Thompson Is Named New Chief

In their regular meeting Tuesday afternoon, City Council members accepted the resignation of Chief of Police John Turner, effective June 23, and named Patrolman Dave Thompson as his successor.

Turner and his wife, Ilene, who also have been in charge of the Emergency Medical Service here have accepted employment in Brownwood and will be moving there with their children.

Thompson, who began his duties here last December 6, attended basic police academy at Johnson County Community College in Overland Park, Kansas. He attended courses in both police science and police officer motorcycle school at Regional Police Institute in Kansas City, traffic accident investigation at Northwestern University in Chicago, in addition to Illinois Law for Police at the University of Illinois in Champagne.

The new Chief of Police served six years with the U.S. Army Special Forces, with two and one half years of these in Viet Nam.

Early Count Shows Knox County Loss

Preliminary figures for the 1980 census released to the New office this week by Judge Homer T. Melton for Knox County indicate a 664 loss in population within the county. Melton said he was unprepared for a loss of that magnitude.

"It shows we have a loss of 664 county-wide, and we may have, but I didn't think it would be that much," he said. The county-wide loss was an 11.1 decrease since 1970, dropping from 5,972 to 5,308.

Benjamin showed a loss of 47 persons, giving the county seat a count of 261, while Goree's loss of 46 persons made its population 492.

Knox City gained 40 persons, with the preliminary count now 1,576, while Munday's gain of nine persons totaled 1,735.

Melton explained that these figures are not final and have been tabulated solely for review purposes. The figures were taken from a computer printout dated June 28.

Burnett Is Resigning As Attorney

Bobby D. Burnett is resigning as County Attorney of Knox County effective August 31.

According to Burnett, he gave the decision to resign a great deal of thought and reached the conclusion that he was unable to devote the time required to properly fulfill the duties of the office and still maintain his private law practice and other business interests.

Burnett said that during his eight years in office, he has attempted to serve the people of this county to the best of his ability. He said that his association with his fellow county officials during this time had been pleasant and rewarding without exception.

Burnett was appointed to the office on November 1, 1971. He was elected in 1975 and again this year, was elected as the Democratic nominee to appear on the ballot for the General Election in November, 1980. He explained that the County Democratic Executive Committee will now choose a candidate to appear on the ballot for the General Election.

Burnett and his wife, Judy, have been residents of Munday since March, 1973. They are the parents of two daughters, Christine, 7, and Laura, 4.

He plans to continue to maintain his law office in Munday as well as his residency he said.

Open Horse Show Slated Here July 19

Knox City and area residents once again will enjoy having beautiful show horses and their owners come to town when the Brazos Valley Recreation Association hosts its Second Annual All-Breed Open Horse Show on Saturday, July 19. Activities start at 9:00 a.m. at the arena on Highway 6, featuring many different types of events.

Show horses will be exhibited at halter in the morning, concluding with an open reining class. During the noon break, a Stallion Parade is scheduled, featuring area stallions of various breeds.

The afternoon program includes trail, western pleasure, and horsemanship, barrel racing, pole bending, and flag races. The popular ride-a-buck class, in which exhibitors try to keep a dollar bill beneath them on slippery bare-backed horses, will be the final event of the day.

A new addition to this year's show is an English pleasure class, tentatively scheduled to take place just before the noon break. Many area residents have not had the pleasure of seeing this more formal type of show horse riding and are invited to come to the show and enjoy the day's activities, officials said.

Judging this year's Open Horse Show is Cathy Wheeler of Abilene. Mrs. Wheeler trains and exhibits Quarter Horses, and coaches the Abilene 4-H Judging Team. She was a member of the 1974 4-H Judging Team which won the State, Southern Regional title and participated in the National level judging competition. She was also a member of the 1975 Texas A&M University Intercollegiate Judging Team, and has judged several area horse shows.

Of special interest to spectators at this year's show will be the Grand and Reserve Halter Championships; the beautiful Color Breeds halter

class, which will feature Paint, Palomino, Pinto, Buckskin and Appaloosa horses and Ponies of the Americas; the appealing Walk-Trot class for exhibitors aged five and under; and the Trail Horse class, a new addition to this year's show, in which exhibitors and their mounts negotiate a series of obstacles representing those found on

the trail. The concession stand on the show grounds will feature fresh barbecued brisket, cooked by Ed Daniels, which was enjoyed by many at the recent BVRA Junior Rodeo.

Gillespie Revival Set July 13 - 20

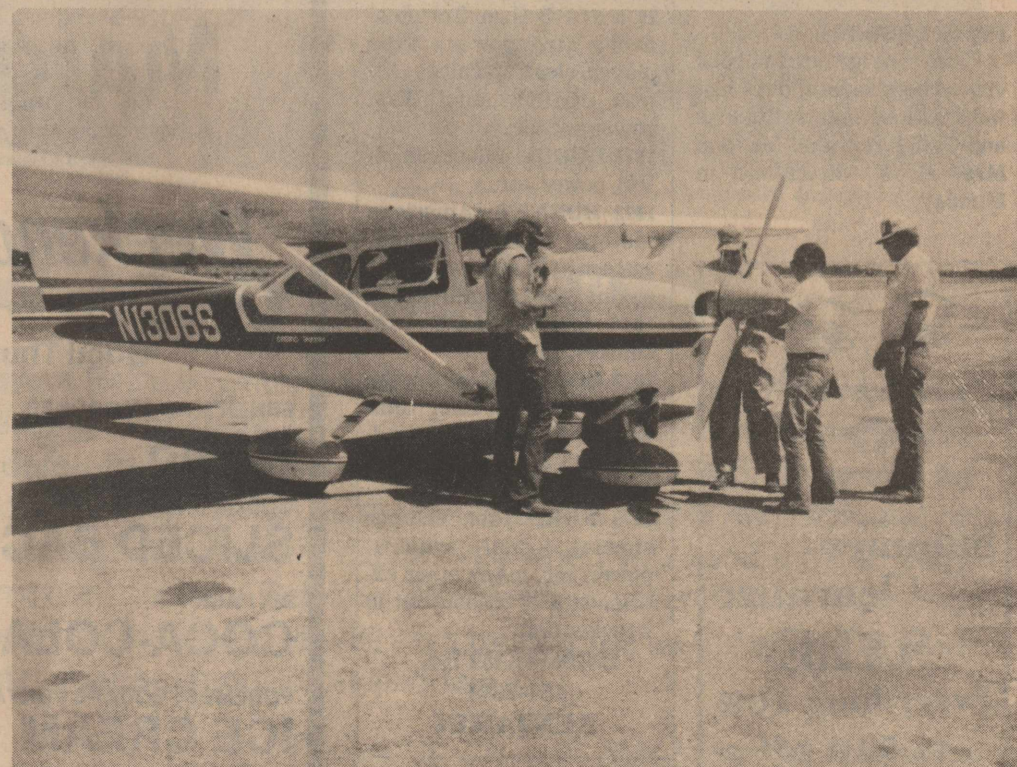
The Gillespie Baptist Church has scheduled a revival to begin Sunday, July 13, and continue through July 20.
