HASKELL-Haskell will hold its third annual Christmas Parade Saturday, December 1, at 6:00 p.m.

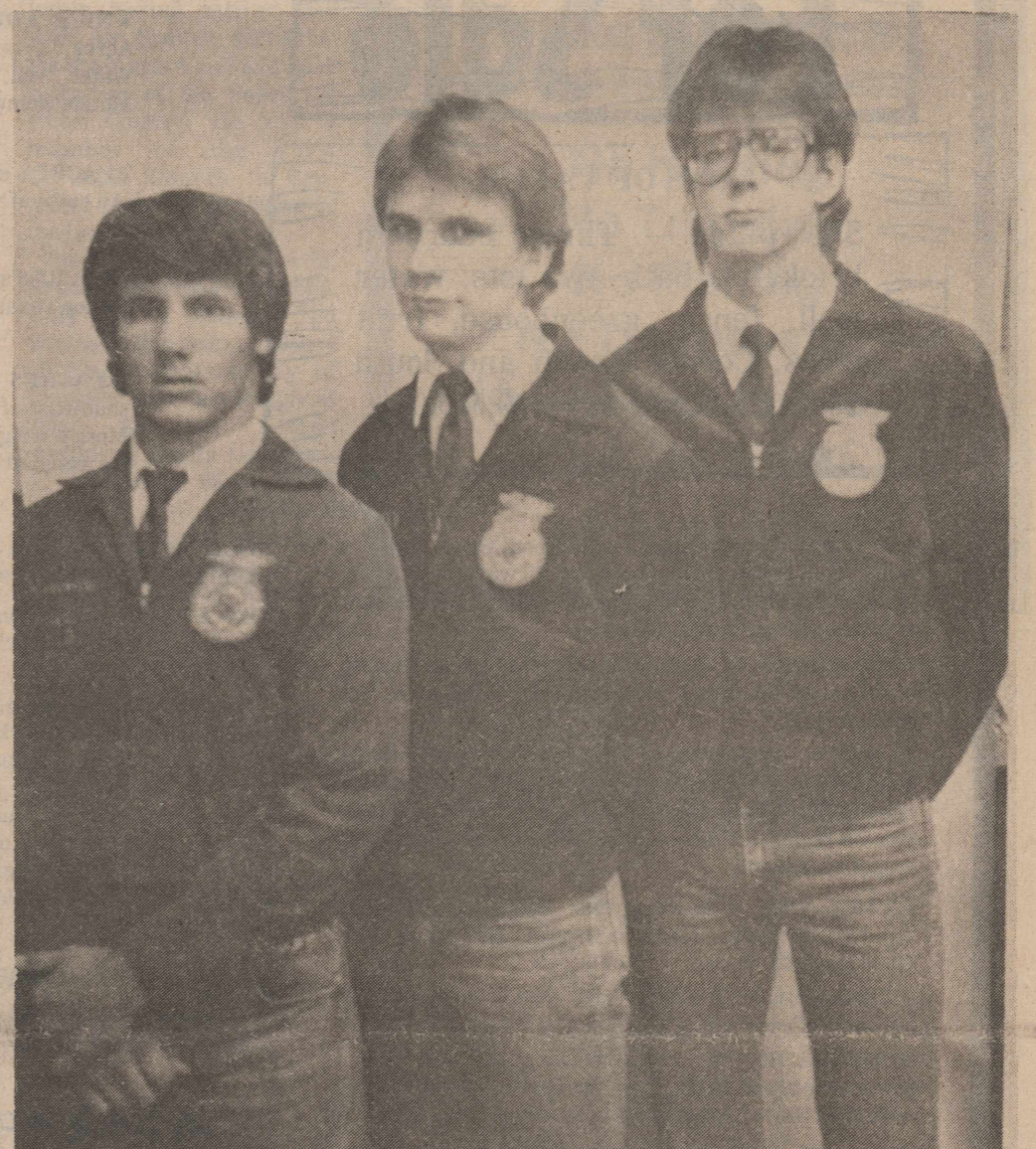
