## Mustang Cagers To Open District Play Here Friday With Floydada

Olton High School basketball teams will meet Floydada here this Friday night in the first home district cage tilts of the season.

Three games are scheduled. The junior varsities of the two schools will begin play at 6:30 p. m., and contests between the girls' team and the varsity boys' teams will follow in that order.

Coach Joe Turner has announced that boxing matches, featuring Olton High School mittmen, will be held between halves of both the varsity boys' and girls' games as an added inducement for a larger crowd on the occasion of these first home district games.

The OHS varsity lost to Littlefield on Tuesday night, 55-38. Red Machen canned 11 points for the locals. The Mustang B team also lost to the Littlefield junior varsity, 35-23.

The Mustang girls, however, emerged victorious in their initial district encounter, trouncing Littlefield, 45-28. The win gives the OHS girls a 1-0 record in district play.

Littlefield is a conference opponent for the OHS girls, but not for the boys. Other conference foes include Floydada, Lockney, Tulia, and Muleshoe.

Tomorrow night's game with Floydada will open an eight-game district schedule for the Mustang boys, and will be the second in a ten-game schedule for the girls.

Funeral arrangements were not definite when Rev. and Mrs. Littleton left here Monday. They expect to return to Olton the latter part of this week.

## CITY ADDS HILLCREST ADDITION

Hillcrest Addition, a 40-acre tract at the western outskirts of Olton, has been annexed to the city.

Annexation proceedings became final Tuesday at a called meeting of the city commission. Commissioner W. B. Smith, Jr., made a motion to accept a petition to annex the addition. The motion was seconded by Commission or Eldon Franks and made unanimous by Mayor Lefty Hollingsworth.

Ben F. Smith, owner of the tract, had formally petitioned annexation. The new portion of the city is to be a housing project site.

## Olton Mothers Will March January 27

The Mothers March of Dimes will be waged by Olton Study Club members Thursday night, January 27.

Beginning at 7:30 that evening, the women will make a house-to-house canvass in Olton, stopping to solicit contributions to the national polio fund at houses with porch lights on.

The Mothers' March is a part of the annual drive to raise funds for polio research and relief. Olton's goal this year is \$2500. Contributions will be accepted at any time from any person by members of the Study Club.

Boxes are placed in downtown business houses for free-will contributions. Special efforts are being made through school students and girl scout troops.

According to county records, only two of the nine polio cases reported in Lamb County last year were adequately covered by polio insurance. The other seven cases were aided by the March of Dimes.

## Ticket Sellers Urged To Report Next Monday Nite

A meeting on which hinges the future of a proposed Olton High School football stadium project has been called for 7 p. m. Monday, Jan. 24, at Olton High School, it was announced Wednesday by Carl Macon, superintendent of schools.

"I cannot stress strongly enough the importance of this meeting," Macon declared. "It is extremely urgent that everyone with tickets be present and bring all unsold tickets, because the entire matter of whether we're to have a new stadium depends on the outcome of this meeting."

Goal in Sight Reserved seat sales, which would finance the project, "are far enough along that we can see the goal in sight, providing we can get a few men to work hard for just a little while longer," Macon asserted.

Letters concerning Monday night's meeting are being mailed to everyone with tickets and to all school board members. "We also invite businessmen, farmers, and in fact everyone interested in the stadium, because important decisions must be made Monday," the superintendent explained.

Three-Phase Plan The overall plan is aimed at the sale of 600 reserved seats in Memorial Stadium to finance the construction of 1,110 new seats on the east side of the stadium and to build a concrete block dressing room and public restrooms on the west end of the band hall.

The 600 reserved seats would be situated between the 40-yard lines of the proposed new 1,110-seat addition. The seats are selling for \$20 each on a three-year basis.

Cost of the stadium addition has been estimated at about \$7,800, and the restroom-dressing room addition is expected to cost about \$4,000.

By January 31 The latter project would be constructed as a 25-foot addition to the west end of the band hall, with approximately 17 feet allotted for dressing room and shower space, and the other 8 feet designated for public restrooms.

"We would very much like to complete this drive by the close of January," Macon said Wednesday.

There has been some discussion of cutting down the size of the stadium addition. "Cutting down the size of the stadium would not cut the cost in proportion, however, and would not help much in realizing our goal," Macon said. The dressing room and shower space and public restrooms cannot be cut at all and still be adequate, he pointed out.

It is we who have produced a generation of state planners. Is it little wonder that teenagers spurn work when our government has put a premium upon indolence and laziness? enterprise. Now it penalizes initiative and rewards slothfulness. Is that something that sets a character building example before our children?

Mr. Murphy has put large enough wire in his house so that all electric appliances get sufficient voltage for proper operation. He says, "I've used #12 wire as minimum on all circuits with larger wire in the heavy duty circuits—#6 for the electric range and #10 for the electric dryer."

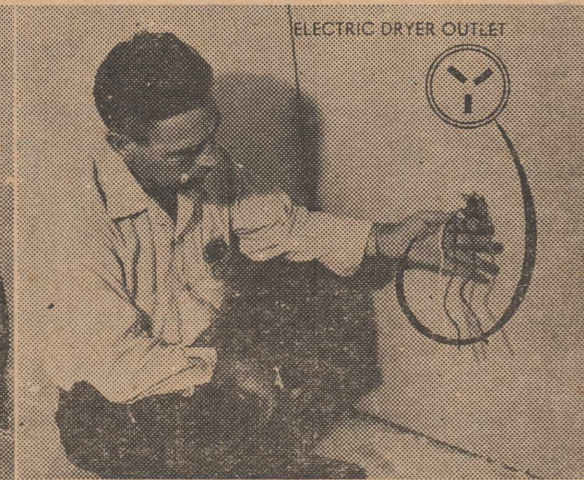


100 AMPERE MAIN BREAKER
