusion in the tax laws centers around the definition of tax terms. I hope you'll find the following definitions useful:

1. **LONG-TERM CAPITAL GAIN-A** favorable tax treatment for assets sold which were held more than one year. Futures transactions in commodities are long-term if held more than six months. Draft, breeding and dairy livestock must be held at least 24 months.

2. **INCOME AVERAGING-A** tax reduction computed by comparing the current year's high income with the prior four years' lower income. A substantial savings is possible if your current year's income is unusually high.

3. **TAX DEDUCTION VERSUS TAX CREDIT-** A deduction is an allowable reduction in your otherwise taxable income. The tax benefit of a deduction is determined by your tax bracket. For example, if you're in the 40% bracket, a \$1,000 deductible item will save you \$400 of income taxes. Tax credits are an offset against the income tax otherwise payable. A credit is used dollar for dollar to offset taxes. For example, if your income tax payable is \$1,000 and your total credits equal \$1,000, you will pay nothing.

4. **ALTERNATIVE MINIMUM TAX-A** relatively new tax computation requiring some taxpayers to pay tax when they otherwise may have avoided it. Very large capital gains in any one year could cause you to pay alternative minimum tax. This tax computation should not be overlooked when reviewing the tax considerations of large sales.

Understanding tax definitions is only one part of good tax planning. When you have transactions involving large amounts of money, seek professional assistance.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### EXEMPTIONS

Persons whose property lies with the Appraisal district of Fisher County and who are due an exemption for property taxes and *did not sign an application in 1982* must submit an application for such exemption by April 30 of this year to the Appraisal District of Fisher County office.

Disabled Veterans must file an exemption each year. In order for the application to be valid, all information required must be furnished.

#### AGRICULTURAL VALUES

All persons who wish to have their property taxes based on open space value and *did not sign an application in 1982* must file proper application this year with the Appraisal District of Fisher County office.

All persons who wish to have their property taxes based on the agricultural value must file proper application by April 30 of this year with the Appraisal District of Fisher County.

Persons who signed for valuation of their property under the open space application in 1982 do not need to sign up again. Any person who has purchased land from another person in 1982 must file an application as the new owner for 1983.

#### RENDITIONS

All persons whose property lies in the Appraisal District of Fisher County whether it be real property or personal property shall render such property for taxation between Jan. 1 and April of this year.

Renditions and applications must be made on forms provided by the Appraisal District of Fisher County office. Rendition forms are available in the Appraisal District of Fisher County office which is located at the Fisher County Courthouse, Rooms 113, 114, 115, Roby, Texas.

The Appraisal District will mail the necessary forms upon request.

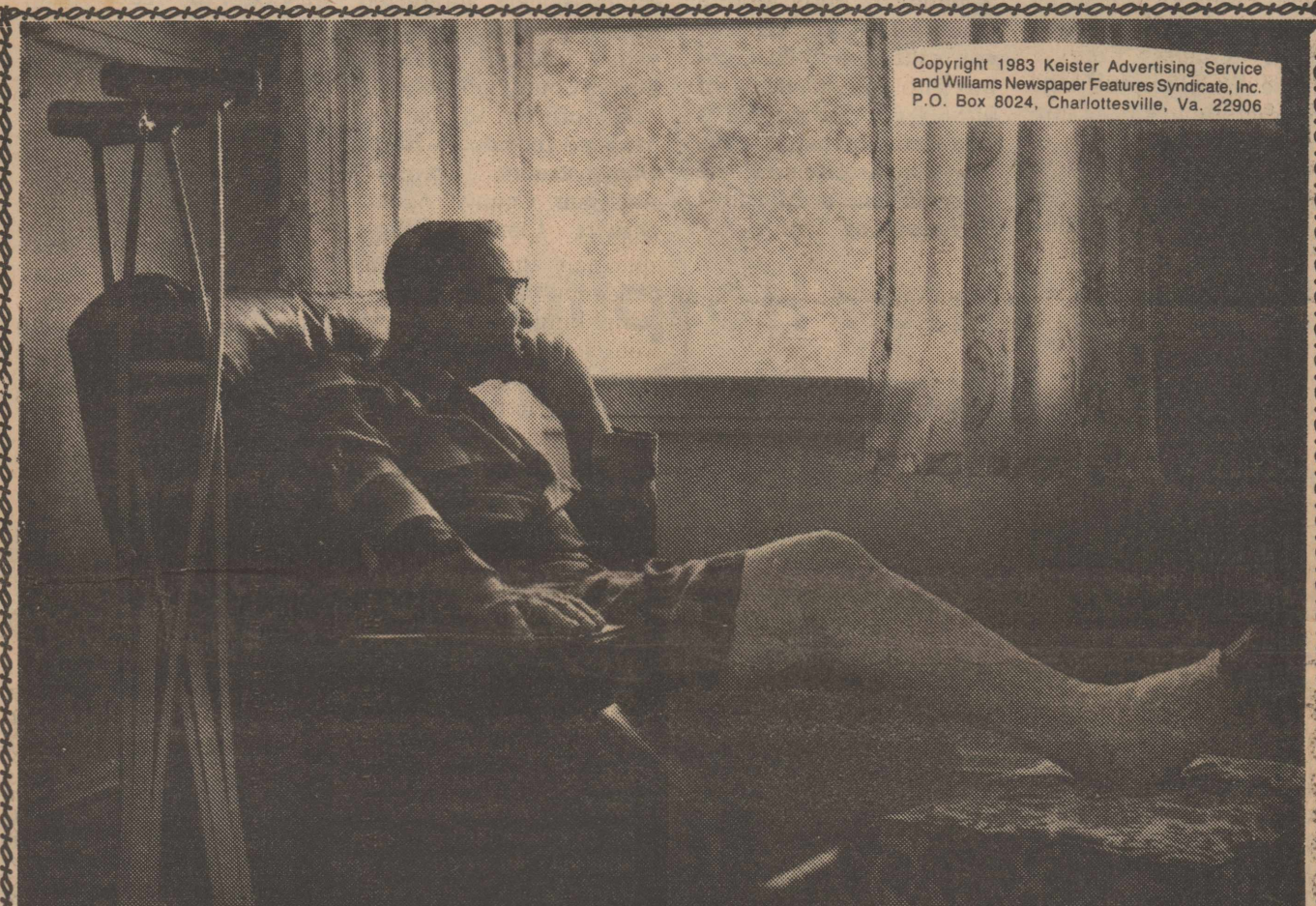

## Barn Talk

Heavy snows, wet soils and cold weather has delayed soil sampling for Rolling Plains producers. Do not let these delays raise your 1983 production cost this year.

Our farm economics is such that producers cannot afford to blindly add fertilizer for the 1983 crop. There is still time and the laboratories have computerized their reporting systems for faster sample turn around.

The best time for sampling is just before the field is dry enough to handle tractor traffic. Later everyone will be in a dead run to get their land prepared, and time will be a limiting factor as to whether farmers run a soil test.

To get a good soil test, a good soil sample is essential. Obtain 10 to 15 samples taken from the surface down to six inches deep. Mix these samples in a plastic bucket. Then take about two-thirds to three-fourths of a pint of the sample soil and mail to the soil testing laboratory for testing.

Be sure to complete a crop information sheet on each soil sample.

This aids the soil chemist to generate a better

fertilizer recommendation for your farm. Information sheets, sample bags for mailing

and additional information on soil testing is available at the County Extension office.

## County Agent Report

The 1982-83 growing season for small grains has been somewhat variable across the state. Rainfall has been abundant in the north central and eastern portions to the state, while moisture has been limiting to the point of reducing stands in areas of the Rolling Plains and High Plains. Recent snows have brought much needed moisture in these areas. The wet, cool, cloudy weather in central and eastern Texas has caused many unusual symptoms to appear in oats and wheat. Many fields are exhibiting yellow and purple leaf coloration. There are several possibilities that could account for these discolorations, including nitrogen and phosphorous deficiencies, barley yellow dwarf mosaic and/or a physiological condition induced by prolonged periods of cool, cloudy, wet weather. Nitrogen deficiencies are becoming apparent. These are caused by heavy grazing

and the removal of large amounts of high protein forage, coupled with weather conditions which are favorable for leaching in light textured soils and denitrification in heavier soil textures.

Phosphorous uptake is related to the diffusion rate of phosphorous between the soil particles and plant roots. As diffusion rates are proportional to soil temperature it is reasonable to assume that some of the purple coloration being observed in small grains is related to reduced phosphorous diffusion rates due to cold soil temperatures.

The physiological condition related to prolonged periods of cool, cloudy, damp weather is somewhat difficult to explain. It probably is induced by nutrient deficiency associated with very low transpiration rates and nearly anaerobic conditions surrounding the root system. Several days of sunny weather should cause these symptoms to disappear.

Most Texas wheat is about ready for sidedress applications of nitrogen. This application should be timed such that nitrogen is readily available as the plant begins to joint or go into reproductive growth. Peak nitrogen demand coincides with booting through grain fill. Rates of nitrogen application are based on projected grain yield. Apply a topdress of approximately one pound of actual nitrogen per bushel of projected grain yield. Excessive rates can cause problems with lodging, while failure to sidedress will limit yield potential. Irrigated wheat on light textured soils may benefit from a split application of N rather than one application.

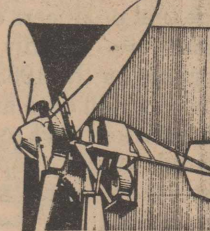

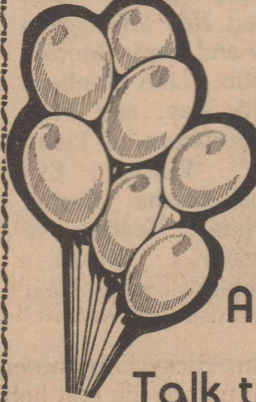

# County Entomologist Reports On Greenbug Control

Frank Hale

Warm weather, wind and sunshine are helping to dry up fields. Conditions are right for a

rapid increase in greenbug numbers but still too cool for a big increase in beneficial insects. Green-

bugs can reproduce rapidly at temperatures between 55 degrees and 95 degrees while natural

enemies such as lady beetles and parasitic wasps reproduce slowly when temperatures are

below 65 degrees.

When checking for greenbugs, make sure you check at least 5 random counts per 20 acres of field area. Greenbugs tend to clump in a field so you might miss them if you only check a few spots.

Areas where greenbugs are aggregated and doing **New Arrival**

The most damage may appear yellowed and often dead plant material can be found. Some yellowing across the area is due to wheat rust. Orange spore forming bodies appear on the rust infected blade so don't confuse this with greenbug damage. A general guide line to use in considering treatment for greenbugs is the appearance of damaged or dead plants and 100-300 greenbugs per linear foot of row for 3-6 inch plants.

Another aphid seen in area fields is the oat bird-cherry aphid. These aphids are usually a dark yellowish-green with a reddish-orange spot on the back end. The greenbug is pale green with a darker green longitudinal stripe

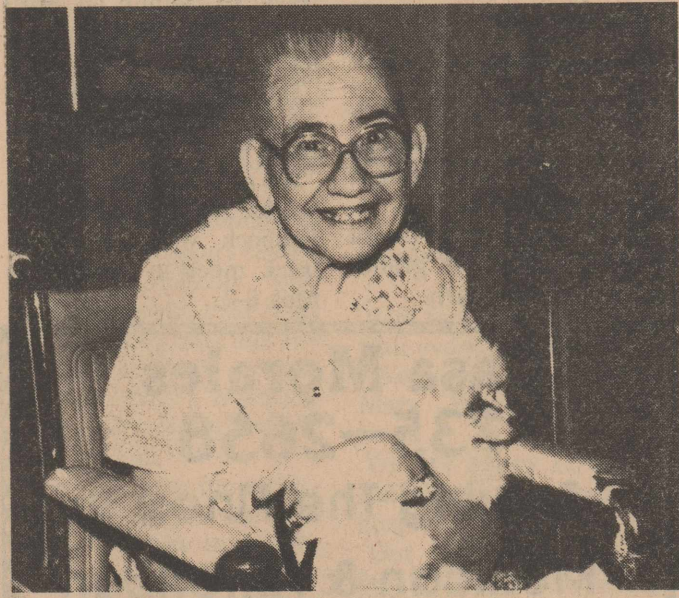
down its back. Don't count oat-bird-cherry aphids when making greenbug counts because unlike the greenbug, these aphids do not inject a toxin when they feed and control for this aphid is seldom required.

While looking at small grains in the 5 county area, I did spot some problem fields. Areas to pay special attention to are 5 miles west of Anson on HiWay 180, three miles east of Aspermont on 380 and south of Aspermont on 610.

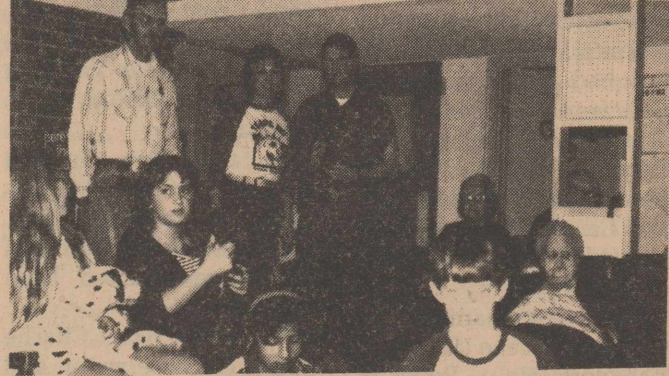
Army cutworms have

been found in light numbers in Stonewall County. The larvae are being found near the edge of fields and haven't caused significant stand loss.

Boll Weevils I collected two leaf litter trash samples. I collected them out of the shinnery adjacent to cotton fields 2 miles south of Peacock in Stonewall County. I found one diapausing boll weevil in the two samples taken. I will be sifting through more trash samples across the areas when the soil dries out some more.

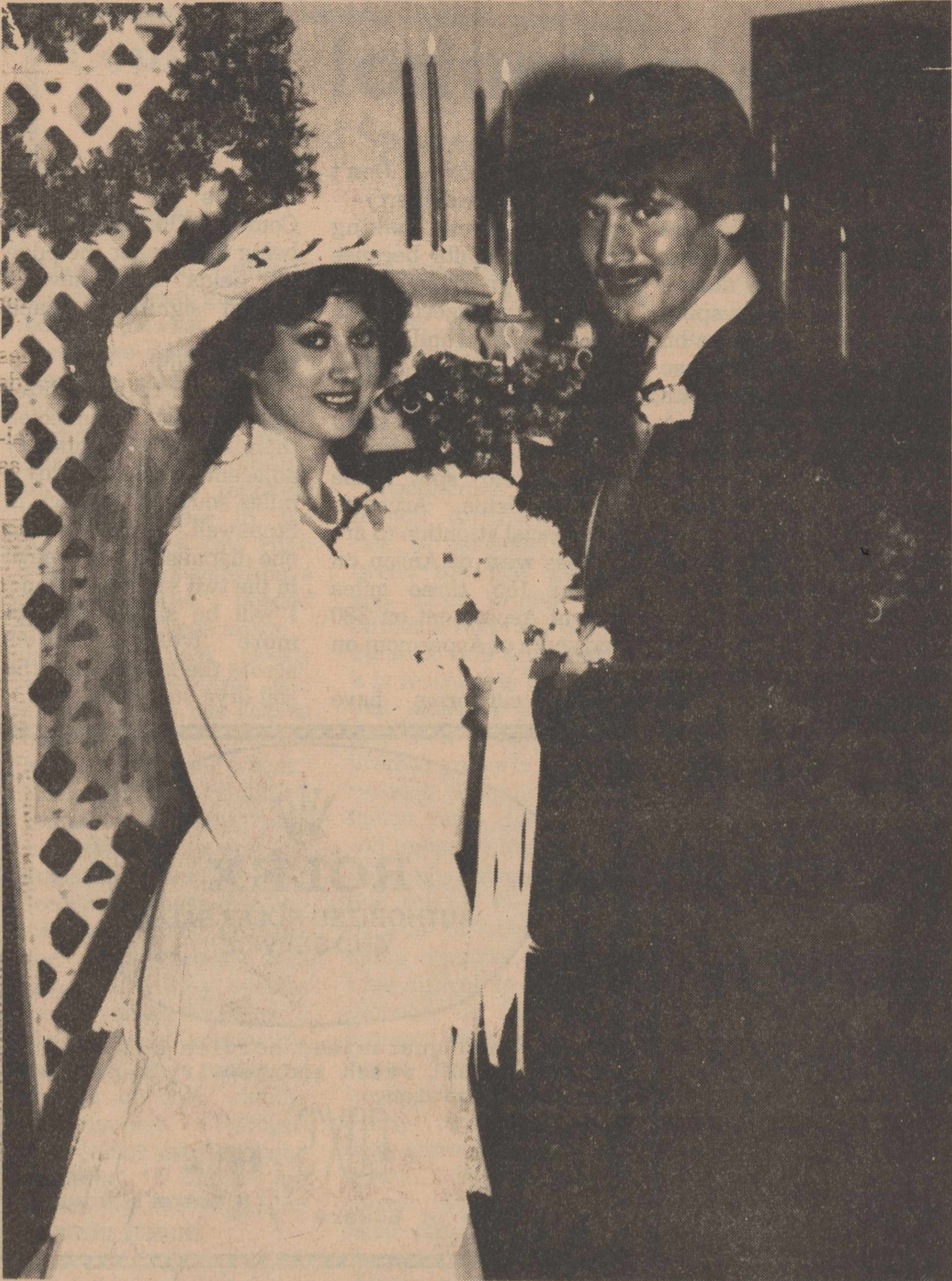

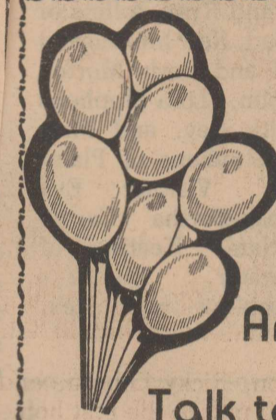

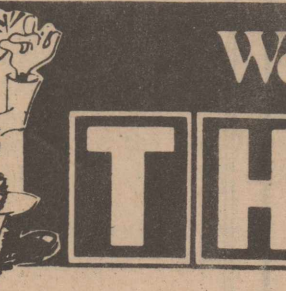
