Bush told reporters today to 'stay tuned'' but refused to say whether he would make Sununu's appointment official or make any other announcements.

"I don't know," he said. "Maybe so, but I'm not sure.

For his part. Sununu refused to confirm at a news conference in Concord on Wednesday that Bush has tapped him for White House chief of staff.

"A request isn't a formal request until the tall thin guy sings," Sununu said. "And the tall thin guy hasn't sung publicly, and therefore I'm not going to comment.'

Sununu has a reputation for being a quick study, highly intelligent and assertive. Some regard him as arrogant and abrasive, traits that could hurt him in working with Congress. He made light of that reputation Wednesday.



Puente had not been seen since Saturday, when police allowed



# Opinions vary on FBI investigation

decide by the end of the month whether the FBI illegally secured a grand jury subpoena in an investigation of an agent who filed a class-action racial discrimination lawsuit against the bureau.

An assistant U.S. attorney from Virginia testified Wednesday that an FBI agent asked him to obtain the subpoena for "an administrative inquiry with a criminal aspect.

The FBI says its probe of agent Bernardo "Matt" Perez is administrative, although grand jury subpoenas are supposed to be used in only criminal - not administrative - investigations.

Perez filed the racial discrimination suit in January 1987. After a two-week, non-jury trial in El Paso in August, Judge Lucius Bunton ruled that the FBI had discriminated against Perez and the 310 Hispanic agents who joined him in the lawsuit. Perez is the No. 2 agent in El Paso.

The administrative inquiry into Perez was launched just two weeks after he filed the lawsuit and about three weeks after the FBI exonerated Perez in a related to the administrative pro-

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) - A retaliation for filing the suit and federal judge is expected to for contradicting his boss' testimony in the espionage trial of Los Angeles agent Richard Miller.

> Specifically, FBI inspector Gary Hart asked for the subpoena through an intermediary so he could examine telephone toll records to determine whether Perez had tried to call Hart one day while Hart was conducting the criminal investigation, according to testimony. Perez said he tried to call Hart; Hart said Perez didn't.

"I started smoking at 14 because I thought it was chic," said actress Celeste Holm, who with other stars at New York City's Lincoln Center on Wednesday urged participation in the smokeout

'I didn't know it would kill you. Now we know better.'

Anti-smokers around the country prepared for the big snuffout, which attempts to coax puffers to say, "Enough!" - at least

In Nebraska, a sheriff said he wanted to "arrest smoking," newborn babies in Seattle and Council Bluffs, Iowa, were adorned with anti-smoking T-shirts and the operator of the trans-Alaska oil pipeline tried to convince people that it's no joke to

New to the smokeout this year is the "Back a Quitter" program. Backers act as buddies to the smokers for the day. By soliciting pledges from co-workers for every hour they go without a cigarette, the smokers also will raise funds for the American Cancer Society.

The American Cancer Society, which sponsors the event, estimated nearly 40 percent of the nation's 50 million smokers participated last year.

"Here's our answer to a packa-day - a pachyderm!" shouted ringmaster Paul Binder in New York as one of two cigarettesmashing elephants stomped a Styrofoam butt to promote the smokeout at New York's "Big Apple Circus."

# Accused mass murderer convicted

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - A man history. accused of fatally slashing and stabbing four siblings in their mobile home last spring was convicted of capital murder after becold, cowardly, cutthroat he executed it.

emotion when the verdict was read shortly before 6 p.m. Wednesday.

The 11-woman, one-man jury deliberated about 2 1-2 hours before finding Narvaiz guilty of killing his former girlfriend, Shannon, Mann, 17, along with her siblings, Jennifer, 19; Martha, 15; and Ernest, 11; at their mobile home on April 15.

The punishment phase of the trial is scheduled to begin today and Narvaiz faces the maximum penalty of death by injection.

Testimony in the three-week trial indicated that the Manns were brutally slain with knives taken from their kitchen. Some of the knives were propelled with such force that they broke in the victims' bodies

Testimony also has revealed that Narvaiz was high on cocaine the morning of the slayings and that his former girlfriend told her she loved him and begged for her life moments before she died of multiple stab wounds.

**Bexar County District Attorney** Fred Rodriguez declined to comment, but Narvaiz's attorneys said their client was somewhat surprised by the verdict.

'I think anybody would be surprised by a verdict such as this," attorney Ernie Glenn said. "(But) I think Leo will accept the verdict as it came back from the

The guilty verdict came one day after jurors heard Shannon Mann's final words, in which she made a call to a 911 emergency operator to say Narvaiz was attacking them.

Rodriguez said that Narvaiz killed the Manns to punish them because Shannon refused to see him anymore.

"He wants justice. He's gotten the right to a public trial," Rodriguez said in closing arguments Wednesday.

What right did this gutless, spineless, murderer accord them? None at all," Rodriguez said, describing the slayings as the most grisly in the county's



At Mather elementary school in a working-class Boston neighborhood, the second grade doesn't have enough math textbooks, the fourth grade needs social studies books and the sixth grade lacks language texts. Health books are missing entirely in the school of 550 students.

Forced to pare its budget, the Boston School Department last spring eliminated \$1.3 million in funding for instructional supplies, leaving \$3.7 million for textbooks, paper, pencils and other materials.

"It's one of the few variable costs you have in the School Department," said Peter Rowe, deputy superintendent for planning and business affairs for the 58,000-student system. Higher

book costs also have hurt. "It was a choice when we came to it between things like textbooks or librarians or nurses or athletic programs or field trips,'

he said Wednesday. In the September study of schools in Detroit, Denver, New Orleans, Indianapolis and Rochester, N.Y., 20 of the 31 schools surveyed said they had

DEAR DR. GOTT: My daughter had a very long and difficult labor. During it, she developed a swelling at her jaw joint and under her eve which closed the eye completely. It went away in a few weeks. Now she's pregnant again. I'm very worried that she was close to a stroke during her previous labor. What do you think?

DEAR READER: I do not know the cause of your daughter's facial swelling during labor. However, I very much doubt that a

blood clot was to blame. Perhaps she developed edema (fluid in the tissue) as a result of the strenuous bearingdown she experienced during child-Discuss your concerns with her ob-

stetrician. I am sure that he or she can answer your question.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Well, I've used saltpeter with my Labrador during spring and fall mating seasons. The substance reduced his sexual interest and made him less obnoxious.

DEAR READER: Well, OK. Labrador owners take notice.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have chronic bronchitis and emphysema. I can handle it except for the 35-pound weight gain I experienced when I started prednisone. My oxygen level is too low for exercise and skimpy diets won't work as I take too much medicine. Do you have any suggestions?

DEAR READER: I followed your reasoning all right, until the part about diet and medicine.

Patients who take cortisone drugs, such as prednisone, may tend to retain salt and accumulate fluid. I can appreciate that exercise is not an option for you, because of your low

However, if you are overweight, you can still diet and take medicine As a start, avoid "empty" calories: Eliminate alcohol and sugar from your diet, eat smaller portions and reduce your intake of fat. In this way, you can remove unwanted pounds and still take the necessary medicines.
