LIONS ANNUAL BROOM SALE SCHEDULED FOR NEXT WEEK

TREASURE HUNT WILL BE SEPT. 15

Olton merchants will stage their second Treasure Hunt promotion Sept. 15, according to Major James, chairman.

Mr. James said 36 merchants will participate in the next promotion. The last promotion was staged here Aug. 25 and brought one of the largest Saturday afternoon crowds to Olton in a decade.

She is survived by her husband, three daughters, and a son, Thurston.

Harvest Gets Off Slow Start

Olton harvest got underway this week but there seemed to be a far distance to go to the peak of gathering.

So far the six gins serving Olton and the Circle community had ginned only 23 bales through Wednesday noon. Ben F. Smith Grain Company reported that grain was coming in at a snail's pace.

Jack Gullett at the elevator said grain that has come in has been very green, for the most part.

He guessed that grain harvest would get in full swing in about two weeks.

Mr. Tanner is a Springlake cotton buyer, real estate broker and insurance man. He was instrumental in the incorporation of Springlake as a town in February of last year.

Mr. Sanders is manager of the Paymaster Gin at Springlake and also was a member of the town's first council.

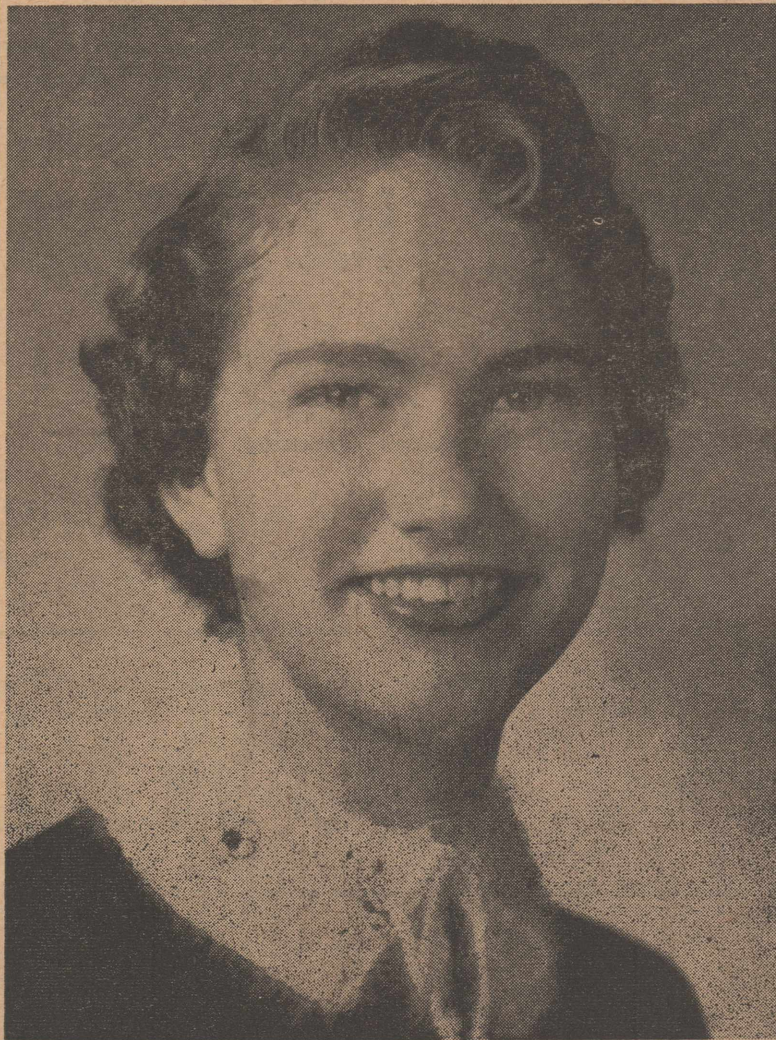
Bill Burrow was named to succeed Mr. Sanders as councilman.

Olton Mustangs To Meet Abernathy In Season Opener Here Friday Nite

Olton's Mustangs will host the Abernathy Antelopes at a "T" Party at Mustang Stadium here Friday night.

It will be the season opener for both teams. Kickoff time will be 8 o'clock. Olton will be looking for revenge for the 13-0 shellacking they took at the hands of the Antelopes last season.

Coach Joe Turner's charges will run a multiple "T" offense composed of the split T, Wing T, straight T, flanker T, pigeon toed T, the double wing T and a single wing.

Abernathy's Antelopes, under

Coach Royal James have received some fearsome press notices. Before the season had even begun, the Antelopes were touted to win their district.

Cagy Coach Turner has declared publicly that the tilt will be a tough one.

Mannie Connell at end and Oscar Lopez in the backfield spark the Antelope aerial hopes.

Connell was all-district end last year and any time the Antelopes have the ball, the Lopez to Connell combination is a real threat.

Coach Turner said the Antelopes have speed. Kenneth Jordan in the backfield is one of Abernathy's best running backs.

James Ray Hyatt will be generally Olton's team from the quarterback slot.

Other probable starters include Teddy Estes at left halfback; David Price at fullback; Jack Royce Straw at right halfback; Kirk McAdams, left end; Clinton Billingsley, left tackle; David Miller, left guard; Jerry Edmonson, center; James Carson, right guard; Jack Hysinger, right tackle; Billy McAllister or Alvin Wallace, right end.

Coach Joe Turner is beginning his fifth season as Mustang mentor. In the four seasons he has coached, his team has brought home three district championships, one bi-district championship, tied the Phillips Blackhaws in the never-to-be-forgotten game for the bi-district championship and has lost only one conference game.

Covering football for The Olton Enterprise this year will be Sammy Hale. Sammy has written sports for the Floyd County Hesperian at Floydada and is widely experienced in that field.

Real Estate Brooker Declares Water Rights On Open Market

Area voters last Saturday squelched an embryo Lamb County Water Control and Improvement District by a landslide and water rights to some 24,000 sandhill acres went on the open market.

The vote was 538 against and 245 for establishment of the district. Proponents of the district proposed to buy up sandhill water right at cost of almost a million dollars.

Routine Business Marks Board's First Meeting Of School Year

School Opens With Assembly; Enrollment Near 1021 Wednesday

An opening assembly started off the school year Monday morning with Rev. John E. Lewis, Baptist pastor, as main speaker.

Supt. Carl Macon, and Principals Fred Gordon and J. A. Williams, made announcement.

Olton School system had an enrollment of 1021 Wednesday morning according to school officials.

In the elementary grades, first through the seventh, 693 children had enrolled. Eighty-

five were in the eighth grade and 243 in high school—freshmen 72, sophomores 65, juniors 60, and seniors 46.

New teachers in OHS are Harold Warren, vocational agriculture; Dave Howton, commercial subjects; Mrs. Frances Pharis, Home Economics; Fred Stockdale, band and choir; and Mrs. J. A. Williams, senior English.

Three new teachers are teaching in the elementary grades. They are Mrs. Howard Warren, fourth; Mrs. John Lewis, sixth; and Mrs. C. W. Matby, first.

Olton school board attended to routine but highly necessary business as the trustees met last Tuesday night.

First off, the trustees made arrangements for completing repair of the homemaking building which was damaged by water.

Bonds were made for business manager, R. E. Porter, and for school bus drivers. The board took out insurance on the two temporary buildings erected during the summer and then bought more playground equipment for smaller children.

The delinquent tax roll was presented and approved. The board then heard an enrollment report by School Supt. Carl Macon. The report was on first day of school enrollment.

It follows:
The first grade with five teachers, 126 students; second grade with four teachers, 95 students; third grade with four teachers, 120 students; fourth grade with three teachers, 114 students; fifth grade with three teachers, 80 students; sixth grade with three teachers, 69 students; and the seventh grade with three teachers, 86 students. This was a total of 690 students in the first seven grades.

In the eighth grade are 84 students; in the ninth grade, 72 students; in the tenth, 65; in the eleventh, 60; and in the twelfth, 46. This is a total of 327 in the five grade in the high school building.

Mr. Macon said the total of 1,017 sets a new first day record for Olton school. He said the total enrollment will rise to a figure much higher than the first day total.

An additional teacher, Mrs. Lois Turner, was employed by the board at the request of the superintendent. She will teach fourth grade.

NEW GRAIN COMPANY IN OLTON

Olton has a new grain company.

It is to be known as Olton Grain Company and is located on Highway 70 near the delinting plant. It is owned jointly by Leonard Moore of Justin and James E. Duke of Fort Worth.

The firm will be managed by Glen Singletery of Kellar. Mr. Moore said the firm would be ready to receive grain almost immediately.

Mr. Moore said his company has purchased a three-acre site from C. T. Mason and will build loading facilities, install scales and erect an office here.

Mr. Moore said he plans to build a storage facility some time in the future but these plans now are indefinite.

The price to have been paid for water rights was fixed at \$31 an acre.

Olton was not included in the limits of the proposed water district. The boundaries of the proposed district ran from north to south across Lamb County about eight miles west of the Hale County line.

The district also excluded dry land acreage in the southwest corner of the county.

V. T. Tanner, Springlake real estate man and one of the most ardent proponents of the proposed district, said the water rights are now on the open market.

"The water rights are for sale to anyone who wants to buy them," Mr. Tanner declared Wednesday morning in a telephone conversation with The Enterprise.

"The people of Lamb County had an opportunity to buy it but they didn't want it," Mr. Tanner continued. "Now we have no scruples against selling to anyone."

Mr. Tanner said the owner of the land involved had wanted the people of Lamb County to have first opportunity at the water rights.

"They don't want the folks to be mad at them when they sell," Mr. Tanner concluded.

The issue carried in only one box in the area involved. Pleasant Valley voted for the district by a margin of 23 for and 2 against. There were 6 absentee votes for the district and 2 against it.

Possibly the reason for its success in the Pleasant Valley box is largely due to the proximity of that community to the sandhill land already controlled by Lubbock.

Rural and city voters balloted in separate boxes where the issue of whether or not an incorporated town would become a part of the district was involved.

Here's how they voted across the county:

Amherst city, 28 against and 8 for; rural, 26 against and 7 for; Earth city, 64 against and 13 for; rural, 43 against and 22 for; Littlefield city, 156 against and 81 for; rural, 40 against and 16 for; Springlake city, 24 against and 23 for; rural, 119 against and 19 for; Sudan city, 16 against and 15 for; rural, 18 against and 12 for; Pleasant Valley, 23 for and 2 against; and absentees, 6 for and 2 against.

Olton Woman's Father Dies At Sweetwater

Mrs. J. W. Dale's father, J. E. Burklow, 72, died Saturday in his home in Sweetwater where he was a retired farmer. He died of cancer and had been ill for about two years.

Mr. Burklow is survived by his wife, three daughters, and two sons.

Funeral services were held in Sweetwater Sunday afternoon and burial was in the Sweetwater cemetery.
