Hounds Travel To Hawley

# Season Opener Is Set Friday

Knox City's Greyhounds will kickoff their season Friday night when they travel to Hawley to take on the Bearcats on their home field at eight o'clock.

The Hounds have been chosen first in the district by the Wichita Falls Times and Record News polls and were second in district picks by the Abilene Reporter-News. Several schoolboy polls have named the Hounds in Top Ten

positions with the Harris Poll selecting them tenth in Class A.

Fifteen lettermen will be returning to this year's Greyhound squad with seven starters returning. Strong points for the Hounds are size and attitude with depth and speed being their weak points.

A four way battle is expected by Coach Rogers for the district 4-A title with Rule,

Aspermont, Jayton and Knox City.

In addition to experience, Knox City has a wealth of big linemen, plus a healthy portion of veterans manning the so-called skill positions.

Three all-district performers is running back Glenn Hedgecoke, tackle Dan Godesy, and wide receiver Rance Hacker all will be attempting to repeat their previous performances.

Sergio Marin returns as the other tackle while lettermen Paul Taylor and Todd Lewis move in at guard and center, respectively. The ends will be letterman Kevin Leach and transfer Carlos Torres.

Dwayne Watkins and Tyke Meinzer will battle for the quarterback spot, a position in which Meinzer lettered last year. Ricky Gutierrez, a starter last year, will join Hedgecoke in the backfield.

Taylor, Lewis, Daniel and Marin will play in the defensive line while James Stafford and Jeff Reece will join Hedgecoke and Gutierrez as linebackers. Leach, Hacker and Steve Lynn will constitute the backfield.

## Benjamin On National TV

The town of Benjamin received national recognition on NBC's Today program last week, the second time in the past few months for such an honor.

Tom Moorhouse, a 35-year-old cowboy who was born and reared on the Moorhouse Ranch west of Benjamin, won best all-around cowboy in competition in the first-ever Texas Ranch Roundup held in Wichita Falls recently, and the story was related by Today personality Jane Pauley.

Twelve of the biggest ranches of Texas competed in the first annual Budweiser Texas Ranch Roundup benefiting the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder; the North Texas Rehabilitation Center in Wichita Falls; and the West Texas Boys Ranch, also at San Angelo.

The main purpose of the event was to see which ranch is good enough to boast as the best, and the best turned out to be the Lewis Ranches from Clarendon with 62 accumulated points in the two-day competition. Second place went to the Renderbrook-Spade Ranch of Colorado City, with 56 points. The Moorhouse Ranch was in the running for the title until the final two events and placed fourth with a total of 49 points.

Also, Sue Moorhouse placed in the ranch queen contest behind Eugenie Von Gontard of the Pitchfork Ranch.

The chili-cooking team, headed by Mrs. Wanda Warner placed first in the Chili Cook-Off and will be heading to the national cook-off in California next year.

Moorhouse received a handmade saddle from Olsen-Stelzer for his individual performance. He said the only time he had ever left the ranch was when he went to get a degree from Sul Ross University and to work a couple of summers on the 6666 Ranch.

The other time Benjamin was mentioned on nationwide TV was during the recent Country Music Awards when Ernest Tubb was named to the Hall of Fame and the emcee told of his boyhood days in Benjamin, Texas.

# Santa Fe Railway To Establish New Office

Santa Fe Railway plans to establish a regional freight office at Sweetwater, designed to improve service to customers and create a more efficient operation, J.R. Fitzgerald, general manager, Amarillo, has announced.

The plan contemplates absorbing the agencies at Maryneal, Hamlin, Rule, Chillicothe and Crowell and consolidating this work at the regional office.

Meetings were held by Santa Fe officials in Chillicothe and Rule on Tuesday, August 18, and in Sweetwater on Wednesday, August 19, to explain the new operation to shippers and city officials from the affected communities and answer questions about the plan.

"These small agencies have a limited staff and are open but eight hours a day," B.K. Perry, assistant general manager, Amarillo, said at the meetings. "They are often unable to provide quick response to requests about rates, car supply or car location. By having direct access to our computer, the new regional freight office will be able to respond to such questions much more quickly. The Sweetwater freight office will be open an expanded number of hours each day, giving our customers easier access by dialing a toll-free number."

"It is understandable there may be initial reaction in a community when it first learns the local agent will no longer be physically located there," Perry said, "however, we believe we are going to serve them better and more efficiently under the new system. Technology available to us today makes this a logical, inevitable improvement," he concluded.

Fitzgerald indicated additional offices will be established across Texas. He stated railroad officials will meet with shippers and community leaders in the affected areas to explain how the system works.

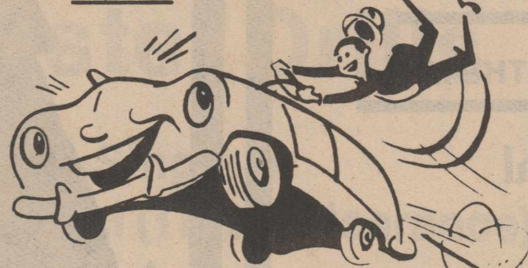

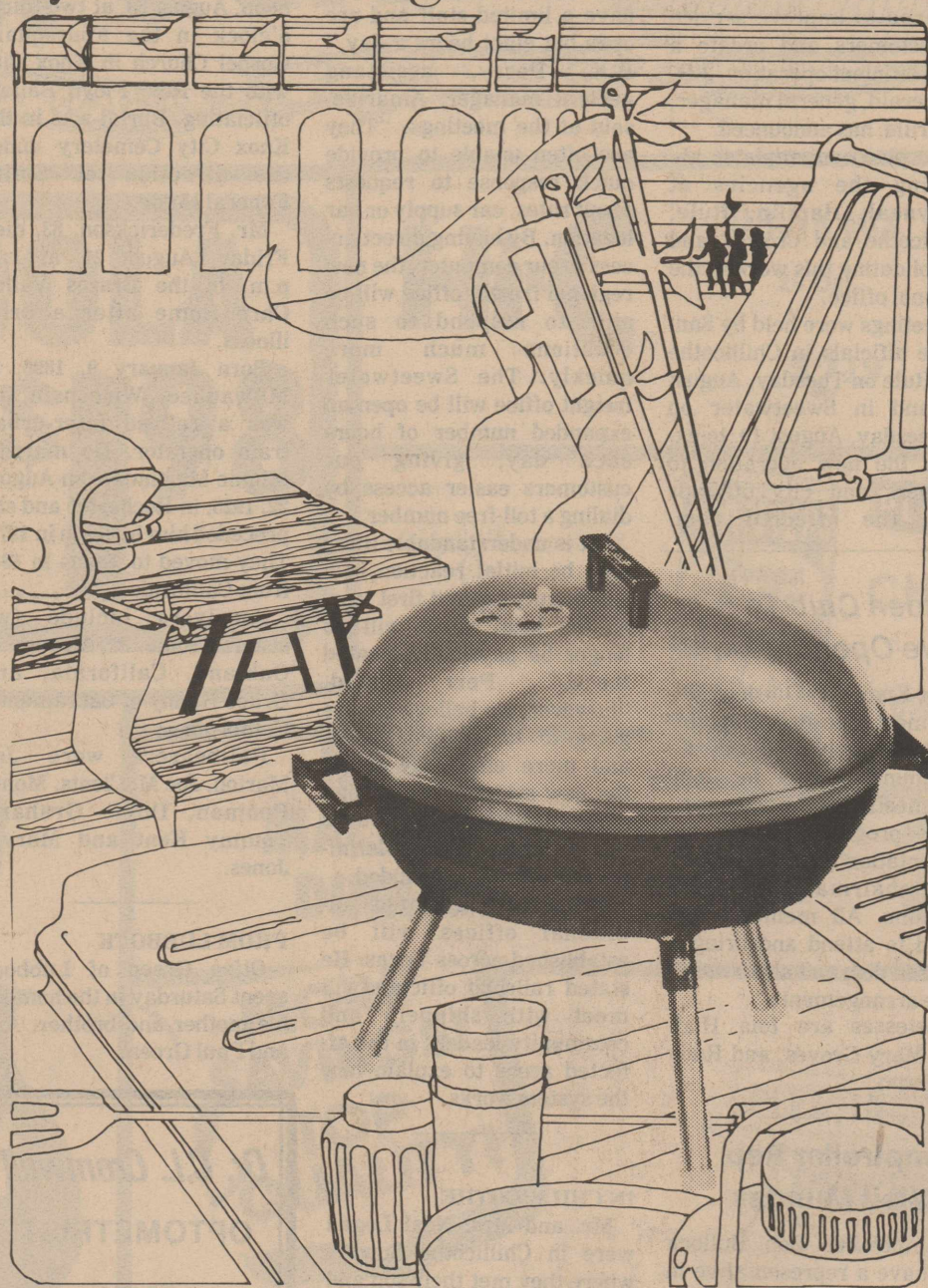

The amount due can be computed on Form 1120-W, a worksheet for computing corporation estimated tax. The form should not be filed with the IRS, but should be kept in the corporation's records.

When the payments are deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, they must be accompanied by the Federal Tax Deposit Form 503, the IRS adds.

Now that those fresh-from-the-garden vegetables are so plentiful, it's time to try an exciting new way to serve them. Here's an easy idea to dress up fresh broccoli or cauliflower. So quick, it takes only minutes to put together. And so delicious, it's likely to have non-vegetable lovers asking for seconds.

**CREAMY BROCCOLI BAKE**

1 1/2 pounds fresh broccoli spears or 1 medium head cauliflower (about 1 1/2 pounds), separated into flowerets\*  
1 can (10 3/4 ounces) condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1/4 cup milk  
1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese  
1 cup Bisquick baking mix  
1/4 cup firm margarine or butter

Heat 1 inch salted water (1/2 teaspoon salt to 1 cup water) to boiling. Add broccoli. Cover and heat to boiling. Cook until stems are almost tender, 10 to 12 minutes; drain. Place broccoli in ungreased 1 1/2-quart round casserole.

Heat oven to 400°. Beat soup and milk with hand beater until smooth; pour over broccoli. Sprinkle with cheese. Mix baking mix and margarine until crumbly; sprinkle over cheese. Bake until crumbs are light brown, about 20 minutes. 6 to 8 servings.

\*2 packages (10 ounces each) frozen broccoli spears or cauliflower, cooked and drained, can be substituted for the fresh broccoli or cauliflower.

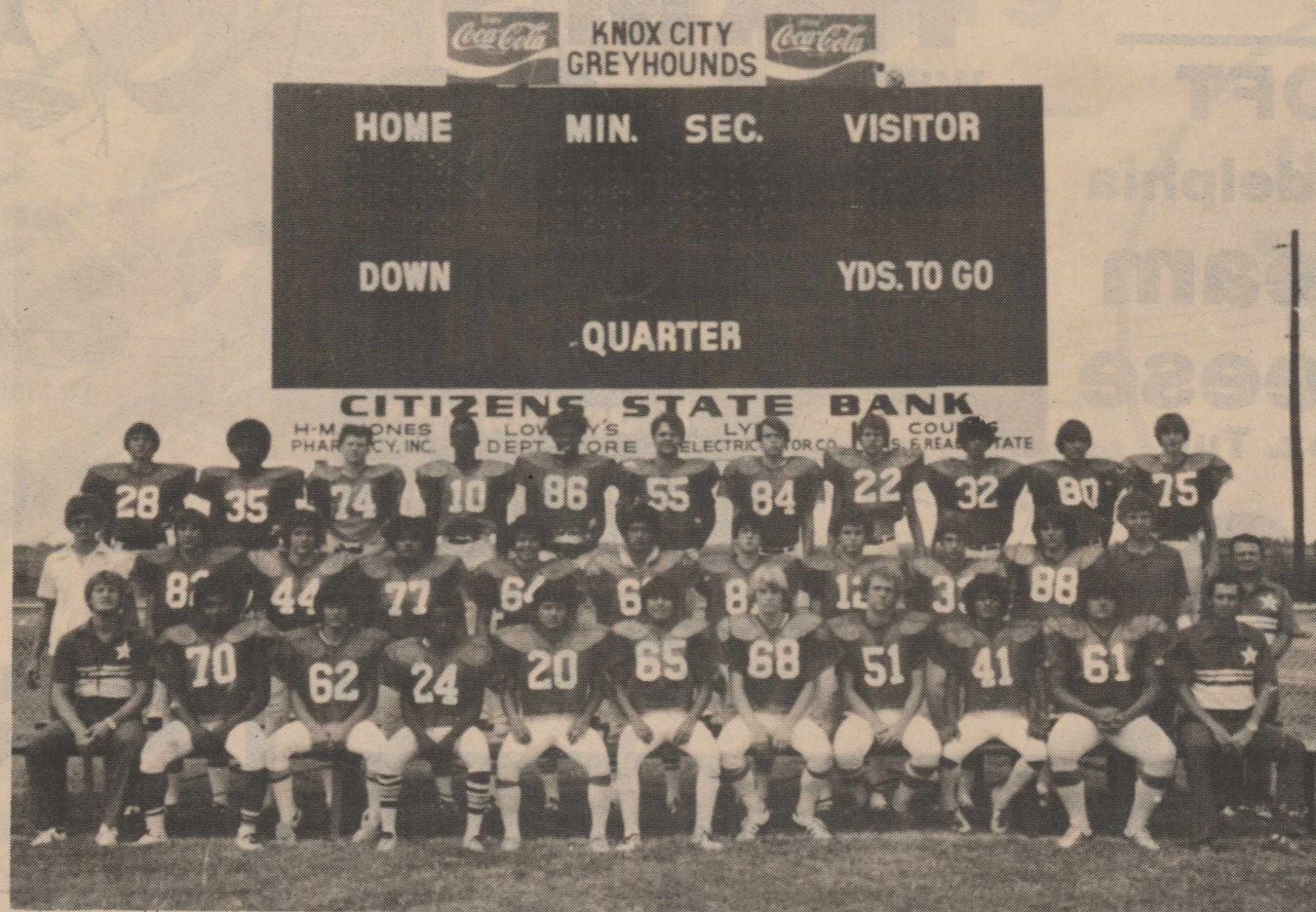

Acne is a common skin condition that can be mild or serious. In its most severe form, acne can result in widespread inflamed lesions, called pustules, that may leave pitted scars if untreated. Most cases are characterized by white heads, blackheads, enlarged pores and a generalized oiliness, occurring on the face, chest, back, shoulders and neck.

Many adolescents develop acne during puberty, when their sex hormones increase and their oil glands enlarge. Even adults up to the age of 40 can be plagued with severe forms of acne.

New medical treatments available today are very effective for many acne patients. These include direct application on the skin of retinoic acid, benzoyl peroxide and topical antibiotics, such as erythromycin and clindamycin, to reduce inflammation and bacteria. Synthetic cortisone-like drugs to reduce inflammation or short treatment periods of ultraviolet light with sunlamps may also be recommended.

One of the most promising drugs for the future treatment of mild to very severe acne is a synthetic version of Vitamin A called an oral retinoid. In recent



studies, four months of oral retinoid therapy completely cleared acne in 95 percent of the individuals who participated. The others in the study achieved dramatic improvement. Pending approval from the Food & Drug Administration, oral retinoids should be available to the public with a physician's prescription within the next few years.

In addition to providing specialized treatment for each patient, a dermatologist can suggest names of nonprescription lotions, creams and medicated cosmetics that may be helpful in drying the skin and minimizing blemishes. Each acne patient's treatment plan is designed to prevent future scarring. A pamphlet entitled "Something Can Be Done About Acne" dispels some of the myths about acne and presents additional information on acne treatment. 

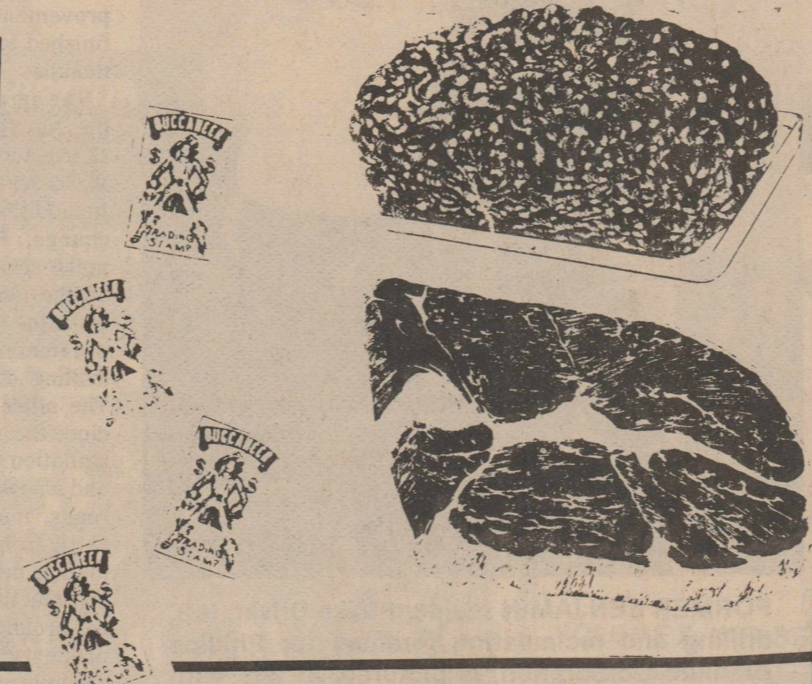

## Increase In Motor Deaths During 1980

"Over half of the 4,424 persons killed on Texas streets and highways in 1980 were under the age of 29," Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said.

"This is an increase of 4.6% or 95 more deaths than the previous year," Bell said. We are asking you, the Texas motorist, to assist in preventing traffic accidents. Many young people are injured each year due to traffic problems which frequently occur following football games. The extremely congested condition caused by the numerous automobiles makes traffic move slowly after any athletic event.

Major Bell said, "Traffic after sports events will be heavy. Please use an extra bit of patience and caution so that you will return home safely. When you leave the stadium, and get into your automobile, remember to drive slowly and carefully."

## Ex-Benjamin Man Involved In Trade

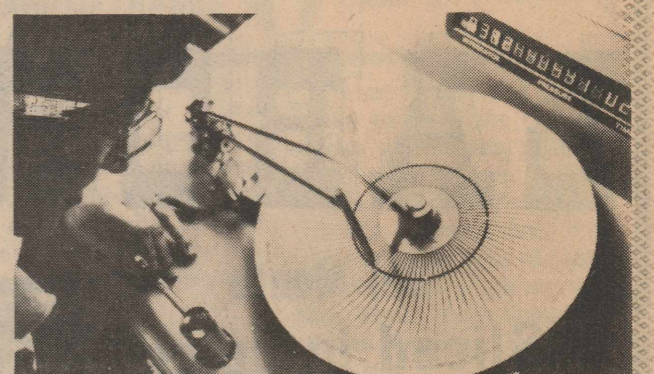
The final terms of the largest land trade agreement in the history of the Eastern Navajo Nation are close to being met. The agreement,

made between the Navajo Nation and Phillips Petroleum Company, was signed in April, 1980. Mike Driver, drilling and

reclamation foreman for Phillips Uranium Corporation, is the son of Mickey Driver of Benjamin where he graduated from high school in 1969. Mike, a 1973 graduate of Texas Tech, who is in charge of the improvement activities, said he anticipates the final steps in the improvement project will be finished within the next few months.

The agreement consisted of the Navajo Nation's trading 12,480 acres of its land for 16,000 acres of Phillips' land. In addition to the land exchange, Phillips agreed to make several improvements on the land it traded to the Navajos. The first improvement made was the drilling of a 2696 foot well. The other improvements include the construction and installation of two windmills and a new corral, blading the roads, moving the Navajos' cattle from their former land to their new location, and the construction of a 25 mile fence around the Nose Rock property. "Approximately one mile of the fence has been completed. This fence will be the boundary that separates the Navajos' agricultural activities from PUC's mining activities at the Nose Rock property," Driver said.

## Oil Industry On The Charts



This may look like a disc jockey playing one of the latest hit records on the radio, but actually, this machine is being used by a worker of Southern Flow Cos., a division of W.R. Grace & Co., to process a circular gas chart. The chart is a written record which shows the amount of gas that has flowed past a meter. The charts are sent to Southern Flow by field producers or pipeline compa-

nies where the basic data are verified and the chart is checked for erroneous readings. The operator then retraces the two original lines to produce a numerical value which can be used to calculate the volume of gas produced. This helps producers and buyers keep track of the gas that changes owners many times from the field to its eventual customer.

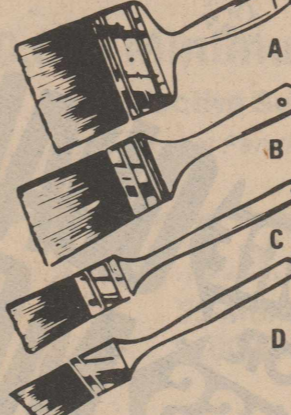
