# Search continues for pair who fled drug-linked plane

GAIL — Two men who fled an aircraft Monday night at an isolated private airstrip here were still at large Wednesday morning while federal officials continued to piece together information apparently tied to a drug smuggling operation with links to Borden County, Palo Pinto County, Austin and Mexico.

Approximately 1½ hours before the private plane touched down and was abandoned in Borden County, it had allegedly been used to deliver an estimated 1,229 pounds of marijuana in Palo Pinto County near Lake Possum Kingdom, Mexico was thought to be the source of the marijuana and the individuals implicated to date are from the

Austin area.

Law enforcement officials arrested two men and confiscated the marijuana in Palo Pinto County around 9:30 p.m. Monday. They had allowed the airplane to take off again, however, after unloading its cargo.

Reports indicate a DPS assault helicopter followed the plane to Borden County, where two individuals fled the aircraft upon landing at a rural airstrip just west of Gail. The landing occurred around 11 p.m. Monday.

A DPS narcotics spokesman in Midland said Wednesday, "We See DRUG, page 9

## Bush, Dukakis capture most votes

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — George Bush and Michael Dukakis today pointed their campaigns southward after decisive New Hampshire victories, and Bob Dole promised to counterattack unless the vice president stops "distorting the Dole record," Richard Gephardt said he was in the race to stay.

But Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois, third among Democrats in New Hampshire after finishing second

in Iowa, said he will have to drop out unless he can win next week in either South Dakota or Minnesota. Jesse Jackson said he had met with former Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt, who he said was "wrestling with" the question of whether to continue.

Dole, the big Republican winner in Iowa last week, said Bush's comeback victory in New Hampshire meant "he's the front-runner."

Asked on CBS what made the difference in New Hampshire, Dole renewed his accusations against Bush, saying, "I think the negative advertising, in effect, distorting the Dole record on raising taxes."

And he said in remarks taped for ABC-TV, "Unless they want to get back on the straight and narrow and withdraw some of their attacks, we're going to have to counterattack."

Tuesday night, Dole had accused Bush of "lying about my record."

Bush, asked about that in an interview taped for CBS-TV today, said, "I'm sorry he feels that way."

Were you lying? Bush was asked.

"No," he answered quietly.

Bush won 38 percent of the Republican vote — and 11 delegates to the GOP convention

— in nearly complete returns. Dole had 29 percent of the vote and seven delegates. They were followed by Rep. Jack Kemp of New York, former Delaware Gov. Pete du Pont and former television evangelist Pat Robertson.

Dukakis lived up to expectations by carrying his neighboring state by 16 percentage points over Rep. Gephardt of Missouri, last week's winner in Iowa.

## Forecast is rainy, colder

Rain and colder weather are in the Scurry County forecast for both Wednesday night and Thursday.

The Snyder area forecast includes a 40 percent chance of rain Wednesday night, decreasing to a 30 percent chance Thursday.

The possibility of additional rain is still in the forecast into Friday for areas of West Texas, where below normal temperature readings are forecast as well.

No significant amounts of rain are now expected for the weekend, however.

The long range temperature forecast for this area includes nightly lows in the 20s with highs in the 40s. By the weekend, the high is expected to be around 50.

The chillier temperatures and forecasts for moisture are part of a comeback for winter across West Texas. Weather officials say there is a possibility of three inches of snow in the Panhandle by dawn Thursday.

Some scattered snow fell across northwestern sections of the Panhandle early Wednesday.

The rain and snow is being triggered by the combination of an upper level disturbance moving over East Texas and moist air from the Gulf of Mexico at the surface.

A stationary front was located across the low rolling plains and South Plains from near Wichita Falls to near Lubbock at dawn Wednesday.

Skies were mostly cloudy and expected to remain that way over most of the state through Thursday.

Forecasts are calling for increasing cloudiness statewide through Thursday night. There is a chance of showers and thunderstorms over North Texas and South Texas through Thursday and a chance of rain mixed with snow over West Texas through Thursday morning.

There could be as much as two inches of snow in the Panhandle tonight.

A stationery front was located across the low rolling plains and South Plains from near Wichita Falls to near Lubbock at dawn Wednesday.

Skies were mostly cloudy and expected to remain that way over most of the state through Thursday.

## Council will seek 'detailed' TV plan

Snyder city council members Tuesday authorized an Austin cable television consultant to draw up a franchise contract for them in connection with the impending sale of SCAT TV Cable to Landmark Cablevision of Colorado City.

Jack Hopper of Austin met with council members during a work session Tuesday, urging them to "put the horns and tails" into the franchise contract.

Following a two-hour presentation during a council work session that started at 5:30 p.m., Hopper was directed to write a proposed contract for the franchise, with all of the provisos he had suggested to be included, at least initially.

"When I write it, it covers the world," he said.

The consultant promised to have the contract written within three to four weeks.

Among items he suggested for the contract are quarterly reports on gross receipts, including uncollectibles; raising the

## Plant renovations, TDC plan profiled

City councilmen Tuesday night heard a Lubbock engineering company outline three capital improvement projects that were characterized as needing attention in the immediate to near future.

Two of these are required to upgrade existing city facilities and the third-laying utility lines to the Texas Department of Corrections unit—has been brought about with Scurry County being awarded the economic-boosting project.

All three combined will apparently cost several million dollars, the council was told.

The officials said the extension

of water and sewer services to the Texas Department of Corrections unit is not a factor in the urgency of the other two projects, other than offering an opportunity to accomplish all of them at once.

The city's wastewater treatment plant south of town off Ave. M was recently cited as needing substantial improvements by the Texas Water Commission and may require an expenditure of \$1.3 million to \$2 million, they were told.

An improvement called a solids contact clarifier has long been needed at the water treatment plant at M and 31st St. to increase its daily capacity from four to 10 million gallons a day, and that is projected to cost about \$600,000.

The cost of the utilities extension to the TDC has been tentatively projected at a little over \$2 million, but Osborn said that projection was purposely liberal and that the actual cost might be "substantially less than that."

Project manager Terry Bilderback of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper said an exact figure will be derived from the project design, on which he said the firm is already at work.

City Manager John Gayle said the city's problems with breaks in water lines, particularly at 37th St. and Ave. V, might be dealt with in the overall project, which the council indicated might be addressed with a loan application to the Texas Water Development Board.

Here's some of the information contained on Lone Star misinformation:

The Armadillo is really not a Texas native, but an emigrant from South America. It was long confined to the Valley, but there has been a slow migration northward. Traditionally, the armadillo is more often seen dead on the side of the road than alive.

Astroturf was made famous by Houston's Astrodome, but was not invented here. It was the product of Monsanto in St. Louis. The artificial grass was brought to Houston in 1966 where real

grass planted in the dome refused to grow. Astrodome management even once tried painting the dying grass a bright green, but that too failed.

To an early cowboy, the word Bible meant not only the Good Book but also a packet of cigarette papers. To a 19th Century Texas Ranger, it also meant the latest most-wanted list as well as the Good Book.

Big Tex, the 52-foot tall statue located at the entrance of the state fair in Dallas was not always a blue-jeaned, bearded cowboy. It was first a giant Santa Claus for the chamber of commerce in Kernes. In 1952, it was sold and made over as the state fair mascot. Big Tex wears a 75-gallon hat and size 70 boots.

## Soviet arms

ADN, East Germany's state-run news agency, said missiles, stationed in Waren, 20 miles west of Neubrandenburg, have been taken apart, put in crates and are ready for transport back to the Soviet Union.

# Abilene... Officers hit wrong residence

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — Department of Public Safety narcotics agents mistakenly raided a minister's house after counting from the wrong end of the block, officials say.

"I thought they were robbers," said Hector Sanchez, whose daughter, Noemi, woke him up early Sunday to say three men were in the backyard with crowbars and guns.

Sanchez, a minister at the Spanish Assembly of God Church, says he asked the men what they wanted and they told him to stop or be shot. They then followed him into the house, Sanchez said.

After questioning by Sanchez, the men identified themselves as law enforcement officials. "When he (one of the officers)

told me he was from the state police, I was relieved," Sanchez said. "But I was still frightened."

His wife and two daughters sat in the living room while the men went through the house and out front, where they ran into the rest of the raiding party — and learned of their mistake.

DPS Narcotics Sgt. Don Bush blames "human error" for the mistake.

The DPS had assigned men to two groups, Bush said. The first

group was supposed to enter the targeted home from the front, and the second group — the group that raided the Sanchez home — was supposed to guard the rear.

Because the houses in that neighborhood don't have numbers on the back, the group in the rear was instructed to count the number of houses from the corner and guard that home, Bush said.

The problem, he said, was that they started counting at the

wrong end of the block.

The Sanchez's dog started barking, apparently awakening the family, and Sanchez opened the back door, Bush said. When Sanchez attempted to go back inside, the officers followed him with their guns drawn, he said.

Two other Sanchez children — an 18-month-old boy and a 5-month-old boy — remained asleep during the raid. "I don't know how they slept through it all, with all the screaming and crying," Sanchez said.

A short time later, DPS officers and the Abilene Police Department's Special Services Bureau arrested seven people in a drug bust just down the block from where Sanchez lives.

## Later tax filings worries officials

WASHINGTON (AP) — If the trend by many taxpayers to delay filing their federal tax returns continues to spread, the federal government could feel the pinch — right in the pocketbook.

Lawrence B. Gibbs, commissioner of the Internal Revenue Service, notes that five years ago, 14 percent of all individual returns were filed in January and 34 percent in April. But last year, only 4 percent were filed during the first month and almost 40 per-

cent in April.

"If this trend were exacerbated by tax reform (the sweeping 1986 law), it could jam the system by slowing down processing and the issuance of refunds," Gibbs told a Senate Finance subcommittee Tuesday. "As a result, there could be a high price to pay."

"If we don't process returns within a 45-day period after the return due date the government must pay interest on refunds," he noted. That due date is April 15.

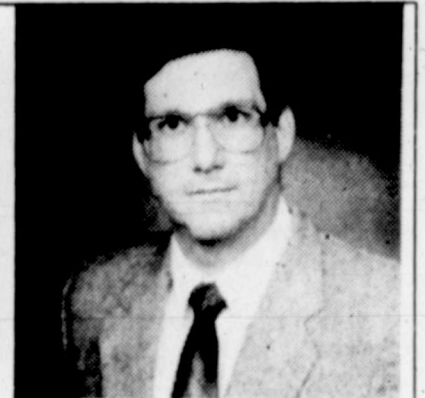
The IRS is not ready to push the panic button, even though 9.7 percent fewer returns have been filed this year than during the same period in 1987. Just a week ago, that gap was 17.5 percent.

"It does not appear that there is an easy solution to reversing the trend" toward late filing, Gibbs said. He cited surveys finding that the chief reasons for later filing include simply procrastinating and failure to receive some information necessary to prepare a return.

The IRS is not sure how the new tax law, with its lower rates, reduced deductions and higher personal exemptions, will affect the late-filing trend. Some returns are simpler under the new law; others are more complicated.

## Company settles in silver lawsuit

DALLAS (AP) — A financial institution accused along with the Hunt brothers of cornering the silver market in 1980 agreed to pay a Peruvian company \$3.65 million in an out-of-court settlement, a Minpeco S.A. attorney said.

AML Futures is the last of six financial institutions accused by Minpeco of participating in an illegal price manipulation scheme that drove up silver prices that led to substantial losses for the company, owned by the government of Peru.

The Hunts claim they did nothing illegal when they began pouring money into the silver market. From August 1979 to March 1980, the price of silver rose from \$9 per ounce to \$50 per ounce before the market collapsed to about \$10 per ounce.

Jury selection is scheduled to begin Thursday in the trial against the Hunts — Nelson Bunker, William Herbert and Lamar — before U.S. Federal District Judge Morris E. Lasker in New York. Opening arguments in the case are scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 24.

## Sometimes wrong turns out right

When today's deal was played in the Blue Ribbon Pairs, most South players arrived at six clubs. This contract will make whenever the trumps divide 2-2. (Declarer simply draws trumps and gives up a trick to the spade king by passing the jack.) Even when trumps are 3-1, the slam will make when the defender who started with three clubs also started with four spades, or more.

However, there is an element of luck in tournament play. On this deal, the best percentage play — playing two rounds of trump, giving up a spade trick and then attempting to throw away three diamond losers on the A-Q-10 of spades — does not work, since West will ruff in on the fourth spade. But a few declarers found a play that was less likely to succeed but that worked in this deal. After winning the heart ace, they ruffed a heart. Next they played a low diamond from dummy and put in the jack, losing the trick to West. Later they ruffed another heart and drew trumps. When they then played the ace of diamonds, the other diamond honor came crashing down, giving them the contract. The hapless defenders had no way to influence their destiny on this deal. If declarer misplayed the hand and made six clubs, they were simply out of luck. And what about the declarers who made 12 tricks by taking the wrong play? It was simply their lucky day.

# Neighbors express enthusiasm at super collider super hearing

WAXAHACHIE, Texas (AP) — More than 200 North Texans, led by Gov. Bill Clements, told U.S. Department of Energy officials the superconducting "super collider" fits right in with the state's frontier spirit, but a handful expressed concern about the "boom town" growth they moved here to escape.

Although little information was gathered Tuesday at two hearings about the project's effect on the area's environment, the leader of the presiding DOE team said they served their purpose.

"One of the factors that we do evaluate in trying to select a final site is community support," said Ira Adler, a deputy director in the department's energy research office. "So the extent that we're hearing both plus and minus that is something we'll factor into that criterion."

Gov. Bill Clements began the afternoon session with a ringing endorsement of the project, the first of many.

"We in Texas have a spirit that goes back to the early days. It is a frontier spirit exemplified in the super collider project. We want to be part of it," Clements said.

Waxahachie is one of seven sites under consideration for the super collider, a high-tech research laboratory where protons will crash at speeds faster than light in a 53-mile oval-shaped tunnel.

Scientists say the super collider will provide new depth in high energy physics research, the field that studies the fundamental nature of matter and energy. When completed in 1996,

the facility is expected to provide jobs for 2,500 people, with a \$270 million annual payroll.

More than 200 political and business leaders, clergy, teachers, students and residents took turns telling federal officials that Ellis County, south of Dallas, should be the site of the super collider.

"The bottom line of a project of this magnitude and standing in the country is jobs," said George Singleton, president of Citizens National Bank of Waxahachie. "That's something all of us can relate to very, very sincerely."

Barney Taylor, president of the Waxahachie Chamber of Commerce, said that county leaders started discussing ways to land the project soon after it was announced in January 1987.

"In a matter of days it was decided by (county) leaders that this is something that we should go after," Taylor said. "Suddenly the folks in Waxahachie, Ennis, Maypearl and Midlothian were talking about each other in something less than four letter words."

"You have given us something that everyone in this area can get

behind and we finally found something to do with the white chalk (underground) besides chuck it at chickens," he said.

The racetrack-like tunnel containing the super colliding magnets would be constructed in the Austin chalk base at least 30 feet below prairie land about 30 miles south of Dallas.

Although the mood was almost unanimously supportive, Debbie Timmermann of rural Maypearl said some residents privately fear the rapid growth the project will bring.

"We're not against the super collider itself," said Mrs. Timmermann, a Waxahachie school teacher who, with her husband Charles, would be displaced from their acreage by the project's 8,000 acre campus.

## U.S. wins medal; settles for bronze

CALGARY, Alberta (AP) - A perky, flawless ballet on ice by a pony-tailed Soviet sprite brightened a night of stumbling performances as a U.S. duo blew a chance at silver and settled for bronze, the first American medal of the Winter Games.

Ekaterina Gordeeva, a lithe little 16-year-old, joined with powerful, towering Sergei Grinkov in a perfect union of grace and acrobatics that captured the pairs figure skating gold in Tuesday's only medal event.

Five golds are up for grabs today, when "Flying Finn" Matti Nykanen pursues a spot in Olympic history in the 90-meter team ski jump. Swiss skier Pirmin Zurbriggen goes for his second victory and medals are awarded in three other sports.

Nykanen, who won the 70-meter jump on Sunday, is bidding to become the first ever to garner two golds in jumping events, and he has the chance to make it three in the 90-meter individual jump Saturday.

Zurbriggen, who won the classic downhill race Monday, carries the lead halfway through the combined Alpine event after

## NCAA peeks at SMU again

DALLAS (AP) - Investigators from the National Collegiate Athletic Association have interviewed former Southern Methodist University athletes about possible rules violations involving the school's basketball and track programs, the Dallas Times Herald reported today.

SMU athletic director Doug Single confirmed Tuesday that

the NCAA is following up on allegations resulting from a seven-month study of SMU athletics by a private investigative firm hired by the university, the newspaper reported in a copyright story.

The NCAA has not indicated which sports are under investigation, but a source close to the inquiry said Tuesday night that the private investigators' report focused on the men's basketball

and track programs, according to the newspaper.

NCAA director of enforcement David Berst also confirmed Tuesday that the NCAA is looking into SMU's report and is working to corroborate the university's information while developing information from sources outside the private investigation.

## Texas debates set to begin

DALLAS (AP) — The first major event of the "Super Tuesday" campaign gets under way this week at the Texas Debates as candidates from both parties converge on Dallas in their bids to capture March 8's crown jewel.

Texas, which leads the 20 Super Tuesday states with 197 Democratic and 111 Republican delegates, is a crucial link for candidates surviving the New Hampshire primary.

"Texas is the crown jewel in this because we are the largest," said state Democratic Party Chairman Bob Slagle of Sherman.

More than one-third of the delegates to both parties' nominating conventions will be picked in a single day on Super Tuesday, March 8.

The debates, to be aired nationally on the Public Broadcasting System from Southern Methodist University's McFarlin Auditorium, start Thursday at 8 p.m. CST with the Democratic candidates. The GOP hopefuls debate the following night.

Sen. Albert Gore Jr., a Tennessee Democrat who calls Southern states key to a presidential win, and Vice President George Bush, a Republican candidate who maintains a Houston address, say they welcome the chance to debate

here as campaigning moves from New Hampshire.

Economic issues in the Southwest, including unemployment and the energy industry, will likely take center stage in the debates.

Bush, a former congressman from Houston, well understands important Texas issues like energy and immigration policy and the business climate, said Kevin Moomaw, his Texas political director in Austin.

"Certainly, with a 40-year association in this state, and with George Jr. from Midland, he understands what's going on down here," Moomaw said. Kansas Sen. "Bob Dole bad-mouthed the vice president in Iowa, but hasn't in New Hampshire and I doubt he will come down here to Texas and bad-mouth him."

Bush, who was born in Connecticut, still claims Houston as his home.

Presidential candidates with Southern ties may have the edge in the debates, coming only two days after Tuesday's New Hampshire primary, in which Bush powered past Dole in the Republican race while Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis won handily on the Democratic side.

With almost all of the precincts reporting, Bush had 38 percent of

the GOP vote to 29 percent for Dole. New York Rep. Jack Kemp narrowly defeated former Delaware Gov. Pete du Pont and religious broadcaster Pat Robertson in the third-place competition to emerge as a conservative alternative to the front-runners.

Dukakis won 36 percent of the vote. In distant second place was Missouri Rep. Richard Gephardt with 20 percent, and Illinois Sen. Paul Simon was third with 17 percent.

Gore, who finished in fifth place with about 7 percent of the Democratic vote, de-emphasized the New Hampshire primary and Iowa caucusing in his strategy.

"He has campaigned harder in Texas. He has focused his campaign on the Super Tuesday states," said Tom Jurkovich, Texas coordinator for the Gore campaign in Austin.

"With 20 states and about 40 percent of the delegates chosen on that day, it made sense to focus his efforts down here," he said. "Being from the region gives him an understanding of the people and concerns. That gives him a certain edge."

Gore was dead last in Iowa after pulling his campaign out of that state last year.

# Hollywood announces Oscar nominations

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — "The Last Emperor," the tragic saga of China's boy emperor, captured top honors with nine nominations today for the 60th Motion Picture Academy Awards.

It was followed by seven nominations for "Broadcast News," the romantic comedy of life in a network news bureau.

Following those two films, with six nominations each, were "Empire of the Sun," the Japanese invasion of China as seen through a boy's eyes; "Fatal Attraction," the chiller of a woman's revenge against a spurning lover, and "Moonstruck," the comedy of love in a volatile Italian-American family.

All four except Steven Spielberg's "Empire of the Sun," were nominated as best picture. The fifth nominee was John Boorman's "Hope and Glory."

Two-time winner Jack Nicholson won his ninth nomination as the 1930s bum in "Ironweed," and Robin Williams

was nominated for best actor with his role as the antic disc jockey in "Good Morning Vietnam."

Also nominated: Michael Douglas, "Wall Street"; William Hurt, "Broadcast News"; and Marcello Mastroianni, "Dark Eyes."

Another double Oscar winner, Meryl Streep, won her seventh nomination for "Ironweed." Also in the best actress race: Cher, for "Moonstruck"; Glenn Close, "Fatal Attraction"; Holly Hunter, "Broadcast News"; and Sally Kirkland for "Anna."

Nominees for supporting actor were Albert Brooks, "Broadcast News"; Sean Connery, "The Untouchables"; Morgan Freeman, "Street Smart"; Vincent Gardenia, "Moonstruck"; and Denzel Washington, "Cry Freedom."

All are first-time nominees except Gardenia, named for "Bang the Drum Slowly," in 1973.

All the supporting actresses were nominated for the first

time: Norma Aleandro, "Gaby - A True Story"; Anne Archer, "Fatal Attraction"; Olympia Dukakis, "Moonstruck"; Anne Ramsey, "Throw Momma From The Train"; Ann Sothern, "The Whales Of August."

Although his "Empire of the Sun" earned six nominations, the Academy again snubbed Spielberg as director. Three years ago, the Academy did not nominate him for best director with "The Color Purple," but he won the Directors Guild award for the movie.

The nominees for best direction were Adrian Lyne for "Fatal Attraction"; John Boorman for "Hope and Glory"; Bernardo Bertolucci, "The Last Emperor"; Norman Jewison, "Moonstruck"; Lasse Hallstrom, "My Life As A Dog."

Another surprise omission was James L. Brooks for his direction of "Broadcast News."

As expected, Louis Malle's remembrance of his wartime childhood, "Au Revoir Les Enfants," was nominated as France's entry for best foreign language film. The other nominees: "Babette's Feast"

(Denmark); "Course Completed" (Spain); "The Family" (Italy); "Pathfinder" (Norway).

Best original screenplay nominations went to Malle for "Au Revoir Les Enfants"; Brooks, "Broadcast News"; John Patrick Shanley, "Moonstruck"; and Woody Allen, "Radio Days."

For best screenplay adaptation, nominees included Tony Huston for "The Dead"; James Dearden, "Fatal Attraction"; Stanley Kubrick, Michael Herr, and Gustav Hasford, "Full Metal Jacket"; Mark Peploe and Bertolucci.

fee the city will collect from 3 to 5 percent; test results provided to the city on broadcast performance standards; demanding that customers be provided lock-boxes on request to block out objectionable channels; and providing for a 1/30th reduction in customers' bills for every 24 hours that the service is off because of malfunctions.

Hopper said that as a member of the Austin Cable Commission, he pushed for more detailed financial reports from the cable company in that city and discovered that \$350,000 in uncollectible accounts had not been included in a year's gross receipts.

Although rate regulation is prevented by current Federal Communications Commission rules, the franchise should give the city the authority to set rates in the event that such powers are restored by the FCC during the franchise period, he said.

The ordinance approving the sale was approved on a first reading earlier this month, and the franchise contract, subject to negotiation, will have to be agreed to and included in the ordinance for the second reading, councilmen indicated.

don't know how they got away, if somebody picked them up or what."

The men who fled the plane from a landing strip about five miles west of Gail are believed to be from Austin. The DPS has been circulating their names among law enforcement agencies.

The arrests of the other two men were the result of a continuing DPS-U.S. Customs investigation, officials say.

Borden County Sheriff Norman (Slick) Sneed was quoted as saying Tuesday he believed the airstrip had been used before by planes carrying marijuana.

Sneed speculated the plane returned to Borden County to retrieve seats which had been removed from it earlier.

Sneed said he believed the pilot would fly from Austin to Lamesa, where the plane would be refueled. They would then land at the rural airstrip to remove plane seats to allow for greater storage space, he speculated.

Scurry County deputies were assisting in the continuing investigation of the incident Wednesday morning.

DPS Sgt. Bob Porter said customs officials and an Austin DPS agent followed the plane from Mexico to a small airstrip at Sportsman World, a housing development on the south side of Possum Kingdom Lake.

He said the pursuit plane, which was unable to land, circled away from the area and notified agents who had been waiting on the ground. Two men loaded 40 large bundles from the KingAir aircraft into a large four-horse trailer hitched to a pickup and left the scene in separate vehicles, Porter said.

Police chased the two men for about 15 miles before arresting them and confiscating the marijuana, valued at about \$1.2 million, Porter said.

## Proposed merger between tire companies announced

CHICAGO (AP) — A proposed merger of the tire-making divisions of Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. and Tokyo-based Bridgestone Corp. would give a Japanese company a significant stake in a major U.S. industry.

Firestone, fifth in worldwide tire sales in 1986, announced Tuesday the plan to merge its tire business with No. 3 Bridgestone.

Creation of the joint venture, of which Bridgestone would own about 75 percent, is expected to generate more than \$1 billion in

cash for Firestone, the company says.

Based on 1986 tire sales figures, the most recent available, of \$2.3 billion for Firestone and about \$3.1 billion for Bridgestone, the proposed Firestone Tire Co. would rank third behind Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. of the United States and Michelin of France.

More important, the joint venture, with majority ownership by Bridgestone, would give the Japanese company a share of the

U.S. original-equipment tire market, or the tires installed on new vehicles, says Ed Noga, editor of the industry trade journal Rubber & Plastics News. Chicago-based Firestone has been successful in obtaining original-equipment contracts.

"Bridgestone is an aggressive company that wants to grow in the United States, and they wanted to get access to the original-equipment market," Noga said in a telephone interview from Akron, Ohio, where Firestone's tire division is based.

Bridgestone held a 2 percent share of the U.S. replacement passenger tire market last year and had a 7 percent share of the U.S. replacement truck tire market, according to Modern Tire Journal, an industry publication.

## Aging reactor to be mothballed

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — After months of debate, the U.S. Energy Department has decided not to restart the flawed and aging N Reactor, one of four reactors supplying the U.S. nuclear arsenal with bomb-grade plutonium.

The N reactor has been closed since January 1987 for about \$70 million worth of safety improvements prompted by the nuclear disaster that killed 31 people at the similarly designed Soviet nuclear plant at Chernobyl.

The N Reactor, operated for the Energy Department by Westinghouse Inc., shares several design characteristics with the Chernobyl plant, including graphite in the reactor core to moderate nuclear fission and lack of a containment dome.

U.S. officials say the N Reactor, operated for the Energy Department by Westinghouse Inc., was considerably safer than the one at Chernobyl.

The fate of the reactor, the last

of nine plutonium producers that had operated at Hanford since 1944, had been mired in controversy. Proponents said the nation needed the plutonium while opponents contended it did not, and that the reactor was unsafe.

The "cold standby" status will begin next year shortly after the safety improvements are completed and tested. The reactor could be restarted, but that would take up to three years, Lawrence said.

Energy Secretary John Herrington announced Tuesday the reactor at the Hanford nuclear reservation will be placed on "cold standby" status, forcing about 2,600 workers to be laid off in the next two years.

"This decision signals the end of the plutonium production mission at the Hanford site," said Mike Lawrence, Hanford operations manager for the Energy Department.

Plans for the mothballing of the reactor will be included in the Reagan administration's proposed budget that will be sent to Congress Thursday.

A report prepared last year for the Energy Department projected that a gradual phase-out of plutonium-producing operations at Hanford by 1996 would result in the loss of more than 13,800 jobs in the state.

Gov. Booth Gardner and members of the state's congressional delegation pledged to seek a way to cushion the economic shock.

But Sen. Dan Evans, R-Wash., said, "Frankly, the most likely type of aid to come will be unemployment benefits."

Herrington said the decision to mothball the reactor was based on a secret Department of Defense review of the nation's future need for plutonium, a key ingredient in nuclear weapons.

The Energy Department said demand for plutonium could be met by three reactors at the Savannah River Plant near Aiken, S.C., and through plutonium recovery from nuclear weapons retired as a result of the recent U.S.-Soviet treaty.

The Savannah River reactors are running at 50 percent power because of safety concerns.

### Allergy may cause throat symptoms

DEAR DR. GOTT: For about nine months I've been plagued with numerous throat problems: extreme dryness to excessive salivation, a devastating tickling, a lump or bulging feeling. I have no difficulty swallowing and my voice is the same. Can emotions cause these symptoms or should I see an allergist?

DEAR READER: You seem to be describing the consequences of post-nasal drip, an overproduction of mucus that drains down the back of your throat.

It's true that emotional stress can cause the symptoms you describe, but, in my opinion, you more likely have an allergy or a reaction to some irritant, such as tobacco smoke, in the air you breathe. I'd start with either an allergist or an ear, nose and throat specialist.

If no physical basis for your problem can be identified, you may wish to address the emotional issues. In my opinion, your symptoms are physical until proven otherwise.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 16 and have been getting bowlegged. Do I have rickets?

DEAR READER: If your legs are truly bowing as you grow, you should be examined by a doctor to find out why. Rickets, bone softening caused by lack of vitamin D, is unusual in this country because most people eat balanced diets, and many foods, such as milk and grain products, are fortified with vitamin D. Nonetheless, rickets has to be considered in any growing youngster with abnormal bone development. A doctor can perform the

necessary tests and advise you.

DEAR DR. GOTT: In a few weeks, I'm having a hysterectomy because of fibroid tumors. My gynecologist suggested that I have my breasts reduced at the same time (I'm very heavy-breasted and have back and shoulder pain). Would I be able to cope with the pain of both surgeries at the same time?

DEAR READER: I don't like to second-guess gynecologists, but I believe that you should approach your problems separately. Hysterectomy is major surgery and, as such, carries with it certain risks, such as infection. So does breast reduction which, incidentally, should be performed by a qualified plastic surgeon.

I think that you would feel more comfortable approaching a second operation after you have recovered from the first. Nevertheless, you may be one of the unusual women who can cope with a double procedure. Ask your gynecologist to meet with the plastic surgeon, reach a consensus and explain the pros and cons to you. Then you will be in a more secure position to make an educated choice.
