

# Trade bill rolls through U.S. House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation overhauling America's trade laws is headed for quick Senate action after rolling through the House with more than the two-thirds majority needed to override a threatened presidential veto.

"I sincerely hope that will not be necessary, that in the end the president will sign the bill," Senate Finance Committee Chairman Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, said after the 312-107 House vote Thursday in favor of

the measure.

Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., told reporters he plans to start debate today and shoot for final passage early next week.

Byrd again warned that an administration favorite — the pending free-trade agreement to phase out tariffs between the United States and Canada — could get entangled in any Reagan veto.

There has been talk in the Senate of a filibuster to stall the

agreement. But Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont, said Thursday night that "it is clear that there are at least 60 votes to stop the filibuster."

Reagan said Thursday that he will veto the bill if it arrives on his desk with a provision to require all but the smallest employers to give 60-day notice of plant closings and large-scale layoffs.

Business groups have fought the plant-closings provision on grounds it would dry up capital

for investment, frighten off customers and cause economic stagnation. Unions are calling for the measure, saying that notifying employees about to lose their jobs is the only humane thing to do.

In recent days the dispute over plant closings has overshadowed the centerpiece features of the bill, which would streamline the system under which the United States aids companies threatened by imports and retaliates against international trade viola-

tions.

Scores of other provisions range from repeal of the windfall oil profits tax to sizeable agricultural subsidies.

A key vote in the House came just before the roll call on final passage, when lawmakers voted 253-167 against a move by Minority Leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., to send the measure back to conference committee with orders to drop the plant-closings provision.

### Anti U.S.

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — Riot troops broke up the second anti-American demonstration in this capital in as many weeks, hurling tear gas grenades and firing into the air to stop about 200 protesters headed for the U.S. Embassy.

At least one person was arrested. There were no immediate reports of injuries.

The protesters, chanting "Embassy, embassy!" had been part of a crowd of about 2,000 people who marched peacefully to the National Congress earlier Thursday to demonstrate against the Honduran government and U.S. policy in the Central American country.

## One-act prepared for fourth contest

Snyder High School's one-act play is due its fourth competitive performance at 5 p.m. Saturday at Coggin Theater on the campus of Howard Payne University in Brownwood.

Snyder is the first play on the slate Saturday. After its 5 p.m. start, other entries will be staged at approximate one-hour intervals.

The order of plays will be Snyder, Granbury, Crowley and Borger. Admission will be allowed only between plays.

At the regional event, there will be an admission charge of \$1.

COVE, Texas (AP) — A hunting service owner says he provides lions that were raised in captivity for people who want to hunt the animals but don't want to go on an African safari.  
 Chambers County rancher Larry Wilburn says his lions are no more dangerous than the wild boars already living in the boggy area of Southeast Texas.  
 "My lions have been raised in captivity," said Wilburn, whose hunting service lists 20 exotic species that can be hunted at his three ranches.

Wilburn says he buys his lions from owners who bought them when they were "cute, cuddly cubs." He says people sell them when they grow into 300-pound animals that cost their owners \$6 a day to feed.  
 "The ones I get are usually past their prime," said Wilburn. "They're old and mean and not useful any more. The zoos usually can't use them and they were destined for the gas chamber when I get them."  
 Some residents don't like the idea of hearing a lion's roar echo through the salt marshes in the area.  
 "I'm very nervous about anybody turning loose a lion in the marsh," said Chambers County Clerk Beanie Rowland, who lives across Wallisville Reservoir from the hunting area.  
 "Now I'll be worrying whenever I hear my dog bark or my grandchildren go to play in the back yard."  
 "I've gotten some phone calls from a few people who have heard rumors about lion hunts and are worried about them," said Jack White, a Cove councilman. "Their main fear, of course, is what if the lion gets loose and starts roaming."  
 Also expressing safety concerns about the lion hunts was Ed White, spokesman for the Army Corps of Engineers, which oversees the 20,000-acre Wallisville Reservoir project near the hunting ranch.  
 "If a lion is wounded and gets away, he could become a public menace," White said. "There's a lot of room for him to hide on that 20,000 acres, and these animals can be secretive. A lion might be impossible to find once he escapes."  
 "What a terrible thing it would

be if a wounded lion came upon somebody fishing or hunting out there," White said. "Also, we're concerned about stray bullets from the elephant guns they're using."  
 Not all area residents are concerned, however.  
 "In days past, we've had panthers or cougars roaming the swamp," said Kendon Clark, a retired Cove councilman who once made his living as a trapper. "There's alligators there, too."  
 Wilburn told the Houston Chronicle that he is not breaking laws by arranging the hunts.  
 The hunts are conducted on a 400-acre raised area in the marsh called Lawrence Island, a remote area surrounded by bayous, canals and waterways, Wilburn said.

"Although lions can swim," he said, "They don't like to get their feet wet."  
 State officials agree it is legal to hold a lion hunt on private property, but that it is illegal to do it on the adjoining federal land.  
 Attention was brought to bear on the lion hunting when a ranger found two lion carcasses, beheaded and skinned, about 100 yards inside the reserve.  
 "This is evidence to suggest the lions were killed on federal property, but the most we could do is fine somebody for discharging a firearm, trespassing and littering," White said. "That would amount to only a \$50 fine for each offense."  
 The lions were accidentally skinned on the reserve and he has agreed to remove the carcasses, Wilburn said. He stressed that the lions are not allowed to roam on the reserve.  
 Chambers County game wardens and state officials say they had never heard of anyone hunting lions in Texas until this.

## Judge says jury should get case

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — A federal judge dismissed some claims against three cigarette makers in a cancer-liability case, but ruled there is sufficient evidence for a jury to decide whether the companies conspired to cover up the dangers of smoking.  
 "The evidence presented permits the jury to find a tobacco industry conspiracy, vast in its scope, devious in its purpose and devastating in its results," U.S. District Judge H. Lee Sarokin said Thursday.

However, the judge also dismissed claims that the three companies caused Rose Cipollone's cancer by not marketing a safer cigarette and by not conducting adequate research into the health effects of smoking.  
 The judge turned down a request by the companies — Liggett Group Inc., Philip Morris Inc. and Lorillard Inc. — to dismiss the suit filed by Antonio Cipollone of Lakelhurst, whose wife died at age 58 in 1984 after smoking for 40 years.  
 The suit has been on trial since Feb. 1, and Cipollone's lawyers have rested their case, which they tout as groundbreaking because for the first time a plaintiff's lawyers obtained access to confidential files of tobacco companies and trade groups detailing their public relations strategies.

Rejecting the defense request to dismiss all claims, he wrote, "If the jury accepts the plaintiff's version of the facts as to the conduct of the defendants, it is difficult to envision a more compelling case for an award of punitive damages."  
 "The jury may reasonably conclude that defendants were members of and engaged in that conspiracy with full knowledge and disregard for the illness and death it would cause, and that Mrs. Cipollone was merely one of its victims," Sarokin said.

classic, it is common these days for experts to overcall with a strong four-card suit at the one-level. (It's hard to be doubled so low, and easier to get a bid in immediately at the one-level than later at a higher level.) The three-spade bid by Andersen was a pre-emptive jump raise.

All of this forced South into an unusual action — a risky four-heart call. But this daring move would have been successful except for precise defense. When the spade king was led, East signaled with the 10, but not as a come-on. Since his jump in spades promised length, the play of the 10 now was suit preference, letting partner know that he had values in diamonds. Soloway dutifully switched to the seven of diamonds. Declarer played low from dummy, won East's jack with his king, played to dummy's heart ace and back to his club king. Then came the eight of hearts.

If Soloway tamely played low as second hand, school would be out. East would win the queen, but could not safely attack diamonds. Soloway correctly deduced that the contract was not to be defeated unless his partner held the heart queen guarded. So he rose with the trump king and led another diamond. With that defense, declarer had to lose a diamond trick and his contract. (And yes, there are better contracts for North-South to be in.)

# Ten indicted in alleged gang rape and kidnapping case

SAN DIEGO, Texas (AP) — Indictments against 10 men will not repair the shattered life of a 19-year-old woman who remains in hiding with her family since she reported being abducted and gang raped last month, friends say.

"They have to get out of San Diego," said Richard Yaeger, a friend of the victim and her 23-year-old husband. "They'll never be able to come back here."

The couple and their two children, ages 16 months and four months, have lived in a secret location in Corpus Christi, since shortly after she reported the March 26 abduction and rape by as many as 20 men, Yaeger said.

A grand jury on Thursday indicted 10 men on charges of sexual assault and/or aggravated kidnapping.

The young mother returned to San Diego to testify before the grand jury Thursday, and was led out of the courthouse with her head and face covered by a black shawl.

Some of the defendants have said the victim was a willing participant.

"She enjoyed it," said one unidentified defendant in a

report on Corpus Christi television station KIII.

The woman said the four-hour series of assaults began at a cockfight at a ranch. She said her attackers urged onlookers to join in the attack. Bystanders ignored her pleas for help and some did join her attackers, she said.

The woman said she was taken to two other locations and raped

there.

"These people here are acting like (the victim and her family) are in the wrong," Yaeger said, adding they have been threatened several times since the incident.

But Dot Barnette of Crisis Services in Corpus Christi said more than \$8,000 has been donated to the family, along with a job offer for the unemployed husband.

## Royal couple to visit Dallas

DALLAS (AP) — Sweden's King Carl Gustav XVI and Queen Silvia celebrate their heritage Texas-style today with a visit to the Mesquite Rodeo complete with brisket, broncs and a bull-riding demonstration.

The royal couple, scheduled to land at Dallas' Love Field airport today, are celebrating New Sweden's 350th anniversary and the Swedish community's contributions to the United States.

Dallas is the King and Queen's first stop on their Texas tour,

which includes a visit to Houston on Saturday. The couple began their national tour in Washington April 10.

Organizers of the Dallas stop also plan tours of two local hospitals and the Swedish telecommunications giant, Ericsson. The day will end with a visit to the Mesquite Rodeo Arena for brisket, broncs and a bull-riding demonstration.

The royal couple are scheduled to visit Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children and Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas, where they will meet Stormie Jones, the little girl who survived the first tandem liver and heart transplant 14 months ago.

The monarchs are scheduled to tour Ericsson's AXE digital switching laboratory, which links telephone networks in 71 countries including the United States. The 112-year-old Swedish company is one of the world's largest telecommunications firms and sponsor of the royal couple's Dallas trip.

Those immigrant Swedes built wooden homes — log cabins — that came to symbolize pioneer America. Swedes and their descendants have since been credited with developing the zipper, ball bearings, monkey wrenches, safety matches, the dairy separator, the pacemaker, the safety belt and the anasthetic Xylocain.

### See specialist for heart problem

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had a heart operation nine years ago and have had heart irregularity since. It has progressed to atrial fibrillation with an uneven beat, and medication doesn't seem to help. Electric heart shock treatment is being considered. What is your opinion?

DEAR READER: Atrial fibrillation, an irregular heartbeat, does not — by itself — require treatment or necessarily indicate heart disease. However, with your background of heart surgery, I'd worry that your increasing irregularity could signal a progressive deterioration of heart function. I'm surprised that medicine does not control your heart rate; there are many effective drugs for this purpose on the market.

Electrical countershock, to restore your heart rhythm to normal, may be an effective short-term solution to your problem; however, it may not be in your long-term best interests. Once your heart has been shocked back to normal, it must be kept normal by medicine. Otherwise, you will develop fibrillation again. You've said that your heart rate hasn't responded to drugs. Therefore, defibrillation may be a useless and risky procedure in the long run.

I'd be more interested in the reasons for your increasing heart irregularity. In my opinion, you need a stress test, and probably a coronary angiogram, to assess the efficiency of your heart's circulation. If no arterial blockages are present (and corrective techniques such as bypass surgery or angioplasty are not indicated), I would attempt medical control of your heart rate using one medicine after another until one of the drugs worked.

Since your case is somewhat unusual and the newer medicines are tricky to use, I would feel more comfortable having you under the care of a cardiologist. At the very least, you are entitled to an opinion from a qualified

heart specialist.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Can people be tested to see if they have been damaged by PCBs from transformers?

DEAR READER: Polychlorinated biphenyls, or PCBs, are a group of more than 30 compounds used in the manufacture of plastics, insulation and chemicals. All are poisonous and can cause cancer. They are not readily biodegradable and, therefore, easily enter the food chain, particularly in water. PCBs are usually toxic when eaten; however, skin contact can produce a rash. A toxicology laboratory can perform blood and urine tests to see whether a person has been exposed to PCBs.

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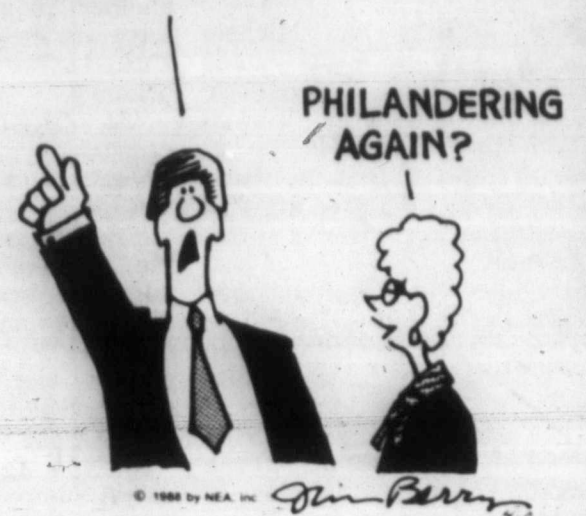
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### Appeals court grants extension

HOUSTON (AP) — Attorneys for death row inmate Clarence Brandley, 36, will receive a third extension to submit written arguments to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, which is deciding whether Brandley will be tried for a third time.

The Austin-based court last month ordered the briefs from the defense and the Montgomery County district attorney for review before deciding if Brandley, 36, will receive a third capital murder trial in the Aug. 23, 1980, strangulation and rape of 16-year-old Cheryl Dee Ferguson.

Miss Ferguson, of Bellville, was killed at Conroe High School where Brandley worked as a janitor. She had gone to the school for a volleyball tournament.



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
