Intensive Girl Scout Drive To Get Underway

55 MORE NOTES ARE REQUIRED TO INSURE THE CONSTRUCTION OF COMMUNITY BUILDING HERE

Before the proposed community building can become a reality and not a figment of wishful thinking, 55 additional \$100 notes must be signed, ac-

ording to C. W. Grant, head of the building drive. Forty-five notes have been signed by local citizens, guaranteeing a sum of \$4,500. Ap-

proximately \$10,000 is needed to assure a building of adequate size to fulfill the purpose for which it is intended. Tentative plans are for structure 50 x 100 feet, to be located west of the baseball park.

Due date for the notes will be three years from the time construction begins. These \$100 notes will be held by Dubb Granbery of Olton State Bank as security in payment of the building costs. Grant emphasized that Mr. Granbery has offered a very satisfactory loan arrangement for three years.

Anyone desiring to make a straight \$100 cash donation is asked to first sign a note and, after building has begun, to pay his personal note off at the bank. Notes will be considerably decreased by a great number of small bank drafts which numerous people have already signed. This money is to be drawn out of their accounts monthly and applied to the \$10,000 total.

"It is planned and hoped that all notes will be paid off at the end of the three years, thereby not necessitating the signer to pay off their own notes—or at least, not the entire amount," Grant announced.

The community clubhouse will be primarily for the use of all teen-age and pre-teen organizations and for scout activities, both boy and girl. With the exception of the regular meeting nights set up for the Boy Scouts, the building will be available on all remaining nights to various organization and groups.

Grant stated that it is planned that the building will be referred to as the Boy Scout building because those 50 to 100 boys will be responsible for building and ground maintenance.

Governing body for the clubhouse will be a committee of Lions Club members.

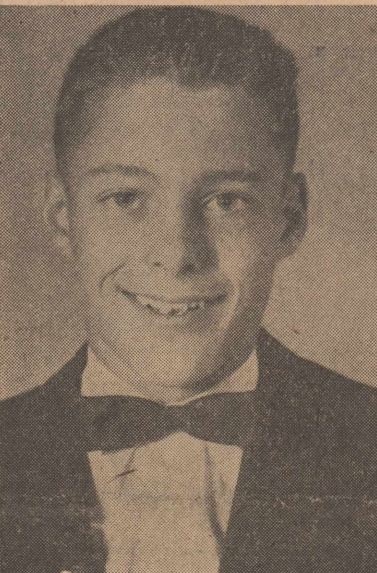

J. C. JONES IS CLAIMED BY DEATH

J. C. Jones, Jr., 45, prominent Olton farmer and civic leader, died at Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas Wednesday morning at 9:54 o'clock after a long illness.

A member of the First Baptist Church, Jones was an avid sports fan and took an active interest in various projects of the FFA boys. He was a member of the volunteer fire department and Quarterback Club. Because of his longstanding activity in the Quarterback Club and Olton sport activities, members have been given a report of his condition at each meeting this fall.

Jones was born in Plainview on Jan. 3, 1911, one of five children of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Jones, Sr. The family moved to a ranch near Ninaview, Colo., in 1918 where they lived until they returned to the Olton community in 1922.

He graduated from Olton High School in 1931 where he was a star player on the Mustang football squad.

After marrying Miss Pauline Hipp of Olton in 1935, he studied for the ministry at Wayland College in Plainview. Upon leaving college, he and his wife farmed in Olton for a time, followed by a three-year stay in Colorado. They returned to Texas and have been Olton citizens since that time.

Jones maintained farming interests near Springfield, Colo., as well as Olton, and spent considerable time there.

Funeral services will be in the Olton First Baptist Church Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with the Rev. John E. Lewis, pastor, and the Rev. J. R. Jennings, former Presbyterian minister, officiating. Burial will be in the Olton Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Pauline; mother, Mrs. J. C. Jones, Sr.; four children, John Paul, Roy Neal, twin daughters Linda and Glenda, all of the home; two brothers, Forrest N. Jones of Ninaview, Colo., and E. C. Jones of Olton; two sisters, Mrs. Matanelene Robertson of Ninaview and Mrs. Athol Light, Olton.

Preceding Jones in death were his father, who died in 1944, and his brother, H. A. Jones, who died in 1955.

Pallbearers will be Bailey Hair, Ed Truelock, Clesto Black, Dubb Granbery, Paul Burrus, John Rice of Hart, and Charlie Barber of Ninaview, Colo.

Walthall Produces Top Cotton Bale; Good Middling Goes In Loan At 37.23

One of the best bales of cotton ever produced in the Olton trade territory was brought in to Straw-Burrow Gin recently by Albert Walthall.

The bale was graded good

middling (best possible) and its staple was an inch and five thirty-seconds.

The bale went into the loan at 37.23 per pound. The bale weighed 560 pounds.

"I've raised cotton all my life and that's my best," declared Mr. Walthall.

"I've always wanted to produce a bale that that," he said, "but that's the first time I ever did it." Mr. Walthall said his cotton is producing from a bale and a quarter to the acre to as much as two bales to the acre on alfalfa land.

He said several bales of his cotton have gone at more than 36 cents a pound. Lint turnouts have been good.

The cotton was 15-17 Acala. Mr. Walthall purchased the seed at Olton Farm Supply.

Mustangs Thump Hereford In Homecoming Thriller

Olton's resurging Mustangs thrilled a near capacity homecoming crowd Friday night with an impressive 19 to 6 win over the AAA Hereford Whitefaces here in Memorial Stadium.

Hard-charging David Price scored all 19 Mustang points and was named Globe-News player of the week earlier in the season. Estes was a prime target in Friday night's clash as "get 26" resounded up and down the Hereford line.

It was a different crew of Ponies Friday night in comparison to the herd that was handily hobbled by Hale Center the week before.

Hereford took the kickoff and was forced to punt after four plays.

The Mustangs took over on the 38 yard line. Price picked up seven yards on a keeper and then Estes went over right end for a first down. Dan Wallace picked up five on a pitch out and then Estes went around end for the second Mustang first and 10.

Wallace carried 28 sizzling

yards to the 16 and the Mustangs were headed TDward.

Price picked up a yard. Estes carried to the 7 and then Price went to the 1. It was Price again with the ball and he went over standing up for the first score with 6:46 left to play in the opening quarter.

Estes tried a kick. It went wide but the Whitefaces were offside and the Ponies got a second chance. This time Price bulled across for the extra point.

Olton got off a bad kick that gave the ball to the Whitefaces on the 50 yard line. A few plays later Estes pounced on a Hereford fumble and the Mustangs owned the ball on the 40 yard

line. After failing to pick up a first down, Price quick-kicked into the end zone and the ball went into play on the 20.

Olton lads trapped the Hereford carrier behind the line but an offside penalty made it first and five for the Whitefaces. The Whitefaces picked up a first down but a few plays later, Clinton Billingsley fell on a Hereford fumble and the Mustangs took over on the 44.

Carries by Wallace, Estes and Price put the ball on the 20 yard line. Then Olton drew a penalty that placed the ball back on the 35 and made it first and 25 yards to go.

Undaunted by the yardage

needed, Quarterback James Ray Hyatt faded and flipped a pass to Price on the 33 and from there Olton's player-of-the-week flashed into the end zone under cover of some excellent blocking.

Attempt to convert failed and the score stood at 13 to 0. Hereford took the kickoff but was in trouble almost immediately after a penalty against them. Olton got the ball on the 15 on a Whiteface punt shortly after the second quarter got underway.

The Mustangs were unable to move the ball and punted to Hereford. The Whitefaces picked up a first and 10 only to fumble on the 38 yard line where Don

Edwards recovered for Olton. Neither team could hook up for the remainder of the second quarter. Olton fumbled once but Estes got revenge for loss of the ball by intercepting a Whiteface pass as the half ended.

At halftime, the score remained 13 to 0 in favor of the hosts. The Mustangs received the kick as the second half opened. Wallace returned the kick to the 28. The Mustangs picked up two first before fumbling the ball away.

The Whitefaces' tenure of the ball was short lived. Hereford punted and Estes ran the ball back to the 32. Price quick-kicked with three yards to go on the fourth down and Here-

ford was again in possession of the ball on the 20.

The Whitefaces moved the pigskin to the 28 before fumbling.

On this series of downs Hyatt dived on an Olton fumble and then on the next play tossed his second touchdown pass to Price.

Hyatt had recovered on the 13 yard line. He screen passed to Price who scored standing up but David Miller should share in that touchdown because it was a beautiful block by this lad that unlocked the pearly gates to TD land for Mister Price.

The score was 19 to 0 after an attempt to convert failed. Hereford ran the ball back to the 40 and then scored their first and

only touchdown with exactly 32 seconds of the fourth quarter gone.

This ended scoring in the ball game in spite of the fact that Coach Joe Turner gave his reserves some experience in the final period.

David Miller did some fine blocking and also was credited with an interception during the ball game.

Fine defensive play by Edmondson, Billingsley, Carson, Estes and Kirk McAdams kept Hereford punting all evening.

Olton has an open date this week and then will meet Muleshoe's Mules at Muleshoe in the first conference game of the season a week from Friday night.

FFA Board Votes To Purchase 5-Acre Tract

Possibility of acquiring a five-acre tract of land for the primary purpose of developing a project for the FFA boys was number one on the agenda at the FFA Board of Directors' meeting Monday night.

It was voted to purchase the land from L. R. Goynne for the consideration of \$2,000. Plans are to launch a drive to establish financial support for this land purchase.

If acquired, the land will be utilized for the following purposes: (1) a FFA project where boys can feed livestock cooperatively for local and other livestock shows (2) a place for boys and girls who live in town and are members of FFA or 4-H who wish to feed livestock for shows (3) a project whereby FFA boys can carry on small-scale experiments pertaining to crops or livestock.

Merrill Brigrance, president of the FFA Board of Directors, issued the following statement: "The need for a project such as this has been brought to the attention of the board on numerous occasions, especially in cases where boys were feeding livestock within the city limits. Such a practice is a direct violation of the city ordinance, but leniency in enforcing this ordi-

nance has inevitably resulted because of no such place as this being available. We are looking to the future with this project, because as our town grows, our vocational agriculture, FFA and 4-H Club will expand. The need has become imperative."

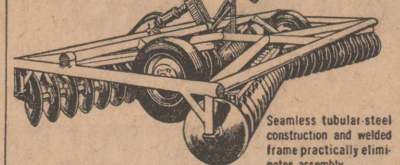
