## Five-Inch Rainfall Boosts Crop Hopes To Peak Levels

### LITTLE BOY SEARED IN GAS FLAMES

Ricky Lee, 1 year old, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Lee, was seriously burned last Friday in a fire at the home of his parents, 5 miles northeast of Olton.

The child turned on a gas jet from which a stove recently had been removed. Gas from the jet, which is located in the bathroom, reached the hot water heater about four feet away and was ignited.

The little boy suffered severe burns on the hands, ears, face and left part of the chest.

The child is under treatment at Olton Memorial Hospital. Hospital attendants described the baby's condition as good Wednesday.

The little boy's grandmother, Mrs. Weldon Lee of Cotton Center said the house was damaged by the explosion and fire.

### Farmers Say Deep-Down Moisture Means Best Start In Recent Years

The cotton and grain sorghum outlook is the best in several years here as the result of heavy intermittent showers, which began here Sunday night and which still were coming down at a steady clip Wednesday afternoon.

More rain is indicated for today. The Sunday-through-Wednes-

day series of showers, estimated at from 2½ to 5 inches of total rainfall, followed closely on the heels of a heavy May 2 shower of more than an inch, and boosted total May rainfall in the Olton area to about five inches.

At Consumers Butane Co., Hobb Thomas reported the total May 2-11 rainfall as "about seven inches." Vernon Nixon's rain gauge placed the total of 4.4 inches, and at Ben F. Smith Grain Co., Guy Watson estimates total rainfall for the 10-day period at 4½ inches.

#### Begins Sunday

Most of the rainfall fell in a 60-hour period which began shortly prior to midnight on Sunday, Sunday's thundershower was a violent one, accompanied by marble-sized hail and sharp lightning.

The rain, touched off by a heavy frontal system which dumped general moisture over the entire Plains area, has resulted in what farmers call "the best start in years."

#### "Best Break"

"It's absolutely the best break we have had in a long time," Willie Gene Green chortled Wednesday afternoon. "The water has soaked in well, and the ground is wet deep down." Green, who farms one mile south and one west of Olton, reported an estimated 4½ inches since Sunday night.

Farmers expressed elation that the "three-day series of showers were spaced sufficiently apart to permit a high percentage of the moisture to soak in, instead of being lost to runoff, as probably would have been the case had all the rain fallen continuously. Five inches plus.

L. R. Goynes, one mile east of Olton, told The Enterprise on Wednesday afternoon that May rainfall at his farm is "in excess of five inches." More than half of that had fallen since Tuesday morning. Goynes said moisture is generally heavier east of Olton than to the west.

"It will mean a wonderful start for cotton," Goynes declared.

C. R. Stockstill Grocery at Circle estimated the fall since Sunday night at approximately 3½ inches.

At Cleo Smith's farm 3½ miles northwest of Olton, Mrs. Smith said she is doubtful that the three-day shower resulted in more than 2½ inches at their place.

#### "Just Wonderful"

George Redinger, four miles northeast, said he has had a "good four inches since Sunday night, and got 1.2 inches a week ago Monday."

Queried about planting prospects, Redinger replied, "Wonderful . . . just wonderful!" Farmers say it will be at least a week and possibly as long as 10 days before they'll be able to get into their fields to begin planting cotton, which normally is planted in early May.

#### Across Highway

Mrs. Lowell McGill said their farm four miles south and two west had received over four inches of May rainfall by Tuesday afternoon, and "probably over five inches with Wednesday's rain."

Draw water was across the highway on the farm road between Hart Camp and Spade on Wednesday morning, according to reports reaching The Enterprise office, and a Texas Highway Department truck was pulling cars across the flooded stretch.

From the deadening thud of downpours to the gentle patter against the window panes, the pleasing sound of rain echoed through the week over the Olton community and most of the South Plains. From the early Sunday morning hours of May Day until now, the heavy moisture laden clouds have filled the sky.

The first measurable moisture coming on Monday night totaled 1.1 inches and with a few intervals of fair sky between showers have thru today (Wednesday) brought a total of 4.4 inches of long desired rain to Olton. The showers, although not especially desired by some few at this particular time, is a special blessing and answered prayer to many on the high plains.

Some, few, maybe 20%, of the farmers had planted their cotton but the majority were waiting for settled skies before getting into the fields. A few of these who planted early have managed to get a stand up but many who planted after the showers began have given up and will plant over when the weather permits.

Most farmers feel that this is the best pre-planting condition our land has been in many years. With only a few days of desirable weather following this spell, the entire community can be planted. With the modern equipment used by the farmers now and the number of 4-row rigs available, the entire area will be covered in less than a week if desired. From the 10th thru the 20th is considered by many as the ideal time to plant cotton. Sorghum grains can be planted any time thru most of June and ordinarily make a good yield.

For the hay and potato farmers, nothing could have been more desirable. Both crops are responding perfectly and the first harvest of the new hay crop is expected next week.

Potato growers report that the plants are most nearly perfect and growing very good. These rains will be ideal, as the first growth of potatoes are now being formed.

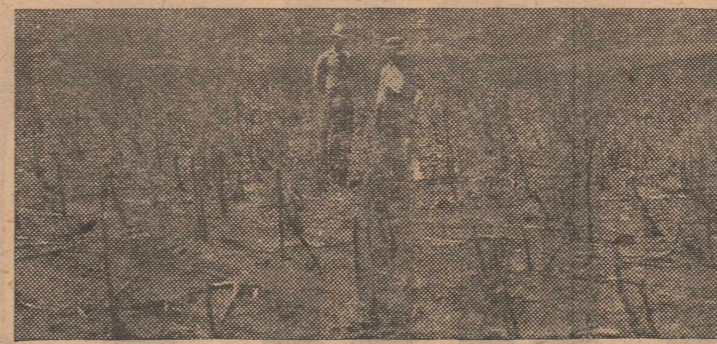
