# Virus changes, strengthens

WASHINGTON (AP) — A study at the University of California in San Francisco suggests that the AIDS virus gets tougher, meaner and faster-acting as pa-tients with the immune deficiency disease get sicker, according to a report published today.

Dr. Jay A. Levy, professor of medicine at UCSF, said he and a group of researchers isolated the human immunodeficiency virus from four patients over a fouryear period and discovered that the virus, which causes AIDS, seems to go through an evolution that makes it stronger while the patient gets weaker.

"It's surprising," Levy said in an interview. "The virus doesn't just stay the same, but actually changes its biologic features. It looks like the same virus, but it's probably evolving within the in-

associated with AIDS, but had not yet developed the disease. As the study progressed, three of the four subjects developed AIDS and two of these died. The fourth patient remains without AIDS symptoms.

In the three who developed AIDS, Levy said the HIV viruses isolated from their blood samples became more and more virulent as their symptoms intensified. Virulence was tested by exposing searching for the HIV genes the isolated virus to cells in test

Levy said that when the subjects were experiencing the most severe AIDS symptoms, the HIV from their blood was able to multiply more readily, infect host cells more easily and would

attack a greater variety of cells. The virulence did not change. however, in the virus isolated periodically from the patient who remained free of AIDS symp- Science. toms, he said.

disease.' The UCSF researchers now are responsible for increasing its virulence and its ability to replicate. If this gene can be isolated, said Levy, "then we can actually target some approach (such as a drug) of getting at the virus and arresting its replication.

The AIDS virus is spread through sexual contact or through the exchange of body fluids. It is most common among homosexual and bisexual men, and among drug users who have shared injection needles.

Other developments in AIDS research include:

-Researchers at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore report they have found that a protein essential for the replication of the HIV virus has a novel chemistry that may suggest a new approach to an AIDS drug.

Alan D. Frankel said he and his colleagues have discovered that molecules of an HIV protein call-HIV virus by somehow blocking AIDS, or acquired immune the binding of the metal atoms.

Charlotte Observer's dogged coverage of the PTL financial dy scandal, scorned by Jim and Tammy Bakker and many readers, earned the Pulitzer Prize for public service, journalism's highest honor

In the arts, Toni Morrison's novel of a former slave, "Beloved," won the Pulitzer for fiction, a category closely watched after the book failed to win two other prestigious awards for which it was nominated.

Alfred Uhry's first non-musical play, "Driving Miss Daisy," won the drama prize and Richard Rhodes was awarded the nonfiction prize for his book, . The Making of the Atomic Bomb:

The Charlotte Observer, The Wall Street Journal and the Miami Herald each won two awards

The Knight-Ridder newspaper group won six in all, with the Observer's two, the Herald's two and one each for the Philadelphia Inquirer and the St. Paul Pioneer Press Dispatch. A total of 21 Pulitzers were awarded Thursday for achievement in the arts and journalism.

The Observer revealed misuse of funds by the PTL ministry through persistent coverage conducted in the face of a massive campaign by PTL to discredit the newspaper," the Pulitzer board said.

The Observer's Managing Editor Mark Ethridge III said the real reward was winning over readers who had denounced the newspaper's efforts

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
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

#### Nicotine has short lifespan

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 61 and have been smoking since high school. I'm trying to quit. How long does it take to get the nicotine out of your system?

DEAR READER Once you have stopped smoking (or chewing) tobacco, the nicotine disappears from your body in a relatively short time, on the order of one or two days. A physical craving for nicotine will last for up to a week. The psychological craving may remain for months or years.

DEAR DR GOTT: A friend has been told she has ataxia. She has difficulty in her coordination and speech. What is ataxia?

DEAR READER: Ataxia means an inability to coordinate the movements of standing and walking. This symptom is caused by damage to the spinal cord or brain, resulting from an array of disorders that include nerve injury, neurological disease, toxicity to drugs, infections and turnors

Treatment of ataxia usually depends on therapy for the underlying men arrested in the case. condition. This can be simple (avoidance or drugs and alcohol) or difficult, as in the management of injuries.

DEAR DR. GOTT: For the past few years I've had the following problem: Every few months one of my saliva glands swells, gets sore, then bursts and a stone pops into my mouth No ear, nose and throat specialist has charged with rape, kidnapping or been able to either cure me or tell me. why this happens. Can you?

DEAR READER: I'll try. Saliva, which drains from glands located around the lower jaw, contains small amounts of calcium. For unknown reasons, some people have a tendency for this calcium to precipitate or cystallize, causing stones. When a salivary stone blocks the duct into the mouth, the back pressure of fluid builds up, the salivary gland may swell and become painful until drainage can be re-established. Sometimes, the stone pops out and fformal drainage spontaneously is restored; at other times, the stone - if wedged or too large to pass - may have to be surgically removed.

Any fluid-filled organ - such as the gall bladder, kidneys or urinary bladder - can be the site of stone formation. The cause of this phenomenon is not clearly understood, although some experts have proved that changes in fluid acidity will make the formation of stones more likely. Check with an oral surgeon for advice about your salivary stones.

### Soviets may arm rivals

ROME (AP) - In a strategic shift, Secretary of State George P. Shultz said he is exploring with the Soviet Union arrangements for continuing U.S. and Soviet military aid to rival forces in Afghanistan.

The proposed compromise on Afghan aid would remove the only major roadblock to a negotiated settlement of that country's 8-year-old war and the withdrawal of the Red Army, which has been propping up the Marxist government in Kabul.

"It would be better to have a moratorium," Shultz said. But, he added, "to date the

Soviets have not wanted to do that."

Shultz also said that in meetings this weekend with Italian officials he planned to discuss moving dozens of U.S. fighter planes to Italy from

He heads for the Middle East on Sunday to continue efforts to

spur Arab-Israeli negotiations. The issue of U.S. aid to Afghan guerrillas and Soviet aid to the Kabul government has become an impediment to improved superpower relations and one of the key regional disputes confronting planners of the planned superpower summit in Moscow in

late May. Shultz made it clear he preferred a suspension of Soviet aid to the Kabul regime and a matching cut-off of U.S. support for the resistance groups. American weapons have included Stinger missiles that have been effective against Soviet planes and

helicopters. But Shultz said the overall goal was "a balanced outcome." He said there was nothing in peace accords being drafted in Geneva 'that tells us we cannot support

our friends. If the Soviets exercise restraint, we are prepared to ex-

ercise restraint." he said. Shultz said he did not know whether the Soviets would go along with the equal levels of aid to the two sides. But he stressed the United States was prepared to guarantee a settlement even while weapons keep flowing to

the combatants 'If we have signed the accords and see a need to support our friends we will be able to do it,"

he said. The United States, the Soviet Union, their clients in Afghanistan and the government of neighboring Pakistan, have been involved for months in U.N .sponsored efforts to bring about a withdrawal of the estimated 115,000 Soviet troops fighting in Afghanistan since the Kremlin intervened in December 1979.

## Winter storm warning issued The overwhelming and for parts of Texas Panhandle

A winter storm warning was in Plains. effect through tonight for the Texas Panhandle, where as much as six inches of snow had the South Plains and snow mixed piled up at dawn today in Dumas with rain fell across eastern secand Dalhart.

Dalhart police reported that heavy snow was falling, visibility was near zero and roads were snow-packed and icy. They discouraged travel in the northwestern portion of the Panhan-

Hazardous driving conditions were reported across most of the Panhandle, and U.S. 287 was closed north of Stratford to the Oklahoma state line because of blowing snow, the Department of Public Safety said.

Near-blizzard conditions and near-zero visibilities were also reported west of Amarillo to Dalhart and into northeastern New Mexico. Winds of up to 30 mph have caused power outages from West Amarillo to Dumas, authorities said.

Forecasters said as much as 10 inches of snow may fall in northern sections of the Panhandle as much as six to eight inches over the rest of the Panhandle. three to five inches over the southern Panhandle and northwest portions of the South low rolling

tions of the Panhandle. An upper level storm system moving across northeastern New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle triggered the snow.

Elsewhere, weather was more spring-like for Easter weekend.

Forecasts called for showers and thunderstorms over most of the rest of the state through Saturday except in extreme West Texas where skies were to remain clear.

Lows tonight will be mostly in the 30s in West Texas, ranging from the upper 20s in the Panhandle to the 40s in the Permian Basin and Concho Valley, in the 40s and 50s across North Texas and mostly in the 50s in South Texas, ranging from the 40s in the Hill Country to the 60s in extreme South Texas.

Highs Saturday will be in the 50s and 60s in West Texas, ranging upwards into the mid 80s in the Big Bend area, in the 60s and 70s in North Texas and in the 70s and 80s over most of South Texas, ranging upward to near 90 in extreme southern portions.

A cold front produced thunderstorms and rain from the Plains and about two inches over through the Edwards Plateau tial veto are growing.

Elsewhere, scattered thunderstorms began developing day in northwestern sections of across North Central and Northeast Texas early today. Clouds covered North Texas and South Texas as moisture from the gulf

continued flowing into the area. Early morning temperatures were in the 30s and 40s over West Texas and in the 50s and 60s over the rest of the state except in extreme South Texas where readings were in the 70s. Extremes ranged from 31 at Marfa in the Davis Mountains to to 73 at Brownsville.

It is the time of year for funnels to appear in Texas

Six months and hundreds of miles apart last year, nature's destructive fury reminded Texans that tornadoes don't necessarily stick to a season.

Weather experts note that in Texas, as in other Tornado Alley states, a twister can strike anywhere, any time. But the rumbling thunderstorms of spring announce the beginning of the unofficial tornado season that runs from April through June.

Forecasters say every thunderstorm has the potential to

produce a twister. From 1951 through 1986, there have been an average of 118 tornadoes in Texas per year, according to the state climatologist's office in College Station.

More than 60 percent of those occur between April and June, records show. In April and June an average of about 18 to 19 tornadoes occur each month, but in May, when weather conditions are the most unstable, that average increases to about 36, or

In Texas, the natural collision between cold, dry air barreling down the Great Plains and warm, moist air from the Gulf of Mexico occurs almost daily in the spring and sometimes produces violent consequences.

Like battling armies, the cold and warm air masses swirl around each other. When weather conditions are ripe, a funnel will drop down and begin its march, some with wind speeds in excess of 250 mph that can drive a soda straw through a tree

Last year, on May 22, a killer storm flattened the small West Texas town of Saragosa, leaving 30 dead and 162 injured. In mid-"Obviously, Texas has to November, 11 East Texans died when a series of tornadoes thrashed towns from Cherokee County to the Gulf Coast.

'A tornado is such a devastating kind of storm. No matter how much preparation you do there is some property damage and some loss of life. But there are some things you can do to protect yourself and propersaid Laureen Chernow, a spokeswoman for the governor's division of emergency manage-

One safeguard is to know the difference between a tornado

watch and a tornado warning. When weather conditions indicate that a tornado could develop, the weather service issues a tornado watch. Weather experts advise that during a watch, keep a careful lookout for the development of a funnel cloud and listen to weather broadcasts on the radio. Make sure you are near a safe shelter.

### Poor hold heavy end of tax load

DALLAS (AP) - Nickel and dime sales taxes are taking its balance revenue needs and toll on Texas' poor because they're paying about five times more in sales taxes than the wealthy, a report says.

The report, titled "Nickels & Dimes," analyzed the impact of sales and excise taxes in each state and found that sales taxes in only eight other states took a higher percentage of the poor's income than those in Texas.

'By relying on nickel and dime sales taxes, Texas has quietly heaped an onerous burden on its poorest citizens," said Robert S. McIntyre, director of Citizens for Tax Justice, a Washington-based tax research and lobbying group, who issued the report last week.



The most regressive state sales taxes, the report said, are in Mississippi
