## Absentee Voting Is Underway

Absentee voting for the upcoming Democratic Primary began Monday and will continue through April 26, according to Knox County and District Clerk Gloria L. West, and voters can cast their absentee ballots in the clerk's office during this time.

Mrs. West explained that anyone who is sick and unable to go to the polls should write in and request a ballot. A doctor's certificate is no longer required, she said. Mail-ins can be received until the day of the election on Saturday, May 1.

County offices that are contested include the Knox County Sheriff with candidates Gene Nix and Benny Archer; the Commissioner's race in Precinct Two with incumbent Bobby Roberson, Fred Carver, Sammy Pierce, and Wayne Sutton; and in the Justice of the Peace, Precinct Two races are Janice D. Tolson, Pate Meinzer, and Imagean Young.

Of special importance also to voters in this area is the race for State Representative, District 78, with candidates Walter Grubbs and Steven A. Carriker. District 78 is the newly formed legislative district replacing the 101st served by State Representative W.S. (Bill) Hearty for many years. Hearty has declined to run.

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## FIRE DEPT. NEWS

By Department Members

This article will conclude the series about the rolling stock in the fire department. Next week, the article will be about the Key Rate, if we can get it put together, fingers crossed and rabbits foot, we're gonna try. The relationship between the trucks and Key Rate Credit are directly related.

The third and final truck for these articles is somewhat unique.

With the rapid deterioration of the Chevrolet and the prospects of not getting it replaced for several more years in 1977, the department set out to acquire some type of truck to relieve the duty of the Chevrolet, which was doing double duty for in-town fires and well as rural calls.

In conjunction with the City Government and the Federal Revenue Sharing money given to the city by the county, the department set out to build a rural truck.

After the necessary papers were processed, two members of the department went to Lubbock and became the proud owners of a slightly used 1948 GMC military surplus troop carrier. Their pride was short lived; however, on the way home the engine blew up. Never the less, fortitude and desire made up the difference. The truck was pulled home and the engine replaced. Only later did we learn that the engine was under warranty for 90 days from purchase date. To late for that, it had a new one and plans were at full steam ahead.

As time permitted, A.T. Holcomb worked and reworked the truck to the desired apparatus the department needed. With the addition of two 750 gallon, converted, propane tanks, the Rural Tanker was starting to look like a usable piece of equipment. A Briggs-Stratton powered pump, that previously occupied a place on the Chevrolet was added. The truck now complete, was ready for service.

In the next few years, it was noticed that a large volume of water was needed on several rural structure fires. So with this in mind, Kenneth Lawson with help

from others, set out to rework the water piping. When it was completed, the "GI" would be able to hook up to the other booster trucks for the much needed water contained in the 1400 gallon reserve. This has proven very helpful on several occasions. We are constantly working and reworking to improve the function of this truck. Some, lovingly refer to it as our pride and joy, while others call it names not suited for print in this publication. Whatever you care to call it, it does the job and quite well. Being six wheel drive with an automatic transmission, you are limited by your imagination to the places it will go. Although we wouldn't do it, it is capable of fording water over the cab, due to the closed carburation and electrical systems.

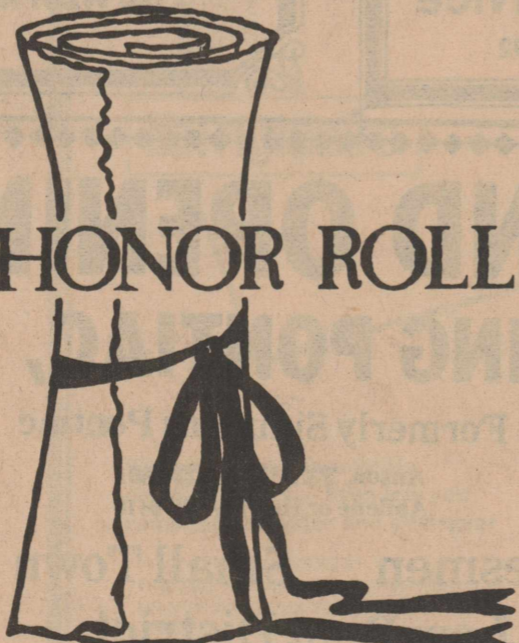
Parts for this are limited to the on hand supply of one other truck, bought by the department for the parts alone. With the proper care this truck will be good for many more years of rural fire service.

Our cost for the GI was \$1,000.00, and the price of the propane tanks and the pump cannot be remembered. The parts truck cost the department \$150.00. So remember when you see it, that if you laugh, it didn't cost all that much to build. As far as replacement goes, we would rather not talk about it.

Well, now you know what we have to work with! All things considered, we think we do pretty good.

We hope to see you at the open house. The kids can play on any or all the trucks while you and the neighbors discuss them over stale cake and day old coffee. (Surely it won't be!)

## Want to Go Fishing?

The local Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District is currently sponsoring a fishpond stocking program. Orders are now being taken at the Knox City SCS office.

Fish will be delivered in early May to a central delivery point in Knox County where you can pick up your order and transport it to your ponds in a short period of time. The fish are guaranteed live delivery to pond if one transports them to his pond within two hours from the time he receives them. The fish are also guaranteed to be healthy and free of parasites and disease.

The District is sponsoring this program because the Texas Parks and Wildlife no longer provides fish for stocking to landowners in Texas. The District can obtain and provide the fish for readers at considerable savings from what it would cost them to travel and purchase them from a commercial fishery. In addition to the low discount prices available, large orders of 1,000 fish or more will get an additional five cents per fish discount.

Readers should get their orders in now before the deadline. For more information, they can contact the Knox City Soil Conservation Service office.

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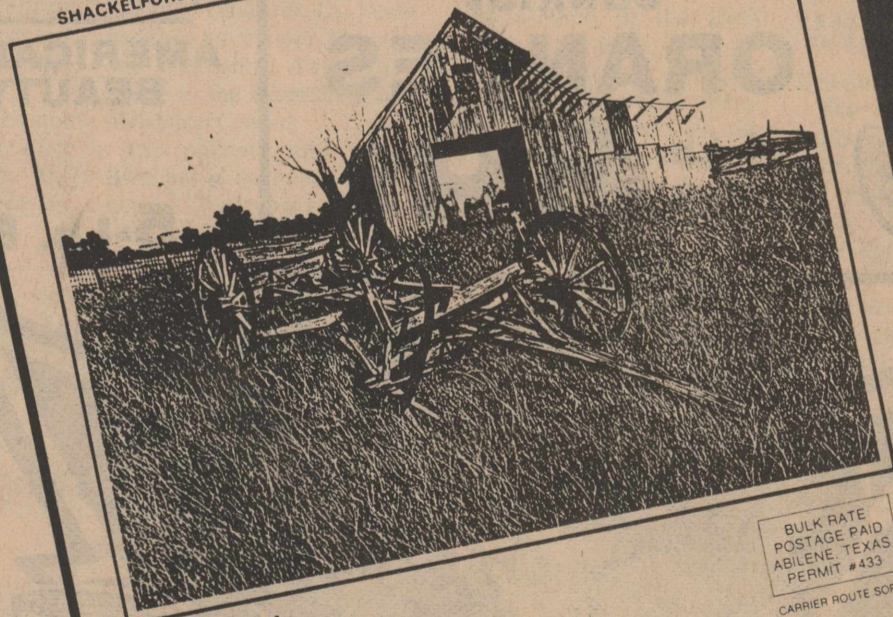
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
