Soviet warships... 2 U. S. ships are bumped

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Soviet warships deliberately bumped into the sides of two U.S. Navy warships early today while the American vessels were steaming in the Black Sea, the Pentagon said.

No injuries were reported. One American ship suffered "minor damage" to its port side, the Pentagon said.

"The United States will protest these incidents to Soviet authorities," the Pentagon added.

The collisions occurred as the "two U.S. Navy ships were conducting routine operations (and) exercising their internationally recognized right of innocent passage through the Soviet 12-mile territorial sea," the Pentagon said.

"The incidents took place at about nine miles and 11 miles distance from the Crimean coastline."

According to the Defense Department, the USS Caron and the USS Yorktown were struck by different Soviet naval vessels around 3 a.m. EST today — or about 11 a.m. local time.

The Caron, a so-called Spruance-class destroyer, "was struck on the port side by a Mirka-class light frigate," the Pentagon said. "There was no damage to the Caron."

Three minutes later, the cruiser USS Yorktown, which was steaming in company with the Caron, was struck on the port side by a Krivak-class frigate. Yorktown sustained minor damage.

The Pentagon did not immediately elaborate on the "minor" damage.

The damage to the Soviet vessels "is unknown, but believed to be minor," the Pentagon added.

Haig is out

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP) — Former Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. withdrew from the Republican presidential race today and threw his support to Kansas Sen. Bob Dole.

Haig, who had lingered at the bottom of public opinion polls, becomes the first of the 13 major party presidential candidates to call it quits in 1988.

"I am announcing today my withdrawal as a candidate for the Republican nomination and my support for the candidate best qualified to run this nation," he said.

Haig said Dole was that man.

Trade deficit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit narrowed to \$12.2 billion in December, the smallest gap since January, as exports surged, the Commerce Department said today.

For the year, the trade deficit widened to a record \$171.2 billion, the largest ever. But financial markets were expected to pay more attention to the December numbers, which came two months after the Oct. 19 stock market crash.

DHS probe

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — County Attorney Joe Lucas says he hopes an attorney general's investigation of the Department of Human Service's El Paso office can improve its handling of child-abuse cases.

The attorney general's office agreed Wednesday to investigate the DHS office's handling of five child-abuse cases in response to Lucas' request last month.

Walter Deines, regional director for the DHS' child protective services department, pledged cooperation and said he expected a thorough review.

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Trustees to likely leave post vacant

Due to the relatively brief time period before the next school board election, Snyder trustees say they will likely not appoint a trustee to fill the board seat to be vacated by Ben Wilcox.

Options for filling the vacancy were discussed in executive session by the board following its regular February meeting Thursday.

Friday morning, board president Mike Jordan said the consensus was to leave the seat vacant until the May 8 election. All board members attended Thursday's meeting.

Any individuals appointed to the post would have to run in May to fill the unexpired seat, which will next come up for reelection in the spring of 1990.

Wilcox was elected last April for one of the board's single member district seats. He represents the portion of the school district located outside the city limits of Snyder, place 5 on the board.

Wilcox informed school officials this week that he would be required to resign effective March 1 due to an impending job transfer to Monahans.

He is the production foreman for SACROC here and is accepting

At February meeting...

Administrator pacts renewed

The Snyder school board accepted the resignation of one of its members Thursday night and officially extended or renewed contracts for 17 administrative personnel.

At its February meeting, the board also indicated it will move ahead with plans to employ a new head of maintenance for the district, apparently abandoning the option of employing an outside company to contract for this service.

In a related personnel action, trustees accepted the resignation of longtime maintenance director Bill Sealy. His contract runs through June 30.

Also Thursday, trustees voted to accept the resignation of member Ben Wilcox, who was elected as a single member district board member at a special election here last April.

Wilcox had indicated he would be required to resign due to a job transfer to Monahans (see related story).

Under personnel action Thursday, the board approved one-year extensions of two-year contracts for 12 administrative staffers. This now gives these staffers contracts through June 30, 1990.

Those given extensions include Dr. Tom Scannicchio, assistant superintendent for instruction; principals Ray Courtney, Charles Anderson, Dr. Tom Alvis, L.D. Monroe, Jim Erwin, Geraldine Parker, Wayne Kennedy and Bob Travis; and assistant principals Lee Presswood, Ned Underwood and Bill Hartfield.

The board also renewed two-year contracts for Nick Williams, assistant superintendent for

business, and Richard Morley, director of special programs. These contracts will next come up for renewal in the year they expire, on June 30, 1990.

One-year administrative contracts were renewed also for Bobbie Box, testing coordinator; Margaret Presswood, elementary reading consultant; and Keith Gentry, transportation director. Their contracts will expire June 30, 1989.

In other personnel action, the board approved a request to hire an additional part-time staffer to work in the administration building.

It was noted this employee will work fulltime hours, but will likely be employed only through the summer. They will be assisting with paperwork associated with federal programs as well as in-

Railroad drug testing ruling may have far-reaching effects

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal court ruling striking down mandatory drug testing of railroad workers could block a similar plan to test airline pilots, air traffic controllers and others in safety-related jobs, officials say.

Union officials on Thursday hailed the 2-1 decision by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco as a victory for "the rights of working people."

But Transportation Secretary Jim Burnley said the decision will be appealed and noted that other federal courts "have upheld mandatory drug testing programs for customs officials, prison guards, bus drivers and jockeys" — all on the basis of overriding safety considerations.

The appeals court declared unconstitutional a federal requirement that rail workers involved in accidents undergo drug tests.

"The decision if not reversed will effectively end drug testing in the railroad industry," declared John Riley, head of the Federal Railroad Administra-

tion, which issued the testing requirements in 1986.

Federal transportation safety officials, including rail accident investigators at the National Transportation Safety Board, have argued that drug testing is necessary after major transportation accidents, both to determine the cause of the mishaps and to deter drug use.

Recently the NTSB, which investigates major transportation accidents, has urged that mandatory post-accident drug testing be required in aviation as well. The safety board said automatic drug testing requirements are needed for pilots, flight attendants and air traffic controllers involved in an accident or major aviation incident.

A draft regulation requiring random and post-accident drug testing of pilots, flight attendants and other aviation workers in safety-sensitive jobs is nearing completion at the Transportation Department, according to officials who spoke on the condition that they not be identified by

name.

Jim Burnett, chairman of the National Transportation Safety Board, said post-accident testing requirements in the railroad industry represented "a major step in the right direction."

"We were very much in hopes the (railroad) rule would be used as a model in other modes of transportation," Burnett said in an interview. He said that without the post-accident testing requirement "we would not have known about the alcohol and drug problems we've had in several recent rail accidents."

According to Riley, railroad workers tested positive for drugs

or alcohol in 37 of the 179 accidents or rail incidents last year in which the mandatory tests were required.

Rail unions hailed the appeals court decision.

"Mandatory testing programs without requirements for reasonable suspicion violate the rights of working people," said James J. Kennedy, executive secretary-treasurer of the Railway Labor Executives' Association, an umbrella organization for 15 rail unions.

"Mandatory testing," said Dennis Simmerman, a spokesman for the 25,000-member Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, "results in submitting workers to an invasion of privacy."

Jail has lost its standing

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — Overcrowding within the Texas prison system has caused the Jefferson County Jail to lose its certification, county officials said.

Texas Commission on Jail Standards officials inspected the jail Monday and failed it for overcrowding and neglecting to maintain an inmate classification system, Sheriff R.E. "Dick" Culbertson said Thursday.

The jail had 43 female inmates, three above its capacity, on Thursday with some having to sleep on mattresses on floors, the sheriff said.

Jail officials are required to place prisoners in cells according to such classifications as number of offenses previously committed, sex, age, health and sexual preference. Because of overcrowding, authorities do not have the space to keep first-time offenders isolated from repeat offenders, Culbertson said.

He said the county jail's problems would not exist if the Texas Department of Corrections could accept inmates sentenced to that institution, instead of being housed in the county jail. The jail is currently keeping 66 prisoners sentenced to prison at a total cost to the county of \$2,970 a day, he said.

Houston bank is 8th failure in Texas

HOUSTON (AP) — Federal officials say poor lending practices prompted the closing of First Houston Bank, N.A., the eighth bank to fail in Texas this year.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. board of directors transferred the deposits of the failed bank because the agency didn't receive any bids to purchase and assume the failed bank, said FDIC spokeswoman Carol Austrian.

Deposits of the failed bank will be transferred to Texas Commerce Bank-River Oaks, Ms. Austrian said. The bank's only office will not reopen.

First Houston Bank with total assets of \$33.9 million was closed Thursday by Robert J. Herrmann, senior deputy comptroller of the currency, and the FDIC

was named receiver. The bank was granted a national charter on Oct. 27, 1983.

Connally penthouse being auctioned

HOUSTON (AP) — Former Gov. John Connally, who last month auctioned off the possessions of a lifetime to put a dent in his multimillion-dollar debt, is having his South Padre Island penthouse put on the auction block later this month.

The Connally penthouse is part of the 120-unit Sunchase Condominium complex which he and partner, former Texas Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, developed in 1984. Individual private owners of Sunchase and nearby luxury condominium units will join the developers of another South Padre and two Brownsville complexes to offer 65 luxury condominiums for sale.

Twenty of the 65 one-, two- and three-bedroom units will be sold regardless of price and all will have suggested opening bids of \$7,500 to \$60,000.

Connally, 70, and his wife, Nellie, last month completed a four-day Houston auction of hundreds of possessions, many of

them collected during his years as governor of Texas from 1963 to 1969. Navy secretary under President Kennedy and Treasury secretary under President Nixon.

The sale brought in nearly \$2.7 million. Connally, who filed for bankruptcy protection in July, owes \$41 million to \$128 million in unsecured debts.

Under bankruptcy laws, Connally is selling all properties except his house and 200 of the 3,400 acres at Picoso Ranch, his homestead in Floresville south of San Antonio. The law allows him to keep \$30,000 in personal possessions.

The two-bedroom, four-bath penthouse has 3,845-square-feet of living space and features 3,405-square-feet of tiled balconies. The penthouse was recently assessed in excess of \$500,000, not including the quarter-million dollars of upgrading and improvements added by Mrs. Connally and a Texas interior design firm.

Laredo officials angered by Clements' stance on bridge

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — Local officials say they have worked for years to build a third bridge across the Rio Grande here and they're outraged that Gov. Bill Clements favors a site 18 miles away at the Mexican town of Colombia.

Clements Thursday indicated support for the Colombia bridge at a news conference held following a two-day meeting with Jorge Trevino, governor of the Mexican state of Nuevo Leon, that resulted in pacts to promote business and tourism. No agreements on the bridge were announced.

"My position is that (Mexican) President (Miguel) de la Madrid has agreed to the bridge" at Colombia, Clements said.

City Councilman Saul N. Ramirez Jr. said Thursday that Clements has excluded local leaders.

"At no time has there been that sort of close cooperation between the Governor's office and the City of Laredo or Webb County. I'm sorry to say," he told the Laredo Morning Times.

"Putting aside the many long hours, in fact years, of planning that we have undergone here at Laredo for a third bridge, to

disregard all that and cater to a foreign entity's desires is insulting to Laredo and the entire region," Ramirez said.

During the Thursday conference, Clements announced an agreement to create jobs on both sides of the border. But it was Clements' suggestion that he would favor placing the proposed bridge at an undeveloped area in Webb County at Trevino's urging drew sharp responses in Laredo, where 60 percent of Mexico's exports cross into the state.

There are two international bridges at Laredo but a third has been under study since the 1970's.

"Our State Department has agreed in principle to the bridge," Clements said. "I am in accord that this bridge would be a good thing for Nuevo Leon and for Texas. But at the same time, there are complex issues here that must be resolved."

Clements said those issues include the environmental impact of a new bridge in Webb County, the character of industrial parks and sites on both sides of the border, building of appropriate roads to the little-traveled area and "the relationship of the City of Laredo to the bridge."

Cue-bidding to slam

The penalty double by South of East's one-spade overall showed more than just four spades; it also indicated a strong opening bid. When North bid three clubs, a game contract was assured, but delicate cue-bids paved the way for the final slam contract. Three diamonds showed the ace, and three hearts another ace. Three spades showed obvious control in that suit; four clubs said, "I'm waiting for more information," and four hearts by South indicated the king. That was enough for North, who simply bid six clubs. There was nothing to the play just a matter of drawing trumps and eventually giving up the inescapable diamond loser.

Even though South's hand had two doubletons, some players with those cards would open with one no-trump (17 high-card points, all suits stopped). This would be wrong. Part of the pleasure of bridge is exercising judgment in evaluating the strength of hands. Here all the high cards consist of prime values — aces and kings — called honor tricks in the early days of contract bridge. It is a flaw in the point-count system that aces and kings count only four and three respectively. So it was right to start with one club, and just as well, since most North players would not consider slam opposite a one-no-trump opening.

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Attorneys file suit against attorneys

TYLER, Texas (AP) — Three lawyers have filed suit against another group of lawyers over the right to represent the widow of a man allegedly beaten to death in an East Texas jail.

The three plaintiffs contend they were already hired by Corine Garner, when an Alabama law firm agreed to represent her.

Mrs. Garner's husband, Loyal Garner Jr., 34, died Dec. 27 of head injuries he allegedly received at the Sabine County Jail where he was held after his Christmas day arrest in Hemphill on a driving while intoxicated charge.

Attorneys Joann Gines-Shepherd, Billy R. Casey of Shreveport, La., and John E. Sherman of Houston are suing attorneys Morris Dees and J. Richard Cohen of the Southern Poverty Law Center of Montgomery, Ala., and attorneys Mark Englehart of Longview and Laurie Lyons of Shreveport.

On Jan. 19, Cohen, Englehart and Ms. Lyons filed a lawsuit in federal court in Lufkin on behalf of Mrs. Garner, her six children, and Sarah and Loyal Garner Sr., against Hemphill Police Chief Thomas Ladner, Sabine County deputies James Hyden, Bill Horton, and the city of Hemphill.

The three law enforcement officers face state charges of violating Garner's civil rights. Tuesday, a Tyler inquest jury ruled that Garner's death was a homicide.

Tyler attorney Otis Carroll filed an answer to the attorney's lawsuit Tuesday on behalf of the defendants, asking the court to dismiss the lawsuit for insufficient grounds.

The three lawyers are seeking an attorney fee equal to one-third of any amount recovered prior to filing suit or 40 percent of any award.

The defendants' answer included an affidavit in which Mrs. Garner said she dismissed the trio of attorneys before she talked to the Alabama firm.

Mrs. Garner said she signed a contingency fee retainer with the lawyers at her home in Florien,

La., Jan. 7, according to her affidavit. But two days later, Mrs. Garner said she telephoned Ms. Gines-Shepherd and dismissed her and later sent certified letters to the attorneys confirming the dismissal.

Mrs. Garner said she talked with Houston attorney Percy Foreman, who advised her she could dismiss Ms. Gines-Shepherd and helped her prepare letters discharging the three lawyers.

She said she later chose the Southern Poverty Law Center and attorneys Dees and Cohen because they represent poor people without charging a fee or taking any part of any settlement or judgment. She said she understood they also successfully handled a case against the Ku Klux Klan.

Mrs. Garner said Dees solicited Englehart and Ms. Lyons to act as local counsel.

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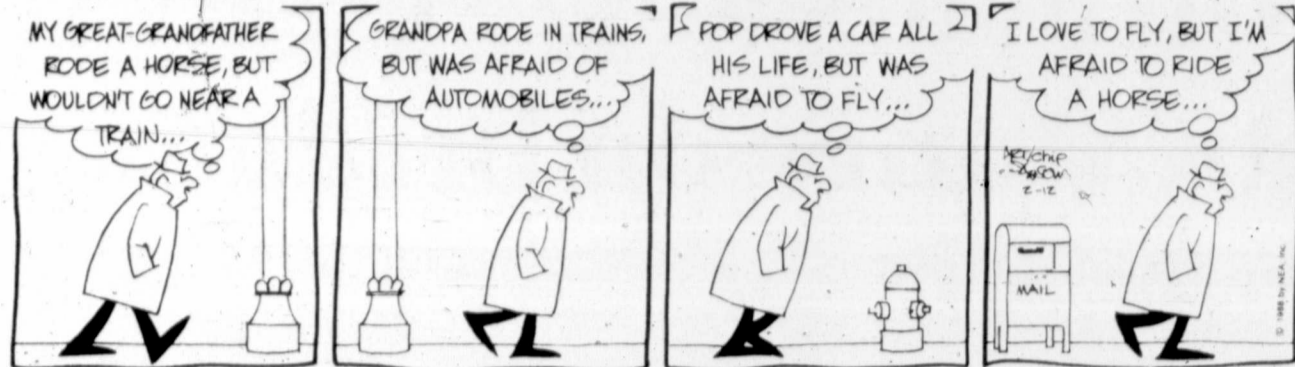
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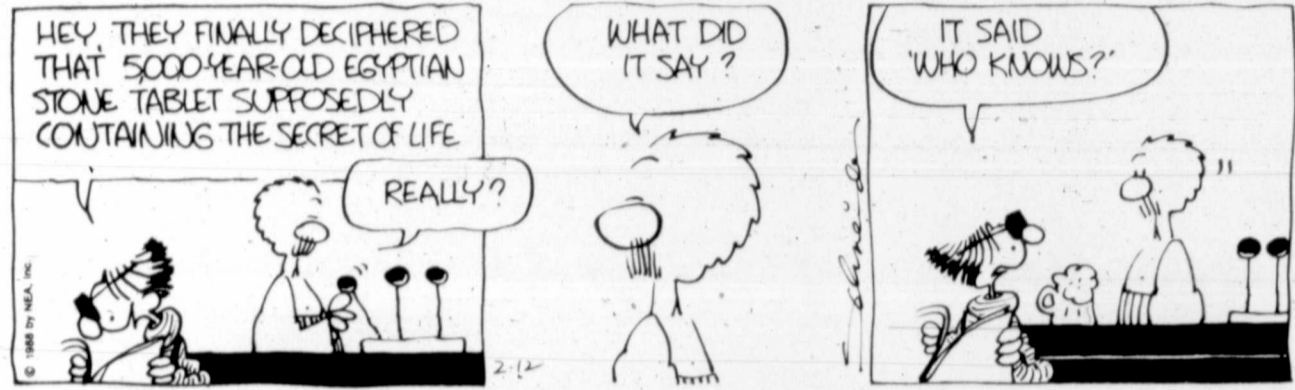
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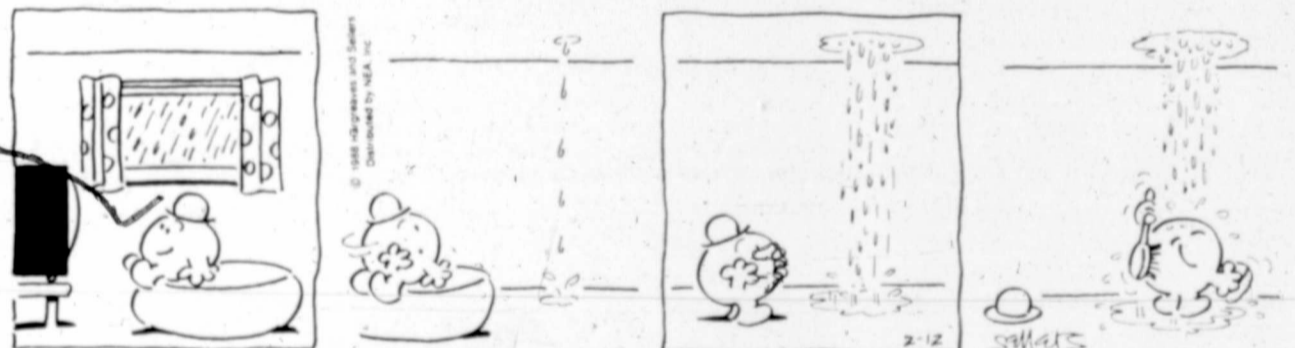
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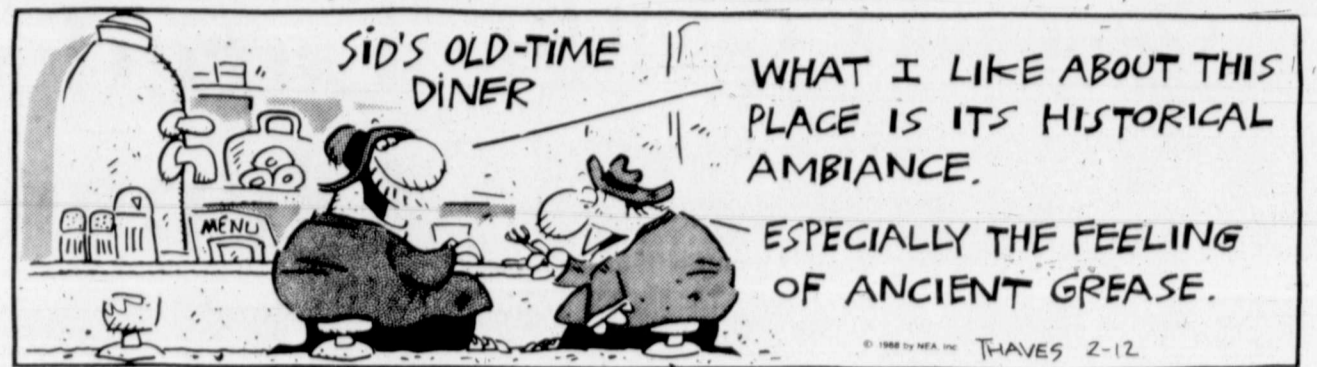
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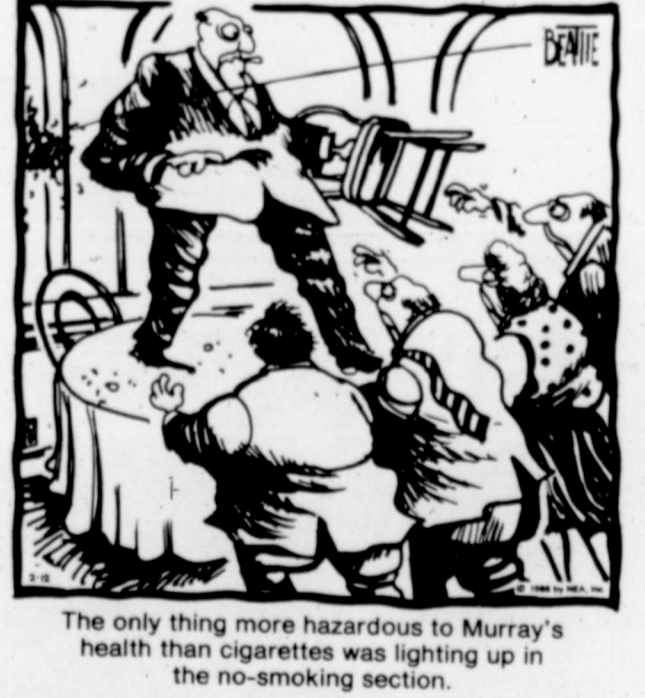
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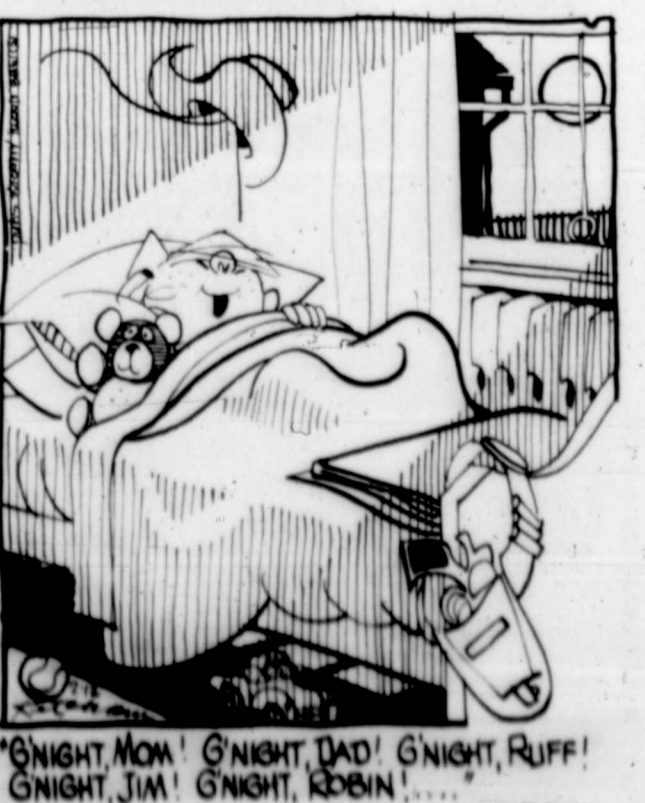

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Jurors nixed theory

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jurors who convicted former presidential aide Lyn Nofziger of illegal lobbying say they didn't buy his argument that the White House had little interest in the multimillion-dollar military contracts he sought for clients.

Jurors interviewed after Thursday's verdict disagreed with the defense's technical argument that what Nofziger lobbied about was not of "direct and substantial interest" to the White House.

"Oh yes it was," said juror Leslie Charles. "Didn't Judge Flannery instruct us that it did not have to do with a broad topic such as poverty or welfare?"

"It had to do with an A-10 bomber, it had to do with MEBA (the Marine Engineers Beneficial Association)," Ms. Charles said. "I don't think those are broad topics."

"The evidence just kept coming up all the time," foreman Towana Braxton said after the jury convicted Nofziger on three counts of illegally lobbying former White House colleagues within a year of leaving President Reagan's staff. Such contacts are prohibited by the Ethics in Government Act.

Nofziger was White House political director during the first year of Reagan's presidency, and then became a private lobbyist. He was found guilty of illegally pressing then-presidential counselor Edwin Meese III about a defense contract for Wedtech Corp.

Meese, now attorney general, testified that he couldn't recall receiving a memo from Nofziger about Wedtech.

Nofziger also was convicted of lobbying other presidential aides about continued production of the A-10 anti-tank plane for Fairchild Republic Corp., and a Navy policy favored by the marine engineers union.

Each conviction carries a potential two-year sentence and a \$10,000 fine. U.S. District Judge Thomas A. Flannery scheduled sentencing for March 25.

The jury acquitted Nofziger, 63, of a fourth count involving an alleged contact about Wedtech's ultimately successful quest for a \$32 million non-competitive Army contract.

Nofziger's partner, Mark A. Bragg, was acquitted of a single aiding and abetting count arising from the same charge — that Nofziger sent a May 28, 1982 letter about Wedtech to deputy presidential adviser James E. Jenkins.

The defense denied that Nofziger signed the letter or knew anything about it, suggesting his signature was forged.

"There was not enough convincing or credible evidence" that Nofziger signed it, Ms. Braxton said.

Nofziger's lawyers conceded he made the other lobbying contacts but contended he was trying to create White House interest that wasn't there.

But prosecutors produced presidential directives about the A-10 and civilian manning of Navy support ships to document White House interest.

Army and Small Business Administration officials testified that without the pressure from Jenkins, Wedtech would not have received the contract to build small engines.

After the verdict, Nofziger said he would appeal and compared his actions to "running a stop sign."

"I feel that I am innocent," he said. "I don't think I did anything wrong."

But juror Herbert Robinson said he was swayed by testimony that the A-10 "was obsolete or useless."

Nofziger was "using his influence within a year after leaving" the White House to continue production of the anti-tank aircraft even though the Air Force was saying "we didn't need it," he said.

"That was paramount in my mind."

The definition of White House interest is expected to be a basis of Nofziger's appeal because he is the first former top government official to be convicted under the revolving-door provisions of the 1978 Ethics in Government Act.

Outfielder George "Kiddo" Davis had a lifetime batting average of .282 in eight big league seasons but in two World Series he batted .381.

Danish tanker hit by helicopter fire

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — An Iranian helicopter attacked a Danish supertanker in the Persian Gulf at dawn today, setting

it ablaze, killing a crew member and wounding three others, shipping executives said.

Iraq warplanes raided a tanker in Iranian oil shipping lanes, a Baghdad war communique said. There was no independent confirmation of the raid.

The Iraqi News Agency quoted a military spokesman as saying the warplanes attacked a "very large maritime target" near the Iranian coast at 11:05 p.m. Thursday, scoring an "accurate and effective hit."

The strike was in pursuit of Baghdad's avowed policy "to strip the Iranian regime of the economic resources that help it continue its aggression against Iraq," said the unidentified spokesman. The report was monitored in Cyprus.

Shipping executives said the 339,000-ton Kate Maersk may have suffered some engine room damage. One source said the ship was "caught dead in the water." Salvage tugboats rushed to help.

Palle Genckel, spokesman for the operating company A.P. Moller, told The Associated Press in Copenhagen that the seaman killed was the 26-year-old radio operator Jan Michael Fabrin.

Genckel identified those injured as second officer Carsten Andersen, 24, machinist Alfred Schmidt, 26, and sailor Poul Egon Pedersen, 46.

Helicopters airlifted the injured to the port of Dubai, the sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Reporters in Dubai said two of the three injured were rushed to the Intensive Care Unit at Al-Rashid Hospital.

Quarantine could become permanent

MALLEN, Texas (AP) — A 30-day emergency quarantine on shipments of Florida citrus into Texas could be extended if the citrus canker disease remains a threat, a state agriculture official said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture declared quarantine on Florida citrus fruit and plants Thursday, in response to a federal decision on Tuesday to end a ban on shipments of Florida fruit to other citrus producing states.

The ban on Florida had been in effect since the bacterial citrus canker disease was discovered in Florida in August 1984.

Texas officials said they'll act to keep Florida citrus out of the state.

"We'll have roadblocks in East Texas on Interstate 10, and also probably on Interstate 20 beginning Monday morning to stop any trucks that have Florida citrus," said Deputy Texas Agriculture Commissioner Mike Moeller, who met with citrus producers Thursday.

"Basically what we'd like to have at the end of 30 days is either to have a permanent quarantine against Florida citrus, or to have a negotiated settlement with Florida and USDA that would effectively buffer the counties in Florida that are the primary source of strain 'A' canker and protect the lower Rio Grande Valley from any Florida citrus coming in," Moeller said.

The quarantine applies to fruit as well as plants, Moeller said.

"Take Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, but don't bring it to the 'Valley,'" said Les Whitlock with the Texas Valley Citrus Committee, based in McAllen.

The canker causes sores on fruit, said Dr. Richard Hensz, director of the Texas A&I Citrus Center in Weslaco, and president of the Texas Citrus Mutual, a growers' organization in McAllen.

The disease also can cause defoliation and other damage to leaves and twigs of plants, and can cause fruit to drop off the tree before reaching maturity.

Moeller said trucks carrying Florida citrus "will either be turned around and sent back to Florida or, if possible, fumigated, sealed and sent on their way across Texas to their destination."

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower charged that the U.S. Department of Agriculture bowed to pressure from Florida growers Tuesday when it lifted the ban.

"We've got to do this to prevent citrus canker from coming into Texas. If we let it in, we are letting in an economic disaster for Texas farmers and workers, for

the Rio Grande Valley economy and the entire Texas economy," said Hightower.

"Florida has not — repeat — not gotten rid of this disease. It's in their trees, it's in their fruit that they are trying to send to us," Hightower said.

But USDA spokeswoman Nancy Robinson said there was "no indication that the nursery strain of canker has ever appeared on the fruit itself under commercial conditions. We believe procedures established in the rule are sound, and will permit fruit to go into other states without excessive risk."

Executive Vice President Bob

McKown of Florida Citrus Mutual, the largest growers' organization in the state, said, "We are not in the business of exporting any miseries or problems to our fellow growers in other states. If Florida growers had believed that the (USDA protocol) was not biologically sound, we would not have supported it."

Public hearings will be held within the 30-day emergency quarantine period, which takes effect immediately, officials said.

Texas has about 22,000 citrus-producing acres in three counties at the southern tip of the state while Florida's citrus is grown on

more than 600,000 acres. This year's Texas crop has been estimated at between \$45 million and \$50 million, about half of its value before a hard freeze devastated the industry in 1983.

Travelers also will be prohibited from bringing Florida citrus fruit and plants into Texas, Moeller said, adding the fine ranges from \$100 to \$500 for those attempting to smuggle the fruit.

Whitlock said the Texas producers would try to obtain the cooperation of other citrus producing states, particularly Arizona and California.

Youth's lunchroom shooting rampage injures 3 educators

PINELLAS PARK, Fla. (AP) — A school administrator was in critical condition today after a 15-year-old student shot him in the head and wounded two other educators during a scuffle in a packed cafeteria, police said.

About 500 Pinellas Park High School students toppled tables for protection, ran for cover and hid in classrooms when the shots rang out in their cafeteria Thursday, but none were hit.

Jason Harless, who came to school packing a .38-caliber pistol, was shot in the shoulder by police as he tried to flee, authorities said. A similarly armed friend fled without firing a shot, but was arrested later at a friend's house, police said.

"It was weird, chaos," said Jeff Oliver, a 15-year-old student who was in the cafeteria when the bullets started flying. "People were crying and shaking. I was shaking. It was terrible."

Assistant Principal Richard Allen, 53, shot in the head at point-blank range, remained in critical condition today at

Bayfront Medical Center in St. Petersburg, said nursing supervisor Gayle Hogan.

Nancy Blackwelder, 35, another assistant principal, was wounded in the abdomen and right arm. She was in serious but stable condition after surgery at Humana Hospital Northside, said a nursing supervisor who refused to give her name.

Student teacher Joseph Blonzalis, 22, grazed in the leg by a bullet, was treated at Humana Northside and released.

Harless was charged with five counts of attempted murder and one count of armed burglary, police said. He was treated by paramedics before being taken Thursday night to the Pinellas County Juvenile Detention Center.

His friend, 15-year-old Jason McCoy, was booked at the detention center on three counts of attempted murder and one count of armed burglary.

Harless had received a three-day suspension Wednesday for cursing a teacher, a punishment given final approval by Ms. Blackwelder, police said. McCoy had been living with Harless' family since summer.

Police and students said Harless and McCoy came to school armed with .38-caliber

revolvers apparently stolen from a neighbor's home. When school officials spotted the suspended teen, they called Pinellas Park police with a trespassing complaint. Both teens were later confronted in the cafeteria.

A brief struggle ensued. Blonzalis grabbed one of the boys and Ms. Blackwelder grabbed another. As Allen approached, he was shot in the head, witnesses said.

Harless and McCoy fled out the school's front door just as police were arriving. When Harless raised his gun to fire at officers, they fired, clipping his shoulder and capturing him.

Theft of boots prompts arrest

A 15-year-old male was arrested at 2:50 p.m. Thursday at the police station in connection with the Jan. 7 theft of a pair of boots from a vehicle parked in the 1900 Block of 26th St.

Sheila Martin of Rt. 3, Box A-72, had reported the theft, and a city detective said the boots and a pair of gloves that were taken from the vehicle were recovered.

He said the youth was released into the custody of his parents and that the case would be forwarded to the district attorney's office for disposition.

Junior high meet slated

Current plans are for the competition to be held annually. Host responsibilities will be circulated among the participating schools.

It is hoped that, beginning next year, a one-act play event for junior high students may be added as well.

Roof fire has fire call here

All aspirin relieves pain

DEAR DR. GOTT: I recently read that generic aspirin was satisfactory for occasional headache, but for relieving the pain and swelling of arthritis, it might be better to use a brand-name aspirin. Is this true? Also, what's the difference between enteric-coated aspirin and the uncoated aspirin?

DEAR READER: All aspirin, whether brand-name or generic, is acetylsalicylic acid, a compound used for lowering fever, reducing inflammation and slowing blood clotting. Aspirin is marketed as plain, buffered, time-release or coated. Whatever the form, it's still aspirin. Brand-name aspirin is not superior to generic in relieving arthritis pain.

In addition to its advertised properties, aspirin causes irritation of the stomach wall, indigestion and ulcers. Evidence suggests that this effect can be moderated by buffering the aspirin with an antacid or coating the tablet with a film that will not allow the aspirin to be released until it enters the intestine. In my experience, choice of aspirin depends more on patients' personal preferences than on any therapeutic advantage. Some people experience fewer side effects with buffered aspirin, others prefer the enteric-coated variety. In my view, the therapeutic effects are identical.

I do not believe that patients with histories of peptic ulcer or gastroin-

testinal bleeding should take aspirin regularly in any form. With that caveat, any type or reputable brand is all right for adults to use.

The use of aspirin for childhood fevers is another matter. In my practice, I do not give aspirin to any child below the age of adolescence. I substitute acetaminophen instead because of the connection between Reye's syndrome, a serious neurological disorder, and aspirin in children.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a relaxed or torn ligament in my neck. The third vertebra pops in and out, causing much pain. The prison doctor says, "Live with it." What can you suggest?

DEAR READER: The neck bones are held in place by tough bands of gristle called ligaments. With age, or after injury, these ligaments may relax and stretch, allowing the bones to move sideways. This can cause a click or produce pain because of muscle spasm.

Although your options for treatment are limited in prison, you could be helped by physiotherapy, a program of rehabilitation that might include neck-strengthening exercises, massage and heat or gentle manipulation to reduce spasm.

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Family rescued from icy water

ROWLETT, Texas (AP) — Paramedic Richard Strange says he knew what to do when he was told there was a child trapped in a car that ran into a creek near Lake Ray Hubbard.

He was about shoulder-deep in the icy water when he reached the open driver's door and began feeling inside the car for signs of life.

"I felt up under as far as I could reach in the water. After a while my hands and arms went numb. Then I just picked up my legs and feet and felt around in the car," said Strange, who is credited with rescuing 4-year-old Morgan Murphy.

The child was one of three in the car that slid off icy State Highway 66 about 7 a.m. Thursday.

"I could see us be nothing but headlines tomorrow," said Karen Murphy from her hospital bed.

"I was pinned because my legs were stuck and I had to wait for the water to fill up in the car. My babies were in the car and all I could think of was that family who died in the lake.

But Ms. Murphy's quick reaction in pulling two of her children from the murky waters, plus a dramatic rescue effort by Rowlett firefighters, kept tragedy at bay.

Women's group announced

AUSTIN (AP) — Michael Dukakis' state campaign officials say the endorsement of more than 1,000 Texas women shows why the Massachusetts governor's presidential bid has earned a reputation for organization.

Amassing endorsements of some 1,200 women statewide is a different approach than that being used by some other campaigns, which have emphasized a small number of endorsements from "name" politicians.

"We're building from the ground up," said campaign organizer Tom Cosgrove.

In announcing formation Thursday of Texas Women for Dukakis, several of the leaders said they were impressed by the governor's track record.

"Gov. Dukakis has an outstanding record of using the power of government to make a difference on the issues that disproportionately affect women and children," said Pat Smothers of San Antonio, who chairs the Texas Women's Political Caucus.

"Michael Dukakis is not just saying that he will be addressing these issues. He has a proven record," she said.

Leaders of the Texas Women

for Dukakis group said they planned to organize voters, conduct telephone banks and back a direct mail drive to help Dukakis in the March 8 primary.

Among those appearing at a news conference for Dukakis were Blandina Cardenas Ramirez, vice chair of the Texas Democratic Party; Ann Eldridge Hall, founder of a Dallas marketing communications consulting firm; Francis Frazier of Houston, a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee; and Mary Alice Cisneros, wife of San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros.

Issues on which the women gave Dukakis high marks included economic growth, equal rights, expanding the role of women in government, pay equity and day care.

Ms. Cardenas Ramirez said the women's vote meant the difference for Democratic U.S. Senate candidates in five Southern states in 1986, adding that she expected the "gender effect" to have an impact on this year's presidential race.

"Women are the most significant force in American politics," she said. "Mike Dukakis understands that women have a

contribution to make."

In El Paso, meanwhile, state Sen. Tati Santiesteban voiced his support for Dukakis, saying he was impressed by his record on job creation.

"Gov. Dukakis is the only candidate who has said the government should help industry and create employment," Santiesteban said. "The other candidates, instead of saying we need help from government, say we need less government."

In other political developments:

— Some Texas Republicans said the surge by former TV

evangelist Pat Robertson, who finished second in this week's Iowa caucuses, raises a possibility that "mainline" party members could lose control of the state GOP.

"The Republican regulars are scared," political consultant Karl Rove told the Austin American-Statesman.
