Olton Lions Sponsor Camp For Little 8-year-old Crippled Boy, C. Schaefer

Curtiss Schaefer, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Schaefer, will be sponsored at the Texas Lions Camp by the Olton Lions Club.

The camp, located in the Texas Hill country, 3 miles south of Kerrville, is free to any boy or girl in the State of Texas who does not speak, hear, see, or any crippled child from the ages of 7 through 16. Curtiss is crippled from Polio that he had years ago.

Curtiss' mother, Mrs. Schaefer, said, "They're going to teach him to swim and he just loves water. It's really going to be grand."

Curtiss will register at the camp Sunday for two weeks of fun, recreation, and rehabilitation.

"Curtiss is a grand little boy," said Lions Club president Carl Macon. "He has more nerve than I ever saw!"

Lamb County Queen Contest Set For Aug. 19

Olton's high school auditorium will be the scene for the Lamb County Farm Bureau queen contest August 19 at 8:00 p.m.

Miss Barbara Faye Brock, daughter of Mrs. Almon Whitford of Springlake, is the third entry in the contest. Two sisters from Sudan were the first entries.

Winner of the Lamb County contest will compete in the district contest in Lubbock in September; the district winner will compete in Fort Worth in November for the state title. The state queen will go to the American Farm Bureau convention in Chicago.

Contestants must be either the daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member living in Lamb County, and must be between 16 and 22 years old. They must be unmarried.

Two awards from each town will be presented also to members for their contributions to the Farm Bureau.

Two-year-old Cathy Pollan was fatally injured Sunday when she was crushed by a car driven by a kinsman.

The child had been playing behind a car at a family get together at Earth. Reports here said an uncle failed to see the baby and backed over her as he was about to depart to buy a package of cigarettes.

The little girl was rushed to Olton and then on to Plainview. She was dead on arrival at a Plainview hospital.

The child was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert F. Pollan of Earth.

REPORT

B. O. Pollock, David Maxey and Firechief Tom Smith this week reported on their attendance of the fire fighting course at Texas A & M College.

Approximately 50% of the Lamb County youngsters who took the first Salk polio vaccine shots had taken the shots by noon Wednesday, reported Fred Gordon, elementary school principal.

Mr. Gordon said that since several children did not show up for their shot, there will be another chance to get the shots in about two weeks. "When a definite time is set", Mr. Gordon explained, "we will let everyone know."

The shots were given at the Medical Arts Building in Littlefield for youngsters who got their initial Salk injection in May. "A number of cars took the children over to Littlefield," Mr. Gordon said, "and there was room for everyone."

Phone Scrap To High Court Patrons Declare

Legal action loomed this week in the rural telephone rate dispute.

Rural patrons Tuesday night voted to attempt negotiations of a flat \$5.00 phone rate with General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Telephone company officials said there is no recognized body which can legally negotiate for rural subscribers.

Rural telephone patrons are not protected by franchise.

The rural group also voted to fight in the courts any attempt of the company to use the sliding scale of rates which General announced last week.

Rural phone users' attorneys, T. Wade Potter and Hank Gowdy of Littlefield promised a battle to the Supreme Court of the US if necessary to vindicate the stand taken by their clients.

The new rural rates go into effect on the next billing coincident with new rates becoming effective for city telephone patrons.

The city settled by compromise with the phone company at the July 5 meeting of the city commission.

General's Bob Shirey declined to discuss rural negotiation with The Enterprise Wednesday.

"We made our position clear the other night," Mr. Shirey declared. The phone company official apparently was referring to a meeting of telephone men with a rural committee Tuesday night of last week.

At that meeting the phone company spokesman announced the new rural rates.

Rates of \$5.00 per month will be charged for the first three miles distance from the city limits of Olton; \$5.25 on the next two miles and patrons living further out than five miles will have a rate of \$5.50, the company officials reported.

Mr. Shirey defended the phone company's sliding scale of rural rates.

"It's the most equitable way," he declared. "It also takes care of increased investment."

Jim King, head of the company's rates and revenue department, could not be reached for comment.

Horace Walker is head of the rural committee chosen by ballot to deal with the telephone company.

HAIL HITS OLTON AREA THIS WEEK

Hail did considerable damage in the Olton area Sunday afternoon and again Tuesday afternoon.

Damage from the Sunday storm was South and Southeast of Olton. Reports here said the farms of Elvie Hayes and M. L. Armstrong were hard hit. Also hit to lesser degree was the north side of the Leslie Kennedy farm 3 miles south of town.

Several other farmers in the area reported heavy damage. About 2 inches of rain fell with the hail.

An area southwest of Circle and north of Circle was hit by hail and rain Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. F. C. Schaefer, 74 years old, resident of Olton for 30 years, died Monday afternoon in the Muleshoe Hospital after a short illness.

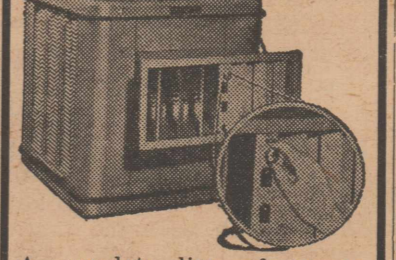

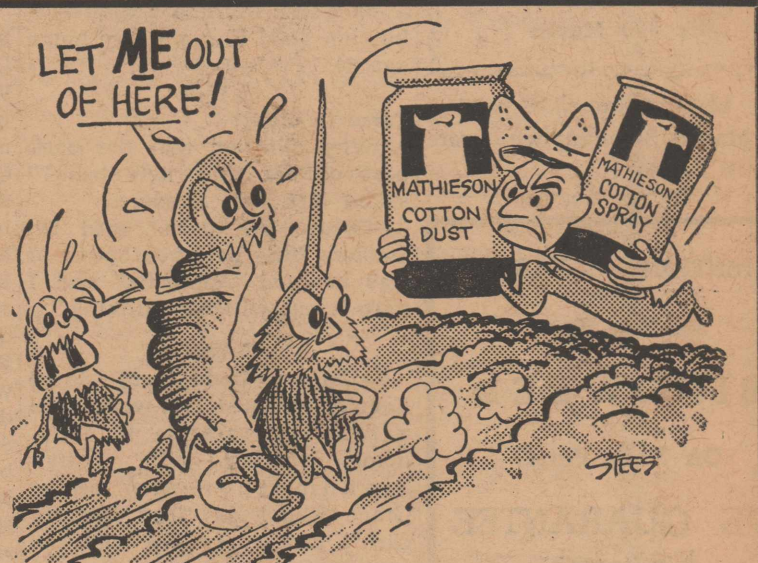

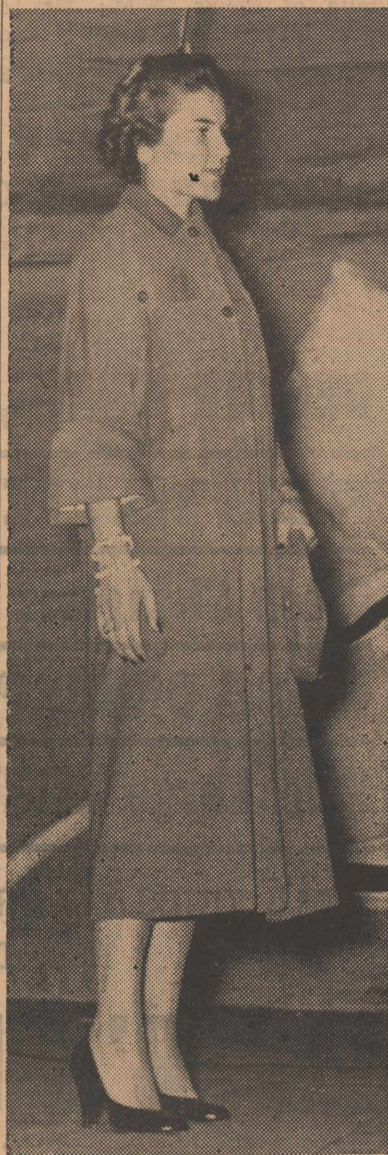

SHORT GRASS

As this column is being written, I am in the midst of preparation for a trip to try to prove that I am a better fisherman than my favorite brunette.

It all started last summer when we first visited Colorado's beautiful Conejos River, which I would heartily recommend to anyone who cares about trout fishing, or wants to learn.

I had a good fly rod and an automatic reel, and had put in a considerable number of hours acquainting myself with the practice of presenting a dry fly in a reasonably acceptable manner.

My favorite brunette, on the other hand, had a poor quality rod, a \$1 manually operated reel, and her fly casting was a good example of the how-not-to-do-it illustrations.

It was a considerably more handsome catch than what I had on my stringer.

So this week we are back on the Conejos River again. My favorite brunette has the same beaten-up rod and reel, and I have carefully put all of my equipment in tip-top shape for the occasion, but I would not care to wager on who lands the biggest fish.

It could be that trout are partial to brunette anglers.

The Rutgers University Department of Journalism has completed a survey of women shoppers which is quite gratifying to me. The survey indicated that 93½ per cent of the housewives interviewed preferred to see advertising published in
