## More candidates surface at deadline

The final afternoon to file as a candidate for Snyder-based boards produced four new office seekers and the first race where an incumbent on any of the three governing bodies is challenged.

That race will involve place 6 on the Western Texas College board, a seat now held by R.C. Patton, a WTC trustee since 1971. Filed for the WTC post is Billy Sam Houston, 52, a county farmer-rancher.

New candidates surfaced also for the Snyder school board and city council—Jerry House at the school and, for the council,

Vernest Tippens and Evelyn J. Malone.

With filing now complete, there are two contested races at WTC, with three candidates seeking place 5 and two seeking place 6; two contested races for the school board, with two candidates seeking place 3 and three candidates seeking place 5; and two contested races for the city council, with two candidates each seeking place 1 and place 3.

Houston, newly filed for WTC's place 6, is originally from Scurry County and returned here some 15 years ago, residing in the col-

lege district since that time.

For the school board, House filed for single member district place 5. He farms north of Snyder and has been a life-long resident of the area he seeks to represent, which includes all rural areas of the school district.

House, 43, has previously been a candidate for county government, running for the post of Pct. 2 commissioner.

He faces two candidates for the place 5 school board seat, Lesa Oudt and Mrs. Wayland (Ann) Walton. The board post is for an unexpired term vacated with the

job transfer of Ben Wilcox.

In the city council filings, both Tippens and Malone were plaintiffs in the lawsuit first filed in October of 1985 which ultimately resulted in the change of both the city and school boards to single member district representation.

Tippens, 56, filed for the place 1 seat now held by Fred Castillo, who did not seek re-election. She resides at 810 33rd St. and has been a resident of the city some 53 years. She is employed as a custodial worker at Western Texas College.

Also seeking the place 1 seat is

Walter E. Cox.

The place 3 seat is sought by Malone, who was a city council candidate previously in the Aug. 30, 1986 ballot which ushered in the single member district concept for the council.

The place is now held by Mike Post, who has indicated he will not run again. Also announced for it is Joe Coronado.

Malone, 40, has lived in Snyder 29½ years and in the area of town she seeks to represent five years. She is a teacher employed with the Colorado City school district.

## Water flowing again

### Repairs finished on schedule here

After being shutoff around 11 p.m. Tuesday, the water supply from Lake J.B. Thomas was flowing once again into the Snyder water treatment plant by 7:30 p.m. Wednesday.

The 20-hour plus "down time" allowed for the connection of a new rapid mix basin at the water treatment plant.

The connection itself was completed by 3 p.m. Wednesday, at which time crews poured "concrete thrust blocks" to brace the connections.

The cement was allowed to cure before officials with the Colorado River Municipal Water District were directed to again open the valve which feeds water to Snyder from the lake.

During the day Wednesday, Snyder water customers had been asked to cutback on non-essential water uses.

City Engineer Don Osborn said all of the city's overhead storage tanks were full Thursday morning and that the city had more

### Level charge

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — A Honduran military official said about 300 Sandinista soldiers entered the same Honduran border region where Nicaraguan troops last week fought Contra rebels.

"We don't know the purpose of this new entry and violation of our country, but the situation is being studied by the high command," the Honduran military official said of Wednesday's reported incursion.

## Trial ongoing after motion for mistrial

The aggravated kidnapping trial of defendant Grady Davis, 25, was continuing in 132nd District Court Thursday with a witness for the state quoting from an earlier trial in which a co-defendant of Davis was convicted for 25 years.

One statement during that testimony prompted defense attorney Pete Greene to move for a mistrial, a comment that characterized Davis as someone who "hated blacks."

District Judge Gene Dulaney denied the motion and allowed Armstrong to continue with testimony from the trial of Larry Dan Beard.

County Deputy Darren Jackson took the witness stand to read Beard's lines from a transcript of his trial here in January.

The 132nd District Court trial continued into its fourth day with Armstrong introducing further testimony from the January trial that Beard went to the front porch of the 3009 Ave. K home of Lafayette Griffin, who is black, in the early evening of Oct. 27.

Testimony was that the third defendant in the case, John Randall "Randy" Locknane, then came to the porch with a pistol and

## Hospital staffing issue due administrative plan tonight

A "plan of action" related to a Cogdell Memorial staff analysis report first offered to board members March 11 is scheduled to be unveiled at a hospital board meeting Thursday.

That analysis indicated that when compared to industry-wide patient-staff ratios, Cogdell Memorial currently has too many "fulltime-equivalent" employees and that this overage may be costing the facility near \$590,000 annually.

These figures were based on a formula which compares the number of fulltime-equivalent employees (FTE) to the number

of patients.

It was noted the nationwide average using this formula is 3.04 FTE staff members for every occupied bed. In rural hospitals like Cogdell, this ratio rises to 4 staffers per patient.

At the March 11 meeting, it was noted the local hospital is currently admitting an average of 29 patients per day.

Assuming the greater rural hospital ratio, this indicates Cogdell should have some 116 FTE staffers. Hochwall estimated the current number of FTE staffers—a composite figure rather than an actual count of

fulltime employees—at 157.

Using this formula as a basis, he estimated Cogdell was depleting its net annual income some \$147,470 for every 10 FTE employees it had in excess. This estimate was based on current hourly wages at Cogdell.

Assuming this overage is 40 staffers, this figures in excess of one-half million dollars a year. The exact figure is \$589,880.

The report has already produced its share of controversy as a full page ad was taken out in Wednesday's SDN by "concern-

## Additions needed for farm 'startup' approved at WTC

Startup operations for the Western Texas College farm, at an estimated expense of some \$60,000, were agreed to Wednesday by board members meeting in special session.

Trustees authorized seeking bids for fencing, the construction of three structures related to a pig operation and equipment to upgrade water facilities at the site.

Dr. Harry Krenek, WTC president, said Thursday these bids should be ready for consideration at the regular April meeting.

The expense, which won't be finalized until bids are received, will come from contingency

funds at the college.

The items approved Wednesday are considered "first year" plans for the farm. The committee which recommended these has devised also a three-year plan for the operation. Additional plans at the farm are expected to be considered annually as budget item requests.

Members of the farm planning committee included trustees Bill Wilson, Edwin Parks and Howard Sterling plus instructors Jim Judah and Bob Doty and business manager Gay Hickman.

Plans approved Wednesday will get the facility "ready to

## Horsemen want off-track betting, according to report

AUSTIN (AP) — Anti-gambling leaders plan to fight a proposal by horsemen to lobby legislators next year for a law allowing off-track betting on pari-mutuel races and televised simulcasting of races across the state.

The Austin American-Statesman reported Wednesday that backers of the idea say the proposals would boost state revenues, purses and proceeds for tracks from gambling.

"The life and salvation of racing is simulcasting and off-track

betting," said Loyd Miles of Fort Worth, regional chairman of the new Texas division of the Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association.

Off-track betting would allow placing of wagers at locations other than tracks. Simulcasting allows bettors at various tracks to bet on major races at other tracks as they are televised.

Sue Cox, leader of the anti-gambling Texans Who Care which opposed last year's horse and dog racing referendum, said she had thought it would be at least two years before racing backers proposed off-track betting in Texas.

"I am truly shocked. I thought they would get up and running before they moved to simulcasting and off-track betting," Ms. Cox said.

"We would oppose any off-track betting because it spreads gambling from just a few counties to virtually every county in the state. It brings the potential of crime and corruption close to

people's neighborhoods," she said.

Pari-mutuel wagering on horse and dog races was approved on a local-option basis by voters in November. The still-organizing State Racing Commission has yet to write regulations or approve tracks. Races aren't expected before autumn, experts say.

Miles told the American-Statesman that the horsemen's association in Texas likely would propose for off-track betting that six percent of all wagers at such facilities go to purses for owners of successful horses. One reason the group wants bigger purses is so the additional money can be used to help fund medical and pension programs for horsemen.

The state and track owners also would collect a portion of the off-track betting proceeds under the proposal, Miles said.

According to Miles' simulcasting proposal, the state would get five percent and bettors 82 percent. The host track would get 50 percent of the remaining money and the rest would be split evenly between purses and tracks receiving the broadcast.

House Speaker Pro Tem Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, an author of the racing law, said both concepts were prohibited by that legislation. He said there wopplawmakers would pprove off-track betting because the sport is easier to regulate without it.

"It's dead. DOA," Berlanga said of off-track betting. "We don't want it. That's why we had (the prohibition) in the legislation when we passed it."



## DR. GOTT Find cause of eczema

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife has had bad eczema of her entire body for 12 years. Her skin is badly damaged from the itching. She is reluctant to take prednisone because of the side effects, but the doctors offer no other cure.

DEAR READER: Eczema is a type of dermatitis marked by inflammation, redness, oozing, crusting, scaling and itchiness of the skin. Some eczema is due to allergies or hypersensitivity to certain substances, such as chemicals, animal dander, medications and industrial solvents. Sunlight can trigger eczema.

Other patients appear to have endogenous eczema, a dermatitis caused by factors within the body. Often the cause is obscure, as in atopic dermatitis, nummular dermatitis and seborrheic dermatitis, various similar skin eruptions. There may be an inherited or genetic predisposition.

Because the cause of the disease may be unknown, often all doctors can do is try to treat the symptoms. Oils, lotions and cortisone-containing medicines may be useful. Patients who are reacting to a variety of drugs can develop skin lesions identical to eczema. Any medicine has the potential for causing dermatitis in a susceptible individual. In addition, some diseases, such as inborn errors of metabolism and nutritional deficiency, are associated with eczema.

To get at the cause of her skin irritation, your wife needs a thorough medical evaluation to identify any disease, compound, pollutant or drug that could be causing her eczema. An allergy investigation and scrupulous environmental history may be necessary. Before assuming that her eczema is "idiopathic" (without obvious cause), your wife should be tested to see if she is reacting to a specific factor. Prednisone, a form of cortisone, may be appropriate to use in her case as a temporary measure until the basis of her skin reaction can be discovered.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My middle finger will bend, but I can't straighten it. Then it jerks — painfully — straight after a minute or two. What causes this?

DEAR READER: This is a trigger-finger. It is due to a laxity of the supporting structures of the joint, leading to recurrent and partial dislocation. Trigger-finger can be treated, under the supervision of an orthopedic surgeon, by exercises or injections. Surgery, to restore proper joint mechanics, is seldom necessary.

## Dean of unaccredited law school resigns his position

EDINBURG, Texas (AP) — The dean of the state's only law school south of San Antonio resigned, saying he is giving up his fight to get the unaccredited school affiliated with Pan American University.

"I think something has to drastically change, and if I'm the problem, I'm stepping down," Michael De Moss said Wednesday, after announcing he would quit at the end of this semester as dean of the Reynaldo Garza School of Law.

De Moss' resignation followed a Pan American regent's meeting in which regents shelved discussion on working toward affiliation with the law school, a requirement for accreditation.

The 46-year-old dean brought a group of judges and elected officials to speak to the regents on the law school's behalf.

But after a majority of the regents questioned how the law school resolution and a host of other items ended up on what was designed to be a limited agenda, the board voted to discuss only issues left over from last month's meeting.

"I resign and I'm sad that we couldn't at least talk about it today," De Moss told the regents.

State Rep. Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen, said he thinks De Moss' resignation could help the Garza school's chances of affiliating

with the university, because there is animosity between some of the regents and the dean.

"Whatever mistakes were made in the past, he has been blamed for them," Hinojosa said after the meeting. The lawmaker went to the meeting in support of De Moss' school.

The school needs affiliation with the university for accreditation with the American Bar Association.

Many of the students at the school, which opened in 1984, say they would not have been able to afford to study law outside of the lower Rio Grande Valley.

ABA accreditation is a prerequisite for students to take the state bar exam to qualify them to practice law in the state.

of milking extra tricks is to run a long suit and hope the opponents discard foolishly.

Willy Nilly was declarer in today's three no-trump contract. After winning West's lead of the spade jack with dummy's queen, Willy couldn't wait to run that long club suit. His first two discards were the seven and nine of diamonds, then finally a low spade. As you might imagine, East did not throw two diamonds away, nor did he discard two hearts. Instead he let go one card from each red suit, and then his other spade. Willy was able to take only his top cards in the red suits before giving up the last two tricks to the opposition.

Poor Willy was afflicted by a little table blindness, a malady that causes bridge players to sometimes miss obvious plays. When dummy's queen of spades holds the first trick, declarer risks nothing if he simply takes a heart finesse to his jack. If West wins, he cannot effectively attack spades, since South holds the king protected. And when East holds the heart queen, declarer has 12 tricks. He can cash the heart king and then run that long club suit plus the ace of hearts to see if someone can be cajoled into throwing away his diamond guard.

use" for next fall, Krenek noted.

The 271-acre farm, located some six miles from WTC southwest of Snyder, will be utilized by approximately 52 agri-business majors now enrolled at WTC. Krenek called it one of the stronger academic majors currently on campus.

The plans approved Wednesday include fencing off the farm at an estimated expense of some \$1,600.

In addition, three buildings will be constructed for an existing swine operation. The cost of all three is estimated in the range of \$46,800.

Facilities to be built will include a farrowing house, a finishing house and sow and boar pens.

Also approved was the laying of water lines to the pig pens and an underground pump for one of three water sources on the property.

The college has also purchased a surplus bulldozer which has been used to dig stock tanks and for brush control at the farm.

Future plans include the addition of a sheep operation at the site.

At Wednesday's meeting, the board took no action regarding the need to find a new carrier for a public employee's honesty bond for WTC staffers.

The previous carrier no longer offers this service, Krenek said. He said this will likely be an action item at the April meeting.

Trustees conducted also a 30-minute executive session to discuss personnel, but took no action after coming back into open session.

## Wood receives rape sentence

David Leonard Wood, who has been questioned in the deaths of the women, was convicted last week by a state district court jury of raping a woman last summer. The attack took place near the area where five bodies were unearthed last fall. A sixth body was discovered last week.

All the bodies were found within a half-mile of one another in the desert near the outskirts of northeast El Paso.

Wood, sentenced Wednesday, could have received a maximum sentence of life in prison because it was his fourth conviction for a sex offense. He also was fined \$10,000.

Wood's case received considerable publicity in the El Paso area. At a change of venue hearing last January, an El Paso police detective testified that Wood was one of several suspects in the desert deaths.

## Big Spring city manager resigns amid problems

**BIG SPRING, Texas (AP)** — After being questioned by City Council members about personal financial troubles that included a lawsuit, default judgment and home foreclosure, Mack Wofford stepped down as city manager.

Wofford announced his resignation Wednesday amid controversy surrounding his financial difficulties.

Councilman Gary Don Carey said that Wofford offered to resign from his position "because we kept questioning and the answers weren't satisfactory."

"He couldn't give us verification on things we heard and things that had been brought down," Carey said.

Wofford was named in a lawsuit filed March 1 in 118th District Court by State National Bank, seeking \$10,225.70 and related costs. The suit contends Wofford made a single \$166.87 payment on the principal. The suit seeks \$10,058.83, plus interest, attorney's fees and legal costs.

Questions also arose concerning the existence of collateral for the loan.

Court records indicate that money "related to contract fulfillment" with the city of Wheeler was pledged by Wofford as collateral. But Wheeler officials denied any such contract with Wofford.

Gray County District Court in Pampa has ordered Wofford to pay \$40,132.45 in connection with

his default on a promissory note with the Citizen's Bank and Trust Company in Pampa.

The court's judgment against Wofford, a former city manager at Pampa, was issued at a non-jury trial on Feb. 5, according to court records.

Notice of home foreclosure proceedings were initiated in connection with the city manager's default of payment on a \$52,000 loan from Citizen's Federal Credit Union, according to records at the Howard County Clerk's office.

Mayor A.C. "Cotton" Mize refused to comment on the situation Wednesday.

"We're not happy having to do it," Carey told the Big Spring Herald. "We feel he did us a good job — we feel he's a good city manager."

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### Better finance system needed

# Texaco faces new battles as Chapter 11 ends

NEW YORK (AP) — After four years of tortuous litigation, Texaco Inc. has received permission to lower the curtain on its multibillion-dollar legal battle with Pennzoil Co. and the historic bankruptcy case stemming from it.

But while that particular act may be ending, the broader drama continues.

The nation's third-largest oil company widely is seen as vulnerable to a takeover attempt by investors who believe they can realize big profits by winning control of the company and then selling its assets.

Such raiders may have allies among the legions of shareholders that analysts say were disenchanted with Texaco management even before it became entangled in the legal morass that prompted its bankruptcy filing last April 12.

Texaco management has vowed

to resist any attempt to dismember the company but many industry experts expect at least one full-scale takeover attempt, which could leave a much different Texaco standing once the battle is over.

U.S. Bankruptcy Court Judge Howard Schwartzberg on Wednesday confirmed Texaco's plan to emerge from bankruptcy protection, the keystone of which was an out-of-court settlement with Pennzoil.

Having agreed to pay Pennzoil \$3 billion in cash to drop its \$10.3 billion judgment against Texaco, the nation's third-largest oil company is gearing up for a reorganization involving sales of \$3 billion worth of assets.

The White Plains, N.Y.-based oil giant's troubles began in November 1985, when a Houston jury made the unprecedented \$10.3 billion damage award to Pennzoil after deciding Texaco

improperly had interfered with Pennzoil's acquisition of part of Getty Oil Co. so that Texaco itself could buy Getty.

Texaco filed for Chapter 11

bankruptcy protection to avoid posting what it said would be a ruinous \$11-billion bond while appealing that verdict. It was the largest bankruptcy filing in U.S.

history. By last December, after a string of losses in the Texas state courts, Texaco chose to settle rather than risking everything on the chance that the U.S. Supreme Court would overrule the judgment.

The reorganization package approved by Schwartzberg was negotiated laboriously by committees representing Texaco's creditors, its shareholders, and Pennzoil. The plan takes effect — and Pennzoil will be paid — on April 7.

But a lot of bitterness remains, as well as some sticky issues raised during the bankruptcy negotiations.

## 'Sunrise wind' bodes ill for area

POST, Texas (AP) — A tough year for farmers is in the wind, that is if an old Indian legend holds true.

According to legend, the wind direction at precisely sunrise on the day after the first day of spring will tell what kind of weather and farming conditions the next year will hold.

If the sunrise wind, called Taba'na Yuna'e in the Comanche tongue, comes from the east or northeast, good harvests should follow; if it blows from the north or northwest, conditions will be average. A west or southwest wind doesn't bode well, and a south wind is just plain bad news.

Mato Numpa — or "Chief" Frank Runkles — who has been performing the annual ceremony for 15 years, began his dance Tuesday with supplications to Wakantanka, the Father Spirit, and Mikeana, Mother Earth, as well as the four winds.

"The Mother Earth is revered because she gives us food to eat," he said. "Wakantanka is the Great Father above — we seek his blessings."

The southerly wind blew so

hard that Indian dancers from an Amarillo Boy Scout Explorer Post had to shield a ceremonial fire as it was ignited.

As the moment of Taba'na Yuan'e drew near, the gusts died down and began swirling the small fire.

Seconds before Runkles, dressed in costume of a Sioux Indian chief, caught the first glimpse of the sun over the distant horizon, a gust whisked in from the north, then reversed direction at the moment of sunrise, giving an official reading of west-southwest — bad news for farmers.

Records on the Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony have been kept here since 1906, the first-year settlers gathered to see what the winds had in store.

But although the ceremonial predictions have a 92 percent success rate, according to records, farmers don't necessarily need to worry.

Last year, smoke from Runkles' fire indicated a south wind and poor conditions, but South Plains farmers ended up with one of the best cotton harvests on record.

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
