Causes, treatment for back problems

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is spinal

DEAR READER: Spinal stenosis is the pain of sciatic nerve compression from a herniated disc. It consists of a narrowed spinal canal and is usually due to osteoarthritis or other bony abnormalities of the vertebrae. Spinal stenosis causes pain in the buttocks, thighs or calves on standing or walking. The diagnosis is established by a myelogram, a special X-ray study of the back. Non-surgical treatment, such as weight loss and physiotherapy, may help the symptoms. However, in most cases, surgery (decompression laminectomy) is required to remove the offending areas of bone that are exerting pressure on the

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had a compression fracture of a vertebra in the lumbar section of the spine. I still have soreness after nine months. Can this condition precipitate arthritis? Would

exercise help?
DEAR READER: A compression fracture is traumatic squishing of one (or more) of the doughnut-shaped vertebral bones in the back. In young people, this can result from serious injury and usually heals with time, without symptoms except for spinal stiffness and soreness.

In older people, on the other hand, loss of bone calcium leads to an increased tendency to spontaneous compression fractures. The bones of the spine become weak, brittle and unstable; they can be relatively easily scrunched in the normal course of everyday activities. Hence, compression fractures are often seen in the elderly during X-ray examinations for backache. These fractures do heal in time, but the architecture of the vertebrae remains abnormal, so pain and stiffness persist.

Many types of bone fractures result in later arthritis. Spinal compression fractures are no exception. However, since most elderly patients have ar-thritis anyway, doctors often have difficulty determining whether the arthritis follows the fracture or is present as a separate issue.

Exercise, physiotherapy, back braces and the use of hormone pills and calcium supplements (when appropriate) are helpful means of minimizing pain and disability. Patients can often obtain relief of symptoms by following a program laid out by the combined efforts of orthopedic doctors and metabolic specialists. Such a multi-disciplinary approach offers hope to the thousands of patients with both traumatic and spontaneous compression fractures. "When I was questioned by the Warren Commission, I was a blind kitten," she said.

The commission, appointed to investigate the assassination, concluded it was the work of a single gunman, Oswald. But in 1979, the House Select Committee on Assassinations, relying in part the woods, trying to find a path, on acoustical evidence, concluded a conspiracy was likely and that it may have involved organized crime.

Since then, Mrs. Porter, 47, has drawn new conclusions.

"I don't know if Lee shot him," she said. "I'm not saying that Lee is innocent, that he didn't know about the conspiracy or was not a part of it, but I am saying he's not necessarily guilty of murder.

'At first, I thought that Jack Ruby (who killed Oswald two days after the assassination) was swayed by passion; all of America was grieving," she said. "But later, we found that he had connections with the underworld. Now, I think Lee was killed to keep his mouth shut."

Mrs. Porter said that in retrospect, Oswald seemed professionally schooled in secretiveness "and I believe he worked for the American govern-

Today's declarer put a bit too much trust in his opponents' bidding, although that trust would be justified 99 percent of the time

West's four-spade bid put considerable pressure on North-South. North made a penalty double, but South chose to remove it to five clubs.

When the diamond was led, declarer won in dummy, drew the trump and promptly took a spade finesse, intending to discard a heart loser. East's king of spades was unexpected. East exited with a diamond and declarer eventually lost two hearts for down

South showed true grit, admitting he should have made five clubs. All he needed to do was plan ahead. It's true that the king of spades rated to be onside, but there was a measurable chance that it was offside (and it was).

South's winning play is to win the diamond lead, ruff a diamond with an honor, lead a trump to dummy and ruff another diamond. He then leads one more trump to dummy and ruffs the last diamond.

With diamonds eliminated, declarer leads a heart and plays dummy's jack. East wins the queen but has no successful lead. Anything gives up an 11th trick.

The key is to admit that even 99 percent isn't perfect and can be improved on. Even then it is necessary to think about it early. If declarer fails to ruff a diamond at trick two, the end position won't work. Full marks to South for acknowledging his error.

Afghan withdrawal halted by Soviets

UNITED NATIONS (AP) -Union has suspended the withdrawal of its troops from Afghanistan because of persistent violations of a U.N.negotiated agreement.

United States and Pakistan to nadze. "come to their senses" and stop arming the guerrillas fighting the communist Afghan govern-

In remarks reported by the official Tass news agency, Gorbachev said Pakistan was trying to install leaders in neighboring Afghanistan to its own liking despite the wishes of the Afghan people.

At the United Nations. Shevardnadze said the Soviets have not yet begun the second stage of their withdrawal from Afghanistan. Half a Soviet force of more than 100,000 troops had pulled out by Aug. 15.

"Let's wait and see," he told reporters. "It is necessary to stop the violations that take place. It is the most important thing.

In a speech to the General Foreign Minister Eduard A. Assembly earlier, he asked the Shevardnadze says the Soviet five members of the U.N. Security Council to discuss violations of the withdrawal agreement with Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Residents can't wait to return

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP) Much of Love Canal has been declared safe for resettlement, and Nunzio LoVerdi, who spent years trying to stay in the neighborhood that became synonymous with chemical contamination, vowed to be the first

"Your home is your home no matter what happens to it," LoVerdi said Tuesday. "I'm going back.

State health officials announced Tuesday that hundreds of former Love Canal residents may return to the homes they left after the neighborhood was declared a disaster by President Jimmy Carter 10 years ago. Up to 80 other families were hoping the study would confirm their decision to stay in their homes near the former chemical dump site.

The state health commissioner, Dr. David Axelrod, said that as a result of state and federal cleanup efforts, most areas of Love Canal contain no more chemicals than neighborhoods in this industrial

Axelrod met with about 200 former residents Tuesday night to announce his findings. Axelrod said, however, that some blocks remain unsafe, affecting about 10

The long-anticipated finding was hailed by former residents who feared that their neighborhood would be left. boarded up and mostly abandoned as a symbol of environmental disaster.

'We didn't want to be a symbol of anything. We just wanted our lifestyle back," said LoVerdi, a retired laborer who led a group of renters fighting city and state plans to tear down the Lasalle Housing Project and other homes in the area.

LoVerdi was among the renters evicted this spring from the project, where state officials never found contamination. It is scheduled to be torn down because it would cost too much to


Actor-singer visits activist's home

The building had been sprayed with gunfire, allegedly by police repressing street demonstrations against President Augusto Pinochet.



MONTERREY, Mexico (AP) - Rescuers rummaged through tons of rubble today looking for at least four people believed trapped by the collapse of a six-story apartment building, which killed

a man and an infant boy They located the body of one, woman today, but there were no signs of two other women and a 19-month-old baby trapped inside when the building collapsed.

"They located a cadaver. Thy can see a leg but the body is squeezed in and it's down very deep," Luis Carlos Trevino Berchelman, Nuevo Leon state assistant attorney general, said at the

Rescue teams working since the building collapsed and slid down a steep hill Tuesday morning dug by hand and carried out buckets of broken concrete that had been the building's walls and floors.

"The goal is to preserve the life of those that may be inside,' Trevino Berchelman said.

He said three teams of dogs had been brought in to sniff through the rubble, including an American group from Dallas, Texas, all had pinpointed about the same locations where the victims may be trapped.

But he said the heavy concrete slabs prevented rescue workers from getting in to those locations.

Authorities said the 3-year-old building may have been weakened by Hurricane Gilbert, which hit this northern industrial city on Sept. 17 and caused widespread flooding that killed at least 140 people in the area.

the opportunity to name six judges this November, and he urged voters to be informed about the supreme court races.

"Money and politics result in bad laws," citing the \$8.8 million contributed to four current judges from "a handful of plaintiff firms. We have a court bought by the plaintiff's bar while business has sat on its hands."

He asked the mostly businessman audience if anyone could name the nine supreme court justices. "A good workman's compensation bill can be undone at the supreme court level. The court is making law and is making bad law."

In addition to electing nonpartisan judges, Perry suggested the heart of legislative reform would be to remove compensation claims from the civil courts.

Perry described the Texas Industrial Accident Board as a turnstile on the way to the courthouse. He said Texas is only one of three states that retain trial de novo, which sends cases directly to the civil courts. "Trial lawyers will do anything to prevent this reform. Trial de novo is a narrow special interest system that is antiquated.'

"It's an economic issue and you can't dance around it. There are lawyers who make a massive amount of money representing injured workers. This is the gut morning issue of the 71st session--who's afraid of trial lawyers."



Shuttle carries escape system

take forever to put on. But they hatch and pole. could be lifesavers for Discovery's astronauts.

The 75-pound suits, never before worn into space, are to be worn only during takeoff and landing and come packed with parachutes, lifeboats and radios. They are part of a new escape system, including a telescoping pole and an escape hatch, that was devised in the aftermath of Challenger, although it would not have helped in the disaster that killed seven astronauts.

"It's not a very comfortable thing to walk around in, but it's got a lot of capabilities," said Roly Rice, project engineer for the escape system, at NASA's Johnson Space Center.

It's so uncomfortable, in fact, that NASA has cut the "launch window" - the span in which liftoff could occur - from three to 212 hours to reduce the time the five crew members must spend on their backs inside the orbiter while dressed in the garments.

The astronauts also will have to wake up about 30 minutes earlier than previously on launch day because it takes extra time to put the suits on.

During the first four shuttle flights, astronauts wore lesssophisticated pressure suits that were to be used in combination with ejection seats in case of a launch emergency. But after the shuttle was deemed "operational," the seats were removed and the suits replaced with simple coveralls.


