## Olton Man Killed In Accident Near Abernathy Saturday

An Olton man was killed early Saturday morning when his station wagon was involved in a collision with a cattle truck near Abernathy.

Dead is Lee Roy Cannon, 30 years old, employee of Ben Henson.

The accident is reported to have taken place about 3 o'clock Saturday morning. Mr. Cannon was pronounced dead on arrival at the Hale Center hospital.

Plainview Highway patrolmen investigated the accident. The officers were said to have reported that the cattle truck was struck on its left side by the station wagon.

Officers said the cattle truck was going south on US Highway 87. Mr. Cannon was reported to have been traveling east on Farm to Market Road 54.

The truck was loaded with cattle to be shown at the Lubbock fair. According to reports, one of the cattle was a black Angus bull valued at some \$30,000. It's back was said to have been broken in the crash.

Mr. Cannon moved to Olton about six years ago from Uvalde. He was a veteran of the Navy with which he served during World War II. A native of Maryville, Tex., he was born Aug. 17, 1926.

Mr. Cannon had returned to Olton from Montana only a short time ago. He had been operating a combine for Mr. Henson.

Relatives here said he was en route to Lubbock to visit a sister when he was fatally injured.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in Olton First Baptist Church. Officiating was Rev. John Lewis, pastor. Burial was in Olton Cemetery under

direction of Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Cannon, Olton; a sister, Mrs. W. W. Daniels,

Lubbock; five brothers, William of Gainesville, James of Billings, Mon., Richard of West Hollywood, Calif., Joe and Bob, both of Olton.

## Hines Motors Will Display New 1957 Fords At Showroom Wednesday

Hines Motors is combining its formal showing of the 1957 Ford with the observance of its second birthday.

For the convenience of the public, Mr. Hines said his firm would remain open until eight o'clock next Wednesday.

## Car Wash Set For Saturday

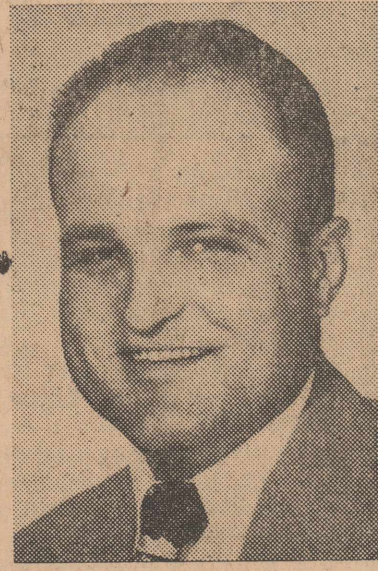
Senior boys will wash cars all-day Saturday beginning at 9 a.m. Everyone is asked to bring his car to the front of the school for a wash job.

Mothers of the twirlers made the uniforms.

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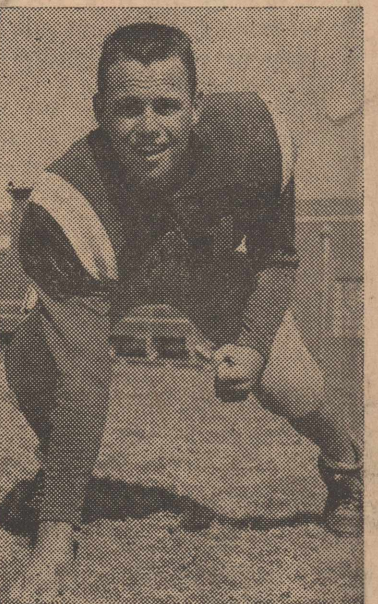
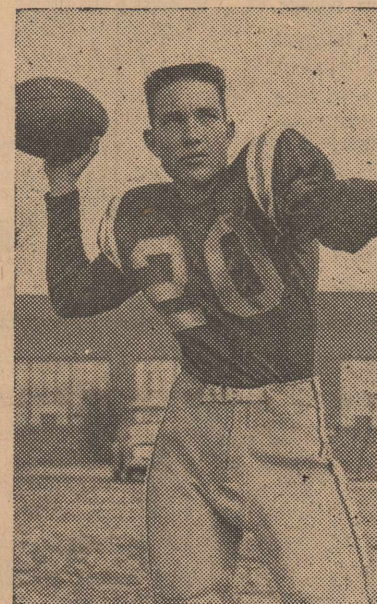
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## County Group Names Olton Man To Office

# Mustangs Battle Littlefield Wildcats To 12-12 Draw In Gridiron Thriller

Sparked by the Wallace brothers—Dan and Alvin—Olton's Mustangs managed to keep Coach Joe Turner's record clean as a hound's tooth Friday night as they fought the AAA Littlefield Wildcats to a 12 to 12 deadlock. The game was played at Littlefield.

Ironically, Dan and Alvin came to Olton a little more than a year ago from Littlefield.

Alvin made one of Olton's touchdowns and Dan sparked on defense for the Mustangs.

The Wallace brothers were by no means the only big guns the Mustangs opened up on the Wildcats. The entire Pony squad

rates a well done for a ball game that leaves Coach Turner two wins and a tie in the Mustang series with the Wildcats during Turner's tenure as Olton's mentor.

Jack Royce Straw, David Price and Tedy Estes all rate an extra bravo for their part in Friday's game. Billy King did a bang up job filling the shoes of Jack Hysinger at tackle. Jack was out with an injury.

The Ponies, definite underdogs in the game, again came back after the half to almost upset the dope bucket. The Mustangs seemed nervous at the start but settled down in the third and fourth quarters to almost pull the game out for Coach Turner.

Littlefield won the toss and

elects to receive. The Cats returned Straw's opening kickoff to their own 40. From there they moved to a score in six plays with Buddy Jones racing 42 yards for the TD.

The kick was wide and the score was 6-0 with the game less than three minutes old. The ease with which the Wildcats scored their first touchdown made it appear that the Mustang supporters might be in for a long night.

Following Littlefield's kickoff Olton could gain only five yards in three plays and had to punt. The punt was good for only 12 yards and the Cats took over on the Olton 41.

From there the Wildcats got five in three plays and on a fourth down try, Dan Wallace

caught the ball carried behind the line for a three yard loss. The Mustangs took over on downs. Two Olton passes went incomplete and David Price's quick-kick caught the Wildcats flat footed. The ball rolled across the goal line and went into play on the Littlefield 20.

The Wildcats moved from there to the 36 from where they had another touchdown nullified by a clipping penalty. This seemed to sting the Mustangs into action as in the middle of the second quarter they moved from their own 20, down to the Wildcat 27, before a fourth and one pass was intercepted to stymie Olton's only scoring threat of the first half.

The second half opened with Olton receiving the kick, but

the Mustangs couldn't move and had to punt. Littlefield got a first down, but fumbled and Straw recovered for Olton.

Then neither team could move and after an exchange of punts, the Mustangs owned the ball on their own 31.

It was then that the Ponies exploded. With the fire and determination exhibited in earlier ball games, the Mustangs drove for the tying touchdown.

First, Estes got 16 to the 47. Price picked up 7 to the Wildcat 46. Estes raced for a first down on the 41. Then alternating between Price, Estes and Straw, the Mustangs got a first down on the 16 as the quarter ended.

On the second play of the fourth quarter, James Ray Hyatt tossed a pass to Alvin Wallace

in the end zone.

Olton fans chewed on their hearts as Wallace tipped the ball high into the air on the first contact with his hands, brought it a little more under control the next time he touched it and then tucked it in on the third try.

It was a touchdown! The score was tied and remained so after attempted conversion failed.

Littlefield roared back with the kickoff and moved to midfield before Olton's line held and forced a punt. A short kick rolled dead on Olton's 27 yard line.

Two Olton passes fell short and again Price got off a beautiful quick kick that rolled dead on the Littlefield 20. The Cats got a first down

before Olton's defense held and forced a punt. Olton got the ball on its own 43 yard line.

Estes picked up a first down in two tries, bringing the ball to the Wildcat 46. Straw ran to the 23, and Price bulled his way to the 11 and then to the 8. Dan Wallace moved to the four.

Price lost one back to the five. Then on a fourth down try, Estes drove his way across the double stripe and Olton held the lead 12-6.

Straw's kick was blocked but that didn't seem important as only 2 minutes and 43 seconds of playing time remained on the clock.

However, the Cats would not be denied. They moved 62 yards in six plays. Buddy Jones took a pass in left flat for the score

with only 1:03 of time left. The kick was wide and the ball game ended in a 12 to 12 thriller.

Here's show the Mustangs showed up on the defense on tackles and assists. Jerry Edmondson, 13; Straw, 12; Clinton Billingsley, 9; Estes and Alvin Wallace, each 7; Dan Wallace, 6. Estes carried 14 times for 78 yards; Price 16 for 64; and Straw 6 for 49.

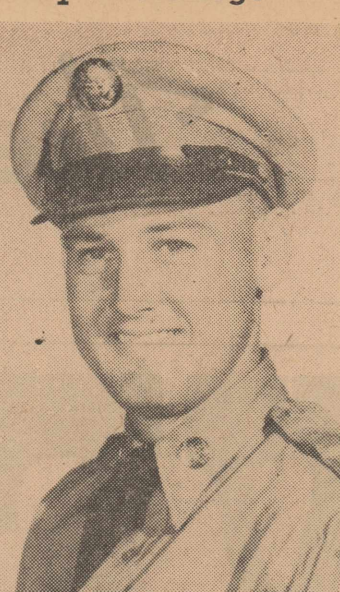

**ADDING BURRS  
TO SOIL  
INCREASES YIELD**

W. W. Bearden, who lives one mile west and a quarter of a mile north of Olton, says, "It pays to add cotton burrs to the soil." Bearden has been using burrs on his farm for the past several years. He started out on an experimental basis, but now he adds them to his soil whenever they are available.

The use of this practice is urged by the Lamb County Soil Conservation District Supervisors. Thurlie Branscum, Chairman of the Board of the Lamb County Soil Conservation District, said, "A large number of farmers in the district are applying cotton burrs to the soil, but there are still thousands of tons of burrs being burned annually instead of being added back to the soil."

Faster results can be expected from the use of composted burrs; these burrs are treated with a bacteria culture. With added moisture, they can be decayed in thirty days. When burrs have been composted, the heat created by the bacterial action will destroy weed seed, insects' eggs and larvae, plus some other undesirable elements. When the composted burrs are used, the nitrogen tie-up is for a much shorter period. If raw cotton burrs are added to the soil without a sufficient application of nitrogen, the following crop will probably show a nitrogen deficiency because the available nitrogen is tied up by the bacteria in decaying the burrs. The same is true when any high residue is returned to the soil. When any raw material is added to the soil, whether it is burrs or a heavy grain sorghum stubble, nitrogen should be added for best results.

The recommended application of burrs is from three to ten tons per acre although good results have been obtained with heavier applications when a sufficient amount of nitrogen is added. Out of every ton of burrs spread on the land, there is approximately thirty pounds of nitrogen, eight pounds of phosphate, one hundred pounds of potash, plus 1,750 pounds of organic matter and other minerals that are needed by the plants. The greatest benefits are received from soil conditioning by the addition of humus or organic matter which is required by all soils for plant growth. Humus is known as the magic material of the soil. It keeps the soil warm in winter and cool in the summer, slows up evaporation, and increases soil fertility and water holding capacity. For each ton of organic matter added to the soil, its storage capacity is increased by 1,000 gallons or more.

As a result of chemical analysis made on gin waste or cotton burrs, no agricultural agency or authority will question the value of organic matter in the soil; the problem is getting enough organic matter returned back to the soil.

### TO PRODUCE TWO SIZES OF FORDS

DEARBORN, MICH.—For the first time in its 53-year history, Ford Motor Company will produce two sizes of Ford cars, the company announced this week. The 19 new models to be un-

veiled by Ford dealers Wednesday morning will have the highest performance engines ever offered in the low price field.

R. S. McNamara, Ford Motor Company vice president and Ford Division general manager, said the 1957 Fords "represent the biggest change in the modern history of the Ford car."

The new Ford line divides into two basic sizes, Fairlane and Custom, plus the station wagon series, each with its own body and chassis. In addition,

the Fairlane series has been expanded to offer "Fairlane 500" models, which have extra luxury features.

The 1957 Fairlane and Fairlane 500 sedans are nine inches longer and four inches lower than last year's comparable models. Custom and Custom 300 sedans are more than three inches longer and nearly three and one-half inches lower than the 1956 models. Station wagons are three and one-half inches lower and nearly six inches longer. Fairlanes and Fairlane 500's are built on a 118-inch wheelbase. Station wagons, Customs and Custom 300's have a 116-inch wheelbase.

"There has been no sacrifice of headroom inside the car, in spite of their reduced height," Mr. McNamara said. "The new frame extends to the sides of the car, and this permits the floor to be lowered inside the frame rails."

"The design and styling are new from the ground up. Every dimension is changed. Wheels, frame, rear axle, drive shaft, engines, and every inch of sheet metal in every body style are definite departures from past models," he explained.

Riding ease has been greatly improved by using a longer, wider frame with lower pressure tires on wider treads, and employing redesigned ball-joint suspension in the front and outboard-mounted longer leaf springs in back. Because there

is more spring length ahead of the rear axle, front end dip on quick stops is checked better than ever before.

"Durability is built into the 1957 Ford through stronger alloy metals, greater use of insulation and sound-deadening materials, longer-wearing fabrics and plastics, and strengthening of mechanical parts," Mr. McNamara pointed out.

For the first time, a high performance V-8 engine is available as an optional power plant on all Ford cars. The engine, develops 245 horsepower, and is equipped with a four-barrel low silhouette carburetor.

Standard engine for the Fairlane and station wagon series is the 212 h. p. Thunderbird V-8. A 190 h. p. V-8 is standard for the Custom and Custom 300 series. Both have two-barrel carburetors. In addition, the 144 h. p. Mileage Maker six is available on all models. All engines can be ordered with standard, over-drive or Fordomatic transmissions.

Advanced design of the engines' carburetion, combustion chamber, and exhaust system, plus stepped-up compression, provides increased operating economy in all models. The dry-type air filter, carburetors, intake manifold, intake valves, camshaft, and distributor are the new components which give Ford increased performance.

Ford's new styling starts with the wide hooded headlights and a forward slanting grille, and includes streamlined wheel openings, a windshield that wraps further around the sides for better visibility, distinctive fins at the rear, and contoured sides that give the car a sculptured look.

"Hardtop" styling is the trademark of the conventional two door and four door sedans in the Fairlane and Fairlane 500 series. The effect is achieved with thin side pillars. Ford's true pillarless "hardtops," the four door and two door Victorias, also are offered in these series.

Station wagons have flatter roof lines, with a contoured step-down midway back from the windshield. At the back, the rear window and liftgate wrap around the sides to provide 20 per cent more opening for bulky loads. A new latch opens the entire tailgate with one pull, and the liftgate swings up automatically on concealed torsion bar springs. Special side mouldings and

ornamentation distinguish each of Ford's five series, which are available in 19 two-tone paint combinations or 12 solid colors. Inside, the upholstery is color-matched to the body's paint.

Ford's pioneering safety features introduced in 1956 have been improved. There is a new safety instrument panel with recessed control knobs clustered under the redesigned deep center steering wheel. Instrument panel and sun visor crash cushions are available, and the safety rear view mirror is continued. Safety door latches have been reinforced to withstand greater impacts. A three and one-half inch shock absorbing area is provided over the steering column by the new safety steering wheel, which is one inch smaller in diameter. It is mounted lower in the car for the best driving position.

Roofs have been strengthened with steel center bows. Hoods are hinged at the front so air will hold them down if they open accidentally. The hood release has been moved to the instrument panel, making the engine compartment tamper-proof when the car is locked. The fresh air intake has been moved to the cowl in front of the windshield so exhaust fumes are not drawn into the car.

For 1957, Ford offers a broad range of optional features including power-operated steering, brakes, seats and windows, as well as air conditioning, tinted glass, 6 and 8-tube radios, and heaters.
