Banks-aid

DALLAS (AP) - Two more Texas banks suffering financial losses from poor real estate loans are seeking help from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., according to a published

Industry sources told the Dallas Times Herald in today's editions the banks are Texas American Bancshares of Fort Worth and the San Antonio-based National Bancshares Corp. of Texas. They are reported to have \$515 million and \$258.2 million in problem assets, respectively.

FORT SMITH, Ark. (AP) - Jurors reached a verdict on a charge that white supremacists conspired to kill a federal judge and an FBI agent, but were rebuffed by the judge when they said they were deadlocked on two other charges.

With deliberations set to continue for a fourth day today, the jury was still undecided on a count of seditious conspiracy brought against nine of the 13 defendants and a count of transporting stolen money faced by two defendants.



Jerry Sims and Pat Wilhelm, both 23-year-old graduates of should run smoothly for you today if you Happy High School, joined forces three years ago and began custom cutting and hauling hay near their hometown.

They hauled hay together in high school and saw the business potential, Sims said.

'We wanted to go into business when we were still in school, but we just couldn't afford it then," he said. "So as soon as we could, we bought a used round baler and went to work.

The used baler saw long hours of work for two years and finally wore out, so Sims bought a new John Deere 530 last November SAGITTARIUS (Nov. 23-Dec. 21) As and is ready to begin the having

> The men each bought a used tractor and other equipment needed for the custom work. Wilhelm owns a swather, Sims owns hay rakes and the baler.

> "Farmers still have their own equipment and do most of their own work," Wilhelm said. "But putting up hay takes so much equipment and farmers are usually pressed for time, so haying is good for custom cutters.'

The men build their hay bales to last and wrap each 6-foot bale with string spaced 11/2 to 2 inches apart, Sims said.

"We use more string than most people and wrap the bales tighter," he said, "but the bales stay together better and you can still pick them up after they've been in the field for awhile."

Although hay baling is

seasonal, the weather during the last two years was good for the crop and the men put up between 15,000 and 20,000 bales in 1987. Sims estimated. Wheat hay is cut grazer is cut in September and October.

'More farmers have started to bale wheat because of the government program." Sims said, "and a lot of people will plant hay grazer for cattle.

The men work with their customers on payment plans and sometimes take a percentage of the hay crop as payment to feed their own cattle, Sims said. He also built trailers to haul the big. round bales, and modified a front-end loader on a tractor to pick them up.

Wilhelm also bought a grass drill last year and is seeding grass on a custom basis.

"It looked like grass seeding was going to be a good venture for awhile," he said. "The government program is encouraging people to plant grass and some of my neighbors were asking if I could do it.'

Weather conditions were favorable for establishing good grass stands, and Wilhelm hasn't had to do any replanting, he said. He began planting in January of this year and will continue until the program deadline of June 1

DEAR DR. GOTT: I injured my leg in a fall two years ago. The doctor's diagnosis was reflex sympathetic dystrophy. Since then I've developed RSD in my other leg and both of my arms.
Pharmacological and physical therapy haven't helped much. What can you tell me about this devastating

DEAR READER: Reflex sympathetic dystrophy is a form of neuropa-thy. It is also called Sundeck's atrophy and post-traumatic neuralgia. Following injury to a bone or soft tissues, some patients develop an unusual reflex reaction: skin. bone or joint shrinkage coupled with pain and malfunction of circulation and sweating in the injured area. No one knows why this happens. Treatment consists of physical therapy, including TENS (transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation), special exercises, deep massage and acupuncture. Sometimes, medicine is useful. For example, local nerve blocks with anesthetic drugs, anti-depressants, cortisone and calcium-channel blockers have all been used successfully to treat the syndrome.

The symptoms may disappear without treatment; in rare cases, surgery to block pain-carrying nerves

nay be necessary.
DEAR DR. GOTT: When my daughter was vaccinated as a child, she developed a keloid. At 16 she had it removed and was treated with steroids, but it grew back. She's now 19 and it has been recommended that she have her tonsils removed. What are the chances of her developing a keloid in her throat?

DEAR READER: Keloid, an overgrowth of scar tissue, appears to be an inherited tendency. It usually affects the skin, causing a heaped-up, painless but cosmetically embarrassing collection of tissue. Keloids are less common on "internal" structures, such as mucus membranes. Nonetheless, your daughter should inform the surgeon of her keloid propensity before she has a tonsillectomy. The doctor may wish to alter his technique so as to minimize the risk of keloids. For example, the tonsils can be frozen, thus sparing the adjacent mucous membrane and making keloid formation less likely.

DEAR DR. GOTT: When I touch my tongue to my hands or arms, they taste as if I've had a salt bath. I don't perspire very much and this salty taste is a new development. Is this something to worry about?

DEAR READER: Our bodies constantly secrete small amounts of salty perspiration. As the moisture evaporates, trace amounts of salt are left on the skin which, when licked, can taste salty. This is normal. Don't wor-
