Smith Elevator Begins Shipments To Make Room For 1956 Grain Crop

OLTON HAS FINANCE COMPANY

Olton has a relatively new corporation.

It is Farmers Investment Corporation, a finance company, which has been in business here for the past six months. The company was founded by W. B. Smith, Jr., C. W. Grant and Andrew W. Stroebel.

Farmers Investment Corporation was organized in January. The management only recently offered stock in the firm for sale.

The firm finances furniture, appliances and other items of merchandise.

Lease-Purchase Plan Announced By PO Dept.

The Post Office Department has come out with a brochure on the lease-purchase program under which many towns and cities are beginning to get badly needed post office buildings. Entitled "Post Office Department Lease-Purchase Procedures and Documents," the brochure will be of interest to prospective bidders and investors. It can be obtained from the regional real estate manager, A. P. DeWitt, Box 3, Dallas 21, Texas.

The lease-purchase law, enacted by the 83rd Congress, makes it possible to employ the financing and construction capacity of private enterprise to provide modern buildings for government use. Under this program, the Post Office Department may buy vitally needed facilities substantially in the same manner that the average prudent American buys his home in periodic payments like rent. Excessive immediate outlays of public funds are thus avoided.

Twenty-seven lease-purchase post office projects have been approved, and four of them are in Texas—at Garland, Grand Prairie, Houston and Refugio.

George A. Gray of Dallas, director of the Louisiana-Texas Post Office Region, said the lease-purchase program combined with the regular leasing program gives the Post Office two methods of obtaining badly needed new facilities through private financing.

Costs under the lease-purchase program, he said, must compare with the rental of similar property in the same or a like community. Based on analysis, the Department will determine, and then use, either the lease-purchase method or the regular leasing method, depending on which is the most advantageous to the taxpayers.

About 35 million pounds of Olton grain is being shipped to port for export to the world market.

Louie Mack Hardy of Ben F. Smith Grain Company said 30 trucks are busy hauling the milo to Houston from where it will be shipped overseas.

Olton's grain went to India last year. Mr. Hardy said he does not know the final destination of the grain being shipped out this year.

Already 200 truck loads have been shipped. Some 800 loads remain to go. This will represent a dollar value of some \$700,000.

The grain being shipped is in the government loan. Loans against it were not paid off and it now belongs to the government.

Mr. Hardy said there has been no sign of castor beans in this year's shipment. Both the elevator folks and the farmers were very careful with last year's grain crop after castor bean contamination was reported.

Mr. Hardy said his elevator should be cleared for the 1956 crop by Sept. 1.

HATLEY SAYS STATEMENTS A MUST

Farmers who want to use bracer labor this fall should sign housing statements to be filed with the Department of Labor in the very near future.

This information came this week from Elvis Hatley, manager of Olton Producers Co-Op. He said these statements should be signed by Sept. 1.

If such a statement is not signed by deadline, it will be too late for the farmer to qualify. "Even though you are a paid-up member of Olton Co-Op Producers Association, you still must sign a statement to qualify yourself to use bracer labor," Mr. Hatley declared.

"If you are not a paid-up member, you must join and then sign a housing statement in order to qualify," he declared.

All interested producers have been urged to inquire at the Littlefield ASC office before the deadline date.

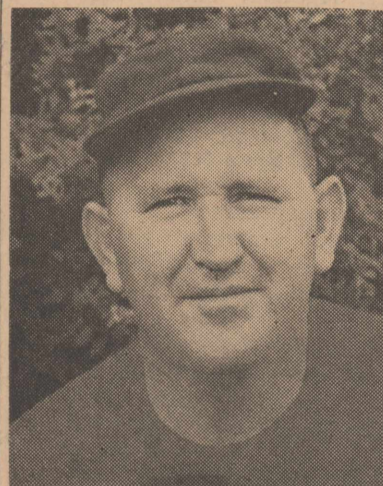
The sign-up period is for any practices to be carried out in the months of September and October.

This information came like a dash of ice water in the torrid August heat wave when Coach Joe Turner announced that the 1956 Mustang Football Squad will suit out and begin practice Monday, Aug. 27.

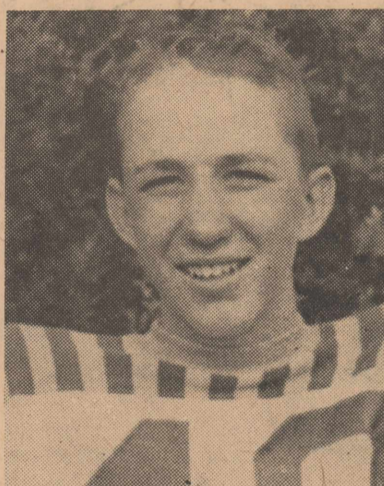
Coach Turner expects some 50 or 60 boys to report for practice. Of that number, 15 will be returning lettermen but only 4 of the returnees were 1955 starters.

Coach Turner said the boys will get physical examinations Aug. 25 at the football field house.

Jeff Smart is Olton assistant coach and Jimmy Goss also is an assistant.

Coach Turner says Olton will be facing a rough schedule again this season beginning with Abernathy here Sept. 7. Abernathy beat Olton 13 to 0 last season—the first time the Antelopes ever handed the Mustangs a defeat. Abernathy is touted to win its district.

Olton is District 2-AA defending champions but it will be tough sledding even in district play this season. The district this year is made up of Olton, Muleshoe, Tulia, Dalhart, Dimmitt and Canyon.

Canyon's Eagles are picked as one of the top AA contenders in the state this year.

"Our main weakness will be depth at quarterback and end," declared Coach Turner.

James Ray Hyatt, Jack Royce Straw and Thurman Adams are to fill the quarterback position. Straw will fill in all over the backfield, wherever he is needed, Coach Turner reported.

End prospects are Billy McAlister, Alvin Wallace, Kirk McAdams and Don Kidd. Turner said these boys are short on experience. Kirk McAdams is the only letterman among them. "These boys are of about average speed," the coach declared.

Halfback prospects are Teddy Estes, Arno Hall, Dan Wallace, Jack Royce Straw, Joe Miller and Ronnie Dennis. Fullback prospects are David Price and Jack Royce Straw.

Tackles are Jack Hysinger and Clinton Billingsley. Guards are James Carson, David Miller and Charlie Pool. Centers are Jerry Edmonson and Billy King.

In other football developments, Coach Turner said scoreboard blueprints have arrived for Olton's new electric scoreboard.

The scoreboard will be purchased from funds derived from selling advertising on the scoreboard itself and from money left by two Olton High School classes. It was not financed from school funds.

Coach Turner said the football field has been lined off and the turf is in fair condition.

In the meantime, Quarterback Club President Bill Kelley announced that the Quarterback Club will meet at 8 o'clock the night of Aug. 27 and election of officers will be held. The meeting will be held at the high school.

James Otis "Jim" Bledsoe, 65 years old, long-time resident of Olton, died Thursday of last week in Olton Memorial Hospital following an illness of two years.

Mr. Bledsoe had been seriously ill since February. He underwent an operation early this year.

Mr. Bledsoe was born Oct. 15, 1890 at Denison. His family moved to Oklahoma when he was a youngster and Mr. Bledsoe grew up at Hollis.

Mr. Bledsoe and Bill Locke attended school together as boys.

Mr. Bledsoe was married Dec. 23, 1913 to Miss Mary Adams at Childress. They had met at Northfield. The Bledsoes made their home at Northfield for a time after their marriage but later settled at Hollis.

They moved to Olton about 18 years ago and had made their home here since. Mr. Bledsoe was a farmer and carpenter. He helped build some of the finest homes in Olton.

The Bledsoe home place is located two miles north of Circle.

Mr. Bledsoe was a song leader for the Church of Christ which he joined in 1915.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon in the Olton Main Street Church of Christ. Officiating was E. R. Higgins, minister, and J. V. Davis, Church of Christ minister from Hereford.

Burial was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Survivors include the widow; three daughters, Mrs. Iva Lobaugh of Tallequah, Okla., Mrs. Mildred Davis of Sundown, and Mrs. Norma Moss of Edmondton, Canada; two sons, James Bledsoe of Odessa and Delroy of Vernon; nine grandchildren; three brothers, Horace Bledsoe of Vanita, Okla., Burlen Bledsoe of Wellington, and Hugh Bledsoe of Olton; and four sisters, Mrs. Bert Miller of Wellington, Mrs. Earl Miller of Memphis, Mrs. Opha Wilson, Borger, and Mrs. Henry Miller, Dallas.

Elimination of risk with greater assurance of profit from flat storage of grain or seed, on the farm, is possible where the farmer has made provision for aeration of the stored grain.

Aeration prevents excessive moisture from forming on top of the grain and, in addition, cools the grain, thereby preventing insect and small rodent growth. Since grain is usually cut with a moisture content of about 13%, it is practical to maintain that percentage with aeration equipment.

The easiest way to accomplish aeration is to have a well advised installation consisting of a wire mesh tunnel running the length of the storage building, at one end of which is an electrically driven fan capable of pulling or pushing large volumes of air through the grain. Since aeration is simply a matter of cooling and maintaining quality after the grain has been dried to desirable moisture content, good aeration equipment can be used successfully for fumigation.

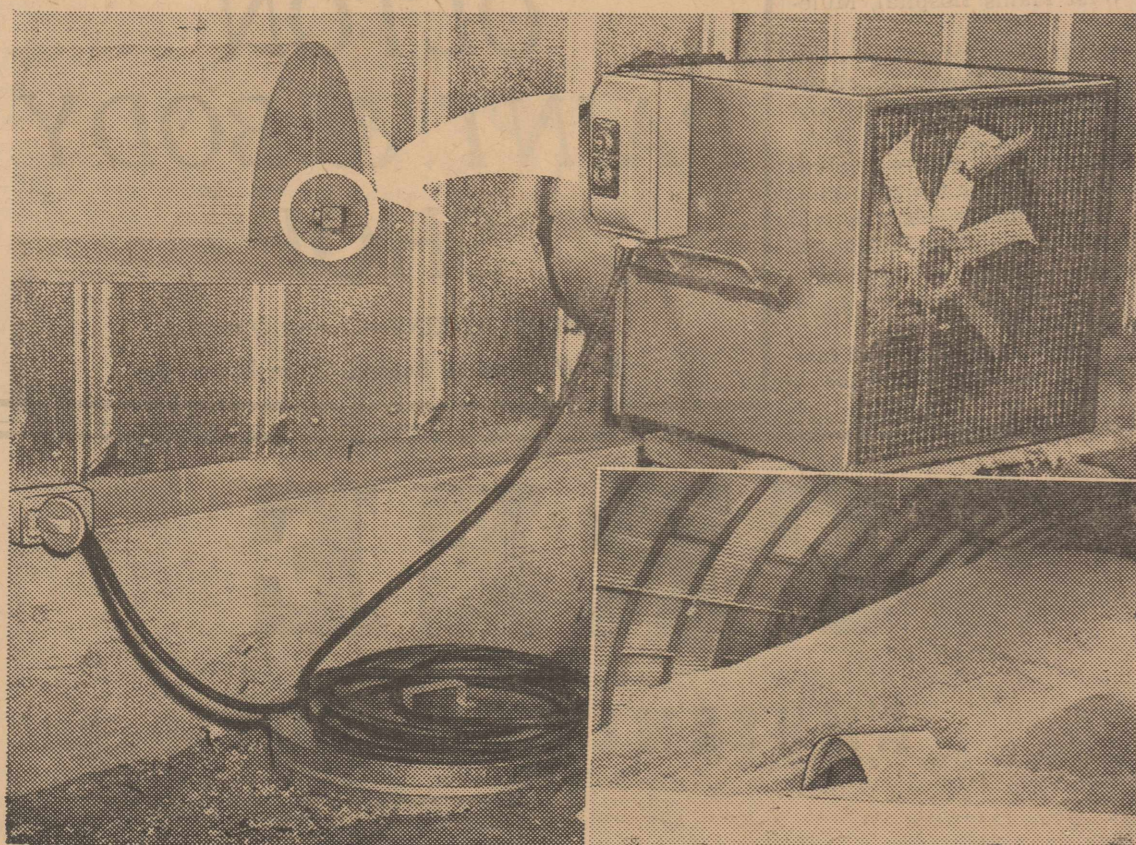
Some grain growers have at-

tempted to dry high-moisture-content grain with aeration equipment, however, this practice is not recommended because upwards of ten to twenty-five times greater air moving capacity must be employed. In drying, air is "pushed" through the grain rather than "pulled" through as in aerating.

Farmers have found that by storing grain on the farm, with proper anti-spoilage equipment, they have good returns for labor performed, good return on investment through saving the usual storage fees and grain handling costs. In addition, the grower maintains control of his crop, and he can sell whenever the market looks best.

Information on grain storage equipment is available through college agricultural departments and equipment suppliers.
