WASHINGTON (AP) Lyn Nofziger, President Reagan's former political director, was found guilty today of charges he illegally lobbied the executive branch for private clients.

Nofziger, whose political association with the president dates back to Reagan's days as governor of California, was found guilty by a U.S. District Court jury that deliberated less than eight

The jury convicted Nofziger on three of four felony charges that he had illegally lobbied one-time colleagues on behalf of Wedtech Corp., a maritime engineers union and manufacturer of the Air Force's A-10 anti-tank

The jury acquitted Nofziger of a single charge that he had illegally lobbied a White House official on behalf of Wedtech. The jury also cleared Nofziger's partner, Mark A. Bragg, of a felony charge of aiding and abetting that alleged contact, a May 28, 1982, letter to deputy presidential counselor James E.

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Officer dies from accident injuries

ODESSA, Texas (AP) - Police officers from across the state, their badges masked in black tape, gathered for the funeral of a 25-year-old police officer who died six months after he was injured in a motorcycle accident.

About 600 people attended the funeral of Scott Smith Tuesday at Temple Baptist Church.

"I would truly say that we have lost a dear friend - one that has touched all of our lives," said the Rev. George B. Golden, chaplain of the Odessa Police Department.

'Not only did Scott live to be a policeman, but he died being one," Golden said.

Smith had been hospitalized since the off-duty accident and died Saturday. His widow, Angie, is seven months pregnant, and he

is also survived by a daughter, Krystal, 21/2.

Golden said he "never heard Scott say one word out of order. He was one of the most positive men I've ever met. He loved being a policeman and his main

goal was to help his fellow man."

Smith joined the department as a cadet in May 1984. He became an officer in August 1985 and transferred to the Traffic and Patrol Division as a motorcycle officer Jan. 1, 1987.

He was severely injured Aug. 3 when his police motorcycle collided with a car driven by a 65year-old Odessa woman.



Since North's three-club bid did show strength while denying any heart length. South simply took advantage of his probable diamond stopper to bid the no-trump

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

Citrus pondered

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Department of Agriculture, accusing the federal government of bowing to pressure from Florida growers in lifting its ban on citrus shipments, is considering a state quarantine blocking Florida citrus from entering the

The quarantine, designed to block the entry of bacterial citrus canker disease into the state's groves, could replace a federal ban on Florida citrus shipments that was was lifted last week, officials said.

"It would be an emergency ban," TDA spokesman Max Woodfin said. "We only have the authority to do it for 30 days. (Then) we would be required to hold a public hearing and let folks come in and comment on the ac-

The U.S. Department of Agriculture lifted its 3-year ban Tuesday, causing alarm among Texas officials who fear introduction of the disease, which weakens trees and damages the

The disease was discovered in several Florida nurseries in August 1984.

Lawyers were exploring whether the state would run afoul of federal law by blocking Florida citrus from entering Tex-

"We're trying to make sure that if we did take the step that it would have the effect that we want - to get around the lifting of the federal ban," he said. "Texas law does give us pretty clear authority to take steps to protect Texas crops. We think we're on pretty good footing, but we want to make sure

Texas orange and grapefruit growers had fought Florida's efforts to end the ban, citing the potential threat to the Texas crop and a possible loss of the state's share of the California market.

The Texas crop is expected to bring growers up to \$65 million this year. Much of the fruit is grown on 30,000 acres in the state's three southernmost counties, where growers are just recovering from a devastating

"I'm not going to walk in there Williams said in an interview last

Williams acknowledged breaking into the apartment where Miss Anderson was slain, but insisted the burglary occurred a month before the killing. His fingerprints, however, were found in the woman's stolen car, recovered a few blocks from Williams' home.

Williams' attorneys contended in appeals the Texas death penalty law is flawed in that it does not allow jurors to consider mitigating circumstances and forces them to return a death ver-

Earlier Wednesday, a federal judge in Houston and then the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans, rejected their arguments.

But the argument, successful before the Supreme Court, has been used to obtain stays in many recent capital punishment cases since that challenge to the law is pending before the high court in another Texas death row case.

"I would be glad to have it over with," Miss Anderson's sister, Ellen Yarrell said. "As far as I'm concerned, he's had eight years she didn't have.

Williams would have become the 95th inmate to be put to death nationwide and the 28th in Texas - more than any other state since the Supreme Court allowed the death penalty to resume in

During the day Wednesday Williams was described as calm and cooperative, visiting with his mother, two sisters and clergymen.

A Houston jury in 1980 took just six minutes to decide Williams should get the death penalty.

Miss Anderson, 28, from Fort Worth, had moved to Houston to open a new branch of a travel agency. She graduated Phi Beta Kappa from the University of



Sweetener can be hazardous

DEAR DR. GOTT: I was in Mexico last month. On all the diet-soda bottles there was a warning that translated as "This beverage should not be consumed by pregnant women, children under 3 or phenylketonurics." All of these products contained Nutrasweet. Why the warning?

DEAR READER: Nutrasweet is the brand name for a form of aspartame, a common synthetic sweetener that is widely used in diet drinks and other diet products. The substance reacts badly in patients with phenylketonuria, or PKU, a birth defect in which the body lacks an enzyme-to change the amino acid phenylalanine to tyrosine. Pregnant women (who may be carrying a child who has PKU) and PKU children must be careful to avoid aspartame because it can cause mental retardation if inappropriately ingested.

DEAR DR. GOTT: You had a letter from a reader whose 12-year-old daughter still sucks her thumb. My daughter had the same problem. It started after a family trauma. When she started school, I bought a necklace with a stout chain and a smooth agate pendant. She was able to use the pendant safely as a socially acceptable substitute for her thumb, and it kept her hands busy. It worked for

DEAR READER: Since publishing the column on thumbsucking, I have had comments from many readers suggesting methods to break the thumbsucking habit. Some were unacceptable. Others made sense; for ex-

ample, using a pacifier or allowing the child to suck her thumb and hoping that social pressure in school would be sufficient to end the behavior.

Clearly, this is a complicated problem for which there is no universal solution. The trick, it seems to me, is to structure the situation so that the child will no longer wish to suck his or her thumb to achieve security. This often requires patience and behavioral modification on the part of the parents, in conjunction with medical advice given by a pediatrician.


Although I'm glad to hear that the agate-on-a-chain worked for your daughter, I'm concerned that the pendant might, with time, become loosened and be inhaled as a foreign body. causing asphyxiation. I also worry that a child might displace her security from the thumb to an object, thereby simply substituting one problem

In any case, I believe that parents with problem thumbsuckers should begin their quest for a cure in the pediatrician's office.

Candidates jockey for positions in **New Hampshire**

The Democratic presidential candidates sharpened their attacks on one another and Vice President George Bush insisted his Republican campaign could survive another setback, as the contenders jockeyed for position in the New Hampshire home stretch

Nearly all of the 13 candidates were campaigning today in the state, which holds its first-in-thénation presidential primary on Tuesday.

A poll suggested Bush's chief rival, Bob Dole, was narrowing the vice president's lead in New Hampshire in the wake of Bush's embarrassing third-place finish in the Iowa caucuses on Monday.

In an ABC-Washington Post survey, reported in today's editions of the Post, Bush led Dole by only four percentage points, within the poll's six-point margin of error.

New Hampshire. "No, it's not finished," Bush told NBC in an interview Wednesday night, adding that he thought

he would win. The vice president, who spent part of the day at the White House and part on the campaign trail, \said he and President Reagan hadn't discussed the trouncing he took in Iowa at the hands of Pat Robertson.

Robertson continued to crow about his second-place finish in Iowa, and lectured reporters who described him as a former television evangelist. He termed the tag a "bigoted slur," saying he preferred to be called a religious

broadcaster. The ABC-Post poll indicated Robertson's support had climbed into the double digits in New Hampshire. While he remained well behind the front-runners, he made greater gains over a survey a week ago than they did.

On the Democratic side, Rep. Richard Gephardt was riding the wave generated by his first-place finish in Iowa. Although Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis still enjoys a comfortable lead, the poll indicated a surge in support for the Missouri congressman.

Sen. Paul Simon, who finished a close second to Gephardt in Iowa, also rolled up an increase in New Hampshire, but a slightly smaller one.

Both Dukakis and Simon made Gephardt their principal target as they campaigned in New Hampshire. Simon was launching a new ad campaign in the state today, hammering away at the theme that Gephardt's populist campaign themes don't match up with his voting record.

Dukakis, meanwhile, attacked Gephardt for voting for Reagan's 1981 tax cut. Those who finished back in the pack in Iowa found themselves dogged by questions about how long they could hang



sketch of a pair of mallards coming in over a marsh pond. Since 1949, the design for each year's stamp has been chosen through an art contest entered by many of the nation's best wildlife

artists. The 1934 Duck Stamp sold for Since then, more than 90 million Duck Stamps have been sold at higher prices, providing more than \$285 million for the conservation of 3.5 million acres.

Rules governing deductions change

"It's deductible." Those magic words once again ring happily in the ears of the hard-pressed taxpayer.

And this year, under tax reform, you no longer have to reduce your itemized deductions by the standard deduction as was required in the past. You merely total up your itemized destandard deduction, whichever is

Although identifying deductions is your deductions total more than the standard deduction, you will cut your






