LOCAL YOUTH **HURT AS CAR OVERTURNS**


Jerry Young, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Young and a junior student in Olton High School, suffered a broken shoulder and bruised jaw when the "hot rod" in which he was riding overturned out on his parents' place southwest of town. The accident occurred Monday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock. Other occupants of the car were Harold Dean Nicholson, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Nicholson, and Lennon Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Young, norelation to Jerry. Lennon was uninjured and Harold Dean received a leg bruise.

The three boys were riding out in the field at the Young's place when the stripped-down car hit soft dirt and overturned, pinning Jerry underneath. The other two boys lifted the car off of Jerry and they pulled the car out of the field with a tractor. The car belongs to a group of high school boys.

Jerry's parents took him to the Medical Arts Clinic-Hospital in Littlefield where he was treated by Dr. R. E. Maurer and given x-ray examinations. Placed in a cast from the waist up, he will stay in the Littlefield hospital for a week.

His mother said that, although he can return to school next week, he will remain in a cast for six weeks.




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

Janice Ford and Teddy Jack Estes are Miss and Mr. OHS for 1956-57 following a recent election of school personalities by high school students.


