A state panel meeting in Austin Tuesday authorized the issuance of about \$32 million in bonds to complete funding for four 1,000-bed prisons, including the Snyder unit, and to improve facilities at other prison facilities.

The Texas Bond Review Board also approved approximately \$14.6 million in general obligation bonds for the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation for construction and repair at state schools, hospitals and centers

About \$20 million of the \$32.265 million authorized for prisons will go toward improvements dictated by a federal court order against the Texas Department of Corrections. The improvements include upgrading wastewater facilities and heating and ventilation at the

units

The remaining funds will go toward overruns of previous coestimates at the 1,000-bed units. Three of the four units are currently under construction. All four units are expected to be completed next year at a cost of about \$76 million, prison officials said.

In addition to Snyder, units are located in Marlin, Woodville and Dayton.

By Oct. 1, the construction project here was estimated at approximately 10 percent complete. It is scheduled to be at its busiest building phase sometime in December and to be completed in June of next year.

Bids for the construction phase here came in at \$14.4 million.

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

# AT&T plans to cut

The cuts, totaling \$697 million annually, would take effect Dec. 1, the day that residential and small business customers begin paying an additional 60 cents per month to pay the costs of maintaining the local phone network.

As subscribers pay more of the costs to maintain the local net-

work, long-distance companies pay less. The Federal Communications Commission requires AT&T, the nation's largest long-distance company, to send these savings back to consumers by lowering rates.

AT&T's competitors are not required to return these savings to customers, but the companies have tended to lower their rates in response to AT&T price cuts.

The two largest competitors, MCI Communications Corp. and US Sprint Communications Co., said Monday they would review

AT&T's plans. MCI spokesman John Houser said the company "will maintain a competitive rate structure" and "will be passing the access line savings along to our customers." But he said MCI

could not be specific until it has fully reviewed AT&T's proposal. Sprint spokesman Syd Courson said the company wanted to review AT&T's proposed cuts before commenting on its own plans. "We don't know what we

will do right now," he said. The price cut, if approved by the FCC, would be AT&T's seventh since 1984, when the company was stripped of its local operating companies by an antitrust decree.

When South went beyond three notrump with four clubs, North wanted to do more than just bid five clubs. He had no diamond ace or heart king to cue-bid, but he had an honor in the suit in which partner had made a jump shift, so he bid four spades. Since South was anxious to bid a slam,

North's spade bid gave him an excuse to bid six clubs. Bidding it was easier than making it, however.

Chances seemed reasonable, even though the heart lead was best for the defense. If clubs were to divide, declarer could play four rounds of spades and shed a heart from dummy. Later, ruffing a losing heart in dummy would be the 12th trick. So declarer won his heart ace and played two rounds of trumps. Unfortunately East held three clubs to the jack. Undaunted, South left one trump outstanding and played off four rounds of spades. Since East had to follow, declarer was able to discard one heart from dummy. Declarer then led a heart, hoping that West would have to win the trick. But East won the heart jack and played back his jack of clubs. That killed the potential ruff in dummy and declarer had to go set.

Was there a countermove? Sure all declarer had to do was duck the opening heart lead. He could then win the second trick and go about his business as before. The only difference is that the defenders can't play that third round of trumps at him, and he will ruff his heart loser to make the slam.

# Bakery expo displays the sweet and the lucrative

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) -Flaky pastry puffs filled with chocolate mousse float on a tray near the swirl of whipped cream crowning a glazed bed of strawberries and a soft jelly roll oozing with a tart burst of red.

For most people, this is sweet torture. To those attending the Atlantic Bakery Expo this week, this is sweetly lucrative.

Bakers wandered through the expo at Convention Center on Monday, admiring stainless steel mixing bowls as big as Jacuzzis, ovens as big as dining rooms and a \$14,000 machine that pops out 175 dozen bagels an hour.

More than 10,000 buyers were expected to attend the three-day expo, which ends today.

The retail baking industry generates about \$6 billion nationwide each year, with 20,000 independent retail bakers and another 20,000 in-store bakeries across the United States, according to statistics compiled by the Retail Bakers of America Association.

"We could say this show smells of opportunity and tastes of success," said John Charles, executive secretary of the New Jersey Bakers Board of Trade.

for modern bakers displayed at the annual show. There are still frosting bags and traditional wedding cake toppers decorated with lace, but there are also gadgets such as high-tech spray guns that use food coloring to create detailed cake-top scenes.

"Business has been so good that we sold our bakery two years ago and now we sell our Stencil Aire products around the country," said Belinda Franklin, a co-partner in the young cake stenciling firm based in Ripon,

At the expo, Chris Moore, of the Hazelwood (Mo.) Farms Bakeries, promoted a line of predecorated frozen cakes and cupcakes that stores can thaw and sell.

'It's hard to find skilled labor to decorate cakes nowadays," he said. "You don't find that many people want to be bakers anymore because of the crazy hours." Bakers traditionally get a predawn start on their day behind the stove.

But bakers who still make their own cakes are turning to products that save time. Richard D'Alco, a spokesman for In-

The average sweet tooth might stantwhip Food Inc. of Columbus, be surprised at the innovations Ohio, pointed to a giant strawberry shortcake frosted with Instantwhip whipped cream that comes from a carton and doesn't use heavy cream.

"Real heavy cream is primarily used in gourmet operations as long as people are willing to pay the high price," he said. But D'Alco didn't have to con-

tinue touting his product. A husband-wife baking team stopped at his booth to rave.

'Real whipped cream turns in-

to water if you beat it too much,' said Rose Hamilton, co-owner of the Bel Air (Md.) Bakery. "Fresh whipped cream is the

worst thing you could use," said her husband, James.

Even the decorations on cakes can be premade. Sam Guttman, president of Bakery Crafts of Cincinnati, pointed to his variety of colorful plastic and hard sugar cake decorations.

#### At times, benefits can come up short

DEAR DR. GOTT: How I laughed at your article about free VA care! My husband, a vet of World War II, has had surgery for rectal cancer, an ostomy, liver cancer, diabetes, cataract surgery, heart trouble and a stroke. I can't get the VA even to supply the necessary ostomy supplies, let alone the "routine" checkups. If we didn't live in Mexico, we'd be street people by now because of our medical bills, and all thanks to the VA

DEAR READER: I am sorry to learn of your husband's difficulties with the Veteran's Administration. I know that the VA sometimes stubs its toe - it is, after all, a bureaucracy like any other. However, the VA hospital system, despite its drawbacks, continues to provide low-cost medical care to veterans.

In my opinion, your husband's ill health, not the VA, is the root of the problem. If you believe that he has been unfairly treated, you can certainly appeal the VA decision or work through your congressman.

Because the VA has relatively strict rules about how the system responds to the needs of veterans, I usually encourage people to carry private health insurance in the event that the VA denies their claims.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I went on a very strict diet for six months and became constipated. I'm now hooked on laxa-- seven a day. If I don't take them, my bowels don't move. What

DEAR READER: Strict dieting may deprive people of intestinal bulk and roughage, leading to constipation. You may be able to get back on the right track by taking one of the commercially available plant derivatives, such as Metamucil, to add fiber to your diet. These preparations are low-calorie and will often solve the problem.

In addition, you might try eating more salads and raw vegetables, which contain roughage. Such foods contain few calories, will reduce hunger, are safe and plentiful, and will additional benefits.

Avoid taking daily laxatives - especially in large quantities - because your intestinal tract will come to depend on them. Ask your doctor for specific advice.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife and I go with each other for checkups and doctors' visits. We never have any problems when she goes with me. But some doctors have a problem when I go with her. Can you explain this inconsistency

DEAR READER: I cannot. However, the inconsistency you've noticed does exist. Recently, Dr. Aaron Lazare, chairman of psychiatry at the University of Massachusetts in Worcester, addressed this problem.

He believes that such doctor-behavior is a form of humiliation. Doctors may inadvertently add to the unpleasantness of examinations or illness by being insensitive to patients' needs. The healers may not understand or accept their own vulnerability - and they take it out on patients, usually women, who are more vulnerable.

The next time you accompany your wife to the doctor and he seems uncomfortable about your presence, ask him why. Perhaps this will open the door to some interesting dialogue.

"It is a little disheartening having to go out and throw on 15 days" rest and then nine days and have myself and everyone else expecting me to do the job," Tudor said. "I'm not in any kind of rhythm now. I hope I get in one real quick.

At the same time, Dodgers slugger Kirk Gibson, unable to start either of the first two games because of leg injuries, was getting worse instead of better.

"I'm sorer today than I was yesterday — much sorer." Gibson said at Monday's workout.

With Bob Welch, a former Dodger, going for the A's, Game 3 features a matchup of two pitchers who have struggled in postseason

Tudor, 10-8 during the season, was traded from St. Louis to Los

Angeles last Aug. 17 for Pedro Guerrero. He was 4-3 with the Dodgers but did not start in the regular season after Sept. 18 He didn't pitch again until Oct. 9, when he gave up four runs on eight hits in five innings against New York in the playoffs.

That gave Tudor a career playoff ERA of 3.00. His World Series ERA is 4.03.

The Dodgers said Tudor was rested at the end of the regular season because of a hip injury. Tudor said it wasn't so.

"I'm not hurt. I haven't been hurt." Tudor said. "That played no

Lasorda said he understood Tudor's consternation, but he said he had a choice to make.

"When I was putting together the pitching assignments. I felt it would be easier for Tudor to pitch on too much rest than (rookie) Tim Belcher," Lasorda said. "I felt with Tudor's experience in big games, he would be better able to handle it than Belcher

Welch, meanwhile, has a lifetime playoff ERA of 4.50, and his World Series history has slid precipitously since his spotlight strikeout of Reggie Jackson in 1978. He made only one start in the 1981 World Series against New York and gave up two runs on three by Orel Hershiser.

'In 1981, it was just one of those days when he didn't have his good stuff," Dodgers Manager Tom Lasorda said, at the same time dismissing notions that Welch is too hyper to pitch well in big games.

The four states rank behind only New York in the number of AIDS cases, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control.

Rex Shannon, chairman and chief executive officer for Fidel ty Union Life in Dallas, said the practice of Midland National Life is "probably a departure from the norm.'

Shannon said insurers must test for AIDS because, at age 35, for example, carriers of the virus are 40 times more likely to die than other people. He said paying the life insurance claims of AIDS patients can threaten a firm's ability to cover its other policy holders.

An industry survey in 1985 found that nearly half of the policy holders who died of AIDS had bought their insurance within the past two years, indicating that many of the policy holders apparently knew or suspected they had been infected with the deadly disease.





WASHINGTON (AP) - The Internal Revenue Service could collect billions of dollars more a year by using the same aggressive enforcement tactics returns by businesses. He said against businesses that it uses against individual taxpayers; a congressional report says.

The report by the Government Operations subcommittee on commerce, consumer and monetary affairs comes amid a presidential campaign in which Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis has made more aggressive collection of unpaid taxes a cornerstone of his economic proposals.

The subcommittee report, released Monday, says the IRS should develop a program to match "information returns" showing interest and dividend income paid to businesses with the actual tax returns filed by each company. -

The report' estimated that year in taxes on interest and dividends earned by businesses is never collected because the income is not reported to the IRS.

The IRS for years has been using its computers to compare information returns listing interest and dividend payments to individuals with the income tax returns filed by the individuals. The program produced \$2.35 billion in additional tax revenue from individuals in fiscal 1985.

Banks and corporations are not required to file such information returns, but the House report said the IRS still received 26 million such returns in 1985, showing income payments to 5 million businesses totaling \$987 billion.

# Efforts underway to free 3 whales trapped by thick ice

BARROW, Alaska (AP) — One timistic. of three gray whales trapped nearly two weeks by Arctic Sea ice has pneumonia, but biologists say the bleeding and battered behemoths should survive at least until a risky attempt at freeing them.

An Alaska Army National Guard Skycrane helicopter was to lift off today from Prudhoe Bay to tow a 185-ton Hovercrafttype ice-breaking barge 200 miles northwest to the whales.

The trip, expected to take from 25 to 40 hours, was delayed Monday while the company that owns the barge made final checks for repairs, said Mike Haller, a National Guard spokesman.

The endangered California gray whales became trapped while migrating south to warmer waters. The 24-30-foot-long mammals were bleeding and battered from continually bashing into the jagged ice and were exhausted from swimming against the ocean current to remain in place.

The whales were trapped 18 miles northeast of this Inupiat Eskimo village. They were only a few hundred feet offshore in 45 feet of water, with their largest ice hole about 10-by-20 feet.

Villagers and biologists used ice picks Monday to keep the breathing holes open in the 6-inch thick ice, but sub-zero temperatures threatened to seal them.

Ron Morris, with the National Marine Fisheries Service, said he and several veterinarians went onto the ice Monday to study the whales, and noticed that one had symptoms of pneumonia.

"Their condition has worsened since they were first spotted," Morris said. "One has a little pneumonia but the others are all right. We're being cautiously op-

#### In Movie Theaters

PUNCHLINE (PG-13) Tom Hanks is a fresh comic actor, even in this movie, which is not a fresh comic film in any other way. Despite a promising subject, this look at two aspiring stand-up comedians who offer each other solace and support falls flat from the titles sequence on. A movie about comedy that isn't funny is

downright ignominious. Hanks plays a failed med student moonlighting as an edgy comic. At the same club where Hanks performs, he meets Jersey housewife/would-be stand-up Sally Field. Soon he's helping her with her husband and career, and she's soothing him after he has a breakdown one night on stage.

The main problem with this movie, written and directed by the undistinguished David Seltzer, is quite basic. Sally Field is not credible for one second as a stand-up comic: It's impossible to tell the difference between her supposedly bad early sets and her supposedly hilarious later ones. They're all terrible.

Playing aggressive, Hanks is better, though his breakdown scene is embarrassingly over-written. In general, the club audiences within the film keep breaking up over material that is moldy chuckle stuff at best. And the film takes a condescending and sappy turn at the end, when Sally

rejects a comedy contest win to please her husband (John Goodman) and show her gratitude to Hanks. GRADE: \*1/2

CLARA'S HEART (PG-13) Do you like movies that try to warm the cockles of your heart, that rub up against you like a wet-nosed pup? If so, hurry to see this latest vehicle for Whoopi Goldberg. If, on the other hand, you like your sentiment more subdued. you may want to miss this flick. In other words, it's a shameless, welltooled tearjerker.

After a few violent and vulgar movies like "Burglar", Whoopi's career seemed derailed "Clara's Heart" marks her return to the heart-tugging mugging of "The Color Purple." This would seem to be a shrewd commercial move for Whoopi, since the picture could win back the older, racially mixed audience that helped make "Purple" a hit. Yet one still hopes that some day the star will get to play on film the kind of hard-edged, socially astute, yet non-egotistical comedy she does on stage - instead of alternating between being a know-it-all, female Eddie Murphy and a drippingly noble black heroine.

As Clara, she's in her nobility phase. The woman's a veritable Buddha of a Jamaican housekeeper, who goes to live with a wealthy, unhappy couple (Kathleen Quinlan and Michael Ontkean) grieving over the death of their baby. Clara's charge is

the couple's wisecracking and initially hostile son (coy Neil Patrick Harris). The housekeeper and the boy become fast friends, and soon she is teaching him loads of gentle and harsh lessons about life.

Clara turns out to have a deep dark secret, but she's still a saint. Even when she brushes aside the boy for what seems her own interests, she has a way of sounding like that other noble Clara - Miss Barton. Whoopi gives the schmaltzy, self-serving role her all, which, under the circumstances, may strike some as giving a little too much. While others are sniffling through the ending, the less happily manipulated viewer may feel infuriated at Clara's smugness. You've never seen a woman so full of life and love and courage and fun. In real life, you never will. GRADE: ★★

#### **New Home Video**

SCHOOL DAZE (R) RCA/Columbia, \$89.95. Spike Lee followed up his funky small-budget success "She's Gotta Have It" with this slick, somewhat misunderstood movie about Homecoming Weekend at a fictitious black college.

The movie is a collage of raunchy "Animal House"-type frat humor, splashy musical numbers and didactic racial dialogues. It's messy all right, and a bit schematic as Lee contrasts the attitudes of the darker-skinned, proudly militant "Jigaboos," and the ighter-skinned, hair-straightened Wannabees." But it's also a spirited and audacious film - and one that makes no concessions to white viewers. GRADE: \*\*
