Hereford and Hale Center will be among the Olton Mustangs' 1956 non-conference football opponents, according to the '56 Olton grid schedule announced this week by Supt. Carl Macon.

As a result of a recent Inter-scholastic League realignment of districts, District 1-AA for the next two years will be composed of Muleshoe, Tullia, Dalhart, Canyon, Dimmitt and Olton.

"We feel that it is a good schedule," Supt. Macon said.

Macon pointed out that both Spur and Dumas experienced scheduling difficulties, and were unable to include Olton in their 1956 schedules.

Spur will be in a 7-team district next year, and that complicates early scheduling. Dumas will be competing in AAA, and AAA clubs are not permitted to play their first game until Sept. 14.

In non-conference play, Olton will collide with two AAA teams (Littlefield and Hereford), two AA clubs (Abernathy and Floydada), and one Class A team (Hale Center).

"Hale Center's enrollment is barely under the minimum for AA, and the next time the district is realigned, they will probably be in our district," Supt. Macon said. "They always field a good club, and we feel this will be a good opportunity to develop a healthy rivalry between Hale Center and Olton."

Mustangs To Test Lockney In Crucial 2-AA Game This Friday

Olton's Mustangs and Lockney's Longhorns will put unblemished district records on the line when they collide this Friday at Lockney Stadium. The kickoff is set for 8 p. m.

The Mustangs have drawn a slight favorite's role for the crucial test, chiefly on the basis of a better season record. Lockney, however, has been going great guns in district play, and Coach Rudy Halle's fast-stepping Longhorns have been accorded the District 2-AA "darkhorse" role on the basis of their past two performances.

Impressive Wins The Longhorns surprised the experts two weeks ago by slipping past a highly-rated Dimmitt team, 21-20, then trounced Muleshoe in impressive fashion last Friday, 34-6.

Big threat in the Longhorn backfield is Jerry Williams, a slight 128-pound sophomore half-

back. Reporting on Williams at Quarterback Club meeting Monday night, Coach Jimmy Goss said, "He's one of the fastest I've seen this year, and if the boy gets past the line of scrimmage, he's a good bet to go all the way."

Goss, who scouted the Longhorns in their conquest of Muleshoe, termed the entire Longhorn backfield "lots faster than average."

Tallies Three Ken Calloway, Longhorn fullback, is another all-the-way threat. Calloway tallied three touchdowns against Muleshoe on runs of 2, 40 and 62 yards.

The Mustangs are in fairly good physical shape for their test against the Longhorns. Clyde Rhodes, big defensive specialist who missed seeing action against Tullia because of a severe leg bruise, probably will not see action against Lockney. Edward

Feathergill, right tackle, has been hampered this week by a sprained ankle, but probably will play.

AROUND OUR FARMS

With continued good weather for outdoor operations, cotton harvesting is getting into full swing. Altho' there is still a shortage of hands, pulling has stepped up to the extent that the Co-Op Gin has begun round-the-clock ginning and the other plants are lengthening each

days run. Thru Tuesday night over 5,400 bales had been weighed in at the four Olton plants. Grade returns which had been mostly "white" cotton is beginning to show a higher percent of "spot" returns. Most of this, however, can be attributed to the condition of the seed cotton

being brought in from the fields. The hands are taking the liberty to get the bolls regardless of their condition. A closer watch must be made over the pulling or the grades will continue to lower. Some are attempting to strip the stalks even this early.

With each passing day, the damage from the freeze continues to appear even greater. Much of the cotton which showed no damage shortly after the cold spell is now showing a severe spot and even tinge condition. Many of the bolls which seemed to be well-matured are now drying out with practically no lint inside.

Our crop which earlier seemed nearly as good as our 43,000 bale volume last year could be cut near a third. The dollar value could be even more.

Grain harvest is considered completed. Some few strips and corners remain but as a whole the season is over. Stalks are being shredded, tandems following the shredders and many have started their breaking plows. The moldboard seems to be the plow most generally seen in use this fall. This is due to the good moisture condition and the desire of most to turn the foliage under to decay.

This week would be a good time to go back over those well motors and tractors and see that all the water drained out of the cooling coils, butane regulators and the motor blocks. Quite often when draining, trash and sludge will partially stop a drain cock and restrict the motor from completely draining. Better to be sure than "out a couple of hundred dollars."

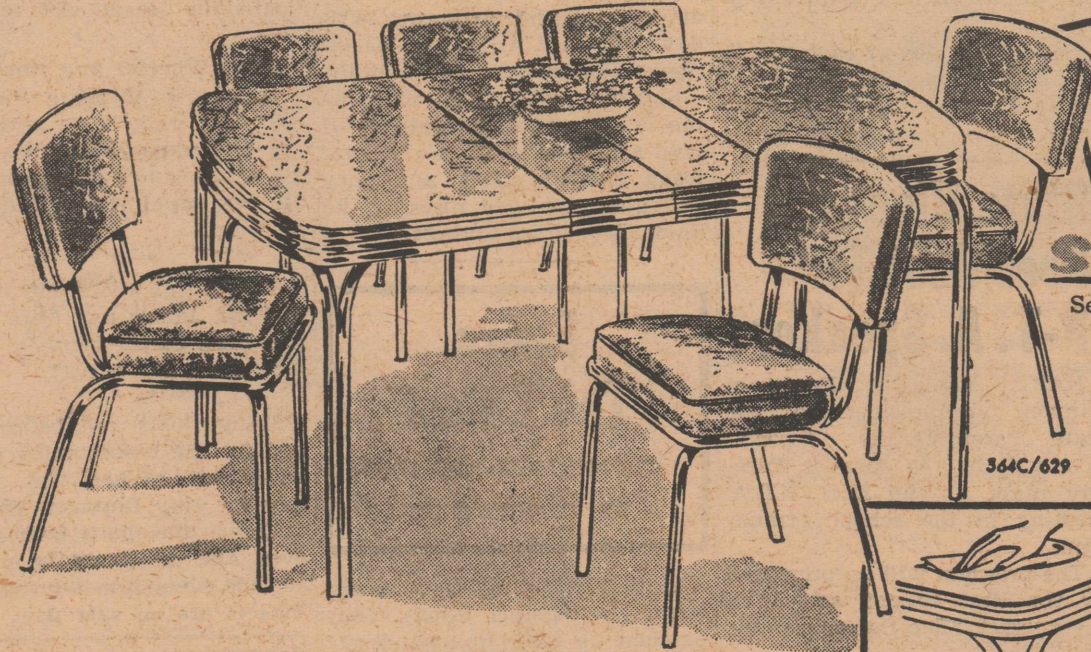
last week. How long can this last?

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**ACCORDING TO THE WORD OF GOD—
HOW MANY BAPTISMS ARE THERE?**

ACCORDING TO THE WORD OF GOD as is recorded in Ephesians 4:4-6 there is ONE BAPTISM. "There is ONE BODY (THE CHURCH), and ONE SPIRIT, even as also ye were called in ONE HOPE of your calling; ONE LORD, ONE FAITH, ONE BAPTISM, ONE GOD and Father of all, who is over all, and through all and in all." One must accept the scriptures. When the scriptures say there is ONE GOD, ONE LORD, ONE FAITH, ONE SPIRIT, ONE HOPE, and ONE BODY (THE CHURCH Eph. 1:22, 23) one must believe it. Now the same scriptures say there is ONE BAPTISM. Then the question arises, "What about all the other baptisms mentioned in the New Testament"? If the scripture says there is ONE BAPTISM for us today then we must find it.

BAPTISM OF SUFFERING. Jesus said, "I have a BAPTISM to be baptized with; and how am I straightened till it be accomplished!" (Lk. 12:50). This baptism does not apply to one today; neither did it apply to Christ's baptism in the river of Jordan since that record is in Lk. 3:21. This baptism refers to the Lord being overwhelmed in suffering; hence the baptism of suffering; which is not the ONE BAPTISM of Ephesians 4:5.

JOHN'S BAPTISM. "John came, who baptized in the wilderness and preached the baptism of repentance unto remission of sins" (Mk. 1:4). This baptism was for the people of John's day and not for the people today. The church of Christ was not established at that time and the people were not baptized into Christ, so this baptism is not the ONE BAPTISM of Ephesians 4:5.

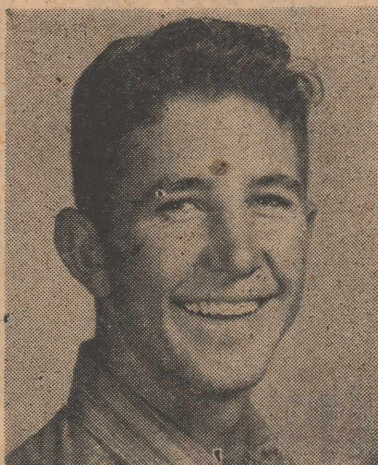
Halloween King & Queen

Springlake quickly retaliated. Donald took the ball around end for a 34-yard paydirt jaunt on the last play of the first-quarter.

Rex Loftis ran the extra point to lead 7-6 and the predatory Wolverines were on the prowl never again to be threatened in the ball game.

The Wolverines scored once in the second quarter as Ronald

Sandel carried 21 yards. He also ran the extra point.

He scored the first and second touchdowns in the third quarter on runs of 69 and 12 yards.

Jerry Tunnell ran six yards in the fourth period for Springlake's fifth marker. Ronnie Sandel scored his fourth TD of the game in the final quarter when he ran 15 yards with an intercepted pass.

crew rolled up a net offense of 445 yards, their biggest yet this year.

Everybody Fumbles
The scoreless first quarter developed into a series of fumble exchanges. On the second play from scrimmage, Hornet quarterback's complete pass to Darrell Nelson was fumbled, and Jackie Gray recovered at the Olton 33.

The Mustangs, moving almost at will with their ground attack, advanced to the Hornet 45. At that point, Teddy Estes fumbled and Tulia recovered. Two plays later, Potter fumbled and Harold Eby and Carlton Ashley recovered for Olton at the Olton 48.

Olton punted. Then a Potter-to-Nelson pass completion good for 41 yards moved the Hornets to Olton's 32. Potter fumbled on the next play, however, and Olton recovered at their own 23.

Tulia Recovers
A nice downfield gallop by Estes sparked a Mustang drive that carried to the Tulia 25.

There, facing second and 3, Wally Stewart skirted his own left end for a nice gain, but the ball squirted free where he was hit at the 10, and Tulia recovered at their 8-yard line.

The first quarter ran out before either club could unfold another fumble play.

Tulia punted out of trouble, and a 19-yard scamper by Stewart moved Olton to the Hornet 26. Estes, after a good gain over left tackle, fumbled again, and Westley Aldridge recovered for Tulia at the Hornet 15. The Hornets could not gain, and quick-kicked out to their 42. Olton advanced quickly to Tulia's 12 on the strength of a 29-yard pass from Gray to Donald Powell.

Estes bulled to the 10. Gray cut

between his own right tackle and right end on a 10-yard scoring thrust, and Estes rammmed over left guard for the point-after to put Olton out front, 7-0, five minutes deep in the second period.

Tough Luck
Late in the second canto, Olton advanced to the Tulia 28. At that point, facing fourth and 11, Gray pegged a perfect pass to Stewart, all alone at the goal-line, but Stewart dropped the ball and Tulia took possession.

Two Hornet passes failed. Potter picked up a first down at the Hornet 38. That set the stage for one of the most spectacular plays seen in this area for a long time. With no seconds left to play showing on the clock, Potter chunked a long desperation pass to halfback George Washington, Stewart, at safety, deflected the ball high in the air. Then Washington snared the ball, and while Stewart and Estes got in one another's way trying to catch the fleet Hornet halfback, Washington scampered the remaining 23 yards to the goal-line. Washington's placement attempt was no good and the halftime count was Olton 7, Tulia 6.

More Like It
The Mustangs took a more businesslike approach to their job in the second half. Stewart returned Tulia's kickoff to the Olton 35. With Estes and Gray eating up big chunks of yardage through the riddled Hornet line, six plays moved the Mustangs to the Tulia 4. Estes rammmed up the middle to score, and Stewart's conversion attempt was off to the right. Olton led 13-6 four minutes deep in the third quarter.

Estes kicked off for Olton.

Potter took the ball at the Hornet 13, handed off to Washington on a slick piece of deception, and while most of Olton's defenders were chasing Potter, Washington careened down the west sideline all the way to the Olton 12 on a sparkling 75-yard kickoff return. The Hornets moved to the 5, but a fourth down jump pass was incomplete and Olton took possession at that point.

Stewart Scampers
Gray, Estes, Stewart and David Price alternated on carries to move to the Olton 42. Then Stewart took a pitchout from James Ray Hyatt, cut outside his own left tackle, and reversed his field to outdistance four Hornet pursuers to the goal-line on a 58-yard scoring scamper. Straw's conversion put the Mustangs in front, 20-6.

Eby broke through to block a Tulia punt late in the third period and set the stage for the final Mustang tally. The blocked punt gave Olton possession at the Hornet 45. Three line thrusts moved to the Hornet 23. Then Gray fumbled and recovered for a 10-yard loss. He promptly made amends for the bobble, however, when he pegged a perfect 33-yard scoring aerial to Jarrell Edwards. Straw's conversion try was high enough but to the right and Olton was out front 26-6 two minutes deep in the final period.

A Close One
Tulia narrowly failed to score only seconds later when Washington, who had worked his way far behind all Mustang defenders, dropped a long pass from Potter at Olton's 40. Had he held on, the play would have gone all the way.

That was Tulia's last serious scoring threat.

Midway of the final canto, Olton's ground game was in high gear and the Mustangs moved to Tulia's 28. Stewart took a handoff from Hyatt, but fumbled as he hit the line of scrimmage and Tulia recovered at their own 23 to spoil Olton's threat for another tally.

Only two minutes later, the Hornets thwarted another Mustang touchdown try when Potter intercepted a short jump pass from Hyatt at the Hornet 34.

Despite the fact that they lost four fumbles and bobbed numerous other times but recovered, the Mustangs ground out 20 first downs, chiefly on the strength of a well-oiled running attack that netted them 374 yards.

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ROCKHOUND WALTER SCHREIER CLAIMS HOBBY WORTH EXPENSE

Heard of a rockhound?
Olton has several. One of the most interesting ones is Walter Schreier.

"Rockhounds" are amateur rock and mineral collectors and if you're a "rockhound" like Mr. Schreier, you will take trips all over the United States looking for rocks. Mr. and Mrs. Schreier returned from a rock-hunting trip to Arizona and New Mexico about three weeks ago. "You have to drive at least 300 miles to find any of the rocks," Mr. Schreier said.

Starts Hobby Recently

Mr. Schreier began his fascinating hobby about two years ago and he doesn't stop with just hunting and collecting rocks—he cuts and polishes them and makes beautiful designs, jewelry, paper weights, etc.

After Mr. Schreier gets his rocks home, he explained, he first cuts the rocks with a diamond saw. "The saw has tiny diamond grits in the blade so that it will cut the hardest rocks", Mr. Schreier declared.

Next, he trims the rocks on a little trim-saw he has and then, he grinds them smooth and sands it, which takes two to three processes.

The last process is polishing the rocks, he said. "I use a special powder called optical cerium oxide," Mr. Schreier remarked, "to polish the rocks." He has a special polishing machine and he moistens the brush and this will polish the rocks and make them shine.

Tumbles Small Rocks

"Some of the rocks are too small to polish by hand," Mr. Schreier explained, "so, we put them in a tumbler, which tumbles at the rate of 15 revolutions a minute for nearly 30 days." After the rocks—he puts several in the tumbler—have tumbled that length of time, Mr. Schreier puts some Tide soap in the tumbler with the rocks. The soap puts the final polish on each tiny rock, Mr. Schreier remarked.

Mr. Schreier's collection includes some petrified wood; about ten different types of Obsidian; "Snow-Flake"; "Gold

Sheen"; Dinosaur bones; seven different varieties of Onyx; "Jasper" in all different colors; Agit, the hardest and most common of the gem stones next to diamonds. "Sand Rose," which looks just

like a rose; and "Thunder Eggs," with the shape of eggs, which are formed in volcanos and blown out, and the rocks have gas pockets and, when the gas escapes it leaves pockets where silica forms different designs in the centers; and various varieties of Sandstone, Pyrite, Dolomite, etc.

Expensive Hobby

"It's a pretty expensive hobby!", Mr. Schreier exclaimed. "You have to drive so far to hunt rocks and your equipment is very expensive."

Mrs. Schreier seems to think it is not all expense, because her husband has made her necklace and earring sets, paper

weights, and book-ends. He has also made some tie clasps for himself.

Mr. and Mrs. Schreier maintain that although it is an expensive hobby—"we have more

fun and get more joy out of being 'rockhounds' than you can imagine!"

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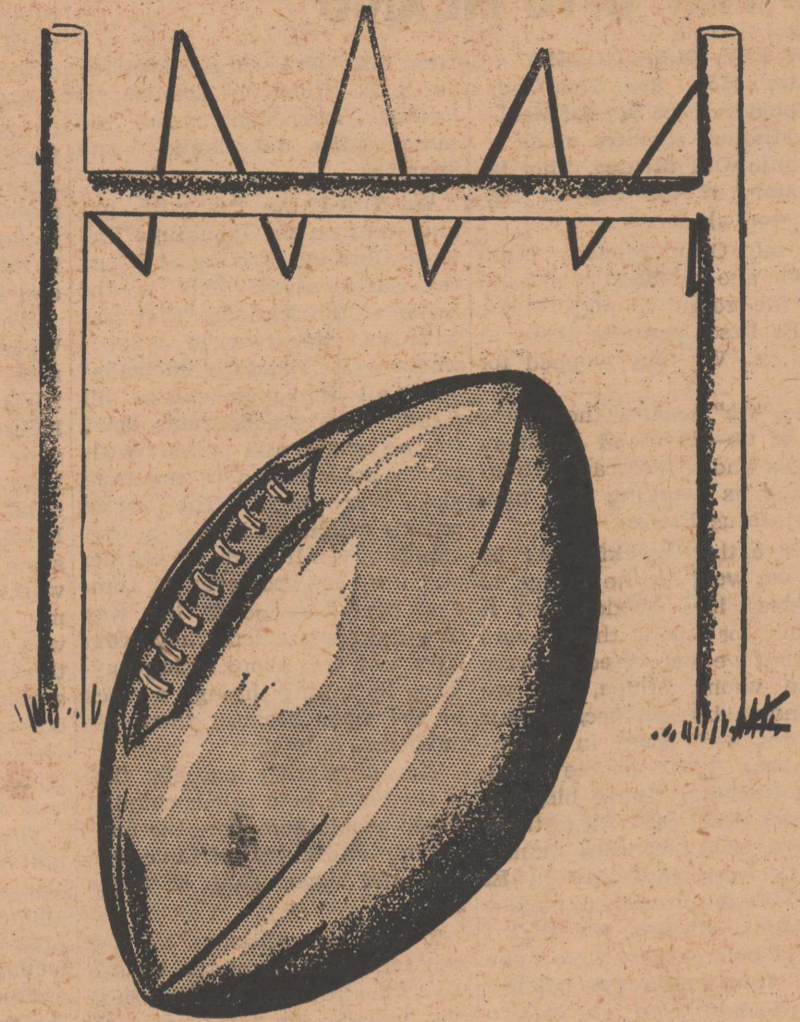
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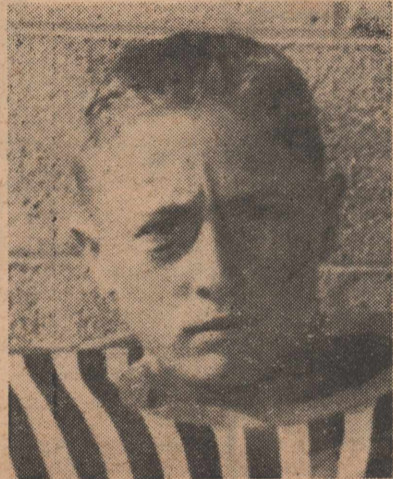
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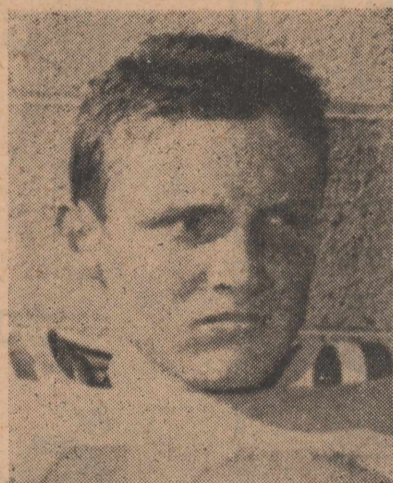

REV. GLEN GODSEY TELLS OF TRIP INTO MEXICO

BY REV. GLEN GODSEY
(Editor's Note: Rev. Glen Godsey, pastor of the Baptist Mexican Mission, recently made a trip into Old Mexico. This is his story of the trip in his own words.)

We left Olton Monday night a week ago at 12:20 a.m. and took the route through Clovis into El Paso, arriving there at 6:30 a.m. We only stopped for gas.

I say "we" because there were three of us—Raymond Anderson of Kress and a Mexican National, who is working for him, named Jesus Flores.

After eating breakfast at El Paso, we went to the bridge to go across into Mexico and it was not for about three hours later that we discovered we were at the wrong bridge, but we were not a bit sad because our time was well spent in watching about 1,200 people come across walking, riding bicycles, cars, and street cars. All of these except a very few were coming over to work that day in El Paso and would return to Mexico that night. Of this few that I spoke of before, there were some people from our own beloved U.S. who had gone into Mexico and left a bad impression as to what our people are really like. The merchandise which many carried was anything besides curios and more on the 100 proof side. I hope all of us are not judged by those few.

At 10 a.m., we crossed over into Mexico, for the very first time in my life. At the Immigration Center, I was made to believe more of the saying, "this is a small world," because there I met a Mexican family who lives at Canyon that my wife and I met in 1948. They too were going to visit in Mexico.

It was here that my Spanish really came in handy and it seemed to be the means of us receiving special privileges throughout our journey. After getting our passports and insurance, then we changed some money at the rate of \$12.45 to \$1.00 of American money. Then we headed for Chihuahua, farther inland. We arrived there at 2:50 p.m. the same day, Monday.

I got a shave there and it cost me less than 40c and a massage went with it plus hair tonic without a hair-cut. We ate lunch there and discovered that for a fraction over a dollar, a person could buy more than he could eat and still more.

Chihuahua, itself, is very pretty with its plaza and then many modern buildings in comparison to the millions of adobe houses. Its population is 87,000.

We left Chihuahua at 3:00 and arrived at Durango on Tuesday morning at 1:30 a.m. This is a modern city with a population of 59,500.

Durango is where the famous

"Iron Hill" or Cerro del Mercado as it is called in Spanish, is located. They don't mean the same thing in English and Spanish.

We filled the car with gas and went on to Guadalupe Victoria, Durango arriving at 3 p.m. the same night. This is the home of the National that was with us. He lives in what I would call a "adobe hacienda" with all the members of his family from grandparents down to the goats and milch cattle which are coralled in the front yard every night. The houses are air conditioned, that is they stand up to all kinds of weather and are very cool even in summer heat because of the way they are constructed. They never have to worry about losing anything by falling through a crack in the floor because there are no floors, only dirt.

The hospitality exceeds that of the South here in our country. These people here were the most humble and kindest I have ever met and never shall I forget them.

It was our pleasure to visit and take pictures of the beautiful Cathedral and also the Baptist (small) church there. We left there at 1:20 p.m. on Tuesday and arrived at Tarreon, Coahuila, a city of 129,000 and some of the most modern buildings I have ever seen. It was here that we visited "El Mercado," which means in English, "The Market Place." This covered one city block and they sold everything from game roosters to Mexican sombreros. There we made a few purchases of Mexican curios.

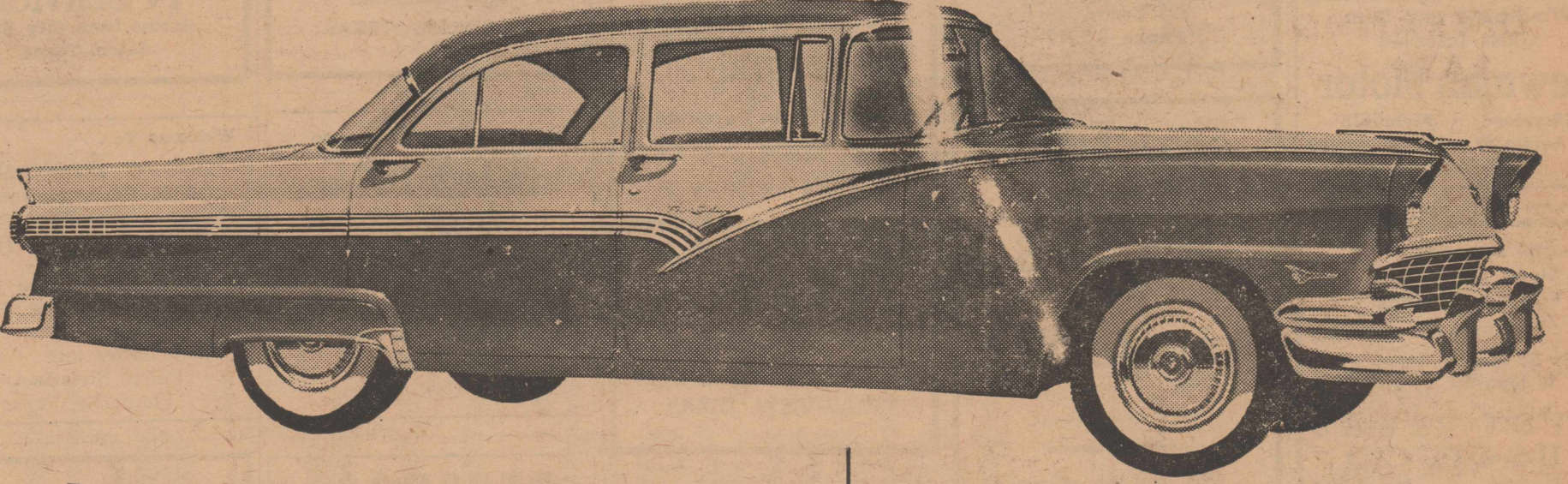
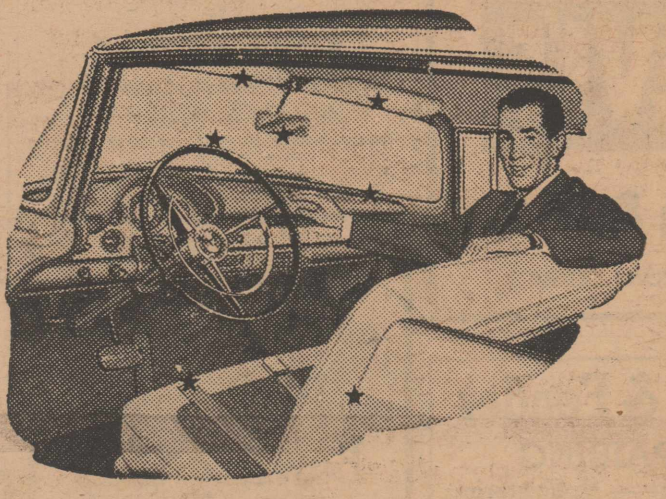

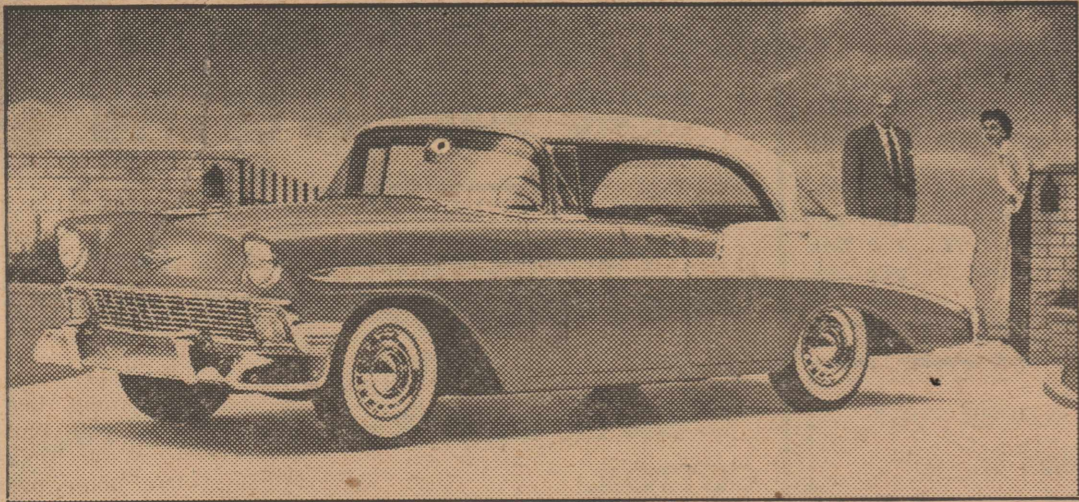

Sport Sedan Makes Bow with 1956 Chevrolets

Elimination of the center pillar in the window area adds smartness as well as unexcelled visibility. The hardtop sedan will be available in the Bel Air (above) and "Two-Ten," two of three price-graduated series of cars offered by Chevrolet for '56. Engine choices include two more powerful V8's and one 6. The "Super Turbo-Fire V8" develops 205 h.p.

striker mounted on the body pillar. The overlap, or interlock, is designed to prevent disengagement of the two parts in event of a collision.

New Paint Harmony

Lively paint schemes are offered in accord with the increased color consciousness of car buyers. Choices range from black to a newly developed pigmentation in beige and red. Original two-toning gives each of three price-graduated series an exclusive pattern. Ten solids and 14 two-tone combinations are on the 1956 color chart.

Novel trim ideas, with particular attention to the low-price One-Fifty series, are evident in the interior as well as the exterior treatment. Charcoal shades are new. In a simplification of options, the company announces

each series will have a "standard" interior two-tone trim. A wide range of other harmonizing interiors will be available on an optional basis.

In the 1956 Chevrolet, completely new sheet metal complements a more massive grille in all models. The grille is a wider, lattice-work design and

the effects of staunchness and beauty is aided by a heavier chromium header bar. Fender lines at the front and rear are higher and straighter. The hood plane is flatter and extends four inches farther forward before dipping to meet the grille.

Chromium molding, applied for the first time on the One-Fifty

series, sweeps along the sides of the 1956 bodies to increase the low, ground-gripping aspect of the cars. Headlamp visors are more pronounced. Parking lamps are square and set low over the reshaped bumpers. A novelty is the location of the gasoline filler, concealed by the hinged rear left tail lamp.

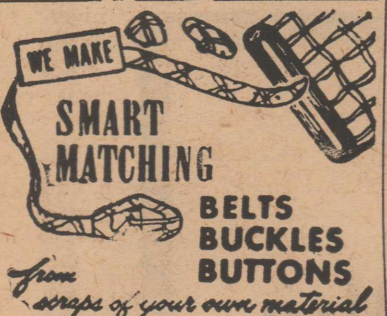

Scheduled for debut at dealer showrooms across the nation Friday, November 4, the latest models carry increased horsepower, a fleetier, more rugged appearance and are offered in the broadest array of bodies ever produced by the company.

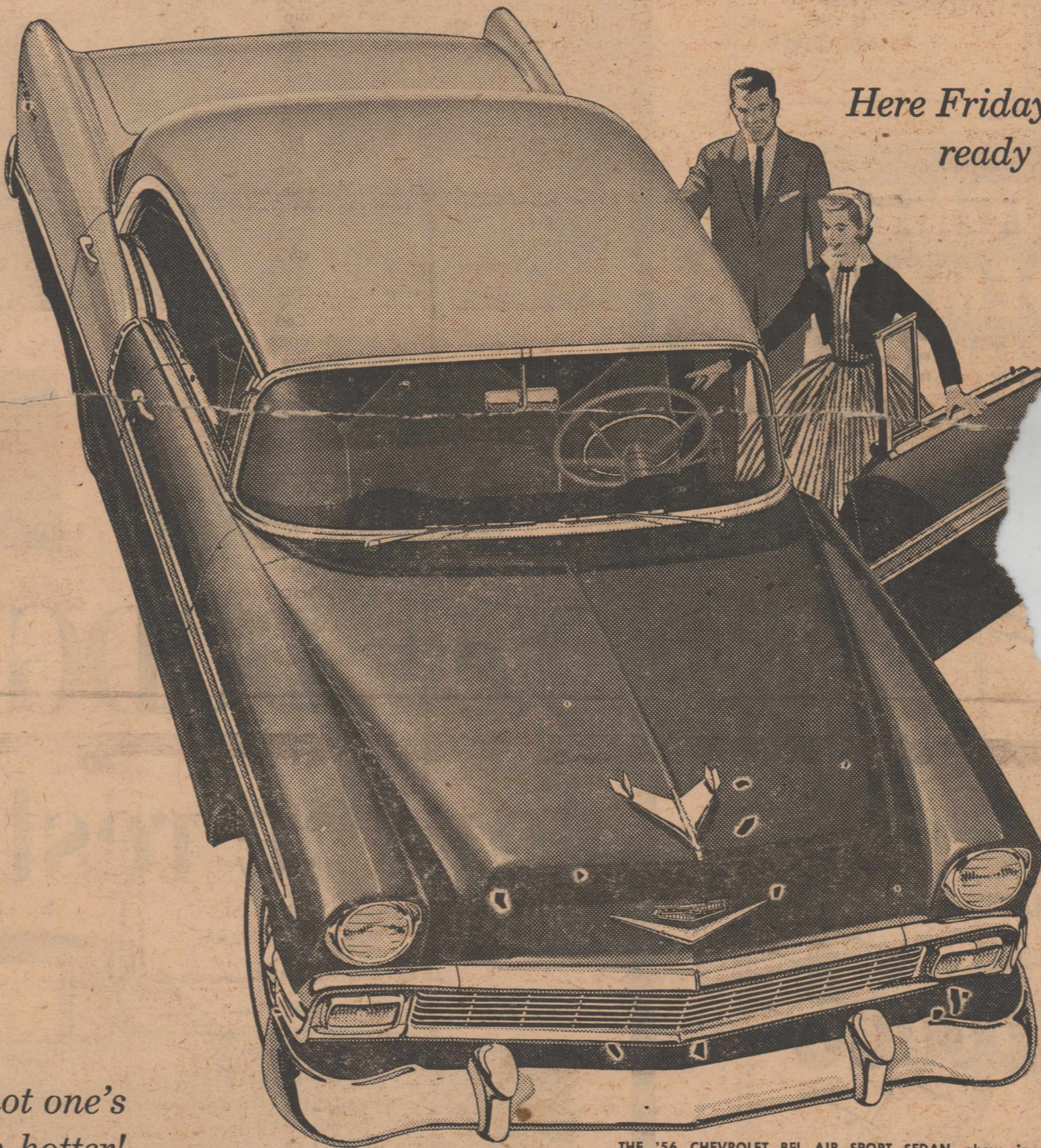
new all-time record at Pikes Peak in September, develops 205 horsepower.
