Artist of the Month at the Citizens State Bank is Knox City resident Betty Smith.

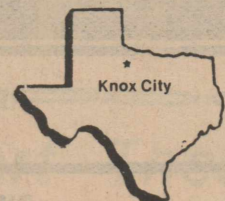

The Kahlers arrived at the Tackitt home last Monday with their Pinto-Arabian stallion, Tackitts Bo Jangles, and accompanied Marti to Tulsa. Tackitts Bo Jangles is a Champion two-year-old stallion foaled on the Tackitt farm, one mile north of Knox City, and sold to the Kahlers last year. panion mare also won Oklahoma State Fair Top Six Champion Tobiano Pinto honors, and Oklahoma State Fair Top Six Pinto Costume.

Another Tackitt mare, Shad-dows Win-Song, won International Maturity Top Six Champion Pinto Senior English Pleasure honors, and was Tulsa State Fair Champion Pleasure-Saddle Type Pinto English Pleasure Horse, Top Six Champion Pleasure - Saddle Type Western Pleasure Horse, and Top Six Champion Pleasure-

Saddle Type Pinto Mare. She also won the Oklahoma State Fair English Pleasure, and was Oklahoma State Fair Top Six in Pinto Senior Western Pleasure. This fine mare was previously named PtHA Champion with a Register of Merit in English Pleasure by the Pinto Horse Association of America, and is in foal to the Tackitts' Purebred Arabian stallion, Lord Barbizon.

"We're exhausted but thrilled," commented Marti, "and proud to call Knox City 'home' for these three new International Champions."

WHEN TO SEE A DOCTOR IF WOUNDED

It is most important to know when to see a physician for first aid.

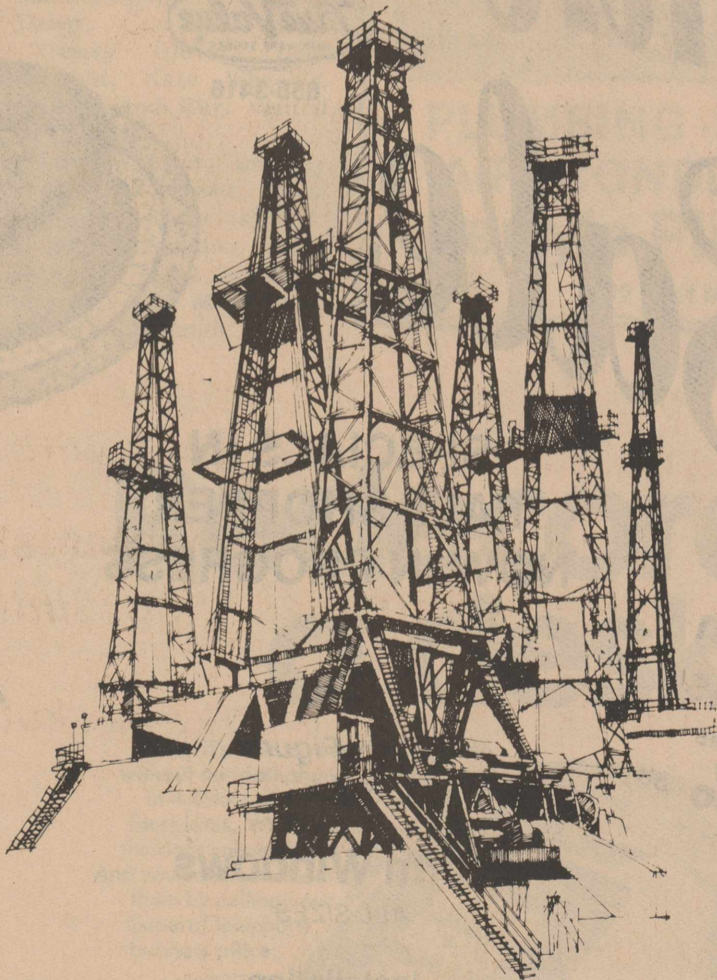
If there is real spurting bleeding, this is an emergency. If slow bleeding continues beyond four to ten minutes, medical attention is needed. If there is foreign material in the wound which does not clean out easily; if it is a deep puncture wound or is long or wide so that stitches may be required, a physician is needed.

Also, if the wound has been in contact with soil or manure, or if signs of infection such as pain, redness, or swelling develop, don't wait. Expert attention quickly will prevent hours of pain and possible infection.

Minutes Of Knox County Hospital District's Board Of Directors

SEPTEMBER 24, 1981

Minutes for the meetings of August 20 and August 24 were read and approved.

There was a discussion of audit proposals for the fiscal year end September 30, 1981, submitted by Russell Alt-miller of Olney and Mason, Nickels and Warner of Lubbock. Stanton Brown moved for re-appointment of the Medical Staff (see attached). Vernal Zeissel seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

Stanton Brown made a motion to adopt the revised Medical Staff By-Laws (see attached). Bernard Brown seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

The proposed budget for the fiscal year end September 30, 1982, was reviewed by the Board. A budget hearing date of October 12 was set for the administrators office at 9:00 a.m. on a motion by Vernal Zeissel and seconded by Gaylon Hord. The motion

carried unanimously.

The Board unanimously adopted a bank about signature resolution (see attached) on a motion by Terry Keener and seconded by Stanton Brown.

The Board reviewed cash position, accounts payable, and other financial information. Bernard Brown

motioned to pay the accounts payable and approve the cash position statement. Vernal Zeissel seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

The meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

Sales Tax Exempt On Some Items

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded Texans that sales tax is no longer due on any therapeutic device bought or rented by a person when it's prescribed by a doctor.

"This exemption doesn't cover hot tubs," Bullock warned.

The change, authorized by the Legislature last spring,

affects the buying or renting of oxygen equipment, devices which help reduce or eliminate pain and all therapeutic items obtained under a physician's prescription.

Bullock said the Legislature also broadened the motor vehicle tax exemption to include vehicles modified for orthopedically-handicapped persons.

The exemption now applies to modified vehicles whose primary use is to transport an orthopedically-handicapped person.
