Democrats hoped the debate has dramatized their contention that Quayle was too inexperienced to step into the presidency on a moment's notice and they drew cheer from the first flash poll suggesting much of the public was going along with that view.

In the only debate scheduled between the two of them, Quayle and Lloyd Bentsen clashed over protecting the environment, Social Security, Contra aid, taxes and campaign reform.

An ABC News poll rated Bentsen the clear winner. Six debate judges who scored the encounter for The Associated Press also picked Bentsen unanimously as the victor.

Quayle said he did "great" in his prime-time encounter with Bent sen. Democrat Bentsen said, "I think I did fine and I enjoyed it. I had fun.

In a 90-minute meeting where neither candidate made any big mistakes, the most electric moment came when the boyishlooking, 41-year-old Quayle was defending his qualifications and said he had as much experience as John F. Kennedy when he sought the presidency. It was a

comparison he has made often.

## Historic gun due display

A Sharps' 50 Buffalo Gun once owned by J. Wright Mooar will be displayed in the Scurry County Museum as part of its "Night of the Buffalo Moon" exhibit opening this weekend.

It was on Oct. 7, 1876, that Mooar, one of the most famous of the buffalo hunters, killed the white buffalo from which Snyder took the name for its annual October celebration. The museum's exhibit is part of this year's White Buffalo Celebration. The buffalo gun is on loan from Randy Hays, Mooar's great-grandson.

Featured in the museum exhibit will be sculptures and photographs by Pam Gilbreath Watkins of Buffalo Gap. Also included in the display are a buffalo sculpture by Dr. Robert Taylor of Snyder; a Cheyenne Indian bison pipe with a black stone bowl and etching and engravings on toan from the Amon Carter Museum in Fort Worth, and limited edition prints from Fen-

Members of the Museum Association will get the first look at the new exhibit Friday night when they attend a reception starting at 6:30 p.m. in the museum. 



Lawless also said, "I have never in my entire life had any direct or indirect contact with any Iranian government officials or any Iranian nationals claiming to represent the Iranian government or any Iranian related interests.'

On Tuesday, Bani-Sadr said in Paris that Lawless had negotiated in behalf of Vice President George Bush with a representative of Iranian Parliament Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani, in an attempt to get American hostages liberated.

Told of the denials at an interview with The New York Times on Wednesday in Paris, Bani-Sadr amended his account, saying he no longer was certain Lawless was involved in the talks, but that "it was probably

## Dan Quayle withstands tough test

Quayle withstood his mid-term He and Democratic presidenpresidential nominee.

Bentsen, Quayle held his own. There were no significant the presidency if he has to, while blunders by either man in the running mate debate.

An ABC News poll immediately after the debate found 51 percent thought Bentsen had won, 27 percent said Quayle, and 22 percent thought it a tie. The margin of error in the survey of 637 people but Lloyd Bentsen looked and was 4.5 percentage points.

Republican Quayle faced the more difficult debate assignment because he is the candidate found by public opinion polls to be a drag on his ticket. He has come under constant campaign attack. And he faced the tougher set of sometimes repetitive debate questions.

Bentsen fills a more traditional No. 2 role. He isn't an issue. He is, rather, a bridge between Democratic presidential nominee Michael Dukakis and his party's more conservative branch.

At the start of the Omaha, Neb., debate, Quayle was asked to defend his credentials and qualifications for the vice presidency and, if need be, the presidency itself. That meshed with the theme Bentsen came to stress — that the debate really dealt with the presidency itself, and whether he or Quayle is the better man to take on the job if

And the debate had hardly ended before Dukakis In 90 minutes of pressurized repeated that theme, telling a debate with Democrat Lloyd Boston rally that Bentsen had proved again he could take over Quayle could not.

That points to a campaign theme that is sure to be part of the Democratic litany until Nov. 8. Post-debate comments, predictably, fit that pattern.

"Neither scored a knockout, sounded more presidential," said Democratic Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois, a former candidate for his party's prize.

Quayle clearly had done his homework for the debate test. When the first questioner recited criticism of his military and academic records, and disparaging comments by Republicans, Quayle said the question behind it all was of his qualifications to be vice president "and in the case of tragedy, whether I'm qualified to be president."

The Indiana senator, 41, said it isn't a question of age but of accomplishments and experience, insisted that he has both, especially on national security, jobs and education, and the federal budget.

"On each one of those issues I have more experience than does the governor of Massachusetts,' he said. And repeatedly, "I am prepared ... to lead this country" if the GOP ticket wins and that becomes necessary. Quayle stuck to that line all

## AP analysis

The panel of questioners, three television and one print journalist, went back to the topic repeatedly, three times by asking what first step Quayle would take if he ever became president. That's an unanswerable question, since no vice president could know what he'd do without knowing the circumstances of his succession. It was not asked of Bent-

Each time, Quayle went back to his formula, claiming strength on the big three issues.

But he varied it enough to trigger the debate's sharpest exchange, saying that he has as much experience now as John F. Kennedy had when he ran for president.

'Senator, I served with Jack Kennedy, I knew Jack Kennedy, Jack Kennedy was a friend of mine," said Bentsen. "Senator, you're no Jack Kennedy.

'That was really uncalled for, senator," an angry Quayle

Kennedy had served 14 years in Congress, eight in the Senate before he became president in 1960. Quayle has been a senator for eight years, and served four in the House.

Bentsen took a share of sharp questions, on his political fundraising tactics and also about his differences with Dukakis on such topics as aid to the Nicaraguan Contras, the death penalty and gun control. The Texas senator favors the first two, opposes gun control. Dukakis holds opposite positions. Bentsen said they agree on most issues, then changed the subject.

Quayle tried to make an issue of that, saying he wouldn't try to defend a liberal like Dukakis,

But he remained the focus. And he is certain to remain a prime target in the five weeks until election day.







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## Time between sex varies a great deal

DEAR DR. GOTT: A woman in our group is 34 and married to a 46-yearold alcoholic. She says she has intercourse with her husband once every 3 months and doesn't miss it. Is this

DEAR READER: I hope that your 'group" is Alanon, a support organization that helps people whose lives have been affected by alcoholism. If you are not in Alanon, I urge you to suggest to your friend that she consid-

To answer your question: Sexual needs vary from person to person. What is "normal" for one couple may not be "normal" for another. Under different circumstances, your friend might choose to be more sexually active. Her present situation may not permit this. It's difficult to get turned on by late-night advances made by a guy who reeks of gin. Alanon could help your friend deal more effectively with what is, at best, a difficult

situation Alcoholism aside, I am often asked what constitutes appropriate, intervals between sexual encounters. Again, people exhibit enormous variation in their patterns. In part, this is related to age, fatigue, stress, general sexual energy, personal preferences and a whole host of interpersonal factors. It seems to me that the appropriate interval is whatever each partner feels comfortable with. Should there be a discrepancy within the couple's wishes, outside counseling might be in

With respect to the woman in your group, I'll bet she would miss more requent sex if her husband stopped drinking. However, under those circumstances, the environment would change and the couple would probably reach a different sexual balance. DEAR READER: Egg whites are composed primarily of protein, mostalbumen; they contain no cholesterol.

On the other hand, it's the egg yolks that can cause trouble for people with high cholesterol because egg yolks contain a significant amount of cholesterol, about 250 mg per yolk. For patients who are advised to reduce dietary cholesterol, this amount is approximately a one-day ration. Therefore, the prohibition against eggs results solely from the cholesterolrich yolks. Egg whites are nutritious and can be consumed without restric-

Mason said it would be difficult now to guess how the court might

"If they say you can't execute retarded people, it could affect all on death row, provided they can prove they're mentally retarded," he said Wednesday. "A lot depends on how they over-rule it. I'm not going to try to speculate. But I don't think it's going to be that broad a challenge."

Mason is in the unique position of being a state attorney working on behalf of an inmate challenging a state law. Another state attorney, from the Texas attorney general's office, will argue the case against Penry before the

Supreme Court. When Mason first got the case 21/2 years ago, death row inmates were having difficulty getting attorneys to handle their cases. Those who could not afford to hire their own attorneys were assigned to Texas Department of Corrections staff counsels.

The Penry case is the first with TDC representation to make it to the Supreme Court.

A sharply divided House Banking Committee voted 29-22 on Wednesday to expand the Federal Home Loan Bank Board's borrowing limit from \$10.8 billion in bonds to \$15.8 billion. The move is opposed by the industry, which pays an assessment to retire the 30-year

Committee Chairman Fernand J. St Germain, D-R.I., said the measure could come before the full House as early as today.

St Germain said the Senate would be "hard put" to oppose an expansion of the bank board's borrowing limit, since last summer, when Congress authorized \$10.8 billion in borrowing over three years, the Senate pushed for a higher limit of \$15 billion.

The bank board already has issued \$3.75 billion in bonds. The Banking Committee bill would permit the bank board to float the remaining amount as soon as needed rather than spreading it

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
