



To Dress Up Garden Vegetables

Now that those fresh-from-the-garden vegetables are so plentiful, it's time to try an exciting new way to serve them. Here's an easy idea to dress up fresh broccoli or cauliflower. So quick, it takes only minutes to put together. And so delicious, it's likely to have non-vegetable lovers asking for seconds

CREAMY BROCCOLI BAKE

1 1/2 pounds fresh broccoli 1/4 cup milk 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar spears or 1 medium head cauliflower (about 1 1/2 cheese 1 cup Bisquick baking mix pounds), separated into

flowerets* 1/4 cup firm margarine or 1 can (10 3/4 ounces) conbutter densed cream of mushroom soup

Heat 1 inch salted water (1/2 teaspoon salt to 1 cup water) to boiling. Add broccoli. Cover and heat to boiling. Cook until stems are almost tender, 10 to 12 minutes; drain. Place broccoli in ungreased 1 1/2-quart round

Heat oven to 400°. Beat soup and milk with hand beater until smooth; pour over broccoli. Sprinkle with cheese. Mix baking mix and margarine until crumbly; sprinkle over cheese. Bake until crumbs are light brown, about 20 minutes. 6 to 8 servings.

*2 packages (10 ounces each) frozen broccoli spears or cauliflower, cooked and drained, can be substituted for the fresh broccoli or cauliflower.

High Altitude Directions (3500 to 6500 feet): Prepare as directed except - do not add salt to water. Cook until stems are almost tender, broccoli about 20 minutes, cauliflower about 12 minutes.


Increase In **Motor Deaths** During 1980




