





## AROUND OUR FARMS

Another week will probably put the finishing touch to the mad rush to get out the disappointing 1955 cotton crop. Even tho' some fellows did quite well on this year's production, the community, as a whole, fell near 30% lower than last season. The gins in Olton through Tuesday night had weighed in 22,382 bales, which was just over 50% of last year's output on some 43,000 bales. The dollar value, due to the low production and poor grade of cotton, will be cut to near half of the 1954 crop.

Harvesting during the past week has probably reached an all-time high during such short time. Co-Op Gin had on the yard over 1400 bales for as long as three days. All plants in town have been behind for the entire week. When the gins once get caught up, the harvest will be over.

Although some few grades have returned as wasty, barked, and staple lengths as low as 3/4-inch, the average run of

grades continues to be good. Practically all will be placed in the government loan, as the open market has been very limited this entire season.

Harvesting continues to dominate most of the farm work; however, many of the fellows are going along getting the land worked up for any winter moisture which we may get. Mold-board plowing is predominate in most of the fields. Moisture continues to be sufficient for good work. Many are already getting the tractors and equipment ready for next season's work. Several are making plans to have irrigation motors overhauled and be ready for the coming year.

There are reported incidents of vandalism and theft throughout the area. Motors and equipment should be brought in near the house. Items most likely to be taken are batteries, generators and starters. These items are easily taken and have an available market in surrounding towns.

Don't wait until the mad rush next spring to get your vehicles checked for State Inspection Stickers. Even though you still have several months before the deadline, try to get these inspections made during the next couple months.

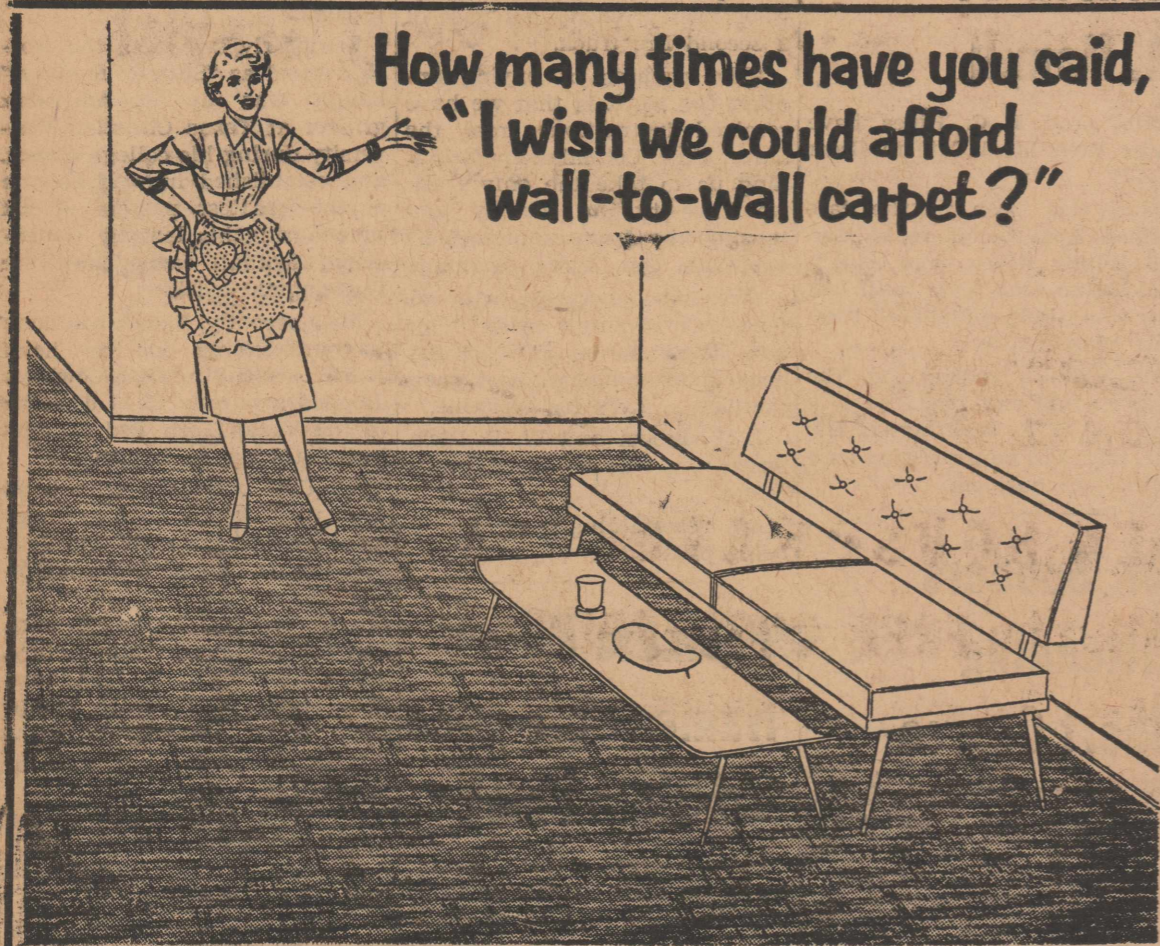

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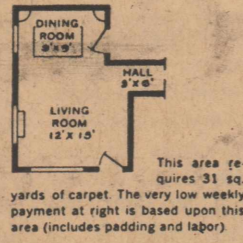
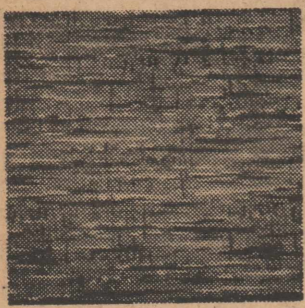

F. H. A. Girls To Compete For Homemakers Title

"Homemaker of Tomorrow Day" will be observed here Tuesday.

A startling total of 256,534 career-minded graduating girls in 10,222 of the nation's high schools simultaneously that day will test their aptitude for the career that awaits eight of 10 of them—homemaking.

Included will be the senior girls of Olton High School who have been enrolled in the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

A total of 582 schools and 12,436 girls in this state will take the 50-minute written homemaking examination which will be the basis for selecting the school and state Homemakers of Tomorrow. The examination paper of the girl receiving the highest test score in each school will be entered in state competition with each state Homemaker of Tomorrow receiving a \$1,500 scholarship and each state runner-up a \$500 scholarship.

The 48 state winners and the representative from the District of Columbia, with their advisors, will tour Washington, colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia, April 8-12, when interviews will combine with the test score in determining the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow who will be selected April 12. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000.

Each girl who takes the test will receive a homemaking guide. Each school winner will receive a golden Homemaker of Tomorrow pin designed by Trifari and her school will receive a cook book. The school of each state winner will receive a set of Encyclopedia Britannica.

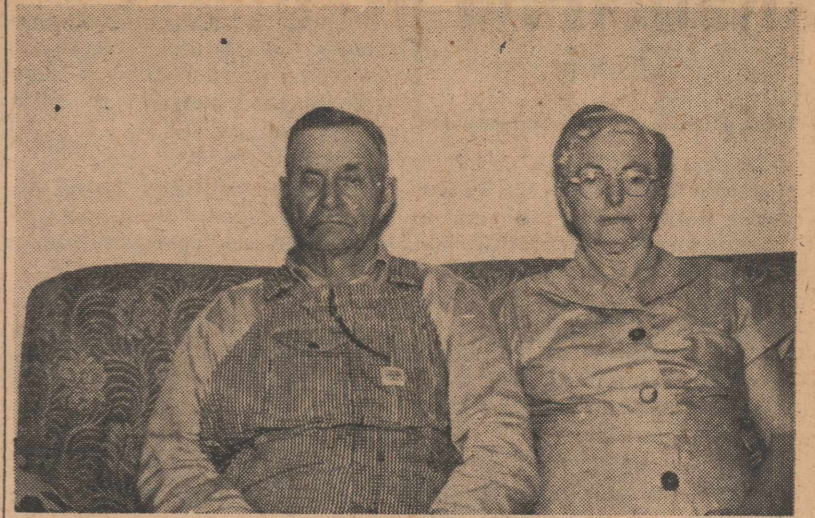

Stinnett marched 51 yards for the score in the third quarter after the kick off. They scored again in the same period as the climax to a 53 yard drive.

There was no score in the fourth period but it was in that quarter that the Wolverines turned in some of their most brilliant playing of the outing.

## Blackhawks Blast Mustangs, 52-7, With Devastating Ground Attack

### HART TO PLAY HOST TO CAGERS IN TOURNAMENT THIS WEEK-END

**HART**—Coach Charles Barnard's Longhorn cage teams will play host at a tournament scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday at Longhorn gym. Competing in the girls' bracket will be Hart, Hartley, Petersburg, Kress, Nazareth, Texline, Adrian and Spade. Quail will round out the boys' bracket in the place of Kress. The tournament will get underway at 6 o'clock Thursday evening.

Here are the brackets for the boys:  
Spade and Adrian at 7:15 o'clock Thursday evening. Hart and Hartley at 9:45. Quail and Nazareth at 1:30 o'clock Friday afternoon and Texline and Petersburg at 9:15 o'clock Friday morning.  
Losers of the Hart-Hartley and Spade-Adrian games will play at 8:30 o'clock Friday evening and the winners will play at 6 o'clock Friday evening.

Losers of the Quail-Nazareth games and the Texline-Petersburg games play at 9:15 o'clock Saturday morning with the winners playing at 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning.  
Game for third place will be at 7:15 o'clock Saturday evening. Consolation game will be at 2:45 o'clock Saturday afternoon.  
The championship and second place winners will be decided by a game beginning at 9:45 o'clock Saturday night.  
In the girls' bracket: Petersburg and Kress play at 6 o'clock Thursday evening with Hart and Hartley meeting at 8:30 o'clock Thursday. Nazareth and Texline play at 10:30 o'clock Friday morning and Adrian and Spade at 8 o'clock Friday morning.  
Losers of the Hart-Hartley and the Petersburg-Kress games will meet at 7:15 o'clock Friday evening with the winners playing at 2:45 o'clock Friday afternoon.  
Losers of the Nazareth-Texline and Adrian-Spade game play at 9:45 o'clock Friday and the winners play at 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Consolation game is at 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Third place will be decided at 6 o'clock Saturday evening while first place and second place will be decided at 8:30 o'clock Saturday night.  
The Hart tournament is the first major invitational basketball tournament in the area this season.

Operating with the precision of professionals, the Phillips Blackhawks swept to an easier-than-expected 52-7 triumph over the Olton Mustangs Friday afternoon in a bi-district clash unfolded before a crowd of more than 4,000 in Plainview's Bulldog Stadium.  
The 1-AA Blackhawks, defending state champions in Class AA and favorites to nab the crown again this year, led only 7-0 at the close of the first period, but broke the game wide open in the second period with a trio of touchdowns to take a commanding 25-0 halftime lead.  
**Dominant Play**  
They completely dominated play during the third period, tallying four times to widen the margin to 52-0. The 2-AA Mustangs tallied on a 50-yard sustained drive midway in the final quarter to break into the scoring column, but at that stage of the contest, Mustang fans were too stunned to emit more than a feeble cheer for their badly outclassed representatives.  
It was a typical victory for the mighty Blackhawks of Coach Chesty Walker, who relentlessly played his first string eleven until one minute prior to game's end.  
**Webb Shines**  
The shining star in Phillips' offense was Jackie Webb, 155-pound right halfback. Webb, a leading candidate for all-state honors, tallied five times on romps of 3, 10, 34, 12 and 28 yards.  
A less talented player than Webb, however, could have moved through the gaping holes opened by the hard-blocking Blackhawk forward wall, led by

Gene Packebush, Norman Kendrick and Royce Phares.  
It was a bitter defeat for the entire Mustang squad, and especially for seniors Carlton Ashley, Harold Eby, Jarrell Edwards, Edward Feathergill, John Jefferies, Jackie Gray, Roy LaDuke, Donald Powell, Clyde Rhodes, Wally Stewart and Max Wozen-craft.  
**Never Gave Up**  
Coach Joe Turner's Mustangs never gave up. Trailing 52-0 at the end of three periods, they outplayed the Blackhawks during the final canto and countered with a 50-yard scoring drive of their own during a series of rough-and-tumble plays that brought near-riot to the gridiron before good officiating quelled flaring tempers on both teams.  
The Mustangs got a bad break early in the first period, when on their first play from scrimmage, David Price fumbled and Packebush recovered for Phillips at the Mustangs 22. Four plays later, Webb dove through a good hole at right guard and Stanley Wilder, the brilliant Blackhawk quarterback, converted to put the Blackhawks out front 7-0.  
That initial tally came 4½ minutes deep in the first period.  
**48-Yard Gallop**  
The Blackhawks had trouble solving the Mustang defense until 2½ minutes deep in the second period, when Wilder handed off to fullback Tommy Newman, who broke through a gaping hole at center and outran the entire Mustang secondary on a stunning 48-yard touchdown gallop. Teddy Estes and Rhodes deflected Wilder's PAT try.  
Newman's spinning, twisting kickoffs kept the Mustangs deep in the hole throughout the second period. The Blackhawks got their third score 7 minutes deep in the quarter on a 10-yard run by Webb, and widened the gap to 25-0 just prior to halftime on Webb's spectacular 34-yard sweep around left end.  
The Blackhawks so completely dominated play during the third quarter that Olton ran only three plays from scrimmage, netting three yards on two ground tries, and passed once, incomplete.  
**Olton Passes Fail**  
The failure of Olton's passing attack to click, in fact, made a big difference in the Mustangs' inability to stage any sort of concerted offensive drive against the Blackhawks. Olton went to the air on 10 occasions, completed none, and had two intercepted.  
The devastating Blackhawk ground game clicked for a fifth touchdown at 3' 40" of the third

period on 12-yard scamper by Webb. Wilder's conversion made it 32-0. About four minutes later, the elusive Webb broke away again on a 28-yard scoring bolt over left guard. Wilder again converted to widen the gap to 39-0.  
**Newman Scampers**  
With 2' 36" remaining in the third quarter, Wilder pitched out to Newman, who carried around left end—and with the aid of a key block thrown by Ted Jolly on Jackie Gray at the 11—went 39 yards for the Blackhawks' seventh touchdown. Wilder's conversion made it 46-0.  
Phillips got its final score with 20 seconds of play remaining in the third quarter on a 13-yard pass from Newman to Ted Jolly.

John Paul Jones, reserve full-back, got the tally when he picked up a fumble by David Price at the one-yard line and piled into the end zone for the score. Jack Royce Straw's conversion made it 52-7.  
The game, probably the roughest engaged in by either club this year, drew to a close minutes later with the Blackhawks in possession at the Mustang 40 (Continued on back page)

Every year many poorly wrapped packages break open despite careful handling and we often have to puzzle over addresses which are incomplete or simply cannot be read at all."

He urged that patrons ask for free copies of a new publication, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing," now available at the Olton Post Office. Advance care in preparing gift packages for the mails and making sure that all addresses are legible and complete will prevent disappointment to sender and receiver alike.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns. "The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your packages from."

Some Post Offices cannot accept packages that are more than 72 inches in combined length and girth, nor more than 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limits go up to 100 inches in combined length and girth and 70 pounds in weight.

It is always better to use corrugated cartons for shipping your gifts especially where there are a number of various sized objects. Use plenty of wadded tissues or newspaper in the cartons for extra protection against shock. Complete each package by wrapping in heavy paper and tying it with strong cord.

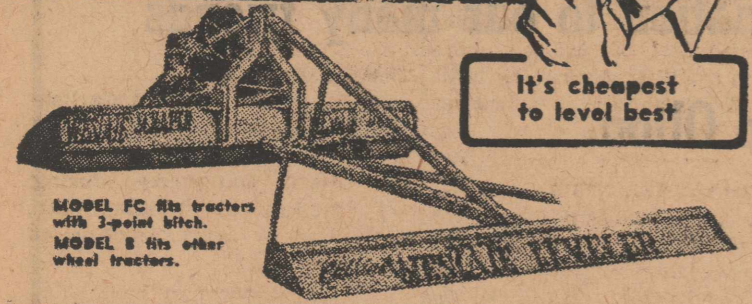
As extra precaution against loss, Postmaster Holt advised placing both your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.
