> Coleman's proposed commission would include state and federal officials representing Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California, who would review and approve applications to fund housing, health, water resources, vocational and technical education, and sewage treatment.

'I'm certainly not claiming all the answers are here, but it is still a legitimate response for the federal government to get involved," said Coleman, an El Paso Democrat.

De la Garza argued the border's complex problems will persist as long as the United States is a magnet to Mexico's poor in search of a better life, and until the states fail to get tough on the developers of unincorporated communities called colonias who do not put in roads. running water or sewerage con-

"Until the states provide the insituation ... we could dump all the money in the world and the situation would not be corrected," said de la Garza, who like Coleman represents a district dotted with colonias.

De la Garza said Mexico's cooperation would be vital to the plan's success, such as stopping the dumping of raw sewage into the Rio Grande and the creation of jobs in the country's interior that would stem migration to the United States.


And federal programs can and do put money into the region, de la Garza, a Mission Democrat and chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, told the House Banking Committee's subcommittee on housing and community development.

But Coleman argued Mexico's problems were no reason not to try to improve conditions in colonias and to help the region's economic development, and questioned whether current programs were adequate.

"I tried to craft ... something that was do-able in the United States," Coleman said, adding said. "I wanted to do the things we could affect. ... I want to use current programs in existence, but I want to know why they haven't helped, why they haven't worked. What's holding them back? We've got a good deal to address here.

Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, a San Antonio Democrat and chairman of the subcommittee, said the border is in "acute distress" and called it the Appalachia of the Southwest because of its poverty, an average unemployment rate of 18 percent, "and the lack of basic facilities we take for granted in a civilized society at this point in the 20th century.

"It is a shameful and distressing situation," he said.

We knew that Mother did not want to be kept alive that way, because our father had also been hooked up to a respirator after he had been pronounced brain-dead.

Please help me. The people I have talked to here told me they have heard of the Living Will, but nobody knows how to obtain one. Thank you

MRS. MALONE KIMBRELL, TRUSSVILLE, ALA.

DEAR MRS. KIMBRELL: The Living Will is a document stating: "To my family physician and hospital caretakers: Should the time come when it is medically confirmed that there is no reasonable hope for my recovery, I direct that I be allowed to die naturally, receiving only the administration of comfort care. I do not wish to have my life prolonged by artificial means. Should I become unable to participate in decisions regarding my medical treatment, it is my intention that my wishes be honored by my family and physician."

Copies of this document should be given to your physician, clergyperson and lawyer, and to as many close family members and friends as you wish.





The auction, which appears in "Murder at the Bridge Table," represents author Matt Granovetter's tongue-in-cheek lampooning of super-scientific bidding methods that call for indiscriminate cue-bidding of first- or second-round controls once a suit fit and a game force have been established. He believes, as I do, that first-round controls come first, and that first-round controls in secondary suits should be bid before a void suit or singleton ace is mentioned. Best bidding on today's deal would spotlight the diamond suit, and eventually North would realize that there was a strong possibility of a diamond loser and would stay out of seven. Of course South made his grand slam, but not without travail.

HOW

He won the opening trump lead and immediately rattled off six rounds of spades, discarding a diamond and a club from dummy. As you can see, West had five discards to make and could throw four clubs, but what then? In fact he threw a heart. Declarer now cashed the heart king, played a heart to dummy's jack and cashed the heart ace. The last heart, now a winner, was played and West was between a rock and a hard place one more time. He pitched a diamond (it just wasn't in his nature to throw the club ace away), and the king and ace of diamonds made declarer's last little diamond the 13th trick. Now that's Murder at the Bridge Table.

Papers signed on Penrod deal

DALLAS (AP) - An agreement worth nearly \$780 million in the two-year legal battle over Penrod Drilling Co. between the Hunt brothers and creditor banks has moved the wealthy Dallas brothers a step closer to emerging from bankruptcy, a company spokesman says

The agreement, signed Wednesday, calls for the Hunts, Nelson Bunker, William Herbert and Lamar, to convey numerous tracts of real estate to the banks in consideration for forgiveness of \$200 million in existing debt.

In addition, a newly restructured loan to Penrod in the amount of \$525 million will be secured by notes and Penrod assets, and the restructured company will make a cash payment of \$53.8 million.

"The agreement ends months of sometimes heated negotiations over the future of Penrod," according to a statement by Hunt Energy

The trust estates of the Hunt brothers filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in August, 1986, for the trust partnership that owns Penrod Drilling. Penrod, one of the world's largest offshore drilling companies, was not under bankruptcy court protection.

Penrod and the Hunts' Placid Oil Co., a sister company to Penrod, sued 23 of their lenders for fraud and misrepresenatation in 1986 after defaulting on about \$1.5 billion in bank loans.

End fight to repeal Homestead Act

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Bankers Association has decided to give up an attempt to repeal a constitutional provision that makes Texas the only state severely limiting the use of second mortgages.

Bob Harris, executive director of the association, said Wednesday that the group still favors repeal of the Homestead Act, but "I think it's safe to say that we sense that the bill probably doesn't have a great chance of success in the 1989 (legislative) session.'

Consumer advocates and legislators see the move by one of Texas' most powerful lobbying groups as a sign that the political climate for repeal has soured, particularly in recent months as the state reeled from numerous financial failures and public disclosures about the lending practices of some banks during the oil boom.

Repeal of the act until recently was expected to be a major issue and a key battleground in the upcoming legislative session.

Former chairman gets six months

DALLAS (AP) - Former Texas Parks and Wildlife Chairman Edwin L. Cox Jr. has been sentenced for bank fraud to six months in federal prison and 1,000 hours of community service and must pay a \$250,000 fine.

During the sentencing hearing Wednesday, the former bank director said: "I don't make any excuses for what I did. I know that what I did was wrong. I'm ashamed of violating the principles of integrity, which I have always held dear. I can promise you that no one will ever be ashamed of my actions again.'

"It seems to me, Mr. Cox, that you deserve much credit for your fortitude ... and for publicly acknowledging your wrongdoing," said U.S. District Judge A. Joe Fish, who sentenced Cox.

Cox must also serve four and half years probation after the prison term and submit a financial statement to a probation officer each year, court officials said.

In June, Cox pleaded guilty to a federal bank fraud charge in connection with \$80 million in loans he received from his bank several years ago.

Pilot cites failure of engine

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) -Friends of Capt. Larry Davis, the pilot of Delta Flight 1141 that crashed, said Davis told them the plane suffered an engine failure, a newspaper reported in a copyright story.

The federal investigation into the cause of the crash has focused on the engines and the position of the wing flaps at takeoff.

HOUSTON (AP) - A Houston- pipes "along with her egg collecarea woman thinks the U.S. Custom Service carried the 'Zero Tolerance'' program a bit too far when they seized her automobile at the border because a friend had purchased two 50cent pipes on a shopping trip into Mexico.

"It's appalling," Teresa Miller, 27, a clerical worker at a suburban Pasadena law office, said Wednesday. "I'm an American citizen, and I should have rights. First off, they (the pipes) were not even mine.'

Miller's 1985 Nissan Sentra was seized Sunday afternoon at the U.S. port of entry at Progreso after Miller and her friend, Valerie Cantrell, returned from Nuevo Progreso, Mexico.



KARNACK, Texas (AP) -Like massive Roman candles, two rocket motors from Pershing nuclear missiles were burned today as Vice President George Bush and a team of Soviet inspectors looked on.

It was the first elimination of such U.S. missiles under the Intermediate-range Nuclear Forces treaty between the two nations

Bush, who used binoculars to watch the first 50-second firing that destroyed the motor, said the destruction of the machinery was related to the quest for world peace.

Lt. Col. Allen L. Germain, commanding officer of the Longhorn plant, said preparations for eliminating the two motors began 75 days ago.

"We have to make sure everything is OK before we let people back in," Red Cross spokeswoman Rita Dralus said. "There are water mocassins and there are gators because ponds have overflowed, and electricity and water definitely don't mix.'

The National Guard was placed on alert as residents bailed out from the 9 to 15 inches of rain that has fallen along the state's central Gulf Coast since Sunday, turning streets into rivers and spilling sewage into living rooms.

It is the area's heaviest rain in a decade, surpassing the deluge Elena in 1985.

Last 45 NEW YORK (AP) - The Giuliani, whose office successfulfederal government sued Drexel Burnham Lambert Inc. and the head of its high-risk junk bond business, alleging they secretly schemed with convicted insidetrader Ivan Boesky to violate securities laws.

Wednesday's civil complaint by the Securities and Exchange Commission seeks an estimated \$100 million, according to Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis.

It followed months of guessing about whether the government had built an extensive case against the Wall Street firm on evidence turned up during the nearly 2-year-old Boesky scandal, which resulted in his imprisonment.

The SEC's complaint accuses Drexel and Michael Milken, head of Drexel's pioneering junk bond operation, of engaging in an arrangement with Boesky that included insider trading, stock manipulation and fraud that benefited Boesky and Drexel at the expense of Drexel clients. Junk bonds, which offer high yields but are highly risky, are often used to finance corporate takeovers.

Drexel's chief executive officer, Frederick H. Joseph, reiterated the company's longstanding claim that it would be absolved of any charges. Milken also again denied any wrongdoing.

"For the past 22 months I have been the subject of a shadow trial of systematic leaks and innuendo based upon false accusations," Milken said in a statement. "No one likes to be sued, but I welcome the opportunity to have at long last a full and open hearing of the allegations in an unbiased forum.'

The charges against Drexel, with whom Boesky worked extensively, had been expected since his illegal dealings were revealed in November 1986.

There had been speculation the SEC delayed filing its civil complaint to avoid interfering with a criminal investigation. The agency cannot bring criminal charges.

Boesky, who is serving a threeyear federal prison term, was forced to surrender a record \$100 million in penalties and illegal trading profits.

Drexel and Milken had an arrangement with Boesky involving at least 16 series of illegal securities transactions, the lawsuit-said.

Under that agreement, Boeskycontrolled companies secretly bought, sold or held securities for Drexel or individual defendants while Drexel sometimes reciprocated with secret transactions for Boesky, the lawsuit said. The SEC also alleged that Drexel and Boesky employees kept secret, off-the-books records as part of the arrangement.

It also said Drexel and Milken traded in securities using confidential information misappropriated from Drexel's own clients.

In 1985, Drexel allegedly made \$1.23 million in profits using inside information on a pending merger between Lorimar and Telepictures and allegedly avoided \$1.78 million in losses the following year after learning privileged information from Viacom International about a buyout proposal.

Federal law bars corporate executives, investment bankers and others with access to confidential corporate information from using it to trade in securities.

Twice earlier, Ms. Ryan said she had \$4 winners in Florida's 8month-old lottery. Since then, she bought five tickets each week but was stunned when she watched Saturday's drawing on television and realized she was rich.

"I just kept saying 'Oh, my God!"' she told a room packed with journalists as she was introduced at the Florida Lottery Department offices.

Her first call was to her lawyer. "She told me not to leave the house," Ms. Ryan said, calling Wednesday a day of firsts.

Today I had my first plane ride. It is not that I'm afraid. I never had a reason to fly before," she said. "This is my first press conference. And this is the first time I ever won \$55 million."

The prize was the largest single lottery jackpot in U.S. history. The odds of winning were estimated by lottery officials at 14 million to 1

Previously, the largest single jackpot was Pennsylvania's \$46 million that went to Donald R. Woomer Sr. and Linda K. Despot, a couple from Hollidaysburg, Pa., last October. 



Dukakis campaign names co-chairmen for state

AUSTIN (AP) - The presidential race shouldn't be a flagwaving contest about patriotism, new state co-chairs of the Dukakis presidential campaign said.

"This campaign must not turn on photo opportunities and nonissues about who can wave more red, white and blue flags and drop more balloons than anybody else," said former U.S. Rep. Barbara Jordan, one of 12 co-chairs announced at a Wednesday news conference. "This campaign can-not turn on who is the biggest or highest or strongest patriot."

Democrats have criticized Republicans for making an issue of patriotism, after Dukakis as Massachusetts governor vetoed a bill on constitutional grounds that would have required the Pledge of Allegiance in schools.

Lyndon Olson Jr., former chairman of the State Board of Insurance, described himself as

"moderate-conservative" Democrat. He said the patriotism of Michael Dukakis and his running mate, U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas, "should not be questioned."

"Their life-long public service and dedication to the public good should be evidence enough of their patriotism," Olson said. "The flag waves just as grand for Democrats as it does for Republicans."

Also announced as cochairpersons were John Mobley of Austin, a member of the Texas A&M Board of Regents; Sen. Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi; Sen. John Montford of Lubbock; Dallas attorney Kathryn Cain; U.S. Rep. Mickey Leland of Houston; Maria Berriozabel, a member of the San Antonio City Council; Ben Love of Houston, chairman of Texas Commerce Bank Shares; Rep. Ernestine Glossbrenner of Alice; Austin attorney Joe Kilgore; and Hidalgo County Clerk Billy Leo.

The 12 will serve as steering committee for the campaign, with Railroad Commissioner John Sharp as its chairman.

"I'm one of those Reagan Democrats who is coming home to my party," said Mobley, who ran the first U.S. Senate campaign of Bentsen. "Somebody has got to put this nation's house in order, and I happen to think that Mike Dukakis and Lloyd Bentsen can do that job, and do it well."

Ms. Cain said the Democratic ticket would attract women because of support for issues like day care and pay equity.

"Mike Dukakis and Lloyd Bentsen can give women, too, an equal shot at the American dream," she said.

Montford, who noted that he represents a conservative area of the state, said he "agonized" over the decision to support Dukakis. In discussing it, he said, "I'm tired of going-out-ofbusiness sales. I'm tired of stacked rigs ... I'm tired of farm auctions. I'm tired of the biggest event in town being an FDIC auction.'

Truan mocked Bush's promise in accepting his party's presidential nomination to create 30 million jobs in the next eight years.

"George Bush's idea of creating 30 million jobs would be for everyone to have two jobs, both at \$3.35 an hour," Truan said.

Authorities said a preliminary investigation showed the plane was flying low when a wing struck the ground, forcing the nose into the ground and causing the plane to tumble and break apart.

Witnesses reported seeing the single-engine plane diving steeply low altitudes and buzzing a pickup truck before the crash, Edwards said.

Other witnesses said the pilot and his brothers had been drinking before the plane took off. Further, "there are indications that there was some drinking going on while they were flying," Edwards said.

Killed in the crash were the pilot, Dennis R. Peterson, 37, of El Paso; Kevin Peterson, 34, of El Paso; Bernard John Peterson, 30. of Austin; and Justin Hafley, 8, of El Paso. Hafley was the son of the pilot's employer.

A man who knew the Petersons told Edwards that he was driving his pickup near the airport when the plane buzzed his truck.

Dennis Peterson liked "teasing the ground," said Phil Barrett, owner of West Texas Regional Airport.

"He was prone to flying low and we warned him about it." Barrett said. "He was a good pilot, just too brazen sometimes."

A Federal Aviation Administration spokeswoman said Tuesday that the pilot's medical certificate apparently was not up to date. If it wasn't, FAA spokeswoman Bobbie Mardis said, Dennis Peterson shouldn't have been flying.

The girl, who went to Dawson Elementary School last year and who was to attend Mathews this year, was buried last Wednesday, the day before she was to enter the second grade.

Dr. Betty Phillips, director of the Office of Student Support Services, said the 26 children from the complex who go to school at Mathews are "upset about the death of their friend, upset about the sex abuse and upset that a neighbor and a trusted person is the one accused of the crime."

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
