Lad Gets Top Barrow Trophy On Birthday

Dewey Hukill had the finest birthday of his life last week as he watched his Poland-China walk off with top honors at the State Fair in Dallas.

The top state award came as a climax to Dewey's fifteenth birthday a week ago Thursday. The Olton FFA lad's 61/2month-old-barrow won top honors in a field of 500 barrows and brought \$2.00 a pound.

It was a crowning achievement for an FFA group that placed every animal they exhibited at the state fair.

Adding to the sense of accomplishment and honor to the Olton FFA Chapter was the fact that Dewey's grand champion barrow was farrowed on the Hukill farm at Hart Camp.

The Olton lad exhibited a gilt from the same litter as the grand champion and placed 15th in a field of about 500.
