FIRE DAMAGES COTTON ON TRUCK HERE

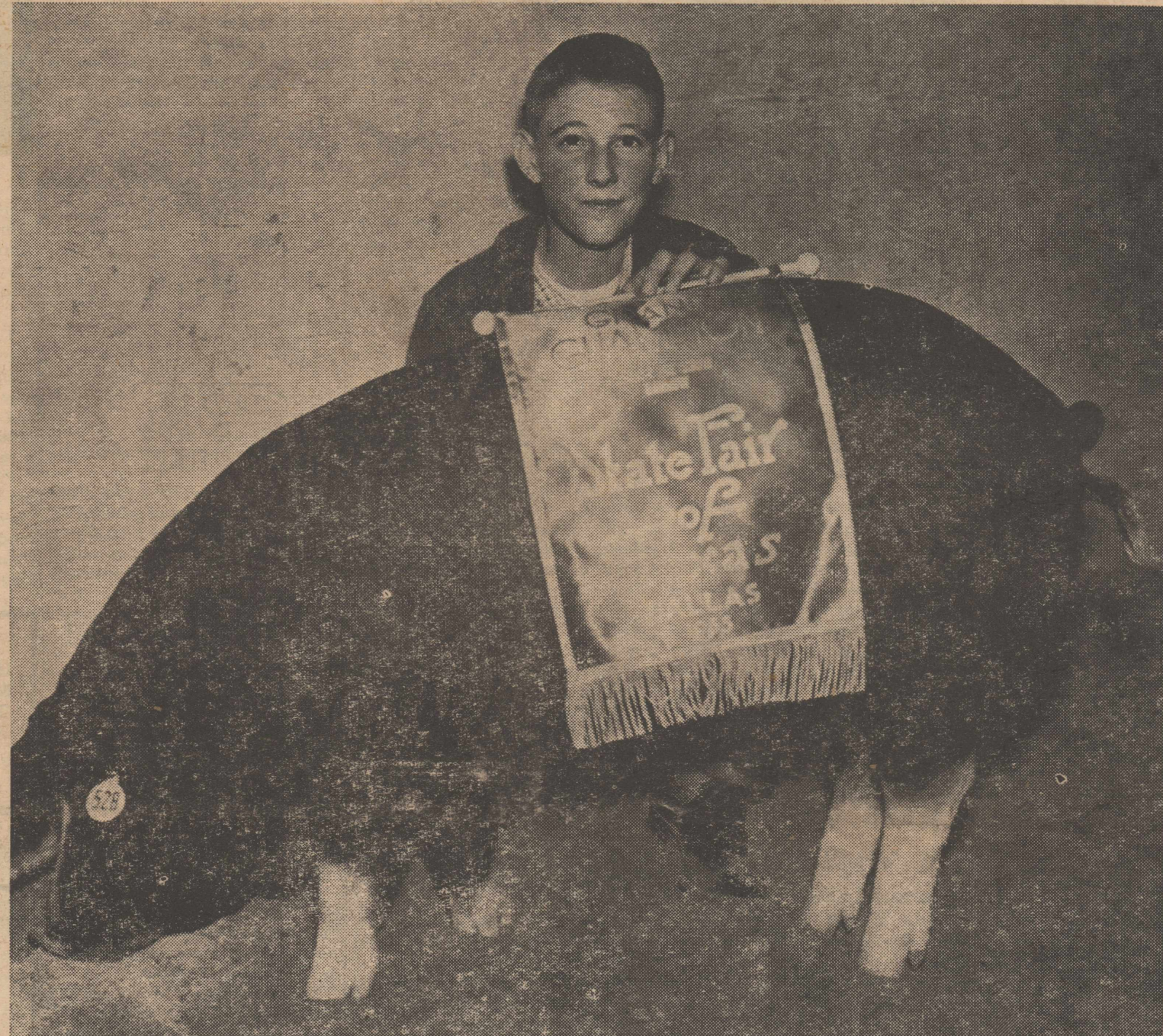
Fire of undetermined origin swept 37 bales of cotton early Wednesday morning on a truck parked on the Farmers Gin yard.

Louis Hair, co-owner of the gin, said four bales were destroyed and the remaining 33 badly charred.

Firemen fought an hour and a half to bring the fire under control.

Value of the cotton on the truck was estimated at about \$5,000. It was to have been taken to Hart warehouse Wednesday.

Olton folks liked what they saw Sunday as Pan-Ama Homes unveiled three sample homes in Hillcrest Addition—the town's first full-fledged housing project. More than 500 filed through the sample homes—two of them furnished—during the 12-hour open house.

The housing project, located at the western outskirts of Olton, conceived and sponsored by Ben F. Smith, grainman, and Jim Speer, Olton real estate man, almost two years ago.

Sunday was in part fulfillment for these two developers but for Pan-Ama it was just the beginning. Charlie Bates, Pan-Ama president, said his firm will build all 144 lots in the project in that's what it takes to satisfy Olton's demand.

The homes in the project are designed to meet either FHA or Veterans Administration requirements.

On one end of the dressing table was the lavatory and the other end was room for make-up, etc. Extra large drawers made abundant storage space for towels and wash cloths and there are large shelves behind the sliding mirrors for the man of the house to keep his shaving equipment.

Utility Closet In Bath Other features of the bathroom which caught the eye of the home-viewers were the utility closet, the metal tile surrounding the bathtubs on three sides and the overhead, and the magazine rack.

Kitchen cabinet doors and storage doors have magnetic catches which help to keep the doors closed when not being used and never stick. Cabinet doors are made of heat-resistant Formica.

The three bedrooms—one can be made into a den—have large closets and high windows. Opening the windows is easy, they slide. All inside doors are sliding that may or may not be locked and thus saves space.

Pan-Ama has made use of all extra space for storage in the house and there is a tool closet at the back of the house for the man's garden tools, etc.

Has Indirect Lighting All through the house, is indirect lighting with fixtures that may be moved in any direction to provide more light on any one thing.

'Rougher Test' Seen for Olton In Friday Clash Against Tulia

Olton's Mustangs, 39-0 winners over a weak Muleshoe team here last Friday, are expected to have considerably rougher opposition when they journey to Tulia this Friday for an 8 p. m. engagement with the Tulia Hornets.

Fans and players alike remember what happened last year. Tulia was winless in seven starts, then rose up to tie a good Olton club, 13-13, and won the game on penetrations.

'Looked Good' Much like last year, the Hornets have failed to register a win in four outings this year. But Tulia looked "plenty good" in last week's 20-6 loss to Littlefield, according to Coaches Jeff Smart and Jimmy Goss, who scouted the affair.

The Hornets led Littlefield, 6-0, throughout most of the first half. Littlefield scored with two minutes of play remaining to lead at halftime, 7-6. The superior bench strength of the Wildcats finally wore Tulia down in the last half and Littlefield won, 20-6.

Tough Defensively

"Tulia has good spirit and they are tough defensively," Coach Goss reported at Quarterback Club meeting Monday night. "They use the T formation and run from a spread, and they are a fast-improving ball club."

The big man in the Hornet defense is center Jack Flippo, a 220-pound senior. The Hornets are quarterbacked by Billy Chandler, 150-pound junior. Tulia's regular fullback, Jeff Carlile, broke his leg the day before the Littlefield game and is out for the rest of the season.

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AROUND OUR FARMES

Fall harvest is gaining momentum as the weeks of beautiful weather continue to bless the Panhandle Plains. The past two weeks of very pleasant weather, even including the sharp freeze, has given the farmer a chance to gather much of the grain crop. There appears to be near

80% completion of feed harvest and with prospects of this weeks work practically all should be completed. There are varied reports of grain production ranging from low as 2000 lbs. to high as better than 6000 lbs. The greater disappointment of yield seems to be in the soft type

grains as Plainsman, Caprock and 7078 with best results coming from Arizona Martins. The long period of damp weather in Sept. was the hinderance to the soft grain types as much of it absorbed moisture and swelled, later drying out and leaving only the empty carcass. Some fields even showed a high percentage of sprouted grains in the heads.

Cotton harvest altho' a full two weeks late has finally begun to pick up. Thru Tuesday night 2714 bales had been ginned at the 4 plants in Olton, with more than 400 bales coming in on Tuesday. Shortage of hands and slowness of maturity has prolonged the beginning of cotton pulling. More hands continue to come in altho' there is an acute shortage at the present. Mexican Nationals continue to be more perdominate with truck loads arriving almost daily from the border. The past week has shown a marked improvement in the grade returns. Luis Hair of Farmers Gin Co. reports that most of the returns now being received are grading Middling with staple length nearing 1".

Reports on the effects of the Freeze of Sunday night continue to be varied. Damage reports range from a loss of as much as 1/4 bale of cotton to no damage at all. Assimilating the reports and the conditions of each seems to come to this conclusion. Crops which were not watered after the 25th of August received little or no damage, but cotton watered in Sept. was in the stage of being about two-thirds matured and has suffered much more seriously. It continues to point back to that fact which we learned when this country first began watering that watering cotton after the 25th of August is almost a certainty to be a losing proposition. Both in the expense of watering and also in a loss of grade and quite often in yield.

DUCK SEASON WILL OPEN WEDNESDAY

Hunters report that there is a plentiful supply of small ducks here now, and colder weather is expected to bring a good many mallards and canvasbacks to this area.

Duck season will continue through Jan. 15. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Daily bag limit is five, and possession limit is ten.

Hunting season on geese will be Nov. 17 through Jan. 15. Hunting hours will be the same as for ducks. Daily bag limit on geese is five, "provided that such limit shall not contain more than two Canada geese or its subspecies, or two white-fronted geese, or one of each." Possession limit is one day's kill.

No person over the age of 16 may hunt migratory waterfowl without a Federal stamp, procurable at the post office.

Cotton Harvest Tops 3,000 Bales; Gathering of Grain Near An End

Olton's cotton harvest has reached the busy stage.

A Wednesday afternoon survey showed that Olton gins have processed a total of 3,248 bales. That's a sharp increase from the 1,549 bales reported a week ago.

Grades are improving, gin men say. More middling cotton is being ginned, and staple length is reported considerably better than during the earliest stages of the cotton harvest.

Freeze Damage

Most farmers and gin operators have adopted a "wait and see" outlook to determine the amount of damage done by the killing freeze which hit this area Sunday night and Monday morning.

A typical comment concerning the freeze was that of Bub Holt: "I don't think it will hurt much from an overall standpoint, but we can tell more about it in a week or so."

At Olton Co-Op Gin, Lloyd Graham said, "There's no doubt that the freeze will mean loss of money for the farmer. It will mean lower grades in cotton than it will cut production. It damaged us."

One ginner estimated that the freeze will mean about 15% damage to the cotton crop.

Varied Opinions

Several farmers, pointed out, however, that "we had about reached the end of the maturing season, anyway, and even if the freeze had held off until later, cotton would not have matured a great deal more than it had prior to Sunday night."

Hurt worst, they agree, were the latest-planted fields.

As the cotton harvest is just gaining a full head of steam, harvest of Olton's grain sorghum crop is nearing a close. Lottie Mack Hardy, manager of Ben F. Smith Grain Co., estimated Wednesday that the grain harvested is 80% complete.

Okay For Loan

Practically all of the grain being combined now is meeting moisture requirements for government loan, Mr. Hardy said.

The current loan price is \$1.54 per 100 pounds.

"We have had enough storage space so far, and hope to have a new 80 by 100-foot storage section and a new truck dump ready by this time next week," Hardy said.

Sunday night's freeze probably will hasten the grain harvest, he said, because it pushed stalk moisture up into the grain heads.

Speaking on Lionism Mr. Nelson declared that Lionism is the fusion of the "human and the divine." With this prelude he then outlined the Lions Club sight conservation work and told of Lions Clubs' work at the crippled children's camp at Kerrville.

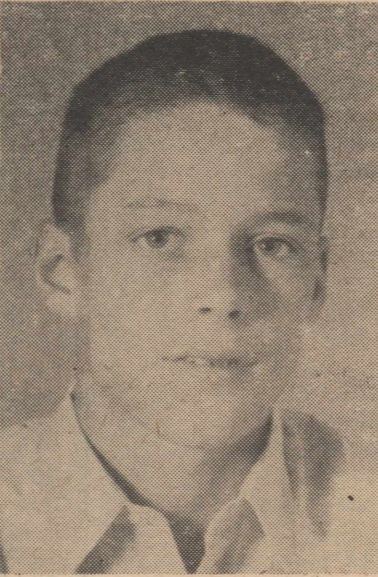

Estes Romps

Olton got an early break when the Mules' G. R. Howell fumbled on the first play from scrimmage and the Mustangs recovered at the Mule 39. Three plays later, Teddy Estes rammed into the left side of the line on a fullback wedge play, found the hole jammed, spun away to the left of the pile-up and went 29 yards to put Olton out front, 6-0. Jackie Gray's placement attempt was blocked.

Five minutes deep in the second period, the Mustangs took possession again after a short punt by Muleshoe fullback G. R. Howell was blown dead on the Mustang 46.

At that point, Wally Stewart

played far better football as a Tech sophomore than he is doing as a senior. So did some of the other Raiders.

Olton climaxed a 34-yard drive early in the second canto when David Price, reserve left halfback, shot between his own right tackle and right end to score from seven yards out. Gray passed to Jarrell Edwards for the point after to make score 20-0.

Six For Gray

Edward Featherngill created the next scoring opportunity for Olton when he pounced on a Mule pitchout from Howell to John Young at the Muleshoe 13. Jack Royce Straw and Estes moved to the Mule 6 in two carries, and Gray piled over right tackle for the score. Straw's conversion attempt was low and to the left of the uprights, and Olton led 26-0 at halftime.

Early in the third quarter, Stewart gathered in a Muleshoe punt at the Mule 40, and shook loose from several would-be acklers in an electrifying 40-yard scamper down the west sideline. Officials ruled, however, that he stepped out at the Mule 30.

The Mustangs were unable to gain from that point.

Gray To Edwards

They next gained possession at their own 37 after containing a 31-yard downfield drive, longest march of the night by the spunky but outmanned Mules. Short gainers by Gray, Stewart and Estes and an 8-yard pass from Gray to Powell moved the Mustangs to the Mule 30. Then Gray pegged perfectly to Jarrell Edwards at the Mule 15 and Edwards outdistanced two pursuers to the goal line for the score. Straw's placement attempt was high enough but wide and Olton led 32-0.

A short, twisting kickoff by David Price was fumbled by Muleshoe and Olton recovered at the Muleshoe 31 just prior to the close of the third quarter. Gray passed to Powell at the 23. Gray carried twice, gaining the 18. Price went over the right side to the 16. Gray passed to Straw at the 9. Gray drove through a good hole in the right side to score and Straw converted to widen Olton's margin to 39-0 early in the last period.

The remainder of the fourth quarter developed into somewhat of a "flag day," with officials tossing red flags on almost every play, and neither team was able to generate a serious scoring threat.

Featherngill, Jefferies and Powell turned in top defensive performances for the locals. The Mustang defense now has limited six opponents to an average 7.5 points per game, with only Abernathy and Spur having succeeded in getting more than 6 points.

DON'T GIVE FIRE A PLACE TO START

"Don't give fire a place to start" has been selected as the slogan for Fire Prevention Week and should stimulate some worthwhile thinking all across the nation. It has been found that in the past year eleven thousand people had their lives taken by fire and four thousand of these were children. A fire occurs every thirty-six seconds of the day which adds up to almost a million a year. One-fourth of these fires were caused by matches and smoking and one out of every eight caused by misuse of electricity. It has also been discovered that from eighty to ninety per cent of all fires can be prevented. These alarming statistics should prove how necessary it is for us to prevent fires.

In many schools it has been proven successful to have junior firemen. In over five thousand schools, students did an extra good job of cooperating and won handsome Junior Fire Marshal Achievement Banners for their classrooms. It teaches the children how to check fire hazards and prevent fires. The enthusiasm shown by the children in turn helps parents to become conscious of the need to prevent fires.

Now that we have seen how

destructive fire can be we realize that something must be done to lead to better habits toward fire prevention. We should all look around us, in our houses, schools, and places of business, to see personally that we "do not give fire a place to start!"

CAUSES AND PREVENTION OF FIRES

Carelessness is the greatest cause of fire. Because of people's carelessness in failing to check defective wiring, using explosive cleaners and liquids indoors, and paying little or no attention to a faulty gas hose or connection, thousands of homes, with much property damage are burned annually. This does not count the lives taken by such outbreaks of fire.

Many people are in thoughtlessness, an aid to fire hazards. By leaving oily cloths in a stuffy closet a home or homes may burn, destroying lives as well as property. Matches in reach of small children are very dangerous, and this one problem causes many serious fires each year.

In the home, especially in the kitchen, many accidents are likely to occur. A grease fire can be serious, especially if in panic, one puts water on it. Never! Never! put water on a grease or oil fire as the water tends to spread it. Pilot lights on gas appliances should be checked regularly, so preventing a cause for gas explosions. In case of detecting a gas in air, open windows and doors to the room or rooms, being careful not to ignite the gas.

Annually thousands of lives and millions of dollars in property damage are caused by forest or outside fires. Burning trash can result in tragedy if one is not careful in doing so. Building and playing with fires takes its toll in children's lives each year. A fire unwisely built near a building or near brush or trash can easily get out of hand when fanned by a breeze or gust of wind. Throwing matches or burning cigarettes into grass or a wooded area is a mistake as it seldom is harmless. In a factory, every precaution should be made to insure the employee's safety in case of fire. Fire extinguishers and escapes are only a precaution and insurance to help save lives and property.

Remember "The fire you prevent, may be your own home and may save your life."

PREVENTION OF FIRES IN THE HOME

Many homes are destroyed

from fires, and most of the time it is caused of mere carelessness.

Matches are the most common causes of fire. You shouldn't leave matches in the reach of small children. It is very dangerous for children to play with matches. If you leave matches lying around mice could pick them up and maybe strike them. You should always be sure matches have been blown out before you put them into the trash can.

Smoking is another common cause of fires. You should never go to sleep smoking. Always be sure you put cigarettes, cigars, and pipe ashes out, and don't throw burning cigarettes or cigars into the trash can.

You should never attempt to clean oily clothes with gasoline in the house. It could flame up very quickly, and don't use cleaning fluid in an air-tight house.

Stoves can be very dangerous. A curtain too close to a burning stove can easily catch fire. Stoves that are very dirty with oil and grease may catch on fire. You should always be careful when cooking not to swipe your dishtowel or potholder across an open flame. If you use a flue and a wood or coal stove, you should always be sure that your flue is fixed right and is clean.

Cluttered closets are sure fire hazards. You should never put oil mops and polish rags in an air-tight closet. Closets that haven't been cleaned out in a long time are a good place for fires to start. Never put oily or dirty clothes in a closet for a long period of time.

Gas lines should always be checked to be sure they are fixed right. Don't ever light a match to find a leak in a gas pipe; it could very easily explode. You should always be sure you turn the gas off.

Electric wiring should be done by an expert. If there is a short in the wiring, it is very dangerous. If your lines are over-loaded with electrical appliances, they could very easily become too hot and catch fire. If you do have a short in some electrical appliance, be sure to

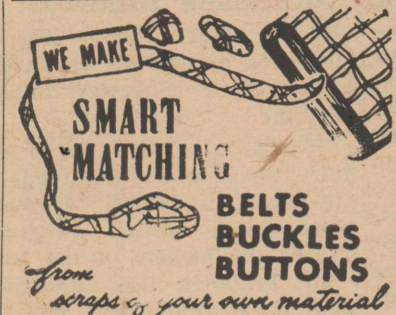
Four special reunions will help Texas Tech alumni get together at the college's 28th annual Homecoming Friday and Saturday, Nov. 4-5.
