Budget cuts

AUSTIN AP Railroad Commissioner John Sharp has called for cuts in the budget request his agency has submitted to the Texas Legislature

"I did not get elected to this agency to preside over a growing bureaucracy. I got elected to streamline this agency and make it work more efficiently. Sharp said in a Tuesday statement. The statement said he called for the cuts in a speech to the Wharton Chamber of Commerce.

The commission's submitted request calls for increasing its budget from \$35.17 million to \$38 million next year and \$37.9 million the following year. It would increase the number of personnel from the current 840 to 1,026 next year and 1,029 the following year

Sharp's proposed budget reduces the request by \$3 million each year



MEXICO CITY (AP) Energy Secretary Fernando Hiriart on Tuesday announced Mexico will set crude oil prices in accordance with prices of other independent producers, saving overproduction by OPEC had rendered that cartel's market quotas useless.

'Since OPEC has not had a serious policy when it comes to respecting production levels and pricing of energy products, producing a destabilization of the international petroleum market. we will ignore its projections about improving prices per barrel of crude," Hiriart said in a statement issued by the Energy, Mines and Parastatal Industries Department.

Mexico is not a member of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries but traditionally has followed the cartel's pricing and production guidelines.

Pemex, the government oil monopoly, has criticized OPEC producers this year for engaging in an undeclared price war, particularly in the United States, Mexico's No. 1 customer.

Pemex blames OPEC overproduction for lowering the average-price of Mexican export crude to \$9.91 a barrel in October.

Great American Smokeout Brings Breath of Fresh Air

DEAR READERS: Tomorrow will mark the 12th Annual Great American Smokeout, a one-day campaign to encourage smokers to quit smoking for 24 hours, just to prove they can do it. The idea, conceived by Lynn R. Smith, editor of the Monticello (Minn.) Times, has now spread to Canada, Great Britain, France, Ireland, Australia, South Africa, Norway, Finland and Sweden.

Last year, more than 19.5 million smokers tried to quit for the day. This represents more than 39 percent of the nation's 50 million smokers. Breast cancer used to be the biggest killer for women. But the No. 1 cause of death among women and men today is lung cancer. An estimated 92,000 men and 44,000 women will die of lung cancer in

And now, a word about smoking-related diseases - emphysema, chronic bronchitis and heart disease: This year an estimated 320,000 will die from one of these. This total exceeds the number of U.S. battle deaths in World War II; it is eight times as many people who die in automobile accidents every

A congressional study has reported that health costs from the adverse effects of smoking have reached a new high of \$100 billion a year in increased medical bills and lost productivity. The loss in death and disability cannot be measured. (And how does one measure the amount of heartache, remorse and guilt suffered as a result of a preventable, self-induced tragedy?)

What about "secondhand" smoke? Is it actually damaging to non-smokers to be in the presence of those who are smoking? Yes! Furthermore, studies reveal that the children of smokare more prone to lung problems and allergies than are children of non-smokers.

For years I have begged my young readers, "If you smoke, quit now. If you don't smoke, don't start!" Yet an estimated 3,000 to 5,000 kids light up for the first time every day. Why? Peer pressure, no doubt.

Quitting "cold turkey" is the hardest way to quit, but my readers have told me it's the most effective, and in the long run, the easiest way. Cutting down is less traumatic, but the temptation to smoke is often too powerful to resist while smoking just one, two or three cigarettes a day.

Those who are heavily addicted may require help to break the habit. Call your local chapter of the American Cancer Society for information.

So if you're hooked on cigarettes and have been telling yourself, "One of these days I'm going to quit," why not start tomorrow?

It won't be easy, but it will be the best Thanksgiving present you can give yourself - and those who love you.

P.S. A favor, please? If you quit tomorrow, even for 24 hours, I want to hear from you. Then write again and let me know how long you were able to stay clean. Good luck. Keep me posted.

P.S.S. Apropos "Thanks for Not Smoking" signs some folks have in their homes: I once saw a sign that read: "If you smoke on these premises, we will assume that you are on fire, and you will be treated accordingly."

Practice to deceive

When you must find your crucial game-going trick in a side-suit, it can't hurt to practice a little deception. From time to time, making the right play will win anyway. But when the right play is not going to work, maybe you can trick the opponents into making a mistake.

In today's four-spade contract, declarer had three certain losers - two diamonds and a heart. Since he also had a club loser, he had to set up an extra winner in the heart suit for a club discard.

The defenders took the king and ace Alpha Club meets

of diamonds, and East returned a club. Declarer won dummy's club ace and put off drawing trumps. (He needed communication back and forth in the spade suit.) Instead he led a low heart from dummy. East played low and South won the queen. A spade was played to dummy's king and another low heart was played from dummy. East correctly played the 10, winning the trick, and continued with the queen of clubs. Declarer won the king, played a low spade to the nine in dummy, and played another heart. Up came the ace; declarer ruffed and got back to dummy with a high spade to shed a losing club on the good king of hearts.

This line of play worked because the ace of hearts was guarded only twice. If East had started with four hearts, declarer's play would have still given East a chance to make the error of thinking that he needed to grab the ace early in case declarer had Q-J doubleton in the heart suit.

Ruling today on Carter's fate

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Education Agency and University Interscholastic League planned to rule today on whether undefeated Dallas Carter will be ousted from the state football playoffs for playing an athlete who may have failed an algebra class in the first six weeks.

The UIL state executive committee met Tuesday to decide whether Carter High has played and should be punished for playing - an ineligible athlete.

But the panel abruptly broke off its hearing in the afternoon and adjourned until 1 p.m. today. The executive committee and TEA officials began to question the UIL's jurisdiction.

"The UIL cannot make a decision as to whether the player is ineligible," UIL assistant athletic director Gina Mazzolini said. "It's the TEA that needs to step in to decide whether punishments are deserved. Then the UIL would come in to decide what the penalties are.

Following six hours of testimony before a standingroom-only crowd, the 14-member UIL committee agreed to reconvene to give the State Board of Education a chance to decide if Dallas Carter player Gary Edwards is ineligible. State officials were looking into alleged grade tampering.

"If there is a violation, it has to be confirmed by the State Board of Education," said UIL Athletic Director Bill Farney. "If it is indeed a violation, the State Executive Committee will rule on what they have heard."







Bush fills out economic team

President-elect George Bush has tapped feisty Gov. John Sununu as his chief of staff, sources say, a signal of change after his first two top appointments went to Reagan administration veterans.

Bush today attended a colorful White House ceremony welcoming British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, who told reporters "I think we're all very fortunate in the Western world" that Bush will be Ronald Reagan's successor.

Their styles will be different, she said, but "for the first time we shall have continuity of policies, stretching over a second presidency ... and that gives enormous stability and confidence to the feeling of the

Thatcher, who was paying a farewell call on President Reagan, praised his administration as "one of the greatest in American history.

With Reagan by her side at a White House ceremony filled with expressions of mutual admiration, Mrs. Thatcher said the. Reagan years "have restored faith in the American dream."

Reagan, in turn, praised Mrs. Thatcher as a leader of "courage, resolve and vision."

Later, while posing for photographers with Reagan in his office, Mrs. Thatcher said her visit was aimed not only at reminiscing about past achievements but at looking ahead to the incoming administration.

Bush did not take part in the Oval Office meeting.

Meanwhile, Bush's transition co-chairmen, Craig Fuller and Robert Teeter, were holding a news conference to announce a raft of additions to the transition

Among those stated to be named deputy transition directors is Fred Fielding, the former Reagan White House counsel now advising Dan Quayle, the vice president-elect.

On Tuesday, after flying home from a four-day Florida vacation with Sununu in tow, Bush met with West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl and announced Brady as the second occupant of a friend's beach home where the his Cabinet. Million plus aliens apply for amnesty

WASHINGTON (AP) Federal officials say extensive fraud has surfaced in a special farm worker amnesty program that has attracted more than 1 million applications, more than twice most projections.

Duke Austin, a spokesman for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, said the program has resulted in cases of gross fraud, partly because of its generous provisions, and fraud 'cartels' have sprung up to provide false affidavits or other work documentation.



DEAR DR. GOTT: I broke two bones in my fingers. The fractures have healed, and I'm getting physical therapy. However, I have developed reflex sympathetic dystrophy. What exactly is this condition?

DEAR READER: Reflex sympathetic dystrophy is a peculiar nerve reaction that can occur in areas of the body where bone or soft-tissue injury has taken place.

The primary components of the syndrome are pain and shrinkage of tissue, seen as atrophy (withering) of bone or skin, loss of hair and increased sweating or flushing.

The precise cause of the dystrophy seems to be malfunction of certain autonomic nerves, those that are not under conscious control.

Physical therapy (to maintain muscle function and prevent joint contractures) is usually combined with injected nerve blocks (medicine to deaden the nerves temporarily.) If the nerve block is effective, consideration is given to surgery to cut the nerve and give more lasting results.

TENS (transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulation, using electrical impulses to block nerve function) and acupuncture are also sometimes

fully find out if a doctor speaks with a heavy accent before making an appointment?

DEAR READER: Foreign doctors are often drawn to practice in the United States because they perceive that opportunities are greater here than in their native countries. Although these doctors may be highly competent practitioners, the language barrier can be a problem.

In evaluating a foreign doctor, I suggest that you use the same method that you would apply in selecting an American physician:

Request a get-acquainted visit to find out whether the doctor appears caring and is in agreement with your general philosophy about medical treatment.

Is he willing, despite a language handicap, to discuss issues with you and help you understand what he proposes to do and why? What are his billing procedures? Will he make house calls? What are his views about issues of life-support? Is he willing to include you in the decision-making process? These and other topics are mportant.

I've found that, all things being equal, the doctor's competence, availability and attitude are more important than his accent. Keep looking for

a doctor until you find one who answers your needs and with whom you feel comfortable.

As part of the selection process, be sure to check the practitioner's credentials: You will want to be certain that he received the training he says he did. The county medical society or the state licensing bureau can verify this information. Beware of the doctor who is not a member in good standing of the county or state medical society.

Also, be wary of practitioners who refuse to take the extra time to explain to you, in understandable terms. your health problem and the treatment for it.

Many foreign doctors provide excellent health-care resources. The extra time it takes you to find the right doctor will be amply repaid.




