One member of the Texas Public Finance Authority voted against the bond sale, noting he is concerned because plans for some of the prisons have not been reviewed by attorneys representing prisoners in a federal lawsuit against the state. Casting the dissenting vote was Gerald

In addition, the state board acknowledged that the State of Texas had been penalized by the bond market's uncertainty over the Texas economy.

KILGORE. Texas (AP) Gregg County Sheriff Bobby Weaver has predicted there may be some arrests within the next few weeks in the execution-style slayings of five people who were abducted in 1983 from a Kilgore restaurant.

The victims were abducted from the Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurant in this East Texas town Sept. 23, 1983, and taken to a rural . area of adjoining Rusk County where they were shot to death.

The viotims each had been shot in the head as they lay face down beside a dirt road about 18 miles south of Kilgore. The victims' arms were folded and the hands of some were clasped across their eyes, police said.

Phony juice

NEW YORK (AP) - Two former executives of the Beech-Nut Nutritional Corp. face substantial prison terms and fines after being convicted of selling flavored sugar water labeled as apple juice for babies.

Former Beech-Nut president Neils L. Hoyvald and a former vice president, John F. Lavery, were charged with hundreds of violations of federal food and drug laws along with conspiracy and mail fraud.

Lavery was convicted Wednesday of all 448 counts in the indictment, said federal prosecutor Thomas

Hoyvald was found guilty on 351 counts of violating federal food and drug laws; the jury, however, could not reach a verdict on about 80 other counts against him.



Inmates take over 12 dormitories

NEW YORK (AP) - The takeover of 12 dormitorites by an estimated 550 inmates at a maximum-security jail, which injured eight people and did widespread damage, ended today

after negotiations and the use of tear gas, authorities said.

The riot was apparently caused by anger over conditions at the Rikers Island jail, said city corrections department spokeswoman Ruby Ryles. A man identifying himself as an inmate said prisoners were beaten

Wednesday.

The inmates took over the dormitories around midnight, using beds and other furniture to barricade themselves inside the Anna M. Cross Center, the city's maximum-security jail, she said.

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

tion to this rule, as are sacrifice bids, which are made to prevent the opponents from playing a contract likely to make. Furthermore, most competent partnerships have the understanding that when they are battling the opponents for a part-score, bidding one more of the agreed trump suit is not a serious game invitation. Instead, it is simply trying to either buy the contract or get those nasty opponents

Today West's bidding follows this strategy. After opener East raised West's hearts over North's two-diamond overcall, South bid two spades. West had little defense against two spades, and certainly no interest in bidding game. However, he still bid three hearts. If he had more strength and wished to invite a game, he would do so by manufacturing a forcing bid, which would give East the option of bidding a game with a little extra. West's three-heart bid had a good effect. When North now bid three spades, that sounded like simple competition, so South did not seriously consider bidding more. Since the cards sit well for North-South (diamonds are 2-2), 10 tricks are easy in spades. The game might be bid if West passes over two spades, since now a free raise to Common sense dictates that the three spades from North would invite

Liver transplants on the increase

ROCKVILLE, Md. (AP) Liver transplantation has proliferated during the past four years from an experimental procedure performed at only a few centers in the world to an expected 1,000 in the United States in 1987, says Internal Medicine

The medical journal, noting the first liver transplant in humans was performed in 1963, reports that before 1981 not more than 25 were performed in the U.S. Now there are more than 40 transplant centers in the nation expected to perform the 1,000 operations.

The publication lists reasons for the rapid change in status as including the introduction of new drugs, improvements in surgical techniques and medical management, and acceptance of patients earlier in the course of their

Previously, patients more than 55 years old were not accepted for transplants, but recently patients as old as 78 have had successful transplants.



WASHINGTON (AP) - An inventor who claims he has devised a machine that produces more energy than it uses says he will appeal a judge's refusal to force the government to give him a patent for his invention.

"I am pleased the judge has finally ruled because I am counting on getting up to the higher court," Joseph W. Newman said Wednesday after U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson rejected his lawsuit against the U.S. Patent and Trademark Of-

It's noisy but not fatal

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor says I have borborygmus. Is this fatal? He won't tell me what it is.

DEAR READER: Borborygmus is a fancy \$64 word that simply means gas and rumbling. Excessive intestinal movement often causes gurgling and tinkling that are a harmless embarrassment. Occasionally, these noises signify intestinal obstruction, but the sounds usually are of no consequence. Borborygmus is onomatopoeia, a word formed by its sound, like "buzz" and "bang."

DEAR DR. GOTT: I see squiggly lines when I open my eyes. I work at CRTs all day. Ophthalmologists aren't much help.


DEAR READER: Medical studies have repeatedly failed to show that eye damage results from computer terminal screens. However, eye strain is a common consequence of this occupation. This can produce headache and visual difficulties that are temporary. Some experts recommend that computer-terminal operators rest their eyes periodically by looking away from the screens for several minutes every hour. If ophthalmologists have examined

you and concluded that your eyes are normal, I suggest that you experiment with methods - such as taking frequent breaks from your screen to find a way to reduce your eyestrain without the necessity of changing

DEAR READER: Pancreatitis-(inflammation of the pancreas) has many causes, including injury by alcohol or drugs, infection, pseudocysts (sores) in the gland or blockage of the duct through which the pancreatic digestive enzymes are secreted into the

Some cures are relatively easy: for example, discontinuation of alcohol. Other cures involve surgery, either to remove inflamed portions of the gland, remove stones or scar tissue from the duct or repair the normal pancreatic drainage.

I cannot answer your question without first knowing the cause of your repeated attacks of pancreatitis and abdominal pain. In my opinion, you need a thorough evaluation by a gastroenterologist, a specialist in diseases of the digestive tract. After appropriate testing, such a physician may be able more precisely to diagnose the cause of your condition. Then he or she may specific curative


